Gray fox killed in town Monday



She said the goats were "pretty stirred up" and wants to remind pet owners to keep their animals' rabies shots up to date.





Turner will meet with constituents on the courthouse square at 10:00 a.m. and invites everyone to stop by with any questions they may have.





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How about a living Christmas tree this year?

One of the most important and recognizable trees is the Christmas tree. For many years, people have used cut live and also the artificial trees that always look so perfect and yet to me, that just don't have the Christmas touch. But to each his own, and they are all special in making the home have that holiday spirit.

Becoming more popular nowadays is the living Christmas tree that you can transplant to your landscape

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when the holidays are over. Here are three to four inches of soil on all sides a few things to consider when deal- of the soil ball. It should be planted at kind of organic matter, to reduce ing with living trees.

The first thing to do is pick out a tree. Consider the following: Aleppo Pine, Japanese Black Pine, Japanese Yew, Loblolly Pine, Deodar cedar, Juniper, or other coniferous evergreens. Perhaps you prefer a broad leafed tree; possibilities include: American Holly, Burford Holly, Compact Cherry Laurel, or Yaupon. Or you might decide on a tubbed plant to remain inside after the Christmas season? The Norfolk Island Pine, kumquats, calamondins, or Yews would be

Once the tree is chosen (if it isn't tubbed), a container must be chosen soil to dry a little between waterings. as well. Now that the tree is in the container and in the house, you can start to give the kids a little leeway. All you have to do now is find a good place for the tree that is not in the stream of heat or near a stove or radiator. When not occupied, the room should be kept as cool as possible, and the plant should be watered when dry. A simple way to tell when the plant needs water is to push a sharpened pencil into the soil. If the pencil comes out dry and clean, the plant needs water; otherwise, wait until the next day.

After Christmas, it is best to plant the tree in the landscape as soon as possible. The selected site for the tree should fit into the landscape design, and allow sufficient room for growth and development. The pit dug for the tree should be large enough to allow

the same depth it was planted at the weeds and conserve moisture. nursery or in the container. 





Don't try to move the seriously injured unless they are in immediate danger of further injury. Call for help. Turn on radio or television to get the latest emergency information. Stay out of damaged buildings. Return home only when authorities say it is safe. Use the telephone only for emergency calls. Clean up spilled medicines, bleaches, or gasoline or other flammable liquids Immediately. Leave the buildings if you smell gas or chemical fumes. Take pictures of the damage- both to the house and its contents- for insurance purposes. Remember to help your neighbors who may require special assistance-infants, the elderly, and people with disabilities.



IMPORTANT READ THIS, SAY NO TO EXTRA EMAIL CHARGE

Please read the following carefully if you intend to stay on-line and continue using email: The last few months have revealed an alarming trend in the Government of the United States attempting to quietly push through legislation that will affect your use of the Internet. Under proposed legislation the U.S. Postal Service will be attempting to bill email users out of "alternate postage fees". Bill 602P will permit the Federal Govt. to charge a 5 cent surcharge on every email delivered, by billing Internet Service Providers at source. The consumer would then be billed in turn by the ISP. Washington D.C. lawyer Richard Stepp is working without pay to prevent this legislation from becoming law. The U.S. Postal Service is claiming that lost revenue due to the proliferation of email is costing nearly\$230,000,000 in revenue per year. You may have noticed their recent ad campaign "There is nothing like a letter". Since the average citizen received about 10 pieces of email per day in 1998, the cost to the typical individual would be an additional 50 cents per day or over \$180 dollars per year, above and beyond their regular Internet costs. Note that this would be money paid directly to the U.S.Postal Service for a service they do not even provide. The whole point of the Internet is democracy and noninterference. If the federal government is permitted to tamper with our liberties by adding a surcharge to email, who knows where it will end. You are already paying an exorbitant price for snail mail because of bureaucratic inefficiency. It currently takes up to 6 days for a letter to be delivered from New York to Buffalo. If the U.S. Postal Service is allowed to tinker with email, it will mark the end of the "free" Internet in the United States. One congressman, Tony Schnell (r) has even suggested a "twenty to Forty dollar per month surcharge on all Internet service" above and beyond the government's proposed email

charges. Note that most of the major newspapers have ignored the story, the only exception being the Washingtonian which called the idea of email surcharge "a useful concept whose time has come" (March 6th 1999 Editorial) Don't sit by and watch your freedom erode away!

Thompson now has staked location for the No. 24 Thompson as a confirmation test. It is in a 559acre lease, GC&SFRR Survey A-5108. The well pumped oil at the rate of 35 barrels per day, registering 165 PSI tubing pressure in the process

Thompson drilled to total depth of 9,025 feet but plugged back to 8,280. Production is in the Ellenberger formation, 7,759 to 7,763 feet into the hole.

County approved for livestock assistance program

Texas Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs announced last week that there are currently 128 Texas counties approved by the U.S. Department of Agriculture Farm Service Agency for the Livestock Assistance Program.

LAP, administered by FSA, provides direct payments to eligible livéstock producers in approved counties that have suffered grazing losses due to natural disasters during 1999. Nátionwide, \$200 million has been allocated for livestock producers for weather-related loses as part of the \$8.7 billion farm assistance package passed in October. An additional \$10 million in funding was approved in the recently passed H.R, 3194 which pro vides \$576 million in additional emergency funding.

For drought-related losses, LAP benefits are available in approved counties where precipitation was 40 percent or more below normal for at least four months and where there was at least a 40 percent loss of available grazing during a 90-day period dufing 1999. Eligible livestock include beef and dairy cattle; buffalo or bee falo when maintained on the same basis as beef cattle; sheep, goats swine and equine animals used com mercially for human food or kept for the production of food or fiber on the owner's farm or ranch.

Included in the 128 approved counties are: Crockett, Reagan Schleicher, Sutton and Upton. Addi tional counties are pending approval and will be announced as they become eligible for the LAP.



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
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
