"Both occupants were wearing their seat belts, but the woman had her seat reclined and it did not restrain her. She was partially ejected from the vehicle by the rollover, causing the fatal injuries," said DPS Cpl. Ben English.

January 11-13 the Texas Sheep Dog Association and the Ozona Chamber of Commerce will hold the second leg of the Winter Olympics Dog Trials in Ozona

The trials will be held at the Double "T" Ranch on Airport Road, next to the Ozona Municipal Airport. Trials will begin at daylight and run until dark. Peter Hetherington of Scotland will judge approximately 115 dogs in five competing classes.

"Come out to see the amazing abilities of these sheep dogs as they drive sheep through the difficult obstacles of the course and enjoy the beautiful ranch atmosphere," invites Shelly Childress, executive director of the chamber. A concession stand will be open. Bring your lawn chairs.

The days and events are: Tuesday, Jan. 11 - Open Class, Top Qualifying 10 Dogs; Wednesday, Jan. 12 -Open Finals, Ranch Class, Novice Class; Thursday, Jan. 13 - Open Ranch Class, Nursery Class.





# **Post Office says** e-mail rumor untrue

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A release dated May 21, 1999, on the U.S. Postal Service's web site address says the rumor is untrue that the government will place a surcharge on e-mail messages.

According to the release from the post office, "The e-mail message claims that a 'Congressman Schnell' has introduced 'Bill 602P' to allow the federal government to impose a 5-cent surcharge on each e-mail message delivered over the Internet. The money would be collected by Internet service providers and then turned over now host in and instruction to the Postal Service.





# What you can do about holiday or Y2K stress

Whether mild stress brought on by a car that won't start to the stress intense stress of losing a loved one, everyone experiences it. Learning to recognize the normal reactions and emotions that stress may cause can help you become more comfortable and effective in coping with it. The following information explains some of the feelings and behaviors that can result from stress.

Things to look for: Behaviors

Having problems getting to sleep or staying asleep

Isolating or withdrawing from others

Keeping excessively busy and preoccupied to avoid stressful thoughts or situations

previously were enjoyable

Becoming overly alert or easily startled

or tension with family members or other people

Easily crying or becoming tearful for no apparent reason

Eating noticeably more or less than usual

Feelings

Feeling just "not myself," out of balance, or easily upset

Feeling a loss of interest in everyday activities

Feeling a sense of despair, hopelessness or emptiness about the future Feeling anxious or fearful, especially in connection to sources of

stress Feeling irritable, short-tempered,

or angry and resentful Feeling depressed, sad or down

Difficulty making decisions

Frequently replaying stressful of holidays or Y2K concerns to the events and circumstances in your mind

> Recurring dreams or even nightmares related to sources of stress

> Questioning of spiritual or religious beliefs

### Health

If stress continues over time, physical health can be adversely affected. It is common for headaches, stomach or intestinal problems, colds, viruses and increase in allergies to occur more frequently. Also, pre-existing medical conditions such as heart problems and high blood pressure may be aggravated by prolonged stress

Mental Health

Stress may adversely affect men-Losing interest in activities that tal health as well as physical health. Anxiety and depression can occur as a result of stress. If you already have a mental health problem, stress can Experiencing increased conflicts make it worse. How to cope and what works

> Stress can bring about physical, mental and emotional fatigue. It is important to remember that it can take time to heal from the effects of stress. However, using some proven tools to cope with stress can help reduce the intensity and duration of its effects. For Yourself

Talk to others about how you are tions. feeling.

Don't become isolated. Seek and maintain connections with community friends, relatives, coworkers or church members. Talk about your experiences with them.

Take time for recreation, relaxation or a favorite hobby.

Pay close attention to your physiactivity and exercise can help, too.

Upsetting times can cause some people to use alcohol or drugs to cope with stress. This way of coping doesn't help in the long run and is stress. likely to cause other problems.

For Your Family

Families should keep some routines in place such as regular meals, certain enjoyable activities, and other family rituals. This will help provide a sense of order and normality.

Couples need to attend to their relationship, as this is often overlooked when one or both partners are under stress. Take time to be alone together, to talk about how you feel, and to have fun together.

Take time to talk with your children. Listen to what they have to say and let them freely express their feelings. Remember that children do not have the same level of coping or understanding that you have.

People with a physical or mental disability and older adults are especially vulnerable to stress. You may have many of the same reactions and feelings already mentioned. However, some reactions to stress can be different or intensified, as described below. It's important to ask for support when you need it.

## **Texas establishes concealed** handgun license reciprocity with neighboring states

Residents of Louisiana, Okla-\* Welfare concern on juvenile. Juvenile homa and Arkansas with concealed state now can legally carry concealed handguns in Texas and vice versa.
