





This comes after an 11-month period in which the "claims rate has" gone down considerably," according to County Treasurer Burl Myers. Claims through November of 1999 were down "by somewhere around \$300,000.00," Myers said.

The insurance cost was \$645,524.00 in 1999. The bid for 2000 increased the amount by \$345,578.00. County health insurance covers an estimated 150 employees and their dependents.


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A Texas hunting story

Ken Branum of Hereford delights in making up stories and passing them along like they were true. He loves to pull practical jokes on people. Playing by the rules

Rules are important. Since the first man walked out of the forest and agreed to share a cave with a fellow human, rules have been needed to make sure we all live together in the safest, fairest way possible."

Millions of years later, in the town of Philadelphia, a group of men took the concept one step further. They decided to form a society in which the rules would not be used to bend the people to the government's will, but to bend the government to the will of the people. We do elect one man - and perhaps in the not-to-distant-future, one woman - to run the whole show. But we also hire five hundred thirty five men and women to make sure he can't do anything that we, the American people, don't want him to do.

In the past few months, the administration has decided that there are exceptions. Fifty million acres in federal land have been put completely offlimits to development, three new monuments have been designated in California and Arizona, and the rules for how to use tens of millions more acres in federal land have been made much stricter. There's nothing un-American about putting land aside. What's wrong is the way the president and the administration went about it. They didn't think Congress would go for the idea of sealing off such a colossal amount of land without letting communities may be eligible have a say in the matter. So, they decided they wouldn't take the path the Constitution lays out, and let your elected representatives vote on it. Instead, for other services the president just did it, over-stretching the power he has to issue an "execu-

The administration is trying to put a padlock on so much land that its own bureaucracy is running a dizzying race trying to hold hearings and collect public comments. Lyle Laverty, a forester in the Rocky Mountains, said that the speed at which the Administration has pushed through these initiatives has confused the public.

It's not the first time that the White House has taken a shortcut around Capitol Hill to get something done. The recent American Heritage Rivers Initiative (AHRI) was a move to extend government control to rivers across the country, though on the surface it was disguised as a plan to simply coordinate federal programs. It increased federal control over the Rio Grande, and gave bureaucrats a way to have a big say so in how millions of acres surrounding the river are used. Even politicians who once supported AHRI are now realizing it was a mistake.

It is because of our system of checks and balances, of making sure that neither Congress nor the president can act alone, that our country has grown from the world's red-headed stepchild to the world's strongest, richest, most powerful nation. No government program is worth bending the Constitution

SSI recipients

People in financial need who are age 65 or older, or people of any age (including children) who are blind or have a disability, may be eligible for monthly Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments. But did you know that other benefits may be available for eligible SST recipients?

If you receive SSI payments, you usually get medical assistance (Medicaid) automatically. You may also be eligible for food stamps. Social Security doesn't decide if you can get them, FM radio proposals but if everyone in your household is applying for or receiving SSI, you may Social Security office. Additional social services may be

available to you through your local department of human services or public welfare. Examples include:

- · homemaker services; · rehabilitation services;
- · protective services; and
- · adult/community placement ser-





Others scoring in the first half were Faught with three, Cole Wadsworth and Ryan Bean, two each.


