Drought conditions in Crockett official rain gauges around the county, Seahorn from records kept by County may have produced dusty, bar- and this past year's results from the water table.

The 30 wells measured each November by Emerald Underground Water District showed no substantial decrease, "a little, but not much," said district manager Dennis Clark.

"The average on the 30 wells mately three-fourths of a foot.

"Surprisingly enough, with no more recharge than we've had, water levels have stayed stabilized," said Clark. The topography of the land has a lot to do with water levels, Clark explained, rather than different rainfall amounts in various parts of the county.

Emerald has one well in Ozona which it monitors daily, and the Crockett County WC&ID#1 monitors wells daily on the east and west hills of Ozona, at the Thompson Ranch north of town and at Crockett Heights.

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The average monthly water level for the Emerald well was 328.42 feet for the year. The water was at its highest in July at a depth of 326.98 feet and at its lowest in October at the 329.70 foot level.

The lowest level for the east hill wells was at 379.97 feet in January 1999, and the highest was in June with a depth of 359.09 feet. The west hill water elevation was at a depth of 329.7 for its lowest in October and at its highest level in July at 326.98 feet.



OSHA's ergonomics proposal on hold

Washington, D.C. - U.S. Rep. Henry Bonilla, R-Texas, welcomed the Occupational Safety and Health Administration's decision today to wait a little longer before letting its ergonomics proposal become law. The deadline for public comment, originally slated for Tuesday, will be extended to March 2. The ergonomics proposal was announced last year on November 22.

"A longer extension is really needed for a regulation of this magnitude, but I am pleased to see that OSHA has listened to the concerns of many of us both here in Congress and in the small business community. The comment time that had been proposed was incredibly short," said Bonilla. "It is ridiculous to claim that 60 days is adequate time for small businesses owners to thoroughly review this 1000 page regulation."


Ergonomics refers to injuries caused by repeated motions. No unbiased evidence exists that fully documents the extent and causes of these injuries. Under OSHA's proposal, about 1.6 million companies that employ workers in very physical jobs, such as production or manufacturing, would have to have a basic ergonomics program. While OSHA claims the regulation would cost around \$4 billion, the Small Business Administration estimates the proposal will cost more than \$18 billion per year.

"OSHA is rushing to administer the medicine before we fully understand the medical problem. They're asking businessmen to act as doctors, guessing at solutions which we should wait for medical professionals to give us," said Bonilla.

The National Academy of Sciences is currently studying ergonomic injuries and any link they may have to the workplace. The administration has fought against this study by experts. The study was commissioned by Congress in 1998 and is expected to be completed in January 2001.


