## **No Condemnation**

All her accusers walked away. Jesus asked, "Did no one condemn you?" The answer of the adulteress was simple. "No one, Lord." Jesus then said two astounding things. "I do not condemn you, either. Go. From now on sin no more" (John 8:10-11). Jesus Christ did not come to bring condemnation.

Adultery already violates God's standards. "You shall not commit adultery" (Exodus 20:14). The penalty for adultery was death. "If there is a man who commits adultery with another man's wife, one who commits adultery with his friend's wife, the adulterer and the adulteress shall surely be put to death" (Leviticus 20:10). The New Testament adds these solemn words, "The wages of sin is death" (Romans 6:23). The Old Testament penalty reflects the awesome spiritual reality.

At the same time, "God sent not his Son into the world to condemn the world; but that the world through him might be saved" (John 3:17). Jesus did not condemn. He did not condone the woman's sin either. "Sin no more." Salvation means new life. God removes guilt and the propensity to sin. God also provides a new bent of heart. "There is now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus. For the law of the Spirit of life in Christ Jesus has set you free from the law of sin and of death" (Romans 8:1).

### An immoral tax

John and Sue Rogers (not their real names) got married on Valentine's Day, They were young and, like most Americans, had their share of debt. But they were determined to work hard, watch what they spent and, eventually, save enough money to buy a home and start a family. Every month, they found ways to put a little money aside. John picked up extra shifts at work, while Sue continued to run a beauty parlor out of their basement. They spent a lot of evenings at home, and ate a lot of macaroni. Within a year, it looked like all the effort was paying off. The couple had just enough for a down payment on a blue house in a quiet neighborhood, with a yard just big enough for a

Then, they did their taxes. Immediately, the house went up in smoke. As it turned out, the government wanted an extra \$1300 from them. Why, they wondered? They weren't making more than the year before. The only difference? John and Sue had become man and wife, and were now getting hit with the "marriage tax."

It sounds ridiculous, the very idea that a couple should owe more to the government simply because they vow to love, honor, and cherish one another: But it's true. If you're married, and both you and your spouse have to work, you will pay more than another couple that's not married. The average couple will pay an extra \$1400 a year just because they're married, because married couples are taxed at a higher rate than unmarried couples. It's an immoral tax. It's a tax that hurts families.

Last week, the U.S. House of Representatives passed a bill to end the marriage tax. The "Marriage Tax Penalty Relief Act of 2000" doesn't give married couples special treatment. It gives them fair treatment, taxing them at the same rate as unmarried couples. Right now, a married couple living together gets a \$7350 standard deduction on their taxes. An unmarried couple living together gets \$8800. This bill allows married couples to take the \$8800 deduction as well.

The White House has already promised to veto this bill. There are a lot of men and women in Washington right now working to see that the marriage tax is banished from IRS books forever. But there are a lot of people who want to keep it. Now's the time to speak up. Write the president. Tell him the marriage tax is unfair. Urge him to sign this bill in to law when Congress sends it to him. If enough Americans write, he'll have no choice but to listen.

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

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
