#### Faced with OSHA's refusal to hold hearings in Texas, Bonilla holds his own hearings The EMS has received a 1994 nel.

Forums to be held in two weeks in 10 West Texas towns Washington, D.C. — Two days after being informed by Secretary of

Labor Alexis Herman that no hearings on the proposed ergonomics regulation will be held in the South Southwest, or Southeast, U.S. Rep. Henry Bonilla, R-Texas, has decided to hold his own hearing. OSHA has refused to hold public hearings on the ergonomics proposal south of Washington D.C. The hearings are being held in Washington D.C., Chicago, and Port-

"My staff and I will be traveling to ten small Texas towns in two days, listening to the concerns of hundreds of small business owners concerning this thousand page regulation. We plan to compile what we learn and present it to OSHA," said Bonilla. The town hall meetings will take place on April 18 and 19. The details are still being worked out, but locations will include Fort Stockton. Iraan, Midland. Odessa, Crane, Big Lake, and Ozona.

In a letter to OSHA dated February 29th, and then again at a hearing on March 22, Bonilla asked OSHA officials why no public hearings were being held in the South or Southwest regions of the United States, and asked that this oversight be corrected. In a letter to Bonilla received April 4, Secretary of Labor Alexis Herman replied that the three northern cities hosting the hearings are "major transportation 'hubs' and readily accessible to people throughout the nation."

"Their response is condescending towards small businessmen, and absolutely shows no comprehension of the problems facing them. While I'm sure holding hearings in the North is very convenient for Mr. Herman, who has the luxury of traveling at government expense, there are thousands of small businessmen in Texas and across the South for whom traveling great distances to these hearings is simply not possible," said Bonilla.

"I would encourage my Colleagues in the South and Southwest to consider holding their own informal public hearings in their districts. OSHA's refusal to travel South leaves us no other option."

Rep. Bonilla will be traveling to Ozona on Wednesday, April 19, to talk about OSHA's proposed ergonomics regulation. The meeting will last from 3:00 to 3:45 p.m. at the Ozona Chamber of Commerce, located at 404 11th Street. All members of the business community are encouraged

As of April 6, Crockett County had only a 40% response rate. The target rate is 70% before the census count swings into the no-response follow-up operation in May and June.





#### The Tax Man Cometh

Many of you are no doubt reading this column at the breakfast table, juggling the morning paper, cup of coffee, and cereal as you try to get off to work. If your son or daughter were to ask you why you go to work, you would probably say something like, "to buy groceries, buy your clothes, and pay the bills." Fair enough. But this week we are all staring down the biggest bill of all: the federal income tax. It's a bill that costs the average American more than food, clothing, and shelter combined. The first two hours of every work day is spent making enough money to pay for your slice of the government's tax revenue pie.

It wasn't always this way.

Up until the Civil War, there was no income tax. The government had to collect taxes for a few years to pay for the war, but as soon as the war was over the Supreme Court ruled it unconstitutional. How did the American people like their flirtation with the tax? During the tax's most successful year, 276, 661 people filed tax returns. The country had about 38 million citizens at the time.


Right before World War I, the government tried the income tax again. This time it stuck, backed up by the newly passed 16th Amendment which made it constitutional.

77 years later, the tax code is out of control. It's a labyrinth with so many twist and turns that the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants has been publically saying the tax code should be simpler for more than ten years now. One of the organization's leaders, David Lifson, was quoted by the Associated Press as saying, "When over half our individual taxpayers [don't really understand] the tax system something is not right...The end result is erosion of voluntary compliance. It is only human to disobey a law if you do not or cannot understand the rules."

The gargantuan tax code's given birth to distrust of the government, and a hatred of the IRS that is rivaled only by fear of the agency. One magazine survey found that the most frightening words people answers, "Here". can imagine hearing were, "This is the IRS calling."

We have a duty to make the tax code simple. We have a duty to asked to R.S.V.P. to Doug McNeely make it fair. In short, we have a duty to end the IRS as we know it, and replace it with a simple and fair tax system.

There are several different ways the tax code could be overhauled. We could have a national sales tax instead. We could also have a flat tax, which would mean everyone would have the same percentage of the money they make go towards the federal government. Whatever the answer, all the potential solutions need to be thoroughly examined, poked and prodded by Congress and the American people. Whether you think the answer lies with a sales tax, a flat tax, or with a whole other option, we should all be able to agree on one thing: the current tax code cannot be allowed to stand.







In the ten or so years I've been removed from your fair town, there are memories I've taken with me that I think about often and fondly. My childhood was spent there. For all intents and purposes, I was reared there. The most impressionable periods of my life were spent there. I learned good from bad there and I was taught Okay...you get the idea. Ozona was a decent place to grow up. You had barbecues and swimming pools and rodeo dances and quinceaneras and proms and football games and all the purest most wonderful trimmings of a kid being a kid in small town West Texas. However...and you knew there had to be a "however"...the darker, more sinister qualities of Ozona have a habit of rearing their ugly heads far too often, and with far more clarity than its innocence.

The most disturbing thing about Ozona is the way that shady politics and ol' boy network influence has stripped the community of some of its most dedicated people.

Now, that said, I'd like to turn my attention to the most recent debacle in Crockett County politics. Even as I write this, I still cannot fathom how a community of supposedly intelligent and civic minded people could collectively make such a boneheaded decision.

Frank Reavis was by far the best teacher I ever had. From Kindergarten through five and a half years of college, I learned more from Mr. Reavis about life and how to live it than from any other educator I can think of save my father. And for those of you who know my Dad, that's an extremely high standard to meet. Although my limitations in math and science were many, I relished every minute in Mr. Reavis' class because I knew that, unlike most teachers I encountered, his goal was not to teach me physics or chemistry or calculus. His goal was to teach me to exercise my mind, so that years down the road when I'd forgotten the Pythagorean Theorem, I could still think critically and use logic to deduce right actions from wrong ones. And he did it with flair and with humor. He challenged me, he entertained me, he scolded me and he cared about me and what happened to me...as he did for each and every student that passed through his classroom door in over thirty years of teaching. I never heard one student, either before or after my time in school ever complain about anything Mr. Reavis did in class or beyond the borders of the campus. Yet, based on rumour, innuendo, and the backhanded slap of local influence, Frank Reavis was robbed of his livelihood. But more importantly, future students were robbed of his influence.

To those of you instrumental in this robbery, I hope you're happy. I hope you got exactly what you wished for. Many is the time in my life when I've been warned, "Be careful what you wish for ... you might get it." Your myopic vision and petty concerns have irreparably damaged the education your children are going to receive. I have no doubt that Mr. Reavis will be fine. He's a strong man of impeccable character that can retire knowing he impacted the lives of countless young people as positively as possible for any public school teacher. If only you sad folks had the same strength, passion, and resolve.

Oh...one more thing. Mr. Reavis, to you I say thank you. I know that as a teacher you don't hear that often enough. I truly appreciate the effort you put forth in order to enrich my life. I am the first to admit that I wasn't the easiest student to reach. But rest assured, you did reach me. I will always be grateful to you for your patience, your kindness, your effort, the discipline you sometimes had to administer, and the friendship you didn't have to administer...but did anyway.
