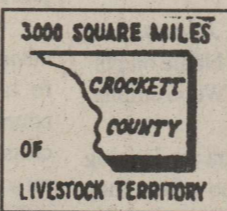

Texas and Ozona schools graduate ranking makes the Wall Street Journal

Automatic admission to Texas public universities and the measures some high schools and students take to assure those admissions made the front page of *The Wall Street Journal* May 15. Included in the story, which focuses mainly on the scholastic rankings games some urban schools play, was one paragraph about Ozona.

In 1997, the Texas Legislature passed a law providing automatic admission to the state's public universities for students ranking in the top 10% of their class. This law, which went into effect in the 1998-99 school year, marks a return to the class rank method of selection for college admission, a result of The University of Texas' race-based admission policy being struck down by a federal court in 1996.

Under the 10% rule, "the top 10% of a high school class shall not contain more than 10% of the total class size." According to the *Journal* article, however, some schools "fudge" on the figures to get more of their students into the magic 10%.

Schools in Donna and Ozona were the only non-urban districts mentioned in the article.

Ozona adheres strictly to the 10% rule according to counselor David McWilliams. Ozona counts grades in core classes and other academics. No physical education related classes or local credit classes (such as office aide) figure into the rankings. Next year, grades for spring band and all senior band will apply.

"Our top 10% have always gone to the (state) schools of their choice for the most part anyway if they get their paperwork in on time," said McWilliams.

Even though being in the top 10% entitles a student to admission at a state public university, applications do have to be made in a timely manner.

Ozona's advanced placement calculus class had 19 enrolled at the be-

ginning of the year. This soon dropped to nine as students became concerned that the difficult course might knock them out of the top 10% of the class according to the *Journal* story.

The article stated that "Teacher Gerry Webb promised the other students - and their parents - to go easy on grades. 'Instead of making 91 or 88, they're making 95 or 99,' he says."

Webb told *The Stockman* Tuesday that his comment reported in the *Journal* was made with "no intent whatsoever to offend anybody". That statement was only one of many made in the course of the interview, according to Webb.

Last year was the first year for advance placement calculus in OHS, and about half the material was covered, Webb said. It takes three to four years to get the program started.

"This year I wanted to get completely through the program (AP calculus material) to see what the course requires. The kids were concerned about keeping up, keeping their grades up. There were two choices, to slow the course down, or my personal choice, keep the pace up and not grade as strict.

"I felt like if I taught to the AP level, for most it would have brought the grades down. It was more important that they learn, come out with the knowledge. The grade was not important to me.

"I never really increased it to an AP level," said Webb of the class. "For the first six weeks, we did every problem in class. We worked it in class all year long."

Rather than water down the course, students were graded on a curve. "Not anyone came up into the top 10% because of this," Webb said. "I wanted to get the top end of math (at OHS) on the college level. I feel

Trustees wrap up the school year and prepares for 2001

In their regular monthly meeting that was held on Tuesday, May 9, members of the Ozona School Board approved the taking of bids or bid quotations for products to be purchased during the next school year.

The district will take bids according to the following schedule: gasoline products for the 2000-01 school year will be approved in the June school board meeting; quotations for band instruments to be purchased during the 2000-01 school year will be approved at the June board meeting; bids for athletic supplies for the 2000-01 school year will be approved in the June board meeting; bids for property, liability, vehicle, and workers' com-

pensation insurance for the 2000-01 school year will be approved in the July board meeting; bids for cafeteria products for the 2000-01 school year will be approved in the July board meeting; and, bids for employee health insurance for the 2000-01 school year will be approved in the August board meeting.

The board conducted a public hearing on the use of the district's Title VI federal funds (\$5,277.00) and Title I federal funds (\$260,301.00) for the 2000-01 school year. During the public hearing Superintendent of Schools Larry Taylor said, "We are recommending that our Title VI funds of \$5,277.00 be used to continue to upgrade our libraries by purchasing Accelerated Reader library books.

Next year will be our fifth year to use our Title I regular funds of \$260,301.00 to administer a campus-wide program at all four campuses. We are also recommending that we continue to concentrate our 2000-01 Title I federal funds on improving

reading and math at the primary and intermediate campuses as well as the summer school of 2001 for grades kindergarten through twelve based on extended services for students whose academic performance needs acceleration."

During the meeting Cynthia Hokit, school business manager and certified notary, administered the Oath of Office to recent elected trustees Veronica Tijerina and Laurie Hale. After the Oath of Office had been administered, Board President Wade Richardson presented retiring board member David Bean with a letter of appreciation and a plaque in honor of his 12 years of service to the Crockett County Consolidated Common School District.

The board certified Supt. Taylor as the district's representative on the Regional Advisory Committee to the Region XV Education Service Center in San Angelo for the 200-01 school year, and it approved the district's participation in the Region XV Education Service Center Math/Science Shared Service Agreement and the waiver for professional development. The board also elected officers for the 2000-01 school year. Wade Richardson was re-elected as Board President, Elliott Barrera was elected as Board Vice President, and Veronica Tijerina was elected Board Secretary.

Ozona High School teacher Pete Maldonado and students Joseph Knaack, Terry Davis, and Josh Tambunga gave the Board a demonstration of the curriculum that is being used in the Ozona High School Networking Technology Class, and Supt. Taylor presented reports on redistricting, acceptance of the district's audit report by the Texas Education Agency, and grades 3-8 and 10 results on the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) for the 1999-2000 school year. He also reported that an

evaluation report on the Ozona High School Block Schedule would be presented during the June meeting of the board.

During the meeting the trustees went into executive session to discuss the purchase of property, but no board action was taken on this agenda item. The meeting was adjourned following an affirmative vote to set the date and time for the board's June regular meeting on June 15 at 7:00 p.m.

Other seniors receiving special recognition during the evening were Band Sweetheart and Beau, Kayla Shurley and Ernie Hernandez.

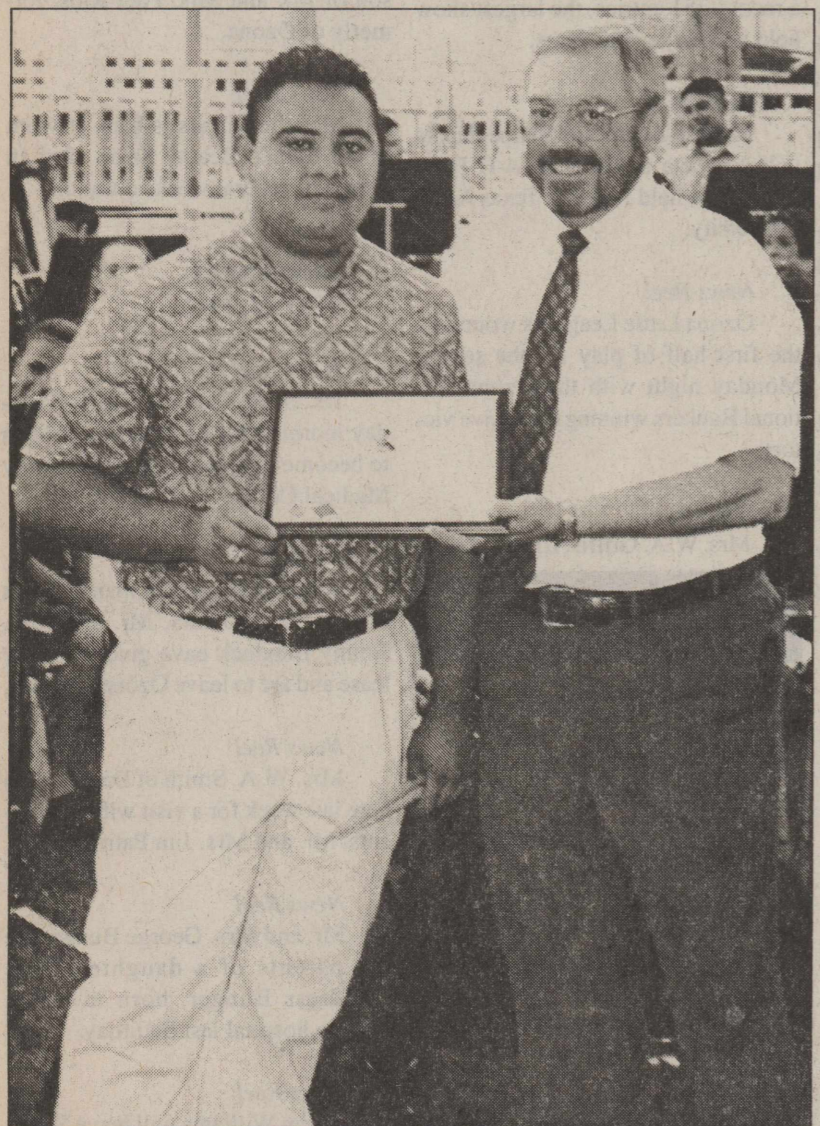

Rep. Bob Turner Report

State Representative Bob Turner (D-Voss) would like to remind parents they have less than a month to lock in the future cost of tuition at this year's prices for Texas colleges and universities. The deadline for enrollment in the Texas Tomorrow Fund is June 5.

Turner stated, "This is a big opportunity for the families of Texas to lock in today's college prices. Now is the time to start taking action on your kid's future. We all know that the price of higher education is only going to increase."

The Texas Tomorrow Fund is a prepaid tuition program created by the Texas Legislature allowing families to secure a child's college education costs. Regardless of what happens to the cost of tuition, enrollees are guaranteed that their tuition and fees are paid.

The program allows parents to enroll their children at any age. When they enroll their child, parents will pay for today's cost of a college education, regardless of when their child enters college. The younger a child is enrolled, the lower the payments will be. For instance, for a newborn, a four-

An appetite for land

Last Spring, a man named Chuck Cushman stood before a Congressional committee, trying to explain why the Conservation and Reinvestment Act (CARA), a rather harmless sounding bill, was a threat to more than a million American families who own land on or near federally regulated property. The legislation, which was passed by the House of Representatives last week, puts aside about \$1 billion a year that the government will use to buy land from "willing sellers."

Cushman, speaking on behalf of the American Land Rights Association, told the story of the "willing sellers" in a little community in Ohio, located between Cleveland and Akron. By law, the Park Service was only supposed to buy up 29 homes to create the Cuyahoga Valley National Recreation Area. But after the Park Service bought the homes and farms of owners who did want to sell, the agency began going after families in a financial crisis, such as recent widows and single parents. Next small businesses and timber owners were bought, which resulted in lost jobs and the closing of most of the remaining businesses. As the situation spiraled downward, tax money was lost, schools and churches closed, and more families moved. Families that stayed found their children could barely get to school, as roads were closed around the newly sealed-off federal land. When PBS filmed a documentary on the town in the mid-eighties, the town had all but died. In all, more than 300 homes were sold to the federal government. And yet, everyone of the men and women who fled the town's collapsing economy was considered a "willing seller."

We have no shortage of preserved land in our country. The government owns one third of the land in the United States. This immense amount of land is, in many cases, in desperate need of repair and improvement. The repair backlog has been estimated at \$5 billion. Common sense dictates that before the government takes on more land, it should take care of the parks it already owns.

CARA had been hard for many congressmen to resist, in part because it promises a lot of money to states for parks and environmental projects. But this bill is a trojan horse, built by well-intentioned men and women who don't want to believe their government is capable of tearing a man from his land, or flagrantly disregarding a whole town's rights as it snatches up business after farm after home. I don't want to believe this is possible, either. But as long as it is, we cannot unleash this law on the American public.

Jeff Owens hits the century mark

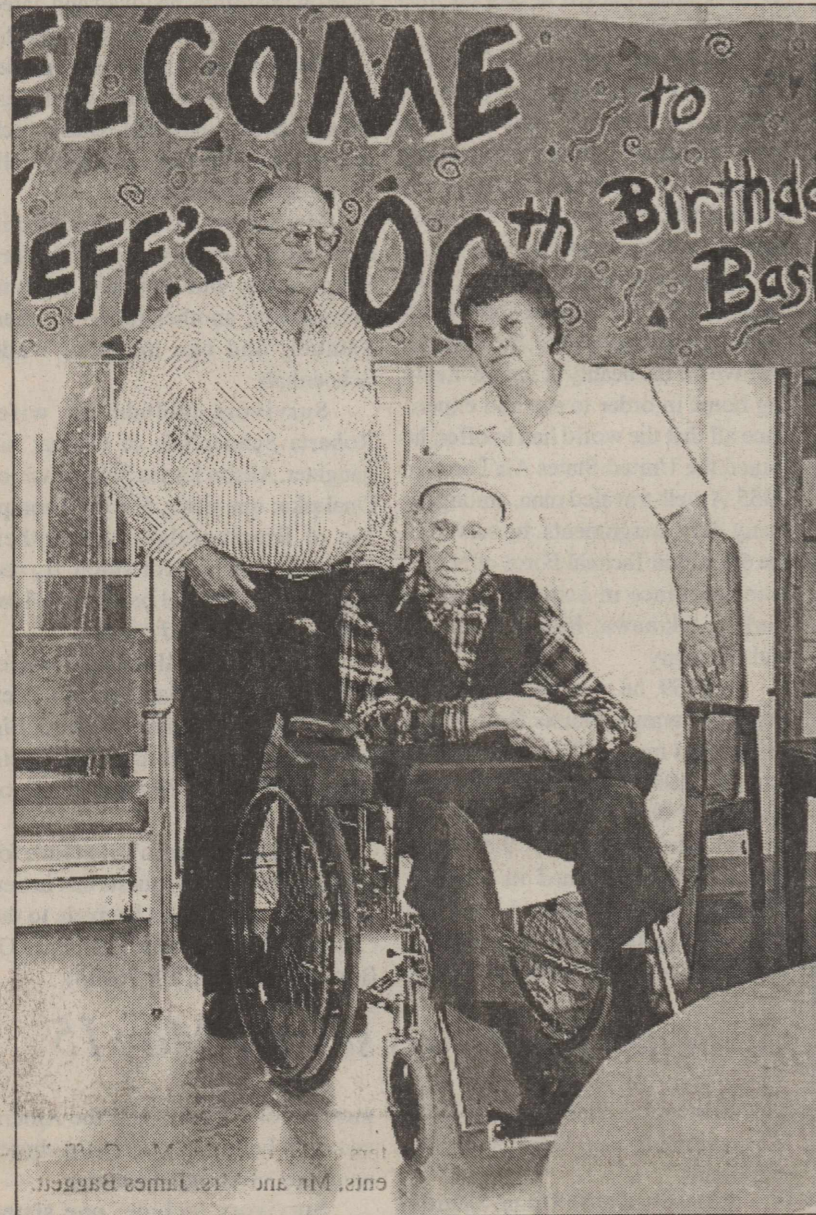

"Caring" is May's character pillar of the month. On Monday, the first grade classes discussed "Caring" and how they can practice "Caring" at school, home and in the community. 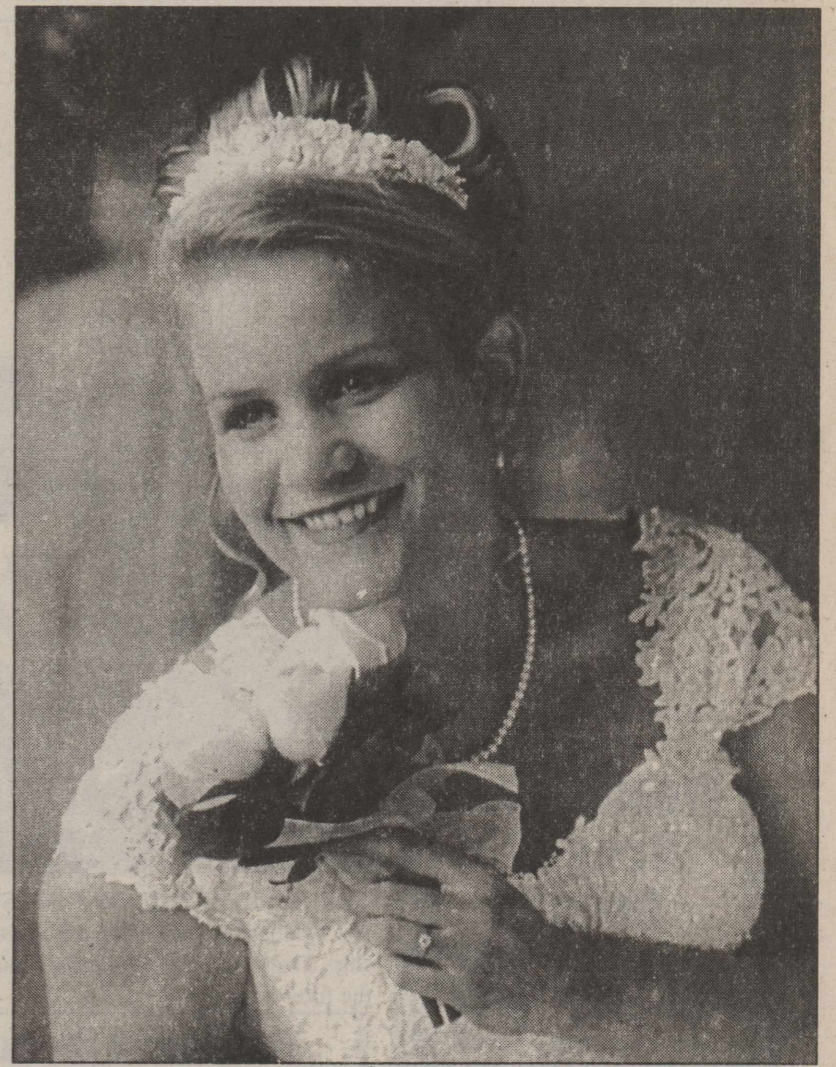

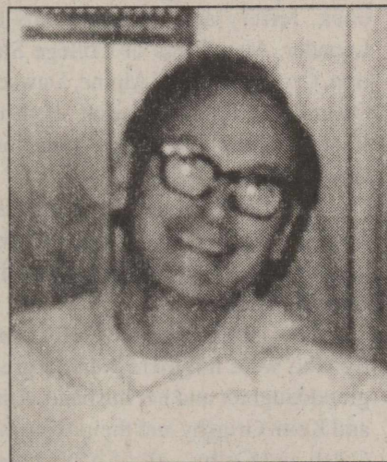
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Letter to the Editor

Parents beware: what's getting on your kid's skin?

Everyday you take care of your children, love them, and pray they stay out of harm's way - but you probably don't know that everyday you douse them and yourself with the same harmful corrosive ingredients found in brake fluid, degreaser and anti-freeze. Soaps, shampoos, bubble baths and cosmetics are loaded with several dangerous chemicals. For instance, in 1993 an FDA survey found the highly toxic 1,4 dioxane, a cancer causing deadly chemical, in all but three of 30 children's shampoo and bubble bath products that were analyzed.

Cosmetics, skin creams, all bar soaps (clear or white), body lotions, shampoos, and deodorants are the least regulated products under the Federal Food, Drug & Cosmetic Act (FFDCA). Disturbingly, the FFDCA does not require pre-market safety testing, review, or approval for these products. Cosmetic manufacturers are not required to register their company, products, ingredients, or adverse reactions reported by consumers with the Food & Drug Administration (FDA). Except for a handful of banned chemicals, manufacturers can add almost any ingredient to personal care products. "You know more about the ingredients in your dog's flea collar than you know about toxicity of whatever you're putting on your skin," argues David Wallinga, a senior scientist with the Natural Resources Defense Council in Washington, DC. "Even if the (Food and Drug Administration) suspects that serious adverse health effects are caused by a cosmetic product, they can't require that manufacturer to provide test data to prove the product's safety," says Oregon Senator Ron Wyden.

"Every day we use products that we think are safe - we assume the product has been tested and any dangerous ingredients labeled. The truth is, products are not always safe and manufacturers don't have to tell us," writes David Steinman, consumer advocate who has investigated the safety of thousands of products over the past 15 years. "You can not be completely healthy if your skin is not healthy," says Linda Chae, a world renowned expert in cosmetics and nutrition for the skin. The skin is the largest organ of the body and considered the "third kidney" because it assists in releasing toxins from the blood. "When we apply products, even with minute amounts of toxins, they enter our internal system and build up in our organs and this is not limited to children only," says Ms. Chae.

The word nontoxic appearing on many consumer products is misleading. "According to the federal definition, nontoxic doesn't necessarily mean 'not at all toxic' or 'absolutely safe', but can mean that up to half of the laboratory animals exposed to the product through ingestion or inhalation die within two weeks," states Ms. Chae. As for possible long-term effects of exposure, says John Bailey, director of FDA's office of cosmetics, "Those kind of issues are not addressed very well."

The most notable and long term side effects would be dermatitis, itching, eczema, psoriasis, scaling conditions, excess growth, plus cancer is not unheard of from long term use," states Mr. Ben Fuchs, pharmacist and leading cosmetic chemist.

Sodium Lauryl Sulfate (SLS) is the most harmful ingredient in personal care products, but is widely used because it is a cheap detergent and foaming agent. SLS is a harsh industrial detergent used in garage floor cleaners, engine degreasers, and car wash soaps. Research has shown that SLS and Sodium Laureth Sulfate (SLES) may cause potentially carcinogenic nitrates and dioxins to form in the bottles of shampoos and cleaners by reacting with the other ingredients found in these products. Large amounts of nitrates can enter the blood stream through the skin from just one use. SLS causes eye irritation, is linked to cataracts and delays healing of corneal tissue. The Journal of the American College of Toxicology states SLS impairs proper structural formation of young eyes and causes permanent damage. Dr. Keith Green, Ph.D., D.Sc., of the Medical College of Georgia reports that SLS denatures proteins of eye tissues, impairing development permanently. Because it is absorbed through the skin, it does not have to enter the eye directly. This toxin is often disguised in so-called natural products as "derived from coconut", but remains a toxic substance, capable of all the above effects.

Another harmful ingredient found in most personal care products is Propylene Glycol. Propylene Glycol (commonly abbreviated as PEG) serves as a humectant (it makes the skin feel moist), but is really "industrial antifreeze" and the major ingredient in brake and hydraulic fluid. Material Safety Data Sheets (MSDS) warn to avoid skin contact as it has systemic consequences and exposure can cause brain and liver abnormalities, kidney damage, gastrointestinal disturbances, nausea, headaches and vomiting, as well as central nervous system depression. The American Academy of Dermatologists reported, from a published clinical review, that propylene glycol causes a significant number of reactions and was a primary irritant to the skin even in low levels of concentrations.

Industry critics, such as Ms. Linda Chae, suggest reforms such as establishing industry wide standards for safety testing and reviewing data from countries that have banned these particular ingredients. 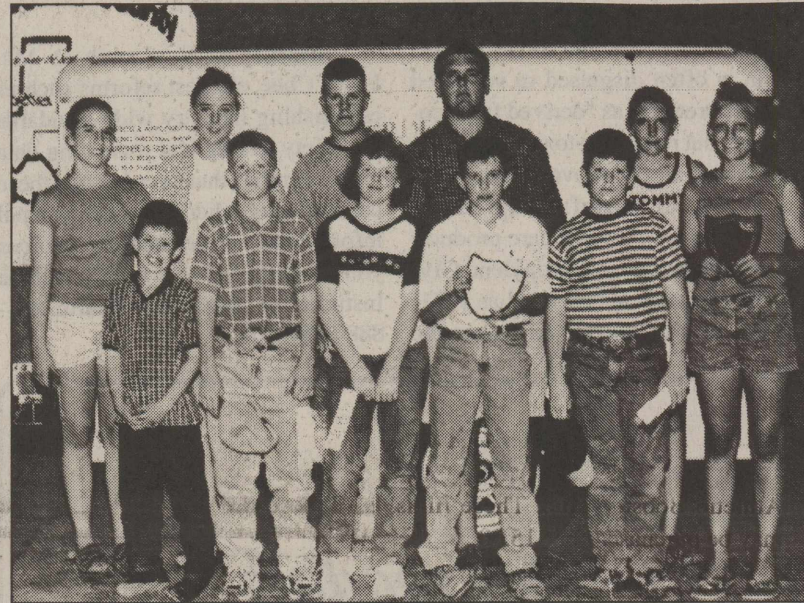

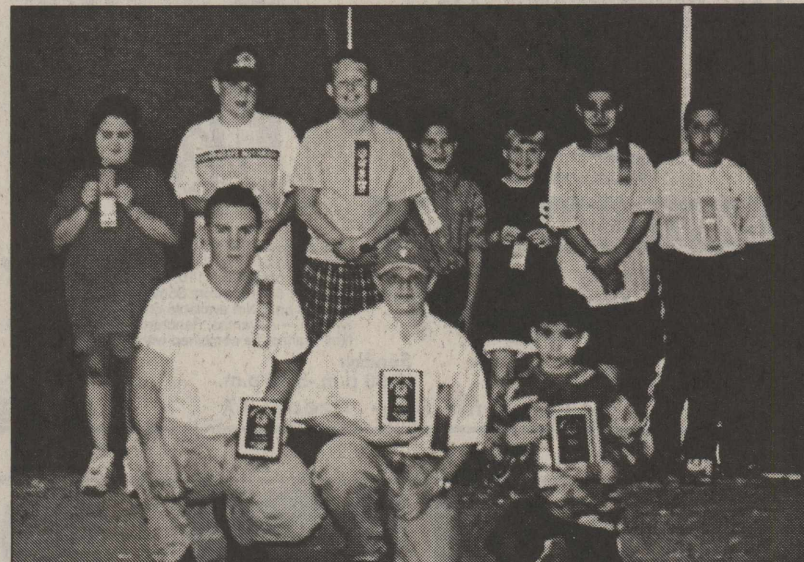

AP biology class goes to the coast

The Ozona High School advance placement biology class headed to the coast Sunday, May 7, along with new biology teacher Mrs. Amy Moffatt and Coach J. B. Holtz. The 7 1/2 hour trip took them to Corpus Christi and Port Aransas.

Along the way the class stopped in San Antonio to tour behind the scenes of Sea World. The tour included a brief demonstration on the significant amount of money needed to keep the animals healthy and in a somewhat normal environment.

The students learned how the trainers use positive reinforcement to teach the animals tricks and how intelligent many of the sea creatures can be. Many of these animals in Sea World have been rescued from adverse conditions. The students petted a baby shark and the dolphins who put on a show for the group.

After arriving at their hotel on the beach at Corpus Christi the students went swimming. Later that evening they went on a specimen hunt. Monday they walked to the USS

Lexington (CV-16) to take a tour. The history dated from the sinking of the USS Lexington CV-2 in World War II to the retirement of the CV-16. The CV-2 was the first aircraft carrier ever lost by the United States.

The CV-16 is massive and required a full two hours to tour.

"One thing amazing is the fact that this is not a modern day aircraft carrier," said Coach Holtz.

Later that day in Port Aransas, the group went aboard the boat "Duke", a vessel designed for educational tours. The experience ranged from observing dolphins to studying plankton to netting for possible specimens. One of the interesting things was to observe the life in a small glass of water.

As they began netting for specimens, the students caught a southern stingray and other types of sealife. The squid and spider crab were also interesting. The students were able to handle and observe these specimens.

As they docked, a gentleman from another boat gave the group a pufferfish, which was a good addition to their specimen collection.

On Tuesday, May 9, the group took a tour of the Texas State

Protecting employers and teens from danger in summer jobs

Thousands of Texas employers will soon be hiring teenagers for summer jobs that include driving vehicles, using power tools or doing similar work. And although many of those employers may not know it, they could be breaking the law.

Some jobs are too dangerous for workers under the age of 18. They are therefore restricted or prohibited by state and federal law. To help employers and workers comply with the laws, the Texas Workforce Commission and U. S. Department of Labor are offering easy-to-read materials on child safety. The free materials, which will be offered year round, are part of the agencies' joint Spring Into Safety campaign, which takes place this month.

"Check out where your teens work and what they're being asked to do," said Commissioner Representing Labor T.P. O'Mahoney. "Make sure they know which jobs are unlawful and that it's OK to say no to dangerous work."

Generally, teens may not work at jobs that involve:

- Driving a motor vehicle and being an outside helper on a motor vehicle

(Absolutely prohibited for youth under 17; subject to certain conditions for youth aged 17)

- Roofing operations*
- Excavating operations*
- Power-driven wood-working machines*
- Power-driven bakery machines
- Power-driven paper-products machines*
- Power-driven hoisting equipment
- Power-driven metal-forming, punching and shearing machines*
- Power-driven circular saws, band saws and guillotine shears*
- Meat packing or processing machines (including power-driven meat slicing)
- Manufacturing brick, tile and related products
- Wrecking, demolition and ship-breaking operations
- Coal mining
- Mining, other than coal mining
- Logging and saw-milling
- Exposure to radioactive sub-

stances and to ionizing radiation

- Manufacturing or storing explosives

* Limited exemptions are provided for apprentices and student-learners under specified standards.

Hourly limitations

- Teens 18 or older may perform any job, whether hazardous or not, for unlimited hours, in accordance with minimum wage and overtime requirements.

- Teens 16 and 17 years old may perform any job that's not hazardous, for an unlimited number of hours.

- Teens 14 and 15 years old may work outside of school hours in jobs that are not hazardous or in mining or manufacturing:
 - 3 hours on a school day
 - 18 hours in a school week
 - 8 hours on a non-school day
 - 40 hours on a non-school week

Teens may work between 7 a.m.
