The Alfaifa Mill has a payroll from \$6,000 to \$8,-

000 every two weeks during the green hay season which is a source of livelihood for about 59 employees.

The merchants of Muleshoe are glad to see the mill begin operations in the spring as it gives revenue to the town as well as to the farmers. The farmers like to have the mill dehydrate their hay since it eliminates baling at night, it eliminates loss of time in watering while hay is curing on the ground for baling, it eliminates the loss from damaged hay due to rains, it eliminates loss from wind blowing hay out of the field, etc.

Ex-Farwell Mayor Enters Guilty Plea

WICHITA, Kan., Nov. 28 - C M. Henderson, former mayor of Farwell, Texas, and Wayne Marteney, former presidents of the bankrupt Garden Grain and Seed Co., of Garden City, Kan., pleaded guilty in federal court today to charges of dealing interstate in fraudulent grain warehouse receipts and drafts.

Marteney pleaded guilty on two of 15 counts and Henderson on one of five counts. The government dismissed the other counts. Federal Judge Delmas Hill ordered both to appear for sentenc-ing Dec. 14. Marteney has been free under \$10,000 bond. Henderson has been serving a four year year sentence in an unrelated case at the federal correctional institution at Seagoville, Texas.
