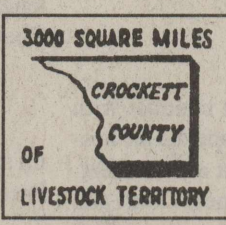

Let's get ready to rumble

Ready or not, here it comes. Football season is on the way. The Ozona coaches are gearing up to begin the season, but first, athletes must practice, practice, practice. Three-a-days are scheduled to start Monday and Tuesday, Aug. 7-8, at 8:00 a.m., 10:30 a.m. and 2:30 p.m.

After two intensive three-a-day workouts, the athletes begin two-a-days Wednesday, Aug. 9, through Friday, Aug. 11.

Coaches, athletes and fans are looking forward to another amazing and awesome season. The Lions clawed their way into playoff position, making their way to the quarterfinals last year after having a rough 1-9 season in 1998.

In the spring of 1999, Coach Steve Taylor and his elite coaching staff took over the Ozona Lions' football program, guiding the Lions all the way to the quarterfinals for a 9-4 season.

"My outlook for the 2000 Ozona Lions' football team is good," Coach Taylor said. "I think we will surprise a lot of people. Many people think we'll be way down with only seven returning lettermen, but five of the seven were all-district last year."

"Our junior varsity team was 8-2 last season, so we have a chance to be good."

When asked about the Lions' strengths and weaknesses, Coach Taylor said, "Our strengths should be our defense again as it was last year. The kids will know the system better after running it a year, and our weakness would be depth. We can't afford many injuries."

Off-season and summer are important to the athletes' strength and conditioning. "You don't get ready for the season in August," Taylor said. "You start in December." Many student athletes have faithfully worked out and lifted weights at the fieldhouse this summer in preparation for football season.

After the realignment last year, Ozona will have some long trips, a few even six and a-half hours one way. The Lions will compete against Van Horn, Anthony, Tornillo, Reagan County and McCamey in district play.

Leadership will be the most important key to the 2000 Ozona Lions' football team's success. "Last year our seniors did a great job of leading, and this group of seniors will do the same," Taylor said. "The athletes did a great job of leading in the spring, so I expect them to do a good job this fall."

"I look forward to having about 70 kids come out for football," said the coach. "Every position is a key position. We have nine seniors, so our underclassmen will be critical to our success this year."

Jake Stewart earned three trophies and a buckle for his shooting expertise in Midland July 14-15. This is the first year for this 4-H'er to enter the shotgun competition; he has previously competed in the .22 shooting

Houston woman killed in I-10 accident

Freddie Lewis Williams, 64, of Houston died in a one car accident early Saturday in Crockett County. Mrs. Williams was ejected from a side window of a Chrysler Town and County mini-van east of Ozona at about 2:55 a.m. July 15. Driver of the van was Wesley Baldwin, 62, of Houston.

Investigating officer DPS Cpl. Ben English said the driver apparently fell asleep, causing the van to veer off into the median. When he tried to regain control of the vehicle, it went back onto the interstate into a 270° spin, overturned onto the roof and

skidded into the median, before overturning a second time onto its wheels.

Mrs. Williams, who was wearing no seatbelt, was ejected when the van overturned a third time.

The driver and seven passengers, including four children, were family members traveling from Houston to Los Angeles. Baldwin was taken by helicopter to Shannon Hospital in San Angelo. Four others were transported by ambulance to San Angelo, and two of the accident victims were treated at Ozona Family Health Clinic and not transported.

English, who was assisted by Sgt.

Carl Mayfield, Deputy Sheriff's Petra Hernandez and Tyler Roy, was complimentary of all who helped at the scene. "I really appreciate everything they did," English said of the efforts of the deputies, EMS, fire department members, Texas Department of Transportation personnel and Judge Jim Hearne. "They were outstanding, as usual," English said.

A witness to the accident, a man from El Paso, was extremely complimentary of the professionalism and rapid response of the people assisting at the accident.

Trustees approve four teacher resignations

Hire new art teacher.....

In their regular meeting that was held on Thursday, July 13, members of the Ozona School Board discussed with the counseling department of Midland College dual credit course arrangements for juniors and seniors in Ozona High School. The discussion was held utilizing a two-way audio-visual teleconferencing site in the school district boardroom.

The administration and school board is excited about the opportunity through Midland College to offer core courses in English, history, government, and economics to juniors and seniors via teleconference during the school day that will count toward dual credit in high school and college. Upon graduation from high school, students who have successfully passed the course(s) and enroll in college will receive the college credit course hours and will not have to take these courses in college.

Students who are eligible to take the dual credit courses are juniors and seniors who have passed the Texas Academics Skills Program (TASP) as well as all parts of the state's Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) test and be in good academic standing in their courses in high school. The tuition for a dual credit course from Midland College will be approximately \$118.00, and this cost will be paid by the student. The school district will pay the cost of a student's textbook. Student participation in the dual credit courses is optional.

The local board reviewed, discussed, and approved bids received for school property and liability, vehicle, workers' compensation, underground storage, and professional legal liability insurance. Key and Piskuran Insurance of Arlington was awarded a two-year bid for school property and liability, workers' compensation, vehicle, and underground storage insurance, and the Texas Association of School Boards was awarded a one-year bid for professional legal liability insurance. The members also approved all bids received for school cafeteria products for the 2000-01 school year.

The members approved allowing Superintendent Larry Taylor to participate in the mentor superintendent program sponsored by the Texas Association of School Administrators entitled "New Learning for Leadership: A Mentoring Program for Texas Superintendents. Prior to approval, Superintendent Taylor told the board that he was one of five superintendents in each education service center region to be nominated for this responsibility, which will be primarily to serve as an advisor to new first-year superintendents.

Other agenda items receiving board approval included the continuation of the block class schedule at Ozona High School, a revision in school board policy regarding admissions and attendance, and calling a special meeting of the board on August 8 at 7:00 p.m. for the purpose of board planning and reviewing the 2000-01 School Year Proposed Estimated Budget. The regular August board meeting will be held on August 15 at 7:00 p.m.

The board also approved resignations from four teachers in the district. Kristi Ellis resigned to take a teaching position with the Bastrop I.S.D.; Sterling Roddie resigned to take a teaching position with the Brady I.S.D.; Deborah Ramon resigned to take a teacher/head girls basketball coaching position with the Klondike I.S.D.; and Dawn Kothman Carter resigned to remain at home as a housewife. The resignation of Amy Moffit, Ozona High School biology teacher, was not accepted due to the lateness of the resignation request. The members also approved the employment of Patrice Sears to take Ms. Ellis' position in theatre arts, speech, and art at Ozona Middle School and Ozona High School.

Rehab selects new president

Woody F. Gilliland was named the new president of West Texas Rehabilitation Center in an announcement made July 12 by Ken Burgess, chairman of the WTRC Board of Directors. Gilliland replaces Jim Pethis, who recently resigned after four years with WTRC.

Until January 2000, Gilliland was the chief executive officer of Abilene Regional Medical Center, and is currently employed with the Bush for President campaign.

"It is very fortunate for Rehab," indicated Burgess, "to secure Woody for this job. His recent experience with Abilene Regional Hospital has kept him on the cutting edge of the medical service industry. And, because of growing up in West Texas, he has an appreciation for the challenges of delivering Rehab services over a wide geographic area."

"And," Burgess added, "he is very familiar with WTRC. Woody has already served as a member of the board of directors of Rehab. So, with him, we have a new president who is up to date on the medical industry, well familiar with Rehab, and also grew up in this area. That is a great combination for Rehab."

Gilliland emerged from a field of candidates for the top job at WTRC during a search conducted by the board of directors over the past few weeks. He begins his responsibilities with the Rehab Center by Aug. 1.

Etiquette of Table Settings

Formal table setting can be intimidating at first. All the silverware, glasses, and different sizes of plates can send you spinning. The diagram at the right will serve as a good visual reference tool. Tape the diagram inside one of your kitchen cabinets so that it will be a handy guide when you need it.

Let's begin at the middle of the diagram and work our way out. The place plate is placed one inch from the edge of the table. If the first course is already on the place plate, the napkin is placed to the left of the fork; otherwise, it is placed in the center of the place plate.

The handles of the flatware are aligned at the bottom. The forks (no more than three) are at the left of the place plate in order of use from the outside in. This diagram depicts the salad fork on the outside and the dinner fork on the inside. The only fork placed on the right side is the oyster fork.

To the right of the place plate are the knives (no more than three) in the order of use with the cutting edge toward the plate. The only spoon for the first course is placed to the right of the knives.

The dessert fork and spoon are placed above the place plate. The bowl of the spoon faces left and the tines of the fork face right.

No more than four glasses are set on the table in order of use for water, white wine, red wine, and champagne.

The butter plate is optional, but when it is used, the butter knife is laid across the top of the plate with the handle to the right and the blade facing the user.

The salt and pepper are placed directly above the place plate with the pepper to the left and the salt to the right. Larger salt and pepper shakers that are to be shared are placed slightly below the wine glasses between every two place settings.



Don't wait until a formal occasion to practice your table setting skills. I would encourage you to use an abbreviated version of them everyday. Then, when you and your family are hosting a dinner party, eating at a fancy restaurant, or at a wedding reception you won't feel awkward.

What Is Truth?

John 18:38, - #3 in a series concerning the Creation/Evolution Issue
"By faith we know God made the world by His Word" - Hebrews 11:3

While belief in creation is a faith matter, there is also a natural knowledge of the Creator based on the things He made - as pointed out by the Apostle Paul in Romans 1:20. Furthermore, the two most basic and well-established laws of science - the First and Second Laws of Thermodynamics, are a continual thorn in the side of evolutionists. The first simply states that nothing new is being created and nothing is being destroyed. In other words, there is a set amount of energy in the universe that cannot be added to or taken away from, such as animals turning into fossils or trees going up in flames. It simply has to be that God created the universe with a certain amount of energy and matter, which the First Law of Thermodynamics points to.

Albert Einstein called the Second Law of Thermodynamics the "Premier Law of All Science". It states that although no new energy is being created or destroyed, that which exists is becoming less usable. In other words, everything is wearing out, running down, disintegrating or simply dying. This means there must have been a distinct point in time when it began.

Maybe this is a good place to define the Latin term "evolution", which literally means "to roll out". The evolutionist believes that the universe is ever rolling upward, becoming even more complex, and developing to a higher level - the opposite of the scientific Second Law of Thermodynamics. So while evolutionists try to use science to prove the Scriptures wrong, the two best-proved laws of the universe were actually written down in the Bible many years ago (of Genesis 2:2 and Psalm 102:25-27). Furthermore, the fact that our universe still holds together as a whole is entirely due to the delicate balance provided by the Creator. And although they know that their efforts will be futile, the Beat Goes On, and On - as evolutionists keep bouncing off the walls they run into.

Since scientists have discovered that our universe is expanding, common sense would tell us that there

must have been a beginning to this outward thrust. Evolutionists say that there was - somewhere about 10 to 15 billion years ago, when a densely packed mass reached such high temperatures it exploded. They call this explosion the "Big Bang", and say that from that moment on an entire universe of heavenly bodies began to emerge.

Then billions of years later non-living molecules became living molecules, and in a few more million years these simple life forms became more and more complex. That's not very logical! For example, picture a big pile of bricks on top of several sticks of dynamite - which suddenly explodes. Busted bricks are shot from the pile in all directions, and when the dust settles there stands a beautiful architectural masterpiece! Sound reasonable enough? Or maybe we can think of other examples when explosions produced orderly results - like Hiroshima or Mt. St. Helens. The problem is that disorder has never produced order. Any you don't need the mind of a genius to see how utterly absurd this theory is. Yet, this is precisely what many scientists and teachers today would have us believe - and school textbooks teach this to millions of unsuspecting children. The only difference is that they replace the bricks with tiny bits of matter, and the results are not a beautiful building but ALL forms of matter, living and non-living.

Neither logic nor scientific data can support a theory like the Big Bang of Evolution. It's simply a matter of faith. So while pointing an accusing finger at Bible-believing Christians who seem to walk around with their heads in a cloud of faith, it's really the evolution-professing community which follows blind faith. Perhaps Laurence Richards said it best when he wrote: "After a Big Bang billions of years ago started our universe, the matter which came from that unexplained explosion JUST HAPPENED to cool into stars. Our Sun, one of those stars, JUST HAPPENED to have planets around it. One of these planets, Earth, JUST HAPPENED to be the right distance from the Sun and TO HAVE JUST THE RIGHT MIX of water and other elements. As Earth cooled, chemicals in an ancient sea JUST HAPPENED to come together in the right way, and those dead chemicals came alive. As the ages passed, the first living cells JUST HAPPENED to take on plant and animal characteristics. As more time passed, these tiny cells JUST HAPPENED to cluster together to become larger living creatures. And eventually one of those living creatures JUST HAPPENED to become a human being."

Believing that philosophy takes REAL FAITH. Thank God that He has given Christian a living faith that is built on truth, explained in the Bible and leads to eternal life!

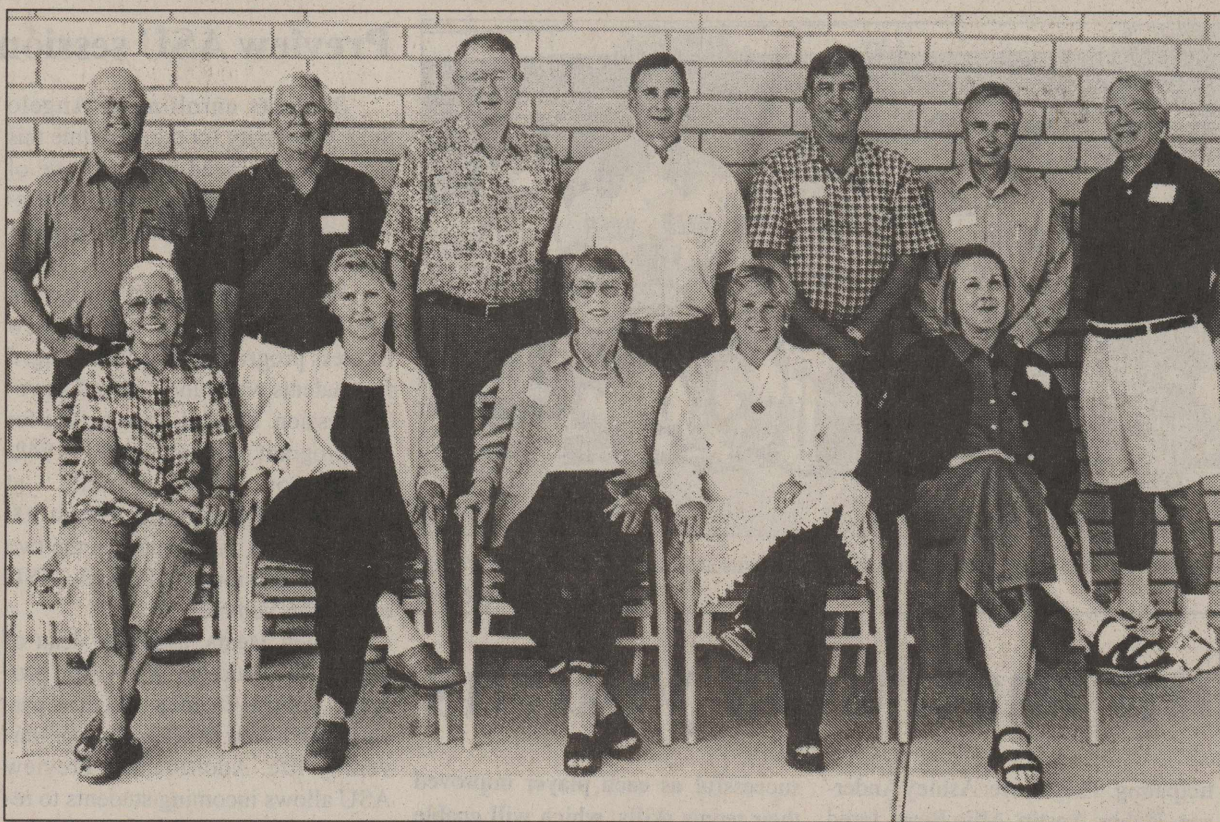

Jewel Bailey and Charlotte Harrell, representing the Woman's Forum, traveled to San Angelo on Saturday, July 15, to attend the annual summer workshop of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs (TFWC) Heart of Texas District to obtain materials for the new 2000-2002 administration and to meet the TFWC officers in a casual setting. The meeting was hosted by the Woman's Forum of San Angelo at the Massie Club House. Heart of Texas (HOT) district president, Shirley Kennedy, and other members of the Woman's Forum of San Angelo graciously welcomed 25 HOT club members to the meeting and provided an excellent lunch.

Three of the newly-elected state TFWC officers, Mary Beth Guy, president, from Kirbyville, Bobbe Mitchell, president-elect, from Sanderson and Patricia Siegfried-Giles, second vice president, from Lancaster, conducted the workshop. Although traveling to each district in Texas takes the officers away from family and business for the month of July, President Guy feels that the effort put forth by the traveling team is very important. She said, "Traveling to each district gives the officers an opportunity to visit with many club women who don't always go to the annual convention. This makes the officers very approachable, which is important in an organization as large as the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs." Mary Beth Guy is the 51st president of TFWC. Of course, participation in the Libraries 2000 program is a very important part of the Education Department's agenda. Further, the TFWC has many scholarships available each year for deserving students who need financial assistance. Kelli Osborn of Ozona is a TFWC scholarship recipient for the 2000-2001 school year.

The Home Life Department promotes health programs and suggests participation in projects such as Habitat for Humanity.

The International Affairs Department includes the president's special project, Operation Smile. Under the auspices of Operation Smile, volunteer surgical teams perform operations free of charge for poor children in many lands who suffer from cleft palates and other facial deformities. Besides cash, which is always welcome, club members can participate by making "Smile" dolls and donating blankets, which are comforting to the children after surgery. Many clubs feature a "Count Your Blessings" cake at one meeting during the year. As members count their many blessings, they give as they are moved to Operation Smile. Of course, the International Affairs Department encourages programs of any kind on the United Nations, Cultural Exchange and Outreach for Children.

The Public Affairs Department includes fund-raising for the Women's Monument to Service Women, automobile safety, exercising the right to vote, and keeping abreast of legislation of interest to women and their families.

The Texas Heritage Department promotes Texas history and its culture.

The traveling team stressed the importance of and gave tips about the observance of protocol at club meetings, the three "Rs" of membership (recruit, retain and rebuild), publicity and the exchange of information among clubs. The Heart of Texas fall board meeting will be held in Roehelle on Saturday, Oct. 7, and the entire TFWC traveling team will next meet with club members at the annual TFWC fall board meeting in Austin on Sept. 25-27. All club members are invited to attend these meetings.

The Texas Federation of Women's Clubs is a member of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, the largest and oldest nondenominational, non-partisan, international service organization of volunteer women in the world. TFWC boasts over 8,000 members in 300 clubs throughout the state. Preview ASU sessions set for new students

Students enrolling at Angelo State University for the first time this fall are encouraged to attend one of the three remaining sessions of Preview ASU, the university's summer orientation program.

Preview ASU is scheduled for July 28-29 and Aug. 4-5. A Preview Express program is scheduled Aug. 5 for students who cannot attend a two-day session. Students can register for any program by phone at (915) 942-2191 or by e-mail at previewasu@angelo.edu. Nolen Mears, associate dean of student life, said the orientation programs provide students and their parents with a look at all aspects of university life. Additionally, Preview ASU allows incoming students to receive individual academic advising and to register for their fall classes.

For children on the go, don't forget the H₂O.....

Parents need to make sure children have plenty of water when they venture outside in the sweltering heat this summer.

"Kids can become dehydrated very quickly," said Dr. Robert Shulman, professor of pediatrics at Baylor College of Medicine and director of the nutritional support team at Texas Children's Hospital in Houston.

In addition to water, sports drinks and fruit juices are also good to give children. It is best to stay away from drinks that contain high levels of caffeine. Caffeine is known to increase the flow of urine, so instead of replenishing the body, it can contribute to dehydration. Dehydration can cause a child to become dizzy or drowsy, develop headaches and a dry mouth, and in severe cases become unconscious.

Keep in mind, infants should never be exposed to the sun for long periods of time, and never placed in direct sunlight. Always dress them in light-colored clothing and put a hat on their head. A light blanket can also protect their arms and legs.

Senior workers freed from earnings limits

Everyone likes to hear good news. And, as the manager of the Social Security office in San Angelo, I've been fortunate lately to share some good news with people who are between age 65 and 70.

According to a new law, people who are age 65 to 69 can continue to work and collect all of their Social Security benefits regardless of how much they earn. Under the previous law, benefits for workers age 65-69 were reduced \$1 for every \$3 they earned over the annual earnings limit (\$17,000 in 2000).

Although the law was signed April 7, it was effective January 1, 2000. This means that anyone who lost benefits between January and April should, by now, have received those benefits in a single payment. In June, they will begin receiving their regular monthly benefits.

Under the new law, if you turn 65 during 2000, your benefits will be reduced \$1 for every \$3 you earn over \$17,000 until the month you reach 65. Then, there's no reduction in your benefit amount no matter how much you earn. For workers age 62 to 64, the law requires that \$1 be withheld for every \$2 you earn over the annual earnings limit (\$10,080 in 2000).

If you're getting retirement benefits on your own earnings record and you continue to work, your benefit amount may increase because of your additional earnings. We'll review your earnings each year and notify you if your benefit amount increases.

TDH offers advice for staying healthy during hot weather

The oven that is fired by summer heats up quickly. With several days of record-setting temperatures already recorded in Texas this year, the long weeks ahead can pose serious health problems.

Heat danger spans many months in the state, according to the Texas Department of Health (TDH). The department's Bureau of Vital Statistics recorded 98 deaths from heat-related causes in 1998, the last year for which complete figures are available. Most often, the elderly, the very young, people with other illnesses or those without access to air conditioning are the victims of intense, prolonged heat.

The body normally cools itself by sweating, but the combination of high temperatures and high humidity can cause this natural cooling system to work overtime. Dehydration and heat illness can result if a person does not replace fluids and salts lost during perspiration. Also, when humidity is high, sweat does not evaporate efficiently, preventing the body from releasing heat quickly. This heating of the body to dangerous levels may result in a heat illness.

Symptoms of a heat illness include heavy sweating, muscle cramps, weakness, dizziness, nausea, weak but rapid pulse and headaches. People with these symptoms should find shade and ventilation and drink water.

If fluids are not replaced quickly, heat stroke can follow causing extremely high body temperature, red and dry skin, rapid pulse, confusion, brain damage, loss of consciousness and, eventually, death. For severe symptoms, get the victim into shade, call for emergency medical services and start cooling the person immediately with cool water or by fanning.

Staying in an air-conditioned area, either at home or in a public place such as a mall, library or recreation center, is the most efficient way to combat heat. If air conditioning is not available, pull the shades over the windows and use cross-ventilation and fans to cool rooms. In areas of high temperatures and high humidity, however, turn off the fans or aim them

through a window to blow the hot air out. A cool shower or bath also is an effective way to cool off. Limit the use of a stove and oven to keep temperatures lower in the home.

Children especially can quickly become dehydrated. They need to drink fluids frequently, especially water, and wear light, loose clothes. Avoid drinks that are heavily sweetened or contain caffeine. Check on children often, especially if they are playing outside in high temperatures.

Other heat precautions include:

- Never leave anyone in a closed, parked vehicle during hot weather.
- Drink plenty of fluids, but avoid drinks with alcohol, caffeine or a lot of sugar. Start drinking fluids before going out into the heat.
- Plan strenuous outdoor activity for early morning or in the evening when the temperature goes down.
- Take frequent breaks when working outside.
- Wear sun block, hats and light, loose-fitting clothes.
- Stay indoors and in air conditioning as much as possible.
- Eat more frequently but be sure meals are well balanced and light.
- Avoid dressing infants in heavy clothing or wrapping them in warm blankets.
- Check frequently on people who are elderly, ill or may need help.
- Check with a doctor about the effects of the sun and heat exposure when taking prescription drugs, especially diuretics or antihistamines.
- At first signs of heat illness — dizziness, nausea, headaches, muscle cramps — move to a cooler place, rest a few minutes, then slowly drink a cool beverage. Seek medical attention immediately if conditions do not improve.
- Pay attention to pets. Be sure they have plenty of water and do not leave them closed up in parked cars or hot buildings.

The best defense against heat-related illness is prevention. Staying cool, drinking plenty of fluids, wearing cool clothing and monitoring outdoor activities are key to staying healthy in hot weather.
