

The ME Generation In Church Clothes

I remember a few years ago reading about a famous T.V. evangelist who was in the practice of preaching powerful, moral sermons on adultery and immorality. His exposure of pornography, the presentation of statistics, the demonstration of national chaos resulting from the influence of such immoral elements in modern society were more than enough to convince any viewer that illicit sexuality destructive and that "had a clear spiritual perspective on the topic. Then, to our surprise, "Rev.____" is on the headline news. The charge? Soliciting the services of a prostitute. Investigations revealed that the "Rev.____" was in the practice of hiring prostitutes on a regular basis. Then when reprimanded and called upon to resign his "Pastorate" he flatly refused. And he continues to preach his moral sermons on

T.V. to this day. Here is a case of a man who wants to play "prophet" and be "self-gratified" at the same time. And because the title and the practice are contradictory, the conscience is sacrificed at the altar of the ME-god. This is not an abstract statement. It is the recognition of a principle in action. devotedly selfish - "Lovers of their own selves...lovers of pleasures more than lovers of God... Having a form of godliness, but denying the power thereof". (2 Tim. 3:1-5).

The ME generation in church clothes plays "church" like it plays bridge or bingo, sings hymns to soothe the nerves, carries a Bible to look religious, prays to self through God, hates brethren through doctrine, drops Coke and chips money into the offering plate, sees sermons as pep-talk, interprets all others as secondary or meaningless, believes all things gyrate around self, and sacrifices nothing for God. The ego-centric Christian does everything ad libitum.

The only difference between "Worldlife" and "Churchlife" to such is the role they play in his/her MEexperience. This one runs the church like his/her household, and runs his/ her household like an insane asylum.

The line will continue to Circle Bar to supply water and fire protection.

This system basically replaces the current method of providing water to connections at Crockett Heights and Circle Bar.

This project brings wells up to Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission standards either by rehabilitating existing water wells or by drilling six new wells.

Ground storage tanks on the east and west hills will be rehabilitated to meet TNRCC standards. A new 156,000 gallon standpipe will be placed on the west hill to give adequate water pres-

sure and flow to customers on the west side of Ozona. Fifty-two new fire hydrants will be installed. They replace units bought secondhand from military bases after World War II.

Estimate at project costs include engineering, contractor, financial advisor, bond counsel, legal fees, bonding and insurance.







Suit claims negligence

A suit filed against Crockett County by the Texas Workman's Compensation Insurance Fund claims negligence with regard to the Jan. 8, 2000, death of Abraham Gonzalez of Midland. Gonzalez was a driver for BML, annex.

He died in a tractor-trainer accident 20 miles north of Ozona on a foggy, damp morning. According to the National Federation of Independent Business (NFIB) one-third of small business owners today will have to sell a part or all of their firms to pay estate taxes, more commonly referred to as the "death tax." Half of those who must liquidate to settle with the IRS will have to eliminate 30 or

Under the tax laws that we currently have, it is cheaper for someone to sell a business before dying and pay taxes than to pass it on to his or her children. This is a grave injustice that must be corrected. No section of the tax code is more unfair and more dangerous to our entrepreneurial spirit than the death tax. In addition to destroying family businesses and farms, the death tax destroys countless jobs of those employed by family businesses.

Members of both parties in Congress have worked hard to repeal this unfair tax. Legislation presented before Congress this year was approved by both the House of Representatives and Senate, but when the Death Tax Elimination Act was passed on to the President, it was vetoed. This week, Congress attempted to override the presidential veto. Unfortunately, liberal members of Congress prevented the override in order to make this an election year issue. They went so far as to have 13 members switch their votes to ensure that the veto prevailed. The vote failed by only 12 votes. This is an unfortunate event, but it is not the end. I encourage each of you to write to the Administration and remind them that this tax is unfair and dangerous. Repealing this tax would make it easier for people to pass their businesses and farms down to their children and grandchildren - a cherished part of the Ameri-

No one should have to meet the undertaker and the IRS on the same day. It's time to bury the federal death tax. The winners will be consumers, small businesses, family farms and loving families all over the country who have enough to think about when there is a death in their household. Paying Uncle Sam should not be part of the grieving process.
