Water District approves calling bond election

Directors of Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District #1 voted Monday night to call a \$3,000,000.00 bond election after deliberating on several ways to finance improvements to the system.

Improvements are necessary in order to comply with Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission requirements. The district is currently under enforcement action by TNRCC for violations.

Board member Dennis Clark said that although there are ways the district can borrow funds for the project without an election, "Number one, the water system belongs to the people, and number two, we'll get a better rate of interest if we have a bond election."

The district could borrow money at the market interest rate, get a lower rate by having a bond election, or obtain the best rate of all if approved for a loan under the Safe

Drinking Water Act.

During an engineering report on water and wastewater improvements, Scott Hay P.E., project manager for Hibbs and Todd, talked about testing existing wells through the logging process to determine whether or not some can be rehabilitated or if six new wells must be drilled.

"We need to take a really hard look at existing wells before we start drilling new wells," said Hay.

The district currently has nine wells. Six new wells with new pumping equipment would produce more than the 1,200 gallons per minute required by the TNRCC.

The improvement project will include replacing 52 fire hydrants bought by the water district from closed World War II military bases.

Six inch waterline will be run from the pumping station on the east hill to provide water to Crockett

Heights and Circle Bar Truck Corral.

Hay warned directors that they are not going to be able to meet the time lines for improvements set out by the TNRCC. "You're going to be in trouble about Nov. 1," Hay said.

"You need to take care of Crockett Heights first because that's where the enforcement is," Hay emphasized. The district has already been fined due to violations.

Descriptions of the various elements of the project and specific costs are published elsewhere in this issue of *The Stockman*.

In a related item, directors voted to have Debbi Puckett hold their election at the same time as the November election.

The water board directors voted to hire the firm of Fulbright & Jaworski L.L.P. for bond attorney services. SAMCO Capital Markets was hired to provide financial advise for the project.

Tax rates decrease

Adoption of the tax rate for county and school Monday by commissioners, saw the county rate drop by five cents, to .65 per \$100.00 of valuation and the school rate went down four cents, from \$1.424 per \$100.00 valuation to \$1.38056.

The rate for county residents subject to the Emerald Underground Water District tax also decreased, going from .023375 to .02063.

Commissioners will meet on Sept. 25 to adopt the year 2001 budget.

Included in the budget is the first county raise for elected officials in five years. County Attorney Bill Mason said he would decline the pay increase. The legislature mandated a raise for his office last year.

Commissioners voted for the increase at a meeting on Sept. 5. Not included will be the office of constable due to an increase already approved.

The budget also includes some employee raises.

During a discussion on action for controlling debris, junk and other items deposited in the draw, commissioners voted to direct Sheriff Shane Fenton to keep the draws clear of anything that would impede or constrict the water flow in the waterway. The draw is defined as beginning at the top edge.

The sides of the draw are not sup-

posed to be changed by any means including removing soil, scraping, making roads, etc.

Road and parks supervisor Eddie Moore reported that he expects to begin work on a water crossing into Chandlerdale West soon. He was instructed by commissioners to buy 24" tin horns for the project rather than a smaller size if the larger ones and related expenses keep the project within the \$150,000.00 previously approved.

Two bids were received for the lot located at 1204 Ave. E. Johnny Jones bid \$23,500.00, and Clay Childress bid \$60,100.00. Nancy Moore of Crockett County Museum asked the court to defer accepting a bid until she could consult with her board. Bidders verbally agreed to honor their bids until the court meets Sept. 25.

Approval was given through a vote of the court to execute a quit claim deed as recommended by County Attorney Bill Mason for the purchase of United Petroleum property adjacent to the cemetery for \$11,000.00.

Commissioners approved compensation for Ladyne Mahannah as acting insurance liason for county employees for three months. At the end of that time there will be a review. Mrs. Mahannah had said she spends four to 10 hours a month on this type

work.

Sheriff and Constable fees were set by the court according to recommended increases. In order to be more in keeping with the state average, Crockett County rates will be \$55.00 for citations and \$100.00 for writs.

No action was taken on an agenda item to contract with Pecos County for detention of juvenile offenders. The revised contract presented by Pecos County will be reviewed by Bill Mason for the court.

Court members voted to approve creating the position of assistant librarian. One of the applicants for the position is related to librarian Louise Ledoux, but examination of the county's personnel policy revealed that department heads are prohibited from hiring family members.

Representatives of Texas Tech Health Services and Linda Knightstep of Shannon Health Systems met with commissioners and talked about space for the Texas Tech program which includes W.I.C. Commissioners have been asked to help with funding for the Tech clinic and are looking for office space as a possible way to assist.

No action was taken to appropriate funds for the Title V program administered here by the Texas Tech

Lions devastate Eagles

The Ozona Lions football team traveled to Grape Creek Friday, Sept. 8 to compete against the Grape Creek Eagles in the Lions second game of the season.

As the game began it was like déjà vu as the Eagles were the first to score in the game. With 5:50 remaining in the first quarter the Eagles scored a touchdown on a four yard run. The two point conversion failed.

The Eagles held the Lions from scoring in the first quarter. However, in the second quarter the Lions would make a gallant comeback just as they did in last year's game.

In a series of four plays #30 Abel Rodriguez would run in a three-yard touchdown. It took the Lions just 31 seconds in the second quarter to score. #73 Ty Allen successfully kicked the extra point for the Lions to take over the lead 7-6.

Later in the second quarter #82 Juan Garcia intercepted an Eagle pass for the Lions to take over possession of the ball. #12 Stephen Tarr then threw a sweet forty-yard pass to #85 Dustin Faught. At first it looked as if the ball was going to be intercepted, however Faught jumped up to make an incredible catch for first and goal for the Lions.

Two plays later Tarr would carry the ball for a three-yard touchdown. The Lions attempt for a two-point conversion failed.

With 1:25 remaining in the second quarter, the Lions would score again on a ten-yard pass from Tarr to Faught. Ty Allen kicked the extra point success-

fully. At halftime the Lions led the Eagles 20-6. The Lions defeated the Eagles last season 20-6. The Eagles went into the locker room devastated by the Lion's mighty roar.

The third quarter would remain scoreless. But, in the fourth quarter the Lions would rack up their fourth touchdown of the game with 7:40 remaining in the game. Tarr threw a great pass to Garcia for a four-yard touchdown. The kick by Allen was good, as he was three for three on his extra point efforts during the game.

In the next play Tarr went down with an injury. His season ended with a broken ankle and fractured fibula.

Faught would have one more interception in the game. As time ran out the Lion fans cheered as the band played the school fight song in celebration of the 27-6 victory.

Offensively the Lions played a decisive game. Tarr finished the contest with 11 carries, rushing for forty yards and one touchdown run. He had eight of fifteen passing for 131 yards and two touchdown passes. Rodriguez had 12 carries and 100 yards rushing and one touchdown. Jared Shaffer ran the ball nine times for 20 yards and Ray Ramos rushed five times for eight yards. Faught snared four receptions for 91 yards and one touchdown. Garcia had two receptions for 12 yards. Luis Cruz caught two passes to advance the ball 28 yards.

Defensively Faught led the Lions with 11 tackles followed by Garcia with eight and Quay Oglesby with six. Faught snagged two interceptions and Garcia had one.

Before leaving the field Stephen

Tarr said "We played a great game. Our defense was strong and did a great job shutting the Eagles down and allowing no more than one touchdown. Our offense was great as they did their job. Dustin Faught had a great night on both sides of the ball."

Tarr was taken into surgery around 1:30 a.m. to repair his injuries early Saturday morning.

"It was a great win for our kids", said Coach Taylor after the game. "They played with a lot of confidence, coming from behind like they did."

Underground water contamination program here Sept. 19

Emerald Underground Water Conservation District and the Crockett County Extension office will host a program on underground water contamination Sept. 19. Registration begins at 6:30 at Ozona Civic Center.

Guest speaker is Dr. George Veni, a hydrogeologist who specializes in caves and karst formation aquifer systems. Dr. Veni is extremely knowledgeable about the Edwards Limestone Karst Formation from which most of the groundwater comes in West Texas. The presentation will include slides of aquifers and caverns he has studied.

The twofold program will inform as to the geological aspects of groundwater and the legal aspects of groundwater and what the future holds.

Ozona cross country teams run in meet

The Lions, Lady Lions and junior high Cubs and Cubettes cross country teams traveled to Carlsbad to compete in the first meet of the 2000 season, the Concho Valley Cross Country Classic.

Individually, Lion Josh Tambunga placed 18th out of 124 participants followed by Rigo Treto who placed 42nd. Also competing for the Lions were Brandon Marmolejo who came in 92nd and Mark Garcia 124th. The Lions didn't place as a team and times were unavailable.

The Lady Lions team placed eighth with 253 points out of 21 teams at the meet.

Individually, Katy Churchill (who just moved to Ozona) placed seventh with a time of 14:29 out of 237 participants. Paige Tambunga placed 35th with a time of 15:23 followed by Britney Ramos coming in 36th in a

time of 15:24. Laken Villareal was right behind them in 37th place and a time of 15:25. Other Lady Lions finishing were Lori Rivas at 215th with a time of 21:42 and Kelly Cunningham placing 216th in 21:50.

Cub Eliseo Treto zipped in first place with a time of 13:12. Cub Aaron Lopez came in 14th with a time of 14:14, followed shortly by Ruben Talamantez placing 32nd in 15:31 and Michael Maldonado running a time of 16:44 in 58th place. The middle school Cubs did not place as a team among the 96 individuals running in the junior high division.

Although the middle school Cubettes did not place as a team, individually Candice Gander came in 42nd with a time of 16:08. Other Cubettes competing were Malorie Moran placing 56th in a time of 16:52, Mandy Fierro 60th with a time of 16:52, Jasmine Tambunga 80th in 18:21 and Jessica Moore coming in 84th in 20:06.

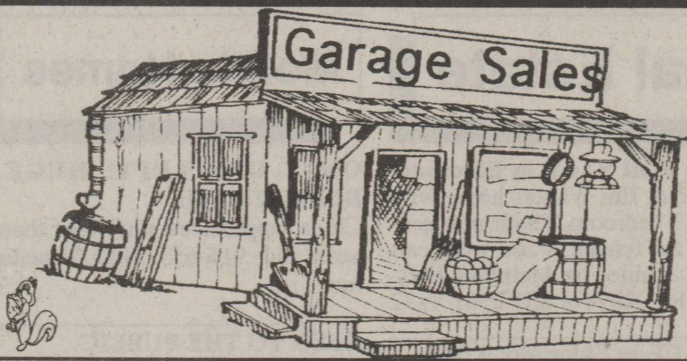
