WHEREAS, the Board hereby finds and determines that this action is in the best interests of the District and deems it necessary and advisable to call such an election at this time and to establish the procedures whereby such election may be held;

WHEREAS, the Board has approved an engineer's report covering the improvements to be purchased or constructed and their estimated cost, together with maps, plats, profiles, and data fully showing and explaining such report, and such report has been filed in the office of the District and is open to inspection by the public;

WHEREAS, such engineer's report, as supplemented, contains an estimate of the cost of providing the improvements and maintenance thereof and

WHEREAS, additional costs and expenses will be incurred by the District necessarily incidental to its operation and the financing of its improvements, and the Board has arrived at an estimate of such additional costs and expenses as hereinbelow set forth;

WHEREAS, the District will hold ajoint election with Crockett County, Texas (the County), as provided pursuant to the provisions of a joint election agreement between the District and the County adopted in accordance with the provisions of Section 271.002, as amended, Texas Election Code;

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Regional water districts key to maintaining property, water rights:

MUNDAY - Regional and local water districts are key political players in the statewide debate over urban and rural water needs and rights, State Rep. Rick Hardcastle of Vernon told a crowd of more than 130 landowners at a recent agricultural field

"Right now, we (legislators) are struggling with the state's water needs and our water future. The best spokesmen for landowners in that debate will continue to be local and regional water districts," Hardcastle said. "As lawmakers we have to balance the need regulation that keeps private property to water the metropolitan areas in an environmentally friendly manner without infringing on landowners' long-standing personal property rights including their water rights.

The field day was held at a satellite research farm operated by the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center in Vernon.


