Ozona Lion Band earns Division I superior rating at Marching Contest

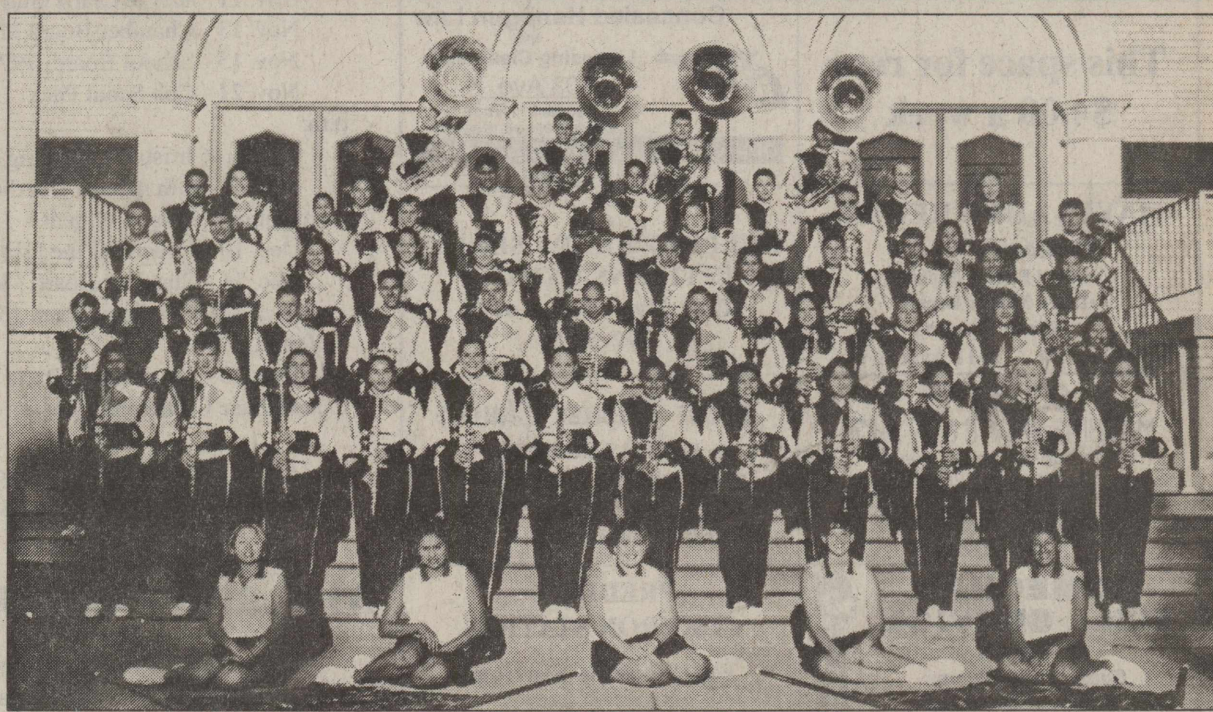
The Ozona Lion Band traveled to Brady to perform at the Region VII U.I.L. Marching Contest on Saturday, Oct. 21. A total of nine Class AA bands performed, and Ozona received a Division I or superior rating. This marks the 18th consecutive year the Lion Band has received the top rating at this contest and the 19th Division I in the past 20 years. The band is under the musical direction of Mr. Kelly Glaze and is assisted by Mr. Norman Carroll. Leslie Flores is the drum major for the 2000 Lion Band, and Michelle Necessary is the flag coordinator.

Judges for the contest were Charles Munsell, Mike Marsh and Sheryl Cyrus. The Lion Band's program consisted of *This is My Country*, *Southern Comfort*, *America the Beautiful* and *Mustang*. The Mallet duet in *Southern Comfort* was performed by Chris Carter and Cecilia Garza, and the trombone solo in *America the Beautiful* was performed by Joseph Knaack.

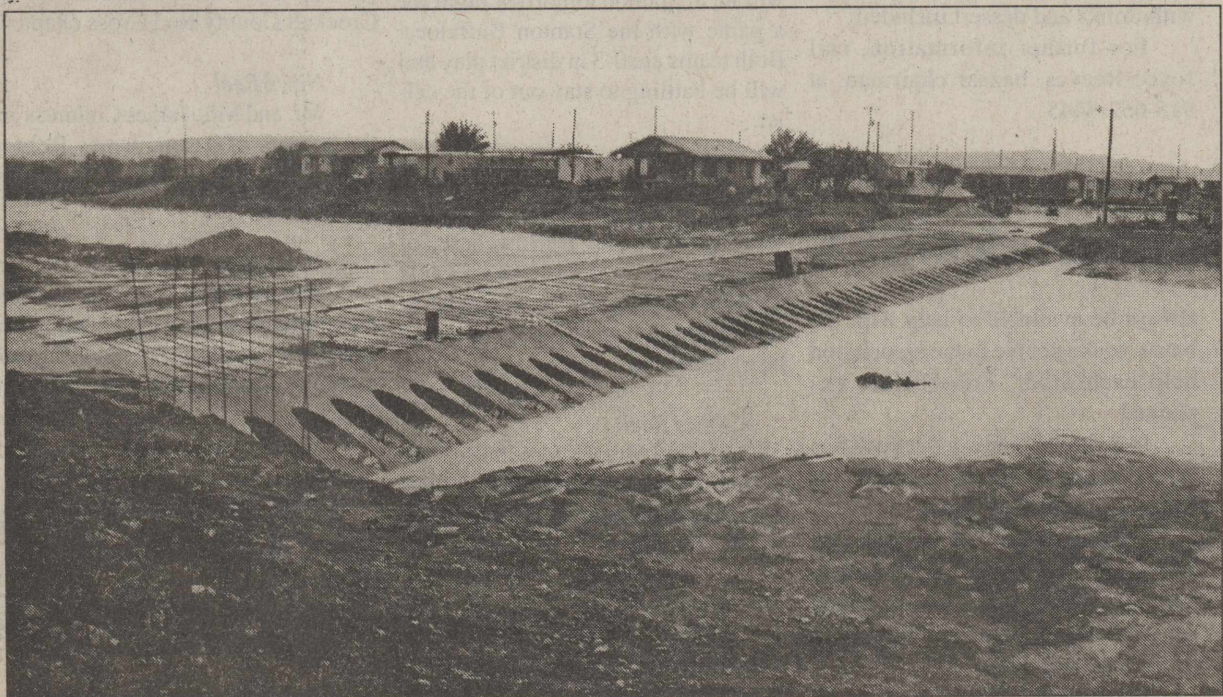
Several years ago the U.I.L. began certifying superior rated bands at the region contest on to the area and

state level of competition on alternating years. On even numbered years only 3-A and 5-A bands may advance, whereas, odd numbered years the A, 2-A and 4-A bands may advance. As a result of this rule, the Lion Band is not eligible to advance to the area or state marching contest.

Plus a tornado to boot

The National Weather Service in San Angelo issued a tornado warning for Crockett County after Doppler radar indicated a developing tornado 27 miles south of Ozona at 12:53 a.m. Tuesday. Weather spotters in three fire department vehicles kept watch on the possible tornado, which veered east and started to dissipate before reaching Ozona.

The school's Heritage Building was opened for the public to use as a shelter. "The siren was not blown, but we were prepared to do what was necessary," said Lue Morrow, fire station attendant and dispatcher.

A following storm contained small hail and high winds. These storms contributed to an accumulation of rainfall which began Friday night and amounted to as much as five inches across parts of the county. Severe thunderstorms with heavy rains and damaging winds were reported in various locations off and on Monday with much of the county under thunderstorm warnings at different times.

Highway 163 south of Ozona was closed in Val Verde County Monday and could remain closed for quite sometime according to the Crockett County Sheriff's Department on Tuesday. The road was reported under six feet of water.

A report from the National Weather Service at Midland late Tuesday morning showed the Pecos River to be seven feet above flood stage and expected to crest at 13 feet above by mid-afternoon.

Jane Black honored for service to Cancer Society



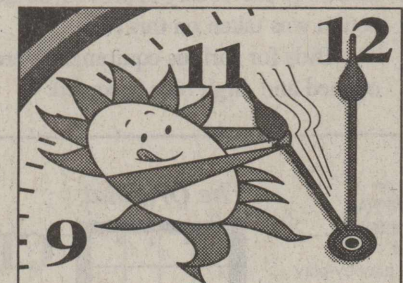

Judge applies for COG position

Crockett County Judge Jeffrey Sutton said last week that he is applying for the position of executive director of the Concho Valley Council of Governments.

Executive committee members of COG discussed hiring Sutton outright at a meeting held Oct. 18 after a motion by Irion County Judge Sid Mabry to hire Sutton. COG is seeking to replace Robert Weaver who retired Oct. 6 after almost 20 years as executive director.

The motion to hire was seconded by Concho County Judge Allen Amos, but several committee members were concerned about the hasty action. The motion was voted down 7-2, and several members abstained.

Judge Mabry commented that he moved to hire Sutton so COG business could continue without having an interim executive director or a lengthy search for a replacement.

Tom Green County Judge Mike Brown said that COG lacks funds to hire a search firm. He is to head up a search committee made up of Judge Amos, McCulloch County Judge Randy Young, City of San Angelo Councilmember Monte Mahon and San Angelo Independent School District trustee Julia Stout.

They are to outline the job description and compensation and decide the hiring process. Recommendations by this committee are to be brought before the members during the November meeting or at a called meeting.

Sutton is in his second term as Crockett County judge. He has branched in Crockett County most of his life, was a member of the school board 12 years, serving as president nine of those years, was a director of the Texas Production Credit Association three years, one of those years as president and served on the tax appraisal board several years.

He was president of the Mohair

Council, vice-president of the International Mohair Association, a member of the advisory council of the Texas Food and Fiber Commission and a director of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association.

If Sutton accepts the position of executive director of CVCOG, commissioners will appoint a replacement for the remainder of his term.

Lions devour Big Lake Owls

And, the feathers flew 39-7

The Lions devoured the Reagan County Owls Oct. 20 in Lion Stadium to win their second district game 39-7.

In the first quarter, the Lions received the Owls' kickoff. Ozona followed with two first downs but was unable to score on the first offensive series.

Robert Ogle punted for 30 yards. He and Josh Tambunga tackled the Owls, allowing only a 2-yard gain for second and eight. Ogle then brought down the Big Lake quarterback for a sack behind the line of scrimmage, pushing the quarterback five yards for third and 13. Lance Unger tackled the Owl for fourth and ten, forcing them to punt.

Abel Rodriguez was back to return, catching the ball and leaving the Owl defense in the dust and making a

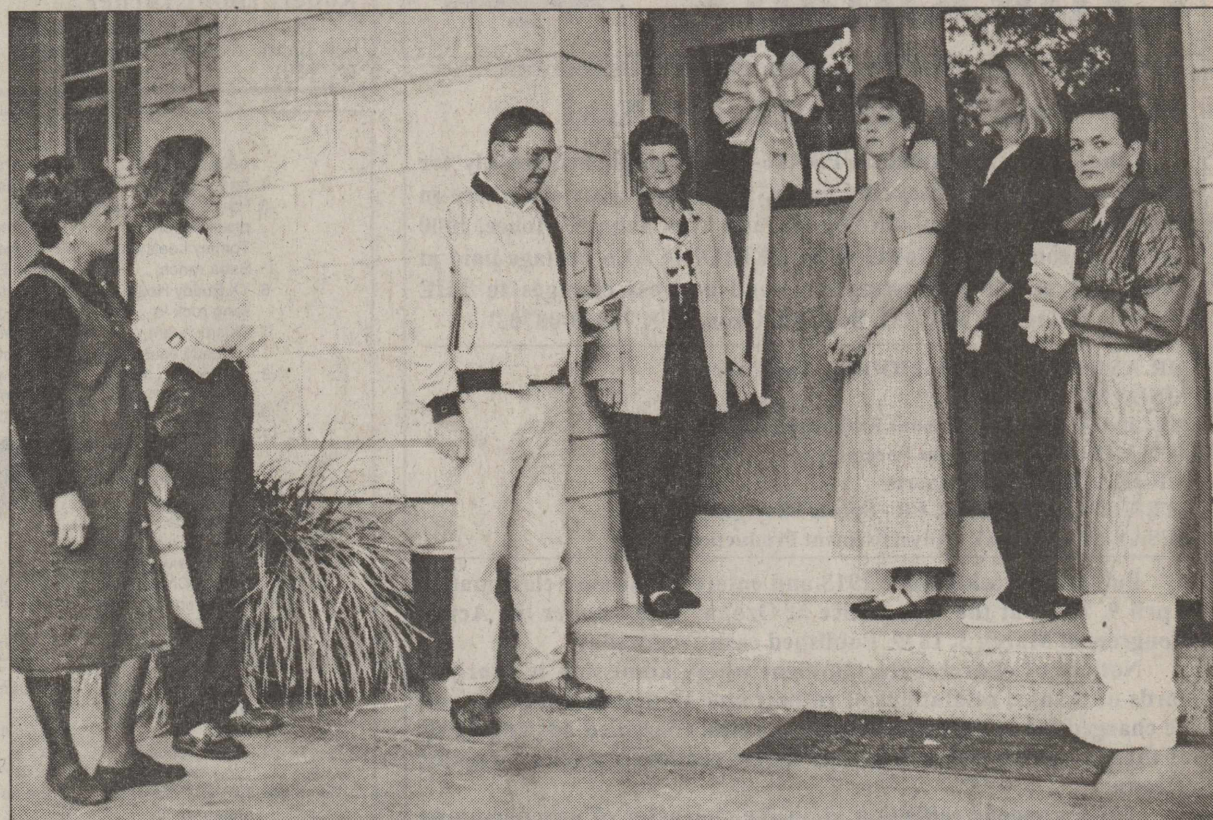
65-yard touchdown with 6:50 remaining in the first quarter. The kick was no good.

After a Ty Allen kick off for the Lions, Big Lake came soaring back up the field with three first downs and scored their only touchdown in the game with 2:27 remaining in the first quarter. The kick was good for the Owls who now led the Lions 7-6.

Ozona came back on their next offensive series to score and lead the Owls 12-7.

Luis Cruz returned the punt to Ozona's 34-yard-line. Two plays later, Jared Shaffer broke open up the center of the field for a carry of 18 yards and first and ten. Kyle Richardson threw a sweet pass to Dustin Faught for 16 yards, putting the Lions on the 10-yard line for another first and ten. Ray Ramos then moved the ball four yards for second and six on the 6-yard

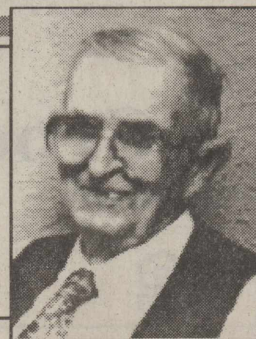

Commissioners give firetruck to SCS

Removal of a firetruck from the surplus equipment list was okayed by commissioners Monday night. The action was taken on a motion that donated the old unit to Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District #235.

District Conservationist Stephen Zuberbueller, Art Roane and Bob Buckholtz were at the meeting to ask that the truck be donated to the Edwards Plateau Prescribed Burning Association.

The association is made up of landowners and others from Crockett, Schleicher, Sutton, Val Verde and Kimble counties who want to do prescribed burns.

The conservation service can't always be available to help with the burns, so the people in the association help each other, Zuberbueller explained.

In Sutton County, a firetruck has been donated to the association for use at the controlled burns.

Commissioners agreed that they are legally unable to give the truck to a private organization, but that they can give it to a government entity to do with as they wish.

Art Roane said the truck can be parked at the Double T Ranch just north of town and will be available as a backup truck to the county if it is needed.

Court members also voted to approve the annual contract and agreement for detention of juvenile offenders. Judge Jeffrey Sutton was authorized to sign the agreement for the county.



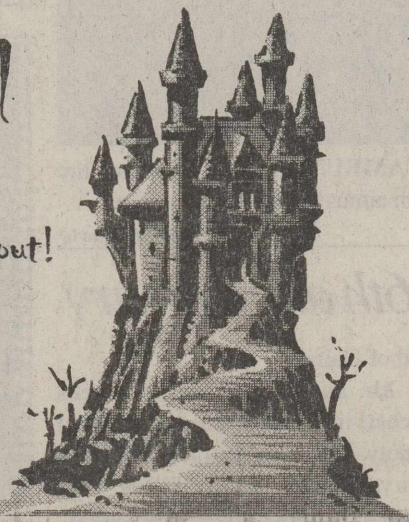

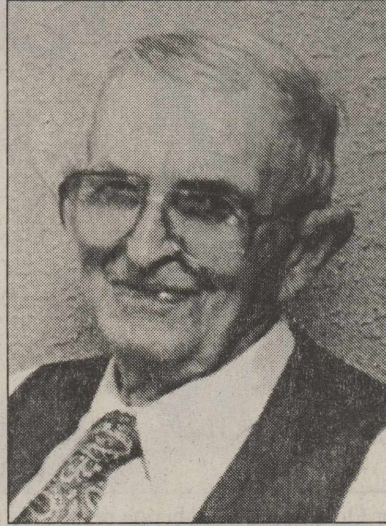

Obituaries

Pete Jacoby service in Ozona Thursday, Oct. 21



Pete William Jacoby, age 86, died in a San Angelo hospital on Thursday evening, Oct. 19, 2000. He was buried in Ozona on Saturday afternoon under the direction of Preddy Funeral Home. Memorial services celebrating his life were conducted in the Ozona United Methodist Church by Reverend Nancy Mossman with graveside services following.

Pete Jacoby, along with his family, arrived in Ozona in 1952 when he was chosen to be the County Agricultural Agent for Crockett County. During the next 22 years, 4-H Club members from Crockett County earned honors at the local, state and national level under his leadership and with the assistance of a large cadre of volunteer adult leaders.

He organized ranchmen to support the screw-worm eradication program, and Crockett County was the

first county in the state to reach its monetary goal for this program that continues to provide benefits to Crockett County agriculture.

His strongest programs were in livestock, range management and wool and mohair grading. However, realizing the need to serve a broader clientele, he organized a strong program in clothing, textiles and apparel development that, under the leadership of Ethel Wolf and Dorothy Price, provided opportunities for Hispanic youth to be involved in 4-H. On their success, a county extension agent in home economics was established for the county in the early 1970's.

After the devastating flood of 1954 that claimed many lives in Ozona, Pete Jacoby led a local effort in cooperation with the local soil conservation district that resulted in the securing of federal funding to construct a series of flood control dams. This contribution continues to protect the lives and property of Ozona residents.

Following his retirement from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in 1974, he earned his realtor's license and operated a real estate business in Ozona. He enjoyed playing golf and established lasting friendships both locally and regionally through his participation in this sport. He felt that Ozona was the best place on earth to call "home".

He was also active in the Ozona Chamber of Commerce, and helped start a vocational agriculture program in the Ozona Public Schools. He was a member of the Ozona United Methodist Church and was a member of Rotary International.

Pete Jacoby was a product of pioneer West Texas families. He was born on a Menard County ranch on

May 12, 1914, the first son of Edgar Adolph Jacoby and Elizabeth Texanah Armstrong Jacoby. He attended public schools in Menard and Menard County, and ranched four years prior to entering Texas A&M where he graduated with a degree in animal husbandry in 1940. He married Jimmie Gwynne Langford of Sonora on Dec. 28, 1940, and they lived in Houston where he was a cattle buyer.

Following the bombing of Pearl Harbor by Japan and America's entry into World War II, he was called to active duty and served four years in the U.S. Army, rising to the rank of Major. Returning to civilian life, he quickly returned to West Texas, operating a pesticide spraying business before teaching in the Veteran's School at Junction. While in Junction, he was active in community service and helped establish a summer campus for Texas A&M, now operated by Texas Tech.

Pete W. Jacoby is survived by his wife, Jimmie Jacoby of Ozona; two sons, Dr. Pete W. (Bill) Jacoby, Jr. and wife Pattie of Pullman, Washington, and Dr. David J. Jacoby of Austin; four grandchildren, J.D. Jacoby of Grand Junction, Colorado, Jim Jacoby of Arlington, Brandon D. Jacoby and Haley R. Jacoby of Austin; three brothers - Earl Jacoby of Menard, Harold Jacoby and wife Doris of Junction, and T.J. Jacoby of San Angelo; and numerous of cousins, nieces and nephews. His mother-in-law, Hazel McDaniel is a longtime resident of the Crockett County Care Center in Ozona.

Trustees plan facility improvements

During their regular monthly meeting that was held on Tuesday, Oct. 17, members of the Ozona School Board approved the employment of Green, Harvey and Associates of Lubbock to develop plans and specifications for the improvement of the acoustics in the Ozona High School Band Hall and the expansion to the boys' field house at Lion Stadium.

Kelly Glaze, Ozona High School Band Director, told the trustees that when the band hall was built in the mid 50's, the acoustics were adequate for a 40-50 member band; however, over the years the size of the high school band had increased to over 100 students. "When we have the band practicing as a whole group," Glaze said, "it is impossible to hear different sections and determine whether or not musical mistakes are being made. We have had to have sectional practices in front of the band hall, in the corridors of the band hall, in the high school auditorium, or anywhere other than the band hall itself due to the sound problem."

In regard to the expansion to the boys' field house at Lion Stadium, the members discussed the erection of a metal prefabricated building that would be located just north of the present boys' field house and connected to the present field house. The building will provide additional storage and weight room facilities.

The board also discussed possible improvements to the concession stand

at Lions Stadium. Possible improvements, due to congestion and the need for more space for storage of concession items, centered upon the possibility of an expansion in length and/or width of the present concession stand; however, no board action was taken on this agenda item.

Prior to discussion on improvements to the acoustics in the Ozona High School Band Hall, the expansion to the boys' field house at Lion Stadium, and improvements to the concession stand at the above location, the board toured all three facilities. The high school band hall improvements and the field house expansion will be funded through the district's 2000-01 school facilities improvement fund budget.

The board approved low bids for materials, installing metal roofs, and air-conditioning for the repair of eight school-owned houses located east of Ozona Intermediate School. Low bids were: City Lumber and Wholesale (materials); Marks Heating and Air Conditioning (heating and air conditioning); and, Vernon Bendele Diversified Company (roofing).

The board also approved 2000-01 school year campus improvement plans for Ozona High School, Ozona Middle School, Ozona Intermediate School and Ozona Primary School as presented by the four campus principals, the 2000-01 District Textbook Selection Committee, and the retirement resignation of James Cox, special education teacher at Ozona Intermediate School.

The members also approved the

taking of bids for the purchase of a driver's education car and a route bus car. Two district cars with mileage in excess of 100,000 miles will be used as trade-ins to companies submitting bids, and bids for these two vehicles will be considered by the board at its November meeting.

The meeting was adjourned following an affirmative vote to set the date and time for the board's regular November meeting on Wednesday, Nov. 15, at 8:00 p.m.

the Owls from scoring on the 10-yard line. The score at halftime was Cubs 6 - Owls 0. The Cubs were unable to score in the third and fourth quarters.

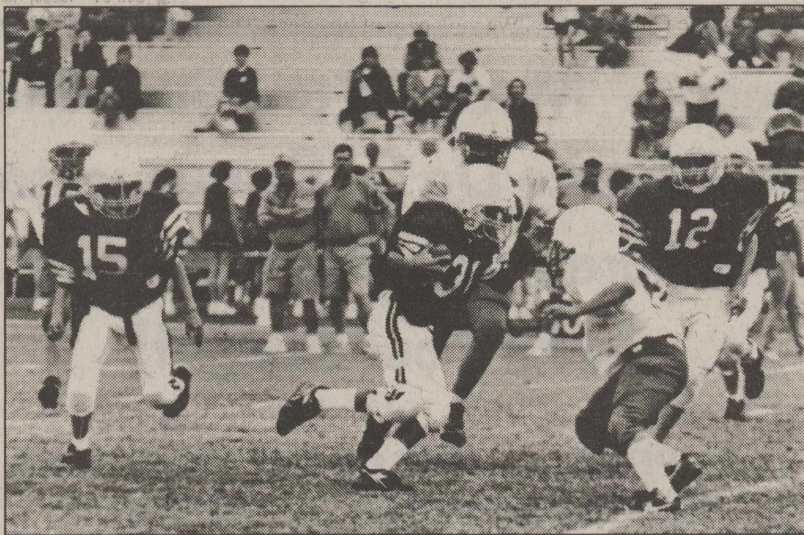

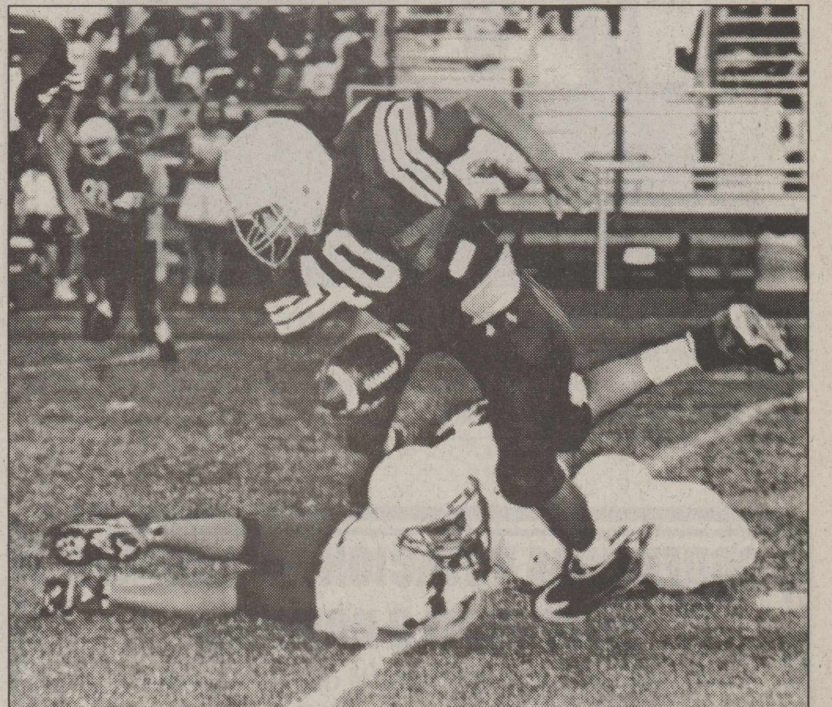

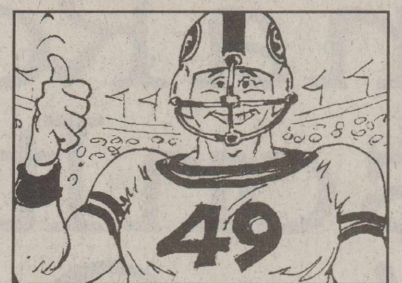

Entries for the food show were judged in four categories, breads and cereals, fruits and vegetables, main dish, and nutritious snacks.

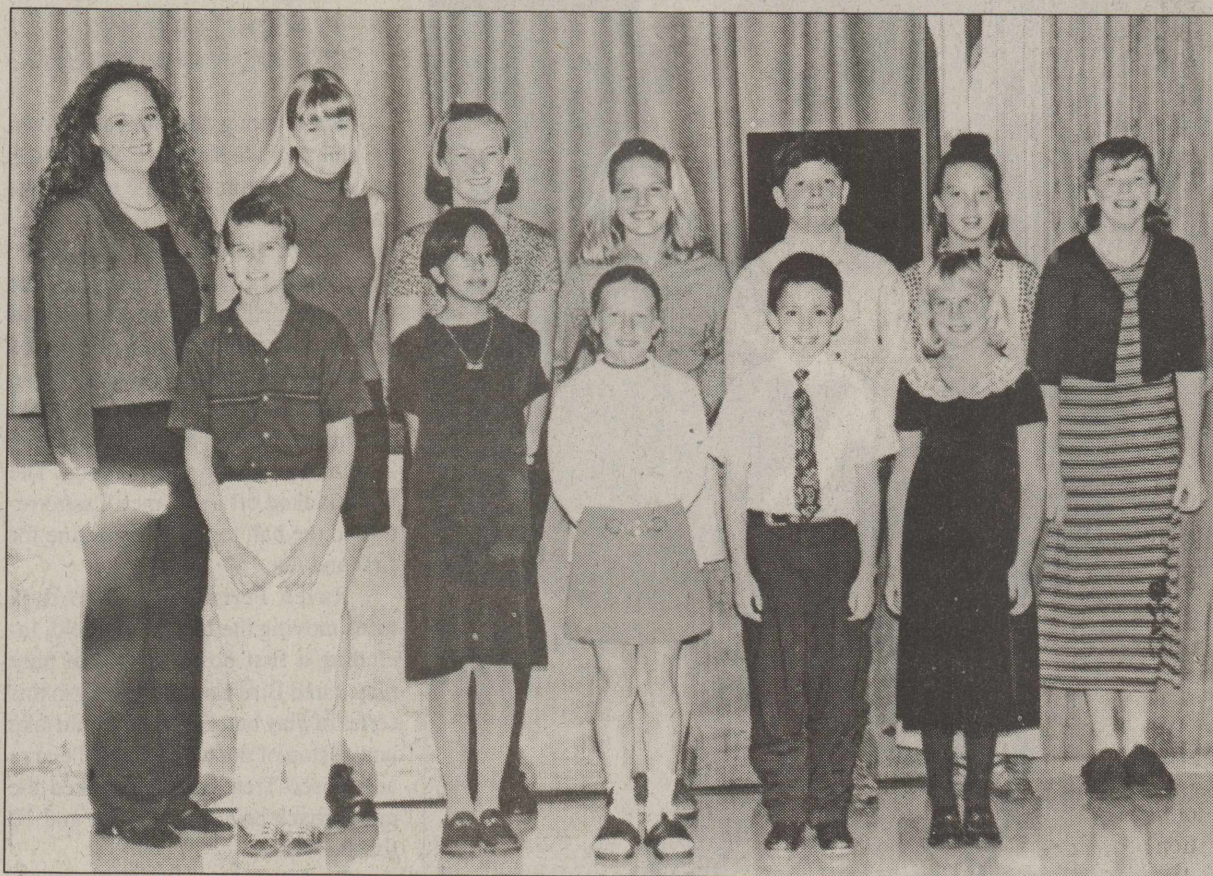

Do children need Social Security numbers?

The answer is yes. A child needs a Social Security number for many reasons:

- to be claimed as a dependent on a tax return;
- to be shown on a bank account or savings bond;
- to obtain medical coverage; or
- to become eligible for government services.

There's no cost and it's simple to get a Social Security number. The easiest way to apply for a child's number is at the hospital when the child is born. When you furnish information to register your baby's birth, the hospital representative should ask if you want to apply for a Social Security number for your baby. If the representative doesn't ask, it's okay for you to say that you want a Social Security number for your baby.

Whenever you apply for a Social Security number for a child under age 18, you need to provide the parents' Social Security numbers. You can still apply for a number for the child and we'll still be able to assign the child a Social Security number without the parent's Social Security numbers if:

- the parent does not have a Social Security number, or
- the parent's Social Security number is not known.

If you wait to apply for your baby's Social Security number, you'll need to:

- fill out an application (you need to give both parents' Social Security numbers);
- show evidence of your child's age, identity and citizenship; and
- show evidence of your identity.

Your baby's Social Security card is an important document. Keep it in a safe place. If you lose the card, we'll replace it at no charge. If you have any questions about getting your baby a Social Security number, check our website, www.ssa.gov, or call us at 1-800-772-1213 between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. to speak to a representative.

Help your child develop good study habits

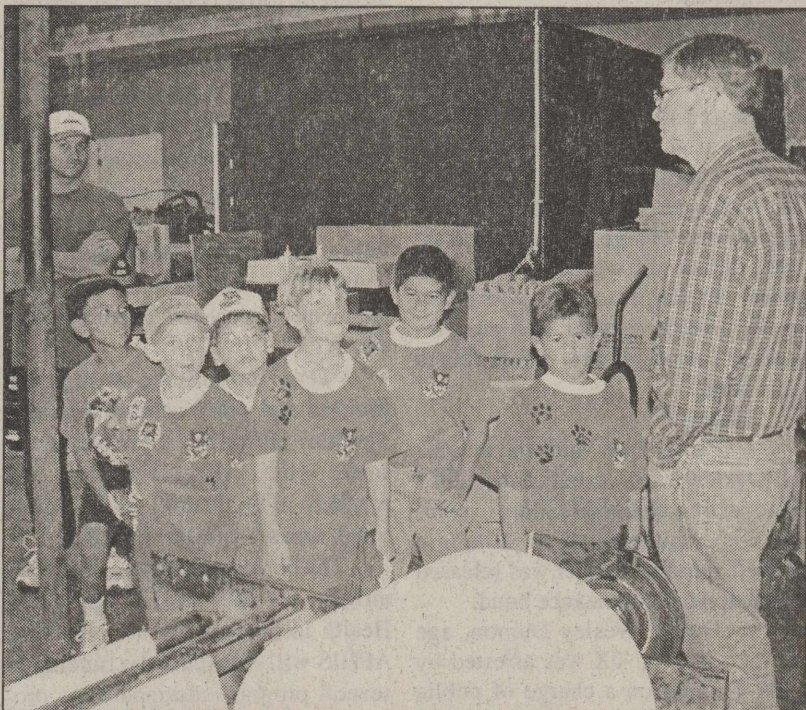
Ever wonder how your child can study with the TV and radio blaring? Not very well — according to most experts.

"Parents need to designate a quiet, private area with good lighting where their child can concentrate," said Dr. Teresa Rice at Texas Children's Hospital in Houston.

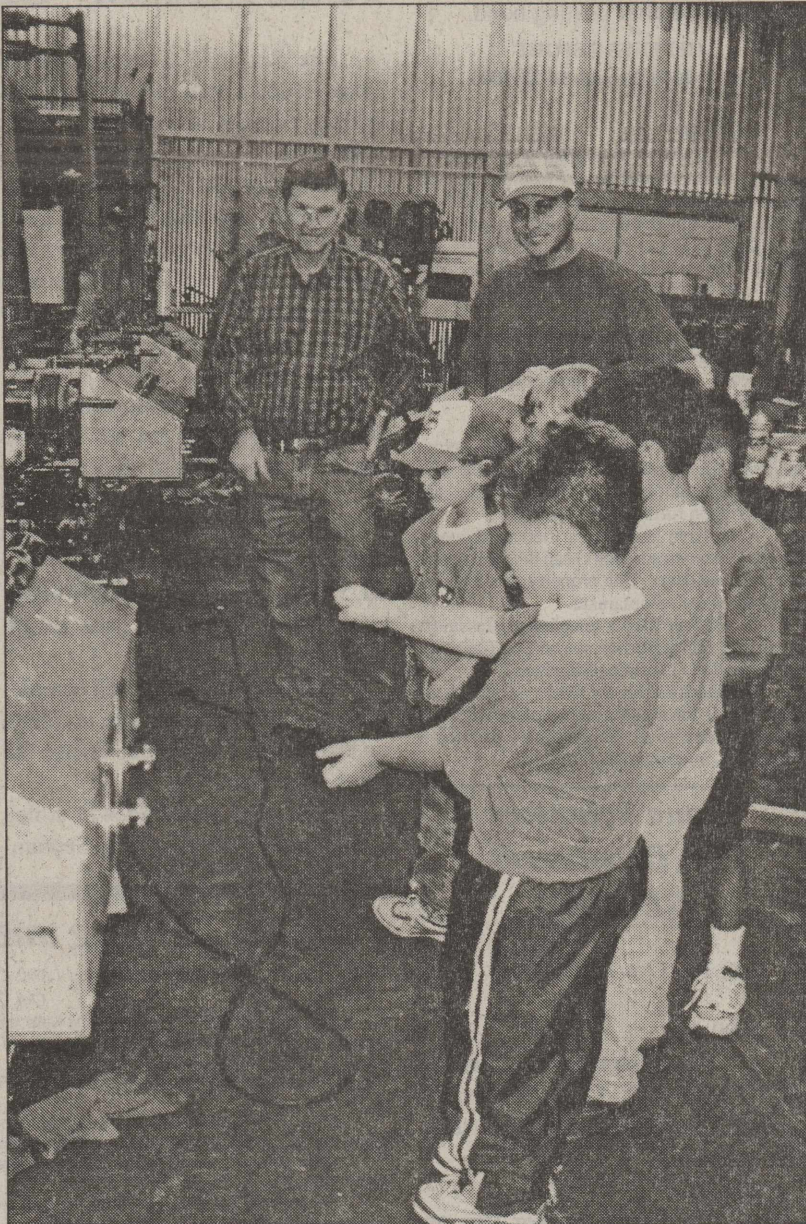

Developing outlines, organizing topics and highlighting key sections of class notes can help. Quiz your child by asking questions or having your child explain what he or she read or studied.

Offer praise and encouragement and provide small rewards when goals are met.

Bonilla applauds Bill to strengthen America's food supply

Representative Henry Bonilla, a member of the Agriculture Appropriations Subcommittee, has announced over \$18 billion in funding to assist with farm disaster relief, crop pest control and agriculture research. Mr. Bonilla applauded the funding and remarked that it will go a long way in strengthening America's food supply.

"We can not take for granted our food supply. This bill goes the extra mile to support hard working farmers and ranchers, and provide food and fiber for America," said Mr. Bonilla. "This funding will help people survive droughts, get rid of the pests that plague their cattle and crops, as well as stay on top of cutting-edge agriculture research."

The Agriculture Appropriations bill includes \$3.5 billion in emergency assistance funding which will assist disaster areas throughout the state. The funding includes \$490 million for the Livestock Assistance Program, \$1.6 billion for crop disaster including specialty crops, and \$20 million in direct payments to wool and mohair producers.

"Texas has suffered greatly from drought and other natural disasters. The \$3.5 billion we approved for disaster relief will help farmers and ranchers in my district survive these tough times," said Mr. Bonilla.

The bill allocated more than \$500 million for the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS). APHIS will distribute the funding to several programs designated to provide assistance to the boll weevil eradication program, pink bollworm and cattle tick control programs, and fire ant regulations. Mr. Bonilla was particularly happy to see a \$64 million increase in funding for the boll weevil eradication program.

"Farmers and ranchers in Texas understand the problems brought on by fire ants, boll weevils and cattle ticks. We're providing the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service with the ammunition necessary to move one step ahead of this constant problem," said Mr. Bonilla.

The agriculture legislation also includes \$969 million for agriculture research. This funding is an \$86 million increase from last year's total and is \$35.4 million over the President's request. The legislation will help develop new irrigation practices in the Rio Grande area and will provide funding for cotton and alternative crop research. Additionally, the bill will provide research dollars to study cancer fighting elements in food.

"My district is the largest and most diverse in Texas. Because of our size, we will benefit from research programs throughout the state. I kept that in mind when fighting for Texas agriculture research funding, and I'm happy to see so many worthy research programs coming home to our state," said Mr. Bonilla. "This funding could help researchers discover cancer fighting elements in the food we eat every day. That is invaluable!"

The FY2001 Agriculture Appropriations, H.R. 4461, passed the House by a vote of 340 to 75.

Texas Monthly Oil and Gas Statistics

The Railroad Commission of Texas issued a total of 1,107 original drilling permits in September compared to 873 in September 1999. Total drilling permits for 2000 year to date is 8,861, up from 5,868 recorded during the same period in 1999. The September total included 843 permits to drill new oil and gas wells; 42 to re-enter existing well bores and 222 for re-completions.

Permits issued in September included 324 oil, 248 gas, 487 oil and gas, 32 injection and 16 other permits.

In September, operators reported 243 oil, 445 gas, 16 injection and two other completions, compared to 215 oil, 278 gas, 16 injection and two other completions during the same month of last year.

The total number of well completions for 2000 year to date is 5,884, up from 4,314 recorded during the same period in 1999.

Operators reported 411 holes plugged and 71 dry holes in September compared to 472 plugged and 169 dry holes in the same period last year.

Texas preliminary July 2000 crude oil production averaged 1,056,463 barrels daily, down from the 1,082,806 barrels daily average of July 1999.

The preliminary Texas crude oil production figure for July 2000 is 32,750,360 barrels, a decrease from 33,566,977 barrels reported during July 1999.

Crockett County's production for the period was 238,037 barrels.

Texas oil and gas wells produced 459,701,665 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas based upon preliminary production figures for July 2000, up from the July 1999 preliminary gas production total of 445,960,441 Mcf.

Texas production in July came from 146,445 oil and 54,492 gas wells.

Crockett County's production was 10,288,017 Mcf.

The M. K. Daniel is in a 3,601-acre lease in the T&GNRR Survey A-3993. The Daniel-State is in a 583-acre lease, TCRR Survey A-5453.

TXP Inc. has brought the No. 1 Pierce "2A" on line in the Ozona Field 21 miles southwest of Ozona. It indicated ability to flow 648,000 CF gas daily on a 22/64 choke and was rated at 659,000 CFD on absolute open flow.

TXP drilled to a 6,600-ft. bottom and was perforated for production at 6,022 to 6,395 feet in the Canyon Sand.

A new pool wildcat is scheduled for spudding in the Ozona Field 12 miles southwest of Ozona. Designated as the No. 3 Henderson "21-2", the well carries permit for a 9,500-ft. Canyon Sand test. It is in a 577-acre lease in the TCRR Survey A-3480, with J. Cleo Thompson of Dallas as the operator.

A deep developmental bid is planned in the Ozona Field by Priza Operating Co. of Grapevine.

With total hole projected to 15,400 feet, the well will be known as the No. 5 Phillip Arledge. It is in a 5,440-acre lease, TCRR Survey A-5384, approximately 33 miles southwest of Ozona.

Rated at 4,311,000 CF gas per day on open flow, the No. 10 Baggett "A" has been completed in the Hunt-Baggett Field, Crockett County. Location is 13.5 miles south-southwest of Ozona with Ricks Exploration as the operator.

Ricks took the hole to a 9,371-ft. bottom, plugged it back to 9,178 and perforated the Strawn Sand for production 8,875 to 8,960 feet into the hole.

Gauged on a 1.5-in. choke, the well made 2,762,000 CF gas daily.

J. Cleo Thompson has posted first production figures for the No. 3 University 32-1 "5" in Crockett County's University 31 Field.

Location is 15 miles southwest of Ozona.

It flowed 646,000 CF gas daily on a 1.5-in. choke and earned a 1,200,000-CFD rating on absolute open flow.

Thompson took the hole to total depth of 8,643 feet and perforated for production at 8,422 feet in the Strawn Detrital Formation.

The Davidson Ranch Field gained new production when the No. 3409 Meybin "C" was completed a little less than nine miles southeast of Ozona.

Bottomed at 8,450 feet, the well was plugged back to 8,184 and will produce from perforations 7,750 to 8,114 feet into the wellbore.

The interval showed ability to flow 241,000 CF gas daily on a 1-in. choke. It earned a 323,000-CFD rating on absolute open flow.

Texaco Exploration has brought the No. 23 C. E. Davidson Jr. "B" on line in the Northeast Ozona Field seven miles southeast of Ozona.

The well flowed 366,000 CF gas daily on a 1.375-in. choke. It registered 349 PSI shut-in wellhead pressure.

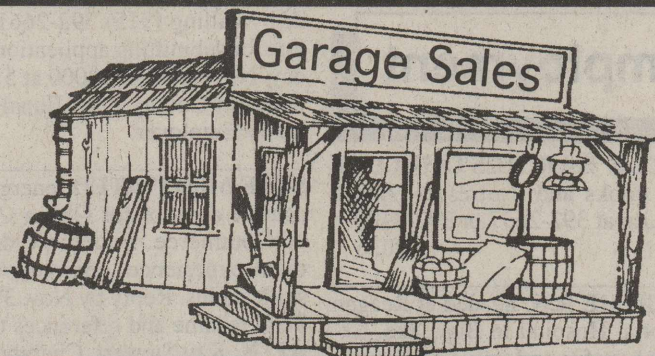

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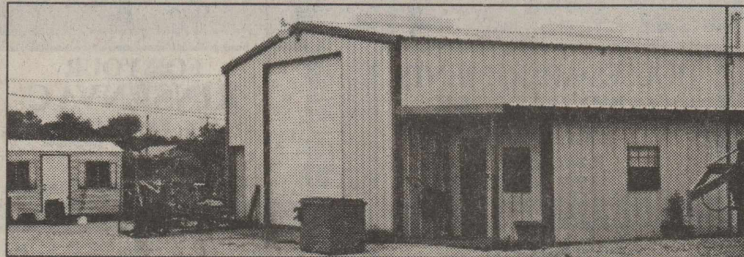

During the past year person or persons unknown have damaged County road signs. The person who provides information that leads to the arrest and conviction of those responsible will be eligible for the \$500.00 reward. Those having information should call Sheriff Shane Fenton. 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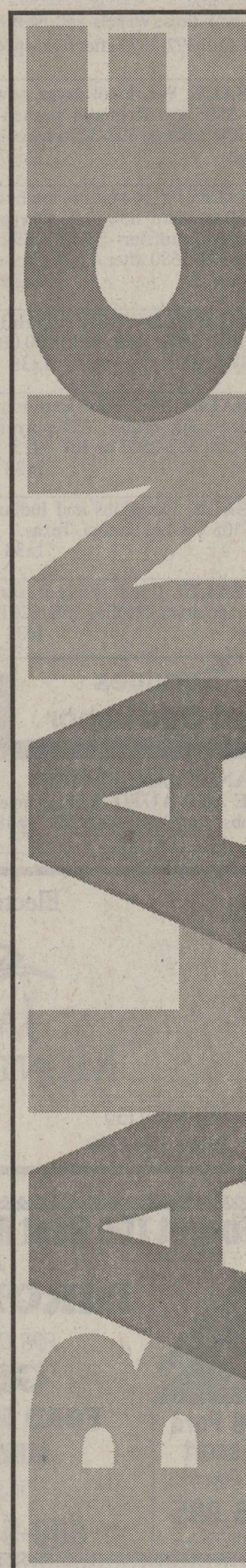
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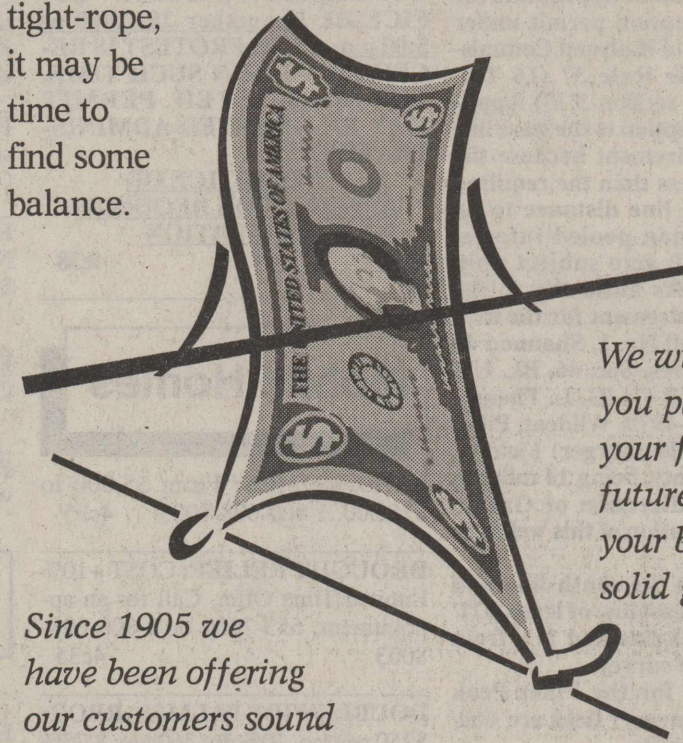
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
