

## Crockett SWCD honors Earl Acton

Earl Acton has served as a director on the Crockett Soil and Water Conservation Board since Aug. 14, 1976. He served as chairman for the past 12 of his 24 years on the board.

He was born in Alpine. His family moved to Balmorhea and lived there for a short time before moving to a ranch near Toyah, where he spent the rest of his youth.

While attending college at Sul Field Day, sponsoring the local poster Ross State University, he met Pam Jones. Earl and Pam laugh when they say, "that's when the cattleman decided to marry a sheep person". Pam Jones Acton comes from a ranching family herself, three generations on her father's side, and four generations on her mother's.

Earl and Pam moved to Ozona in 1965. Their ranch is located 30 miles south of Ozona. It has been a family operation with Earl and Pam working side by side raising cattle, sheep, Spanish goats and horses. Their children, Marty Acton and Bobbie Acton Renfro, have learned to love and respect the ranching profession.

"We have lived off the land and have tried to give back something for future generations," said Earl. "It has been a hard way of life, and in this day and time if you don't have an extra source of income, you just can't

#### Museum moves forward

Crockett County Museum underwent a two-day conservation and architectural assessment last week made possible through a grant written by Nancy Moore.

Here to examine the collection was Mary Frederickson of Canyon. Architect John Volz of Volt & Associates, Inc. of Austin made the architectural assessment.

The Conservation Assessment Program is 20 years old, Ms. Frederickson explained, and works with the National Institute of Cultural Property to fill the need for expertise at small museums. The two were here to come up

with "legitimate solutions that are real possibilities in the real world," said Ms. Frederickson. Their study of the museum will result in suggestions for implementing changes over a 5-year

Volz was enthusiastic about the building's new mechanical system, lighting and life safety measures. The

two praised the museum as "far ahead of other small museums we have vis-

They see Ozona's museum as an ideal place for regional workshops on such subjects as the care of metal objects in a collection, the rust removal, electrolysis and follow up treatment for these objects.

Greater community involvement is also a goal for the museum, said Ms. Frederickson. Interested citizens could learn useful skills such as photography and textile care through projects at the museum, she said. Every item there needs to have at least one photograph made and be documented as to shape, size, distinguishing marks and condition.

Having the assessment performed and working toward some of the resulting goals will help the museum in its search for additional grants, said Geniece Childress, museum director.





At halftime, the Braves led the Lions 12-0.





APPLICATION AND PRELIMINARY DECISION. Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1, P.O. Box 117, Ozona, Texas 76943-0117, has applied to the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) for a renewal of TPDES Permit No. 10059-001, which authorizes the discharge of treated domestic wastewater at a daily average flow not to exceed 500,000 gallons per day. The current permit also authorizes the disposal of treated domestic wastewater via irrigation of 22- acre tract of grassland located on the water treatment plant site. This application was submitted to the TNRCC on March 2,

The facility is located approximately 3,000 feet west of the State Highway 163 and approximately 2.5 miles south of the Interstate Highway 10 in Crockett County, Texas. The treated effluent is discharged to Johnson's Draw; thence to the Devils River in Segment No. 2309 of the Rio Grande Basin. The unclassified receiving water uses are no significant aquatic life uses for Johnson's Draw. The designated uses for Segment No. 2309 are contact recreation, exceptional aquatic life uses and public water supply.

The TNRCC executive director has completed the technical review of the application and prepared a draft permit. The draft permit, if approved, would establish the conditions under which the facility must operate. The executive director has made a preliminary decision to issue the draft permit. The permit application, statement of basis/technical summary and executive director's preliminary decision, and draft permit are available for viewing and copying at Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1.

PUBLIC COMMENT / PUBLIC MEETING. You may submit public comments or request a public meeting about this application. The purpose of a public meeting is to provide the opportunity to submit written or oral comment or to ask questions about the application. The TNRCC will hold a public meeting if the executive director determines that there is a significant degree of public interest in the application or if requested by a local legislator. A public meeting is not a contested case hearing.

Written public comments and requests for a public meeting should be submitted to the Office of the Chief Clerk, MC 105, TNRCC, P.O. Box 13087, Austin, TX 78711-3087 within 30 days of the date of newspaper publication of the notice.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING. After the deadline for public comments, the executive director will consider the comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. The response to comments, along with the executive director's decision on the application, will be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments or who requested to be on a mailing list for this application. If comments were received, the mailing will also provide instructions for requesting a contested case hearing or reconsideration of the executive director's decision. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in a state district court.

A contested case hearing will only be granted based on disputed issues of fact that are relevant and material to the Commission's decision on the application. Further, the Commission will only grant a hearing on issues that were raised during the public comment period and not withdrawn. Issues that are not raised in public comments may not be considered during a hearing. The TNRCC may act on this application to renew a permit without providing an opportunity for a contested case hearing if certain criteria are met.

**EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR ACTION.** The executive director may issue final approval of the application unless a timely contested case hearing request or a timely request for reconsideration is filed. If a timely hearing request or request for reconsideration is filed, the executive director will not issue final approval of the permit and will forward the application and requests to the TNRCC Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.

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
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# WHY SHOULD I VOTE THE WATER IMPROVEMENTS BOND?
