Ozona Lions clinch district championship

The Ozona Lions defeated the Tornillo Coyotes Nov. 3 22-2 to clinch the district championship and the #1 seeded play off position despite the bad weather conditions. This is the first time since 1994 the Lions have won district.

An hour before game time the sky was lit up by lightning. Rain poured throughout the game, letting up during halftime for about two minutes. Lion fans, trainers, ball boys and reporters were all donned in trash bags trying to shield themselves from the The offensive line blocked well. rain as much as possible.

Those on the sidelines soon found out how muddy and slippery it was in three inches of mud.

"The kids did a good job of being ready to play despite the long drive to Tornillo and the bad weather conditions," said Coach Steve Taylor. "The kids actually had a lot of fun playing in the rain, getting muddy and sliding around."

The Lions ate up much of the time in the first quarter on a long drive to eventually score their first touchdown. Jared Shaffer made the score on a 5-yard run and also ran in the 2point conversion for an early 8-0 lead with 3:40 remaining in the quarter. Ozona held the Coyotes out of the end zone for the remainder of the quarter.

The second quarter resembled the first with the Lions scoring after a long drive. Jarryd Taylor dove over the top to score the 1-yard TD with (-27) 3:46 remaining in the half. Taylor also ran in the 2-point conversion, bringing the halftime score to Lions 16, Coyotes 0.

Late in the third quarter, Shaffer broke open up the center for an awesome 47-yard touchdown run. The 2point attempt was no good.

With only 1:47 remaining in the game, the Lions' punt snap ended up in the end zone for the Coyotes' only 2 points of the game on a safety.

The Lions' season record is 6-3. They are 4-0 in district.

"Defensively, we got three fumbles with Ty Allen recovering two, and Tornillo had a (-39) yards total offense," said Coach Taylor. Jared Shaffer and Ray Ramos ran the ball well considering the muddy field.

"The weather made it very difficult to throw the ball, and Tornillo stacked the line of scrimmage."

The Lions will take on the Van Horn Eagles Friday, Nov. 10, at Lion Stadium at 7:30 p.m.

Official Crockett County rain gauge (the one that really counts)





At halftime the Loboes led the Lions 19-0. Brennan Brown received a knee injury in the third quarter and did not go back into the game. He had three tackles including a quarterback



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



Railroad commissioner calls for revamped gas proration system

Calling for modernization of an outdated program, Texas Railroad Commissioner Tony Garza expressed his support last week for updating Texas' gas proration system.

"It's time to bring our regulatory practices up to date," Garza said.

The current gas proration system in Texas dates back to legislation in the mid-1930's. Proration was initiated then to halt wasteful practices in the Panhandle Field of North Texas. At that time, producers without access to pipelines vented billions of cubic feet into the atmosphere.

Venting allowed producers to collect natural gasoline from the gas stream. Yet, the process wasted approximately 97 percent of the energy stored in natural gas. Through legislation, the Railroad Commission of Texas - the state's oil and gas regulatory body - was instructed to limit the production of gas from a given reservoir to an amount that could be put to beneficial use.

"Despite the radically changed natural gas markets of today, the proration system of the 1930's still persists," Garza said. "We have a duty to all Texans to regulate only when needed and in the least intrusive manner available to get the job done."

Garza supports a move to proration on an "as needed" basis.

"By regulating individual gas fields on an 'as needed' basis, we bet ter serve both the natural gas producers and the consumers, while encouraging further development of this clean burning Texas natural resource,' Garza added.

"With demand for natural gas increasing and with new power generation being primarily natural gas driven, Texas should do what it can to ensure that we meet the growing consumer and commercial demands for natural gas," Garza said.

According to a National Petroleum Council report released last year natural gas demand will increase by 32 percent between 1998 and 2010, rising from 22 TCF annually to 29 TCF by 2010 and to levels exceeding 31 TCF by 2015.

Preserving health care for rural America

A big health care rumble is brewing in Washington. Conservative members of Congress want to ensure that people in rural America have access to health care. We don't think families should be penalized because of where

A few years ago, experts predicted that Medicare, which helps keep rural health care on its feet, would be broke in 2001. Thankfully, Congress recognized the problem. We took the bull by the horns and passed the Balanced Budget Act (BBA) of 1997. Policy changes made in the act added 14 years of life to Medicare. By extending the life of Medicare, we extended the life of programs, such as rural health care. Although Congress made its changes using the best information avail-

able, some of the changes were too drastic. But we are fixing the problems. On the flip side, however the Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA) took advantage of the changes and chose to impose their own agenda on the American health care system. The cuts they made threaten to close hospital doors and cripple health care services in rural America. HCFA obviously didn't take into consideration that rural areas have unique health care problems that need to be tackled. Because of their lack of attention, they have placed senior citizens health care in harm's way.

In an effort to reverse the damages made by HCFA, members of Congress have introduced the Medicare Refinement bill. In this important piece of legislation, we address almost every rural health care problem still lingering from the original Balanced Budget Act. The bill improves seniors' access to hospitals, lowers their out-of-pocket costs and cracks down on Medicare fraud that robs seniors of the care they desperately need. The bottom line is that this bill means more money for community health centers and hospitals, which means better health care for rural America.

We also understand that there is more to rural health care than just the facilities. I know that families living in my district also depend on home health and hospice care. This bill is going to protect funding for these services. We're watching out for every aspect of your health care needs.

Unfortunately, just when we thought we were on the road to solving the problem, another barrier showed up. Before the ink was even dry, President Clinton has already threatened a veto. That veto would threaten funding for essential community health centers, which provide comprehensive, high-quality health care services to rural areas throughout the country. As a result, millions of people could lose the health care access and coverage they have relied on for so long.

Just because you live or work in a rural community doesn't mean you should be forgotten when it comes to health care. I understand this and I'm working hard to ensure rural health care coverage is with us for generations to



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


