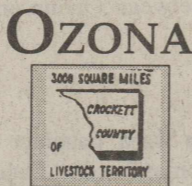

Lions win Bi-District

The Ozona Lions knocked the Mason Punchers out of the playoffs last Saturday at Bobcat Stadium in San Angelo. The Lions won the game over the Punchers and took home the bi-district championship for the second year in a row.

The Mason Punchers were huge in size and were thought to be more that the Lions could handle, but the Lions held their own, proving that size doesn't mean anything.

Both teams battled to reach the end zone in the first 24 minutes of play. However, it would be a scoreless first half.

In the first quarter, on the Punchers' first offensive series of play on fourth and one, Lion Arron Garza blocked a punt, and the Lions took over on the 30-yard-line. On the Punchers' second offensive series, Garza again upset the Mason team as he intercepted a Puncner pass and ran the ball to the 45-yard-line. Later in the first quarter Garza would again intercept a Puncner pass.

Kyle Richardson threw a nice 12-yard pass to Luis Cruz and also a sweet 12-yard pass to Juan Garcia in the second quarter.

The third quarter was ram-packed full of some awesome high school football. The Punchers scored their first touchdown on their first offensive series in the third quarter. They

recovered a Lion fumble and three plays later with 10:49 left in the third quarter, the Punchers scored. Lion Arron Garza blocked the kick for the extra point.

The Punchers led the Lions 6-0, but the Lions immediately fired back with five first downs and the eventual touchdown. Lions Jared Shaffer and Ray Ramos took turns carrying the ball down the field eight times. Richardson also threw a sharp 40-yard pass caught by Juan Garcia in this offensive series of play. The Lions ate five minutes and 41 seconds off the clock on this series.

With 5:08 remaining in the third quarter, Kyle Richardson threw a terrific 12-yard pass to Trey Hale for the Lions' first touchdown of the game. Garza's kick for the extra point was successful and would later be the one point difference in the game.

The Lions now took a short-lived one point lead over the Punchers 7-6. The Mason team bounced back with another touchdown seven plays later, but their two-point conversion attempt failed.

With 1:47 remaining in the third quarter, the Punchers took a five point lead over the Lions 12-7. The Lions would get the ball again but were forced to punt as time ran out in the third quarter.

The pressure was intense in the final quarter as the Lions knew that

Traffic stop nets 800 lbs. of marijuana

The driver gave his name as Michael Docton but was later identified as Michael James Duenas. He was being held Monday for federal marshals on outstanding warrants.

The passenger, Melissa Guerra, bonded out. Both she and Duenas are from San Angelo.

Ozona school enrollment drops

During their regular monthly meeting that was held on Wednesday,

Nov. 15, members of the Ozona School Board approved the taking of bids for the removal of the old roof and the installing of a new gabled metal roof on the Ozona Primary

School Cafeteria. The board also approved the taking of bids for installing a new gabled metal roof on the girls' fieldhouse at Lions Stadium.

Both of the flat roofs on the structures are composed of old foam-type coverings that have begun to leak to the extent that it is not feasible to continue patching the material. Bids for the two roofs will be considered at the board's December regular meeting which was approved to be held on Dec. 14 at 7:00 p.m. The board took no action on the taking of bids for new

tennis court lighting at Lions Stadium; however, it did approve a \$21,976.00 low bid from Glasscock Motors of Big Lake for the purchase of two 2000 Chevrolet Lumina automobiles to be used as a driver's education car and a bus route car.

During the meeting Shirley Weaver, representative from the Region XV Education Service Center in San Angelo, presented certificates of

Care Center still seeking administrator

A replacement for Jim Bob Roddie, administrator of Crockett County Care Center, still has not been found, board chairman Tom Anderson said Tuesday morning. The board will try to find an interim administrator while the search continues, Anderson said.

Roddie announced his plans to resign several months ago and had hoped to be able to leave in October for Brady where his wife is a teacher. His official last day of work is Wednesday, Nov. 22.

The board thought they had been

successful in hiring a replacement late last week, but the applicant didn't take the position, Anderson said.

At a Nov. 13 meeting of the board, Roddie reported a care center census of 39. There was an average of 41.5 residents during October.

Ladyne Mahannah and the business office were moved to the care center from quarters in the medical offices building. Mrs. Mahannah's office and that of the administrator are now located in rooms 302 and 304 of the care center.

The former business office space will become the office of the Texas Tech Health Services Center which includes the W.I.C. program.

Meador requested that he wanted to have airbags installed on one or possibly two of the ambulances for a more comfortable ride. These are not the big bags like on EMS 1, but a smaller version to supplement the shock absorbers, Meador said.

He also told the board an air compressor is needed for the EMS building and that he would like to replace several more pagers.

The board agreed to submit the name of Jeffrey Stuart to commissioners as a replacement for Nancy Moore, who has resigned. Stuart was accepted when commissioners met Nov. 13.

Technology grant information offered

Several members of the community attended a meeting called last week by Judge Jeffrey Sutton to learn more about community network grants available through the Texas Telecommunications Infrastructure Fund Board. TIF grants, as they are called, are made possible through creation of the board and funding in 1995 by the 74th Texas Legislature. Legislative action established a \$1.5 billion

grant fund for 10 years, 1995-2005, funded by a surcharge on telephone and wireless communication. TIF is run by an independent government agency with expenditures of \$150 million per year.

Gene Crick, executive director of Telecom Resource Center, who presented the information last Tuesday,

was \$27,014.12. This is a non-recurring charge. The monthly charge, which also will be paid by COG, is \$2,899.43.

What to do if Gore won't concede?

Al Gore's campaign chairman William Daley has indicated that if the recount shows a Bush victory, Gore will not concede. Daley, together with Warren Christopher have suggested that they will take the situation to the courts. In case the Democrats refuse to relinquish power, here is a suggested course of action:

Herewith is some practical advice on action that every citizen can take in the event that the Florida recount confirms the election of George Bush, but Al Gore fails to concede.

We all know what is going on in Florida, and that the election hinges on the outcome. I am writing you today to prepare us all for what we will have to do if what I think is going to happen actually.

The recount, which will be finished by 5 p.m. Thursday, will likely show Bush to be the winner once again, with only a few thousand overseas ballots to be counted. Those ballots will be overwhelmingly for Bush, a minimum of 60% and probably close to 75%. If the count goes our way tomorrow, we have won this election.

This is when something critical happens. Either Gore bows out gracefully or he doesn't, and I can almost guarantee he won't. These are people wedded to power who will only go down kicking and screaming. They will use every legal maneuver in the book to steal the election.

In 1960 when Richard Nixon had every right and reason to challenge the election results he didn't for the sake of the country. Expect no such noble behavior this time.

What will they try? One bet is to find a friendly judge to throw out the Florida results on a flimsy premise. They are already floating this as a trial balloon in the form of the allegedly "confusing" ballots in Palm Beach County. I have seen the ballots - they are not confusing in the least. Indeed, they are identical in form to the punch-card ballots used in Chicago and Cook County, Illinois, in this very election. What is more, it is just as likely that Palm Beach County voters who wanted to vote for Bush inadvertently voted for Nader. All parties approved the form of ballot before the election. The form-of-ballot issue is a more pretext for an effort a judicial invalidation of the Florida election.

While I hope this scenario doesn't come to pass, I fear that it will, and it will only have disastrous results for the country. The election fight could drag on for months and actually be decided by a court! If this comes to pass the vision of our founders and the blood of patriots will have been betrayed.

Personally, I am not going to stand for this, and I hope you won't either. The good news is that we are not without voice.

Here is what must be done:
If the vote count affirms Bush's election, we allow a short grace period to see the reaction of the Gore camp. If they have not graciously conceded after a few hours, we must bombard the news media and our public officials at every level with phone calls of outrage that demand Gore's concession. I mean literally millions of phone calls.

We must jam their phone banks with calls. There are millions of us so it shouldn't be too difficult. While you're at it, send e-mails to your local newspapers as well, demanding that Gore back down and not embarrass the country. It will be very difficult for Gore to withstand the pressure. He will have to relent.

If you've never made a call like this, there's no reason to be shy. They get opinion calls all the time and are set up to take them. In fact they like calls. It helps them tell which way the wind is blowing.

I'm hoping none of this will be necessary, but I fear otherwise. As Edmund Burke said, the price of freedom is eternal vigilance. This e-mail is just to prepare you for the battle that we must engage.

Senior Happenings

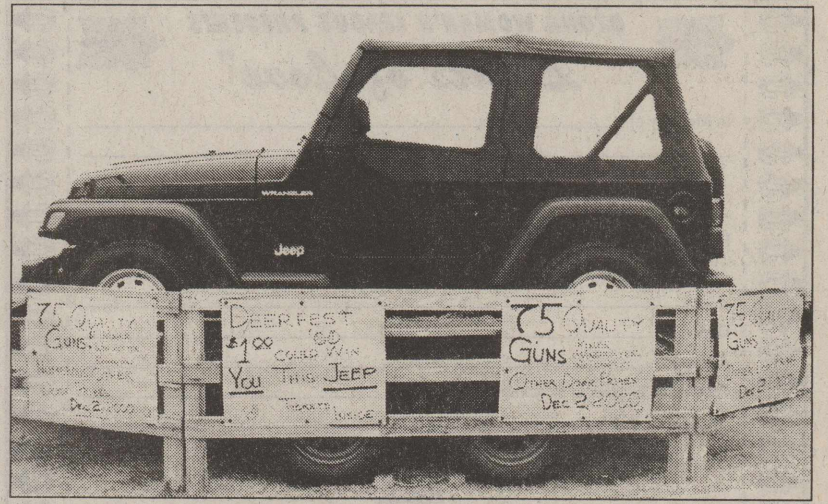

All present enjoyed a program on growing and designing with gourds given by Jan Van Shoubrouek. Jan shared her research with club members and brought many samples of gourds of various sizes and types, gave members information on ordering gourd seeds, and brought a book on creating decorations with gourds for all to peruse.

Gourds have been cultivated for thousands of years by many cultures worldwide, including Native Americans and Africans, for their usefulness as utensils, storage containers and as ornaments. Charlotte Harrell brought some African objects made from gourds, including bowls, water dip-pers and ladles.

Gourds are related to melons, squash, pumpkins and cucumbers, all members of the Cucurbitaceae or cu-

cumber family. There are three types of gourds: the cucurbita, or ornamental gourds, the lagenaria, which encompass the large, utilitarian gourds, and the luffa, or vegetable sponge. The cucurbita include the colorful, variously-shaped ornamental gourds often used in fall arrangements. Plants of this group produce large orange or yellow blossoms that bloom in the daytime. This is a wonderful tribute for anyone to give in honor of, in recognition of, for future honor of or for organizations or individuals who have influenced or touched your life in some special way.

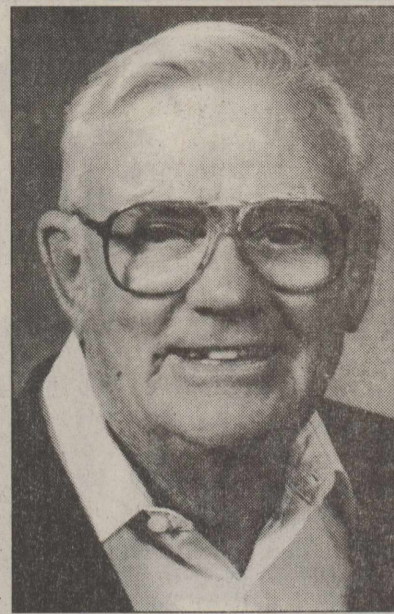

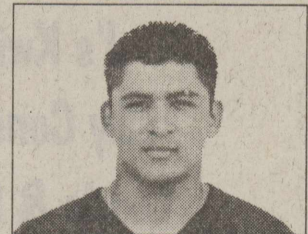

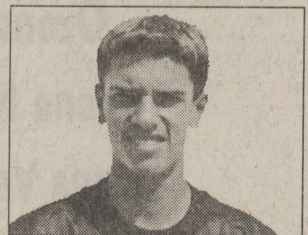

Middle school youths learn of Indian life

Students at Ozona Intermediate School were given the opportunity to learn many things in a short time when Mescalero Apache Ray Olachia recently came to Ozona.

Olachia, a resident of Lake Jackson, was visiting area schools as an extension of Historic Fort Stockton's Living History Day. With him he brought animal skins, tools of the Indian's daily life and of war, deer-skin clothing he had made for his daughter when she was an infant and an adult, a drum and shield.

"What do you see when you look at a tree?" asked Olachia. "Do not destroy them for the fun of it." The Indian sees shelter, chairs, mats, food and medicines, he explained.

The medicinal and nutritional value of familiar plants and use of plant fibers to make bags or baskets were illustrated by the speaker. "All around us, see things you need to survive." He continued to explain that native people copied from Mother Nature.

"How long do you think it took to make this?" he asked, showing a war club.

"You all live under the illusion you are free," he said. Pointing out that many of the youngsters wore watches, he told them that "time is your master".

Olachia went on to explain that in the Indian way of thinking, the time it takes to make something is "from the time you start until you finish. That's all the time it takes."

Olachia demonstrated flintknapping. "There is a tool in this stone, and I will take it out slowly, but surely." He presented the finished product to teacher Katrece Hale.

Donning a warbonnet made for him by a Lakota, Olachia explained that he has been tested in battle. "I am a warrior," he said, explaining that he had served in Vietnam. "My prayer is that none of you have to fight."

"There is war going on in the Middle East, Africa, California, San Antonio, Dallas, Los Angeles where people your age are dying every day."

School and parents were praised by the visitor. "Going to school and learning is the most important job you will ever have in life. Dropping out is the worst mistake you could ever do in life."

"If you survive your teenage years, you will discover how smart your parents are," said Olachia.

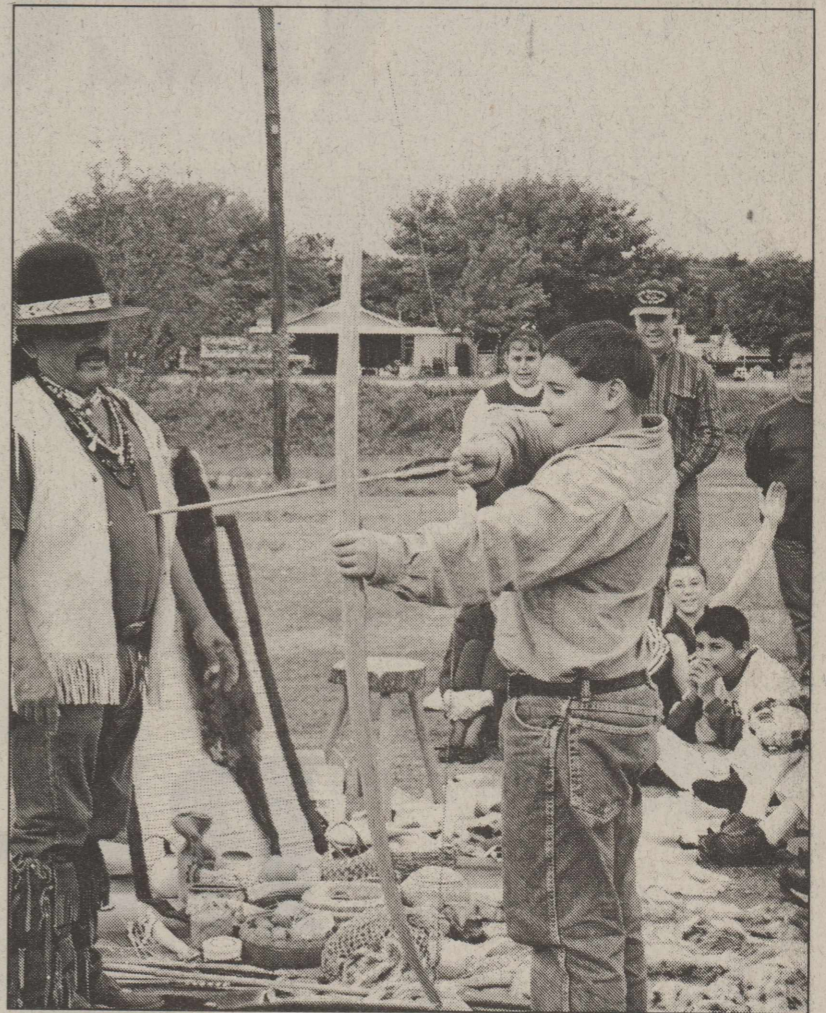
There will be times you may want to run away, he told the students. "There are people out there waiting for you to use, abuse or kill. If you ever get in trouble, your best friends are your parents. They are the ones who are right beside you. Your teachers are your friends. There is not a one of them trying to fail you."

"How well you do in school is in your hands. It is up to you."

Wearing a red ribbon has little significance if the wearer uses tobacco, alcohol or drugs, Olachia said.

"You must have the courage to say no. You have incredible power, and courage if you will only learn to use it. Life is too short for you to fool around with drugs, tobacco or alcohol."

Olachia passed along to the students a gift he was given by his grandmother. "How many of you have ever wanted to get even with someone?" he asked. Repeating his grandmother's wise words, Olachia urged his listeners to "get even with those who do something good for you, not those who make you angry."

accomplishment to the district and to Ozona Middle School and Ozona High School for earning an "Academically Recognized" rating from the Texas Education Agency for the 1999-2000 school year. This is the district's fourth year in a row that it has been "Academically Recognized" by T.E.A., and this is Ozona Middle School's third year in a row for campus recognition.

Also during the meeting teachers and students in Ozona Primary School, Ozona Intermediate School and Ozona Middle School gave the trustees a demonstration of the Shurley English Language Arts Program that is being used in grades one through eight in these three schools. The Shurley English Language Arts Program utilizes jingles and repetition to help students understand how sentences are composed, and this understanding leads to better reading, writing and grammar skills.

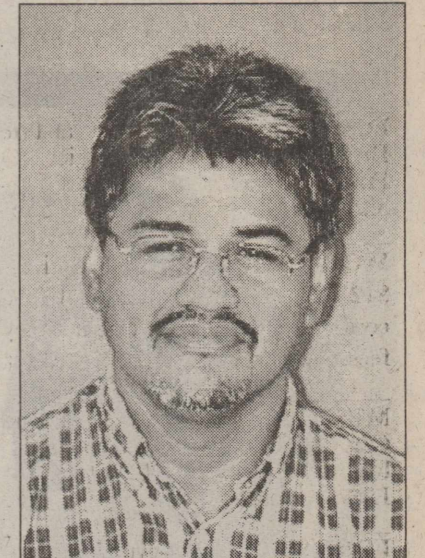
The board entered into executive session to discuss the purchase of property and personnel, and after emerging out of the executive session, the members took no action on an agenda item regarding the purchase of property. The board did approve the employment of Bobbie Renfro as a special education teacher in Ozona Intermediate School for the 2000-2001 school year. Mrs. Renfro takes the place of James Cox who recently resigned for the purpose of retirement.

The meeting was adjourned following a report by Superintendent Larry Taylor concerning the declining enrollment and average daily attendance in the school district. "At the present time we have 823 students enrolled in our district, and projecting a 97% average daily attendance rate, we will probably end the 2000-2001 school year with 798 students in average daily attendance," Taylor said. "Our 1999-2000 average daily attendance was 853; our 1998-1999 average daily attendance was 922; and, our 1997-1998 average daily attendance rate was 958. From the 1997-1998 school year through the 2000-2001 school year we will probably

have a loss of 163 students in average daily attendance unless enrollment increases this year," Taylor remarked.

When asked about where the shift in student enrollment was taking place, Taylor replied, "It is impossible to tell exactly, but I do know that enrollment east of the Interstate 35 Corridor (Fort Worth to Waco to Austin to San Antonio) is increasing, and I know of only two school districts (Wall and Grape Creek) in West Texas where enrollment is increasing rather than decreasing."

Weekly Drilling and Completion Report

A total of five 7,600-ft. development wells is scheduled for spudding in the Ozona Field with Union Pacific Resources as the operator.

The wells include the Nos. 6, 11 and 53 W. C. Montgomery and the Nos. 78 and 79 Union Pacific. The No. 6 Montgomery is in a 260-acre lease, GC&SFRR Survey A-2139. The No. 11 Montgomery is in a 320-acre unit, GC&SFRR Survey A-5577. The No. 53 is in a 2,138-acre lease, TCRR Survey A-3470. Locations are 11.5, 11.9, 12.5, and 9.8 (two wells) southwest of Ozona, respectively.

The two Union Pacific wells are in a 4,304-acre lease GC&SFRR Survey A-2141.

Southern Crockett County's Massie Field saw a new producer come on line when the No. 8 West "C" was completed about ten miles northwest of the Juno community (Val Verde County). OXY U.S.A. is the operator.

The West well flowed 741,000 CF gas daily on a 1.25-in. choke. It received an 801,000-CFD rating on open flow.

OXY took the well to an 11,465-ft. bottom and perforated for Strawn Formation pay. Production will range from 11,160 to 11,465 feet into the hole.

Aimed at expanding the production area of the Hunt-Baggett Field, a new pool wildcard is planned 12 miles southwest of Ozona. Ricks Exploration of Oklahoma City is the operator. Location is in a 320-acre unit, TCRR Survey A-4808. Designated as the No. 506-Miller-Hoover "B", the well carries permit for an even 10,000 feet of hole.

TEMA Oil and gas has brought the No. 30 M. K. Daniels on line as the newest production in the Simpson-Mann Field, Crockett County. Drillsite was about 40 miles southwest of Ozona.

Gauged on a 1.25-in. choke, the well made 653,000 CF gas per day. It was evaluated at 670,000 CF on open flow.

TEMA took the hole to a 5,750-ft. bottom and perforated for Canyon Sand pay. Production will range from 4,728 to 5,345 feet into the wellbore.

pumping 12 barrels of crude oil daily on open choke, the No. 1 University "L" has been completed in Crockett County's Farmer Field.

With Larron Energy as the operator, the well bottomed at 2,600 feet and will produce from perforations ranging from 2,322 to 2,555 feet into the hole.

The lease is approximately 30 miles northwest of Ozona.

said his community network consultant group is a spinoff at the request of TIF.

Beneficiaries of TIF grants for the first five years have been schools, libraries and telemedicine training networks. The Crockett County Public School System is a recipient of a TIF grant.

New goals are community-wide technology building. Phase one of the community grant seeking process is to apply for a planning grant of \$20,000.00. The county would be required to put up a 10% match of funds. Phase 2, the implementation part, gives communities the opportunity to apply for up to \$500,000.00 in grant money, again with a 10% match required.

According to Crick, required elements to receive a grant are: free public Internet and technology access locations, local community information maintained online, community Internet and technology training, and solid local governance with an effective sustainability plan.

The Senior Citizens' Center and Crockett County Civic and Youth Center were suggested as locations for computers and free Internet access. Free Internet access is currently available at Crockett County Public Library where there are nine computers for use by the public. Of these nine, seven are equipped for Internet access.

Local community information "can be relatively static", Crick said, meaning that the data would require little change.

Information about Crockett County and the community of Ozona is currently available on the Ozona Chamber of Commerce website at www.ozona.com/crockettcounty.

Crick said that 54 applicants were awarded \$20,000.00 planning grants in February. In May, 49 communities submitted finished community network plans. In August, 36 communities were awarded implementation grants.

The community needs to decide if it is interested, Crick said. If so, local leadership needs to be established and contact persons designated. A fiscal agent should then be chosen and a letter of intent written. Then the steps in the Texas Telecom Community Network template should be completed.

Judge Sutton said he will put the grant information before commissioners' court.

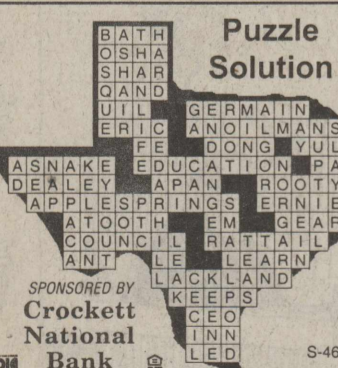

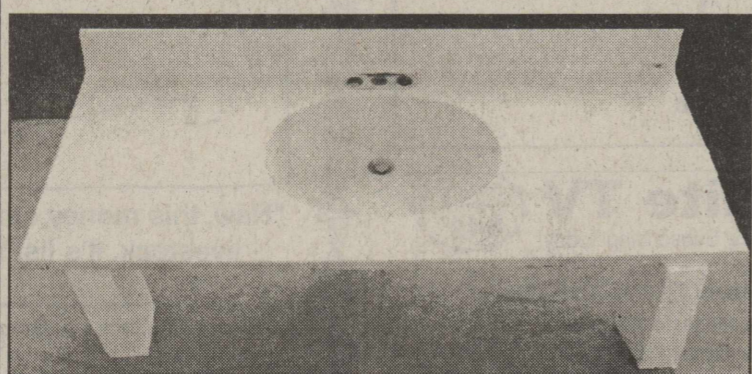
