



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

#### Rep. Bonilla responds to recent surplus report, endorses Bush tax cut proposal

- Seconds Greenspan's Call for Tax Cuts -

WASHINGTON D.C. - Rep. Henry Bonilla today responded to the Congressional Budget Office's (CBO) revised surplus estimate saying, "there has never been a better time for a tax cut. Let's give this money back to the people who earned it."

Mr. Bonilla's remarks came after Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan's assessment that a tax cut is both prudent and possible and that if Congress does not return the tax overcharge to taxpayers, that the likely alternative will be more wasteful government spending.

"It sounds like Alan Greenspan has seen the very same thing I have. If you leave the surplus in Washington, Washington will spend it. For example, the final spending bill approved last year, over my objections, increased spending for four Cabinet Agencies, the White House and Congress by a whopping 29 percent," said Mr. Bonilla.

The Congressional Budget Office's new surplus estimates raise the total surplus to \$5.7 trillion over the next ten years - three-and-a-half times larger than the Bush tax cut. According to a recent report by the National Taxpayers Union, the Bush tax cut is smaller than both the 1981 Reagan tax cut and President Kennedy's 1963 tax cut proposal.

"Clearly, there is room within the surplus to pay down the debt, fund priority programs, and enact the Bush tax cut. If anything, the new surplus estimates justify an even larger tax reduction package. The Reagan tax cut in the early 1980s, was responsible for spurring historic economic growth --America needs a tax cut of that magnitude," said Mr. Bonilla.

"Allowing all Americans to keep more of their money is both good for the people of the 23rd District of Texas and for the economy as a whole. So many families are struggling right now just to pay their credit card and utility bills -- tax relief will help them make ends meet," said Mr. Bonilla. "A tax cut for every American, like the proposal offered by President Bush, is absolutely critical to rebuilding what is quickly becoming a crumbling economy."

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
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## Eighth grade Lions cap season with a squeaker







Independent operator J. Cleo Thompson has completed two producers, one an oil well and one a gasser, in Crockett County's Vaughn Field northwest of Ozona. The wells are known as the No. 1 Vaughn "85" and No. 2 Chambers School Land,

located 11 and 13 miles northwest of Ozona, respectively. The Vaughn "85", shallower of the pair, flowed 129 barrels of oil daily on an 18/64 choke opening. The Chambers flowed 586,000 CF gas daily on a 1-in. choke and was evaluated at a sturdy 2,929,000 CFD on absolute open flow.

Both wells produce from Ellenburger intervals, 7,415 to 7,423 and 7,451 to 7,504 feet into the hole, respectively.

The Vaughn Field was discovered 46 years ago. A North Vaughn Field was recognized ten years later.

Texaco Exploration has employed directional drilling to bring the No. 20 A. R. Kincaid Trust on line in Crockett County's Northeast Ozona Field.

Location is about three miles south of Ozona Texaco drilled to a 6,610-ft. bottom and perforated Canyon Sand pay. Production ranges from 6,244 to 6,417 feet into the wellbore. When gauged on a 1.375-in. choke, the well yielded 899,000 CF gas per day. It

registered 893 PSI shut-in wellhead pressure. An Oklahoma City operator has completed two gas wells southwest of Ozona. The two Devon Energy Inc. wells are designated as the No. 11 Couch "29" and No.

The No. 11 flowed 172,000-CF gas per day on a 1-in. choke. It earned a 1,177,000-CFD rating on absolute open flow. The No. 16 flowed 226,000 CFD on the same sized choke and was evaluated at 3,550,000 CFD on open flow

Devon bottomed both wells at 7,100 feet. Overall, production ranges from 6,307 to 6,950 feet in the Canyon Sand.

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






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
