



### Mammography Clinic here May 9

The Texas Tech Mobile Mammography Clinic will be at the Ozona United Methodist Church on Wednesday, May 9. Screening mammograms cost \$75.00. Medicare covers one mammogram per year. To schedule your appointment, call 800-222-8388.

Most women who get breast cancer have no family history of the disease or other risk factors. Breast cancer can occur at any age, but it becomes more common as a woman gets older. Although some women are at slightly higher risk - women whose mothers or sisters had breast cancer, women who have never had children and women who had their first child after age 30.

The earlier breast cancer is detected, the easier it is to treat. The American Cancer Society recommends the following guidelines for early detection: Age 20-39 - do a breast self-exam each month and have a clinical breast exam by a health care professional every three years. Age 40 and over - have a mammogram every year, have a clinical breast exam by a health care professional every year and do a breast self-exam each month.

Screening recommendations are for women who have no symptoms of breast cancer. Women identified as being at high risk for breast cancer should ask their physician for specific guidelines. Some doctors begin yearly mammograms 10 years prior to the age of diagnosis of your mother or sister. For instance, if your mother was diagnosed with breast cancer at age 46, the doctor may order yearly mammograms for you at age 36.



The Battle of San Jacinto was the last battle to be fought in the Texan war of independence from Mexico. It was fought April 21, 1836, near present-day Houston. The attack came after the forces of Mexican general Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna massacred the garrison of the Alamo.

With 800 men shouting "Remem-

in chief General Sam Houston made a surprise attack on the Mexican army near the mouth of the San Jacinto River. Although outnumbered, the battle lasted less than 20 minutes with Houston's army defeating the Mexican force of about 1300 men. Nearly all of the Mexican army were either killed or captured. Santa Anna was taken prisoner and signed a treaty that granted Texans their independence and ended the war.

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# Resurrection Results

There is a sense in which Christianity is a two-stage affair. There is emphasis upon the spiritual. Jesus puts it this way. "You must be born again" (John 3:7). New birth is spiritual. The Holy Spirit in the human heart is a down payment on good things to come. God "gave us the Spirit in our hearts as a pledge" (2 Corinthians 1:22). This is stage one.

There is a second stage. "We ourselves, having the first fruits of the Spirit, even we ourselves groan within ourselves, waiting eagerly for our adoption as sons, the redemption of our body" (Romans 8:23). We speak of our need for redeemed souls. The Bible also speaks of redeemed

Beyond doubt, we need souls fit for heaven so that we can "depart and be with Christ" (Philippians 1:23). We want to join "the spirits of the righteous made perfect" (Hebrews 12:23). 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### Internet safety: How many children will be harmed before parents get involved?

Dallas - April 11, 2001 -- Every day, pedophiles enter homes and befriend children. Using aliases, these sexual predators spend months gaining children's confidence through their online communications. Children begin to believe and trust these cyber friends and stop distinguishing between real friends at school and cyber friends online. Children then give out personal information or are subject to abuse and exploitation, often unknowingly.

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




