Of course, if there was a fast
accurate test, you can bet the numbers of CID cases would skyrocket and that would not be good for those in the Center of Disease Control who spend
most of their CID efforts defend most of their CJD efforts defending
the false premise that CJD occurs only the false premise that CID occurs only
in one person per million population. If you think this problem is only affecting a smali number of people,
think about the possibility of blood products being infected to include vaccines made from bovine sources
and all the organ donations we are tryand all the organ donations we are try-
ing to encourage, not to mention the possible infection from surgical instruments and dental procedures. The possibility for disaster is endless, and
once the genie is out of the bottle there is no going back.
