School board elects officers

In their regular monthly meeting that was held on Tuesday, May 15, members of the Ozona School Board approved the 2001-02 Crockett County Consolidated Common School District School Calendar as recommended by the school district's district-level site-based decision making committee.

The new school calendar will have students beginning school on Wednesday, August 15, and this is one day later than last year. Teacher staff development days will begin on Wednesday, August 8, and continue through Tuesday, August 14. Other important dates are: Thanksgiving holidays (November 21-23); Christmas holidays (December 24 - January 2); Spring Break (March 11-15); Easter holidays (March 29 - April 1); and, the end of the 2001-02 school year and graduation on May 24.

During the meeting Ozona Intermediate School and Ozona Middle School student participants in the Region XV Education Service Center Technology Showcase that was recently held on May 8 in San Angelo gave the trustees a demonstration of their presentation that was made at the Technology Showcase. In a related school technology item, Rod Miller, district technology coordinator, told the board that the district had been awarded \$100,000.00 to purchase technology and for staff development under the TIF Round 9 Grant.

Following approval of the Crockett County CCSD Trustee Single Member District Plan based on the Year 2000 Census data, Cynthia Hokit, school business manager and certified notary, administered the Oath of Office to recently elected trustees Tom Anderson, Jack Baggett, and Kenny Wadsworth and to re-elected trustee Elliott Barrera. After the Oath of Office had been administered, Superintendent of Schools Larry Taylor presented retiring board member Wade Richardson and Marcus Sims with a plaque in honor of their nine years of service to the school district. Following this presentation, the trustees elected 2001-02 school year officers. Elliott Barrera was elected board president, Laurie Hale was elected board vice-president, and Veronica Tjerina was elected board secretary.

Two teacher requests for transfers were approved by the board as well as two new teaching personnel for next year. The trustees approved the transfer of Jennifer Knapp, music teacher at Ozona Primary School, to eighth grade science teacher at Ozona Middle School; the transfer of Sally Oglesby, second grade teacher at Ozona Primary School, to seventh grade reading teacher at Ozona Middle School; the employment of Justina Bahlman as music teacher at Ozona Primary School for the 2001-02 school year; and, the employment of Gretchen Bloebaum as middle school band director at Ozona Middle School for the 2001-02 school year.

Mrs. Knapp will take the place of Mr. Charles White, who is the new principal of Ozona Middle School, and Mrs. Oglesby will take the place of Mrs. Nancy Floyd, who is retiring at the end of this year. Mrs. Bahlman, presently teaching music at Wall ISD, is the wife of recently hired Ozona High School Band Director Sonny Bahlman. She will take Mrs. Knapp's music position, and Ms. Bloebaum will take the place of Ozona Middle School Band Director Skip Carroll who recently resigned to take a similar position at Sundown ISD.

During the meeting the board approved: the taking of bids for gasoline products for the 2001-02 school year to be approved in the June regular board meeting; the taking of quotations for band instruments to be purchased during the 2001-02 school year to be approved in the June regular board meeting; the taking of bids for athletic supplies for the 2001-02 school year to be approved in the June regular board meeting; the taking of bids for cafeteria products for the 2001-02 school year to be approved in the July regular board meeting; and, the taking of bids for employee health insurance for the 2001-02 school year to be approved in the August regular board meeting.

Also during the meeting the trustees went into Executive Session to conduct a Level III hearing on student discipline regarding violations of due process and procedural rights and complaints against district employees at Ozona High School. Emerging out of Executive Session, the board voted to deny the parents' Level III grievance on student discipline and violations of due process and procedural rights, and to deny the parents' Level III grievance against district employees at Ozona High School.

Prior to adjournment Superintendent Larry Taylor presented a report on school-related activities that will be taking place during the remaining days of school, and the board voted to set the date and time for its June regular meeting on June 19 at 7:00 p.m.

Friends of the Library establish endowment fund with Permian Basin Area Foundation

May 23, 2001 - MIDLAND, Texas - The Friends of the Crockett County Public Library have established an endowment fund with the Permian Basin Area Foundation. The permanent fund of the Foundation will serve to provide resources for the operation and maintenance of the Crockett County Public Library, which is located in Ozona.

"We are delighted to have this opportunity to partner with the Friends of the Crockett County Public Library as they seek to build a solid future for this important community resource," said Jack Swallow, President and Chief Executive Officer of the Permian Basin Area Foundation, which administers approximately 20 agency endowments on behalf of nonprofit organizations throughout the region.

According to Friends President Charlotte Harrell, "This new way to support our library is a permanent endowment fund under the umbrella of the Permian Basin Area Foundation. The Friends of the Library established this fund with an initial \$5,000 contribution in hopes that it will attract other contributions and grow much larger over time. Memorial gifts may be designated for the endowment fund. All contributions are permanent and ongoing, and only the income from the fund will be used as an important source of funding to supplement the library budget."

The Crockett County Public Library is located at the corner of 12th and Avenue G, a few blocks from downtown Ozona. Built in 1928, it was originally the home of the pioneer family of Paul and Lizzie Perner. In 1984 their children donated the residence and surrounding property to Crockett County to house the public library. When it became apparent that more space was needed for services and collections, expansion plans were developed by San Angelo architect Henry Schmidt. Mr. Schmidt's plans maintained the Spanish style architecture and the warm, spacious character of the original Perner home, while providing for new accommodations for people with disabilities. With community support as well as grants from the Texas State Library and several foundations, including the Permian Basin Area Foundation, the project was completed in 1999.

The Friends of the Crockett County Public Library was organized in 1985 to support the library through volunteers for projects and with funding for special equipment not provided by a limited county operating budget. The Friends strives to work for the advancement of education, the development of youth, and for community improvement through library service. To this end, the present Board of the Friends has worked with the Permian Basin Area Foundation to establish a

permanent endowment fund that will continue to support the library for years to come. The Friends' executive officers for 2001 are Charlotte Harrell, president, Lucy Humphrey, vice president, Louise Taliaferro, secretary, and

Chamber plans "Onward Ozona" town session on Tuesday, June 5

In September 2000, Ozona Chamber of Commerce and the Texas Agriculture Extension Service began a process of assessing the strengths, weaknesses, problems, challenges, resources and opportunities for Ozona. The chamber brought in the Texas Rural Development Council Rural Resource Team to conduct town meetings where the people of Ozona were given the opportunity to discuss what they felt were the strengths and weaknesses of the community. For the purpose of assessment, the community was divided into segments such as business, agriculture, civic groups, churches, education, seniors and youth.

The chamber recently mailed to all participants of the town meetings a Rural Resource Team Report. This report contains a summary and recommendations made by the five original

team members who had an opportunity to evaluate Ozona as an outsider as well as hear what citizens of the community had to share about their town. The comments in this report come directly from the citizens of Ozona who participated.

"The chamber is now ready to bring town citizens back together for a strategic planning session," said Shanon Biggerstaff, Chamber Executive Director. "Our theme this year is Onward Ozona. We will now move on, take the results of this report and determine our priorities, our goals, find the resources to accomplish our goals, assign responsibilities and outline a time frame in which to complete our goals. The time has come for our community to roll up our sleeves and go to work."

The chamber of commerce strategic planning session for Ozona has been scheduled for Tuesday, June 5, from 3:00-9:00 p.m. at the Crockett Room. "Anyone is welcome and invited to attend, regardless of whether you were part of the September meetings," said Biggerstaff. "If you live in Ozona, this meeting is about planning for Ozona's future and you should plan to attend. If you cannot attend the entire meeting and have an evening conflict, attend the afternoon session or vice versa. We will meet from 3:00-6:15 p.m. There will be a break from 6:15-7:00 p.m., and we resume our meeting until 9:00 p.m. The chamber will provide a light meal at 6:15 p.m. The meeting will be structured so that input will be valuable at any given time. Joe McFarland of the original resource team will act as our facilitator."

Joseph Knaack receives Sousa Award

plaques in appreciation of their work here. Making the presentation was Band Booster president Wilda Ramos. Mr. Glaze retires from Ozona High School with 53 first divisions, 15 sweepstakes, having advanced to area 14 times, and two trips to state.

In turn, Mrs. Ramos was presented a gift of appreciation from the directors.

Principal Donnie Wiley acted on behalf of the entire school system staff when he called Pat and Kelly Glaze forward to accept a retirement present, a money flute.

Master of ceremonies for the evening, Ty Payne, introduced seniors Tammy Alvarez, Tim Batura, Beatriz Dominguez, Rebecca Flores, Joseph Knaack, Jeffery Mendez, Ray Ramos and Josh Tambunga who also presented gifts to the directors.

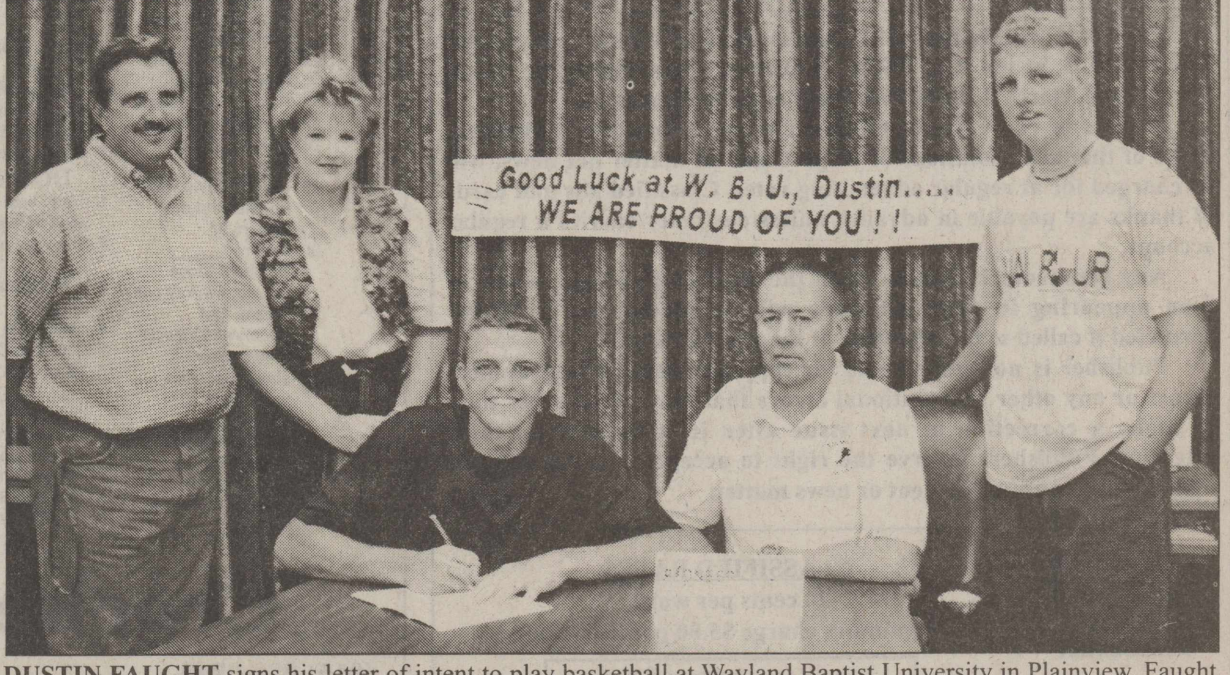

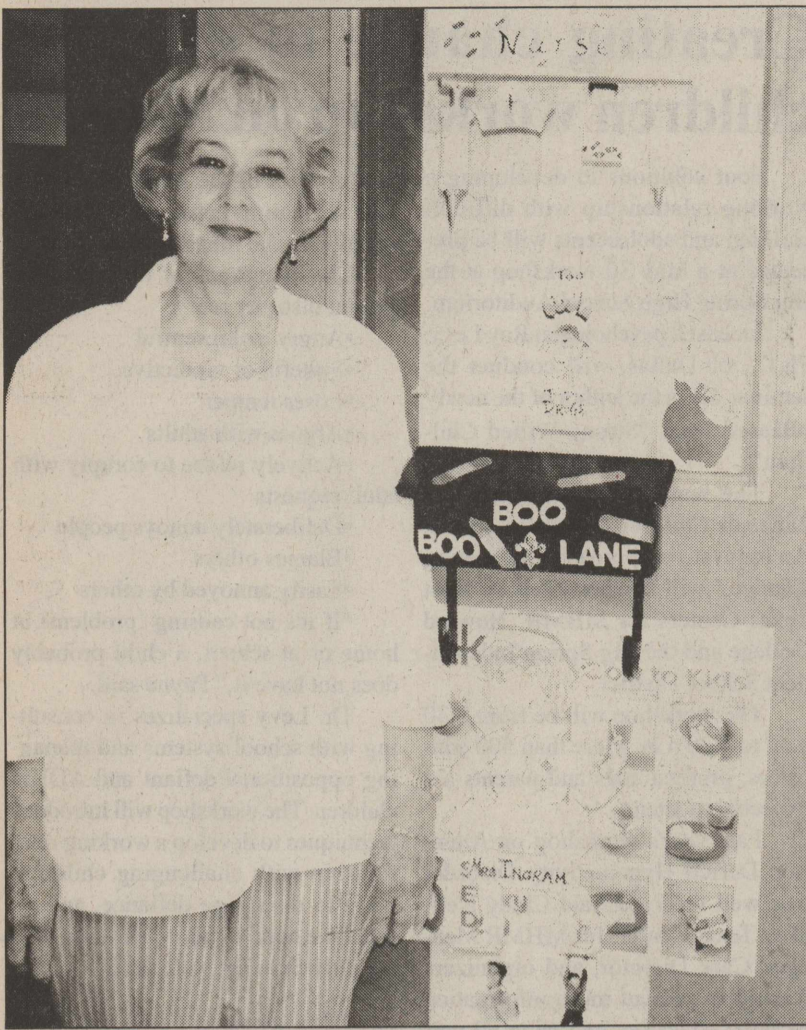

"I love the kids. I'll miss the kids," said Nurse Lu of her retirement this month. She is only the third school nurse Ozona has had.

The retirement had been planned long before the automobile accident which broke her back early this year. "They said I could stay as long as I wanted," she said, referring to the school administration. As it is, retirement and getting rid of her back brace will just about coincide.

Nurse Lu and her husband, Huey Ingram, are looking forward to traveling and seeing their grandchildren play ball. Donnie and his family live in Richardson, and Drew and his family are in Midland.

"I need to be home to cook heart

healthy meals for Huey," she said, "because I want him around a long time." Huey had heart surgery this year, and he is doing well.

The Ingrams are originally from Louisiana and came to Ozona via San Angelo where he was employed with West Texas Utilities. They moved to Ozona in 1955 with the company and have continued to make this their home.

Nurse Lu worked at the hospital 13 years, having received her nursing degree in 1951 in Shreveport, LA. She then worked 12 1/2 years in doctors' offices before accepting the school nurse job.

In 1999, she received the Award for Excellence in Texas School Health - Programs and Instruction from the Texas Department of Health for her book, "Let's Get Personal," about personal hygiene.

"I've loved my work and the people I've worked with," she said. "I've been told 'success is getting what you want. Happiness is being satisfied with what you get.' In that realm, I've been successful. I've had what I wanted and enjoyed my work."

If you think this problem is only affecting a small number of people, think about the possibility of blood products being infected to include vaccines made from bovine sources and all the organ donations we are trying to encourage, not to mention the possible infection from surgical instruments and dental procedures. The possibility for disaster is endless, and once the genie is out of the bottle there is no going back.

Mr. and Mrs. Floyd retire from Ozona school system

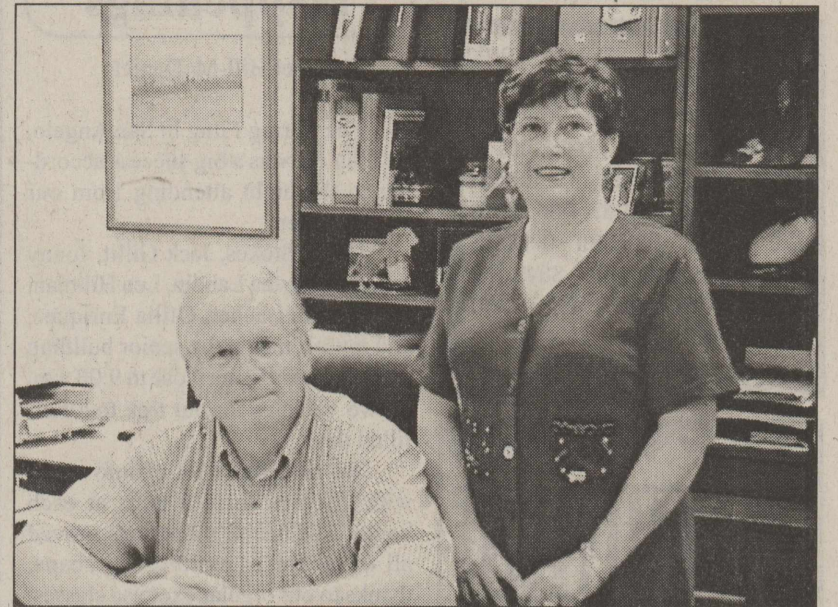

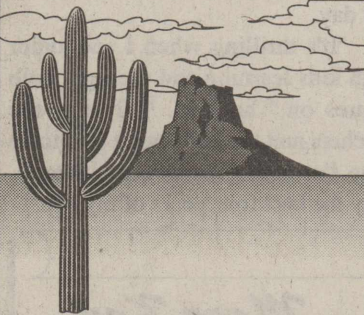

Creating change in difficult children workshop on May 30

Four solutions to developing a working relationship with difficult children and adolescents will be presented at a May 30 workshop at the Big Spring High School Auditorium.

Licensed psychologist Ray Levy, Ph.D., of Dallas, will conduct the seminar. He is the author of the newly released book "Strong-Willed Children".

The workshop "Explosive and Difficult Children and Adolescents: An Innovative Approach for Creating Change," will be sponsored by West Texas Centers for MHMR, Howard College and the Big Spring Independent School District.

The workshop will be from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. More than 500 educators, professionals and parents are expected to attend.

Last year's workshop on Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder was well received, said Cindy Neff, West Texas Centers for MHMR Managed Care Director, and organizers wanted to present more information to assist educators on facing all personality types in the classroom.

"When you go through the education curriculum to learn how to teach school, they don't emphasize how to appropriately deal with behavior problems. This workshop will offer some additional professional guidance to deal with children who are behavior problems in the classroom."

Children who are identified as oppositional/defiant exhibit some of the many traits of children progressing through adolescence, said Janet Payne, West Texas Centers for MHMR Mental Health Essential Services Director. But the two mustn't be confused.

Children living with the disorder

exhibit most of the symptoms for at least six months before they are diagnosed with the illness, she said.

The symptoms of oppositional/defiant disorder are:

- Angry and resentful
- Spiteful or vindictive
- Loses temper
- Argues with adults
- Actively refuse to comply with adult requests
- Deliberately annoys people
- Blames others
- Easily annoyed by others

"If it's not causing problems at home or at school, a child probably does not have it," Payne said.

Dr. Levy specializes in consulting with school systems and managing oppositional/defiant and ADHD children. The workshop will introduce techniques to develop a working relationship with challenging children, ways to disengage defiance, and alternative approaches to children who are misbehaving, Neff said.

"He's going to give a lot of behavioral suggestions," Payne said. "I think he's going to give us any behavioral strategies emphasizing consistency."

Participants will earn seven hours of Professional Development/Continuing Education credits. The cost is \$10.00, and will include materials, refreshments and a donation to a "Children in Need" fund for children and adolescents in the 23-county West Texas Centers for MHMR service area.

Registration forms can be obtained from West Texas Centers for MHMR.

Tx. Dept. of Human Services annual report

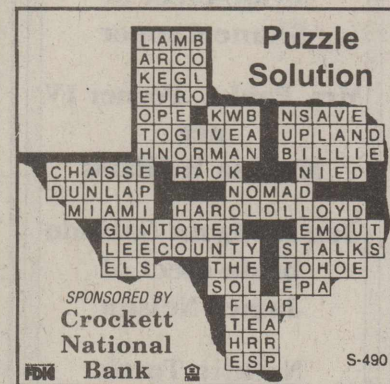
The state spent a total of \$1,011,491.00 last year for major welfare programs in Crockett County, according to Barbara Evans, Regional Administrator for the Texas Department of Human Services.

Food stamps that were worth \$210,434.00 were issued for the fiscal

year which ended August 31, while Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) totaled \$46,408.00. Food stamps are funded entirely by the federal government, while the department determines eligibility of potential clients and non-clients and issues the Lone Star Card.

The state and federal governments share in the cost of TANF to families where needy children are deprived of support because of the absence or disability of one or both parents.

Nursing home costs of approximately \$490,936.00 were paid for aged and disabled residents. Community Care for Aged and Disabled spent \$188,390.00 for Medicaid related services and \$75,323.00 for non-Medicaid related services," Ms. Evans said.

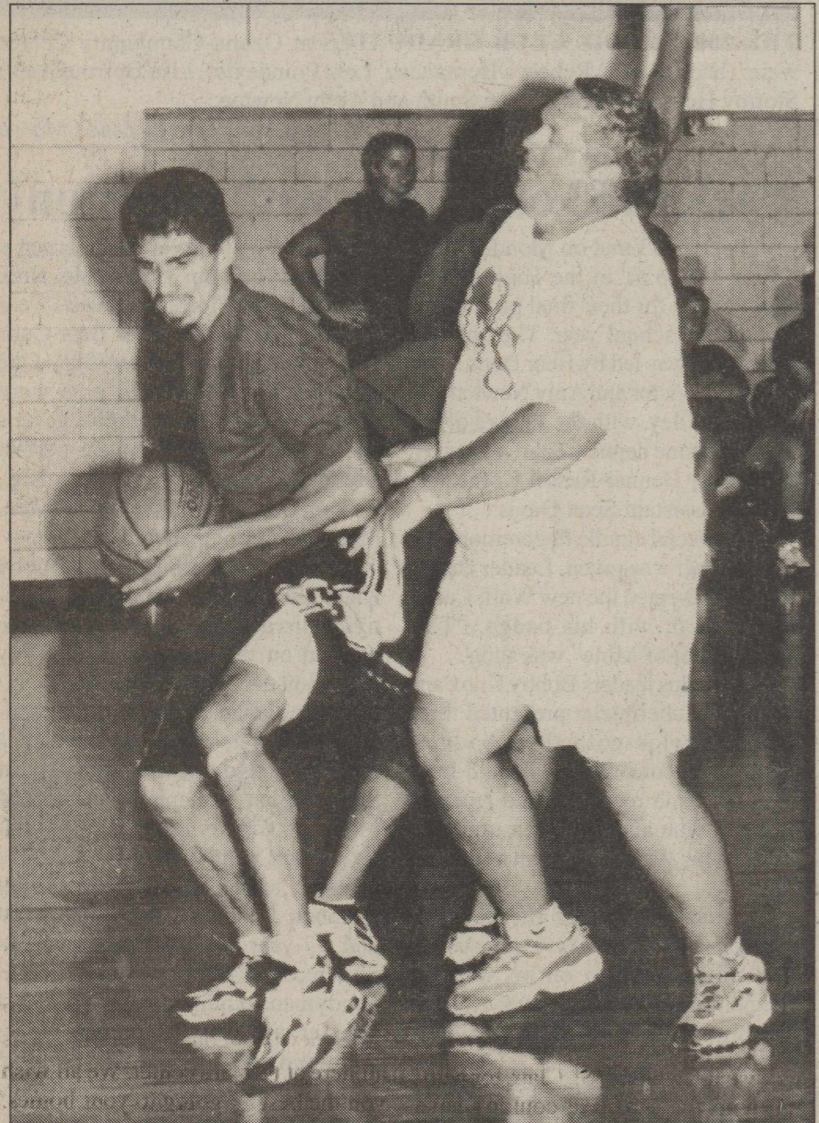

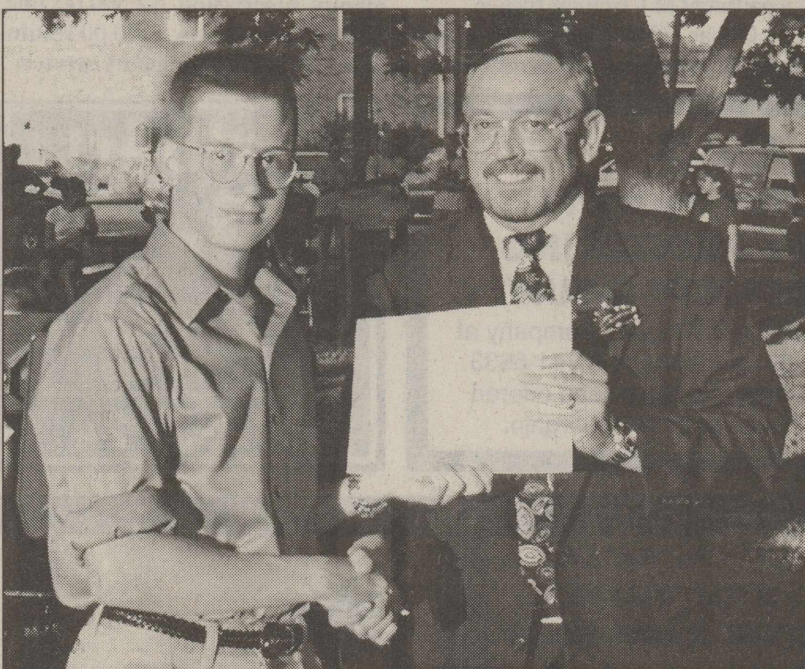

Texas Water Board approves Regional Water Plan for Region F

AUSTIN (May 16, 2001) — The Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) today formally approved the adopted regional water plan of the Region B Regional Water Planning Group (RWPG). The plan was one of five regional water plans to receive formal TWDB approval today. Plans from sixteen RWPGs were submitted to the TWDB in January 2001, as part of the states long-range, bottom-up water supply planning process created under Senate Bill 1.

Mr. William B. Madden, Chairman of the TWDB, presented a Board resolution formally approving the Region F plan. Accepting the resolution was Mr. John Grant, Chair of Region F and General Manager of the Colorado River Municipal Water District. Region F includes the 32 West Texas counties of Borden, Scurry, Howard, Mitchell, Andrews, Martin, Loving, Winkler, Ector, Midland, Glasscock, Sterling, Coke, Runnels, Coleman, Brown, Reeves, Ward, Crane, Lipton, Reagan, Irion, Tom Green, Concho, McCulloch, Pecos, Crockett, Schleicher, Sutton, Menard, Kimbel, and Mason.

"We are especially happy and proud to formally approve the regional water plan for Region F," said Chairman Madden. "This plan embodies months of hard work and cooperation among West Texans who are dedicated to providing sufficient supplies of quality water to the residents of the Region F area."

The sixteen RWPGs were responsible for assessing the needs for water in their regions during drought-of-record conditions, based on population projections through the year 2050. Each of the plans contains strategies for water conservation, management, and mitigation in order to meet the projected needs. The plans also considered environmental impacts of the suggested strategies, specifically those strategies impacting flows to bays and estuaries, and instream flows.

Regional water planning statute and rules provide that the TWDB formally approve the adopted regional water plans. In order to be formally approved, the plans must be developed according to regional and state planning rules, and be free from interregional conflicts. Seven of the sixteen regional plans have now been formally approved by the Board. The TWDB anticipates that the formal approval process will be completed by June 2001. The TWDB will then submit a comprehensive State Water Plan to the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, and appropriate Legislative committees by January 5, 2002.
