

As the daughter of a victim of Creutzfeldt-Jakob Disease, who died undiagnosed after seven months of horrible progressive symptoms, I am outraged that people are not getting enough warning about the POTEN-TIAL disaster of Creutzfeldt-Jacob Disease, or CJD, (the human form of BSE or Mad Cow disease) in the United States

My mom died in 1996 and since then I have tried to learn all about CJD that I can and have been in contact with many families who are going through that hell of not knowing what is destroying their loved one before their eyes. Instead of the professionals working together to develop a fast and accurate test for CJD, the establishment CJD gurus (they call themselves "the club") seem to be slowing progress. Many of them seem to view CJD as an interesting puzzle and intellectual exercise, nothing more.

Of course, if there was a fast and accurate test, you can bet the numbers of CJD cases would skyrocket and that would not be good for those in the Center of Disease Control who spend most of their CJD efforts defending the false premise that CJD occurs only in one person per million population.

If you think this problem is only affecting a small number of people, think about the possibility of blood products being infected to include vaccines made from bovine sources and all the organ donations we are trying to encourage, not to mention the possible infection from surgical instruments and dental procedures. The possibility for disaster is endless, and once the genie is out of the bottle there



Mr. and Mrs. Floyd retire from Ozona school system


