County gets enhanced 9-1-1

Special guests Shirley Kirby, Marolyn Bean, Patsy White, Sandy Bebee, Vada Pridemore and Dorothy Montgomery were able to see the fruits of their labors last week at a training session for 9-1-1 dispatchers. Willa Perry, who was Ozona Women's Forum co-chairman with Shirley Kirby when the project began, was unable to attend.

It started in 1997 when the ladies of the Ozona Women's Forum adopted a project to bring 9-1-1 to Crockett County. The end product of this undertaking became complete last week with the installation of "Enhanced 9-1-1" and the completion of Crockett County's addressing project.

Crockett County was the last county in the state to be addressed for 9-1-1, but through the efforts of R. B. Babbitt, Crockett County addressing coordinator, and Chris Rives, Concho Valley Council of Governments database coordinator, the project was completed in less than a year and now goes into a maintenance mode. Rives noted, "We may have been the last county to start addressing, but we were not the last to finish; across the state there are still counties that are not through even though they started well before we did."

Delaine Foley, customer service advisor with Verizon, was here May 22 from Lubbock to train dispatchers

in the proper use of the new system. Emilio Tambunga, Petra Hernandez, Pablo Talamantez, David Martinez, Michael Bullard, Luther Walker and R. B. Babbitt were in attendance for the training.

You may wonder "Why enhanced and how does it work for me?" The 9-1-1 system is a public emergency reporting system used throughout North America. The system routes all 9-1-1 calls to one or more public safety answering points, which are called PSAPs. Through a cooperative agreement with Sheriff Shane Fenton, the Crockett County PSAP is located at the Sheriff's Office.

Being a dispatcher is just one of the daily responsibilities that is handled by the officers employed at the Sheriff's Office. When a call reaches the PSAP, the caller must be able to provide the dispatcher with certain critical information so that the appropriate emergency service can be promptly dispatched. At a minimum, the caller must be able to provide the address and nature of the emergency. In an emergency situation, however, the caller may not be able to supply this information. The enhanced 9-1-1 system reduces this risk by automatically providing and displaying the caller's phone number, and through a data base that is maintained by Babbitt, the caller's location.

Annetta Glass, program specialist with CVCOG, explained that

through a program called Language Line, the dispatcher is able to put non-English speaking callers at ease with the aid of a translator who can assist with obtaining vital information in an emergency. Language Line interpreters more than 140 languages.

Not only does the dispatcher have one button access with Language Line but also with Poison Control and with the PSAPs in neighboring counties.

In the event of a disaster, system overload or equipment failure, the newly installed tandem routing will also allow the system to route the calls to an alternate answering location so that the citizens will have uninterrupted 9-1-1 service.

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Carson ready for national competition

"I like speaking in front of people; it doesn't really bother me," said Amanda Carson, Ozona's entry in the Health Occupation Students of America national contest June 13 in Atlanta, GA. Amanda is one of 111 competitors in the research persuasive speaking division. She will be pitted against the top three contestants from 37 states, submitting a paper to be judged, making a 5-minute speech on her topic and undergoing a 5-minute question and answer session with the judges.

The Ozona High School junior placed fourth at state in the HOSA competition in Plano with her project *They Swore an Oath*, a speech and paper on fetal tissue research. When the second place contestant was disqualified, Amanda advanced to the national level. Some of the competitors will be students who attend magnet schools where all they study is health science.

"We have an awesome program here," said Amanda, who is in her first year of the health science program. At the same time, she knew competition would be tough at the state contest. "I really didn't expect to get anything in the top five."

Selection of her topic, fetal tissue research, was influenced by the fact that her sister, Julie, is diabetic. At first Amanda planned to take the positive side of the argument. "I thought if a baby is going to be aborted anyway, why couldn't this benefit research?"

After doing more study on the diabetic side of research, Amanda learned that at the 3-month stage, most body organs of fetuses are not developed enough for tissue research.

And, "the use of fetal research seemed to be shattered by the downside of it."

Amanda said she signed up for the health occupations class primarily for the opportunity to compete. In the process, she has had "some really good experiences. You learn things

that you use. I have learned things I never thought I would."

Health occupation class may be relatively new to Amanda, but public speaking is not. She began with UIL contests in junior high and has three years of high school experience in persuasive speaking, poetry interpretation and one act play and one year of cross examination debate with many honors to her credit.

Linda Coates, R.N. and instructor of the health occupations class at

OHS, said this is the first time one of her students has gone to state since the program began five years ago.

"I'm really proud of her. She's a really conscientious student. She did this all on her own," she said of Amanda.

Health occupations class is a very rigorous, demanding program said Mrs. Coates. "It's a good testing area to determine whether or not a student wants to put forth the work to go on in the medical field."

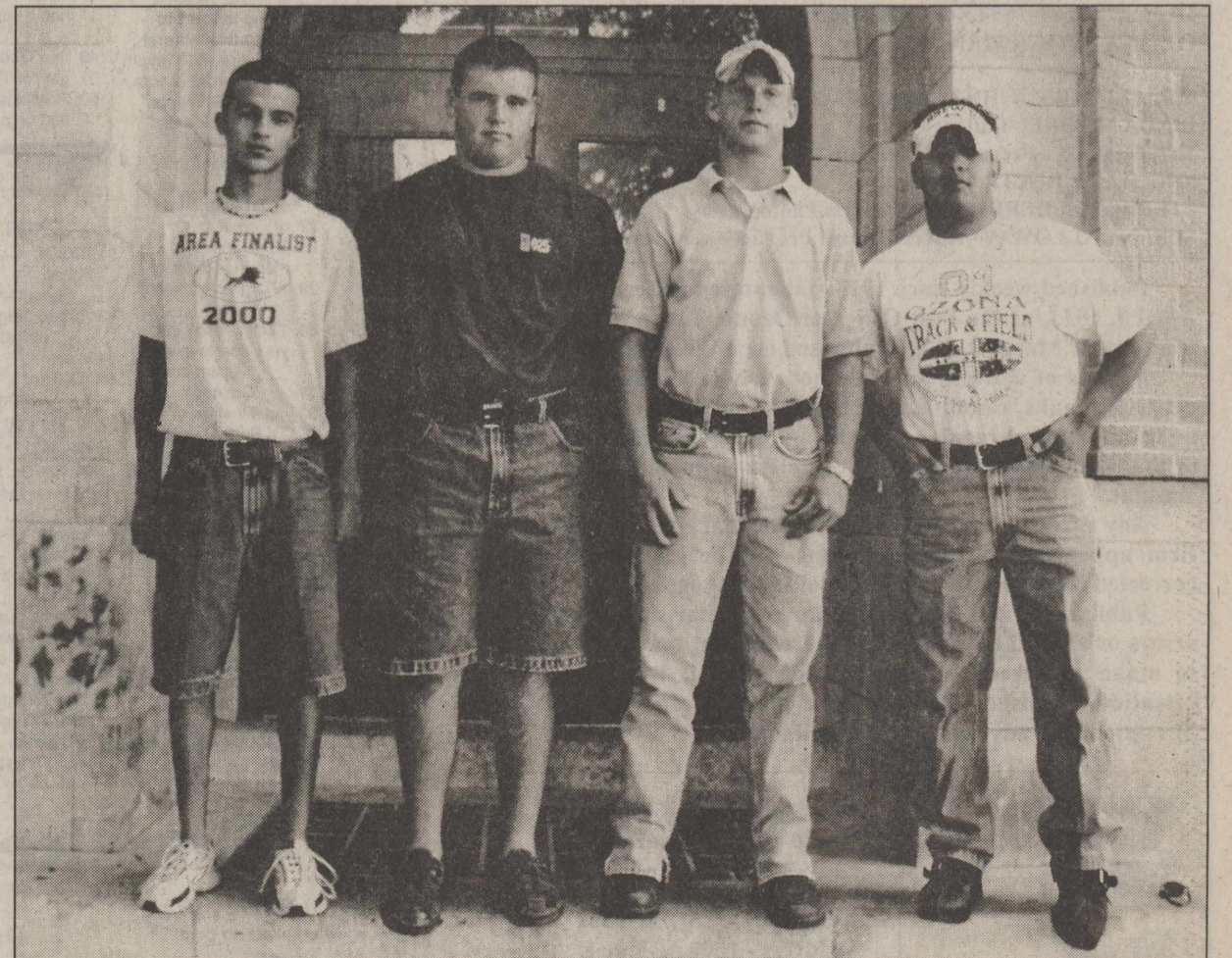
Strategies to grow area tourism goal of June retreat-area businesses invited

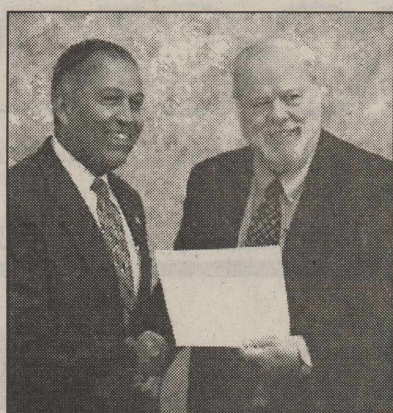
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Rep. Bonilla named champion of private property rights



U.S. Representative Henry Bonilla (R-TX) was honored today for helping protect the private property rights of landowners in the 23rd Congressional district.

The League of Private Property Voters and over 600 sponsor organizations gave Mr. Bonilla a 100 percent rating based on 12 key roll call votes he made in the House of Representatives. Members who voted for private property rights at least 75 percent of the time were recognized as

"Champions of Private Property Rights."

"It's a great honor to be recognized as a champion of private property rights," said Mr. Bonilla. "All too often we see the rights of weeds and bugs placed above the rights of land owners in Texas. I will continue to fight to defend private property owner's constitutional rights. It's the right thing to do."

The Private Property Congressional Vote Index scored the House of Representatives on votes including: land acquisition, mining waste disposal, wetlands permits, rural community revenue, property rights passage and agriculture appropriations.

"Private property rights are one of the most important issues in my district," said Mr. Bonilla. "Although we still have a long way to go, I am happy to say that the private property rights movement in Congress is gaining momentum. I am honored to be a part of that movement."

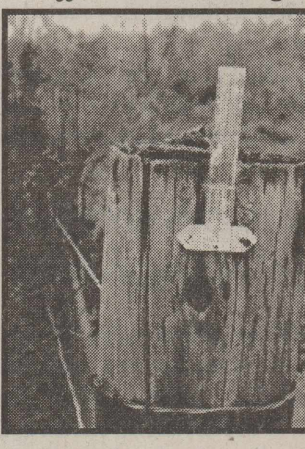

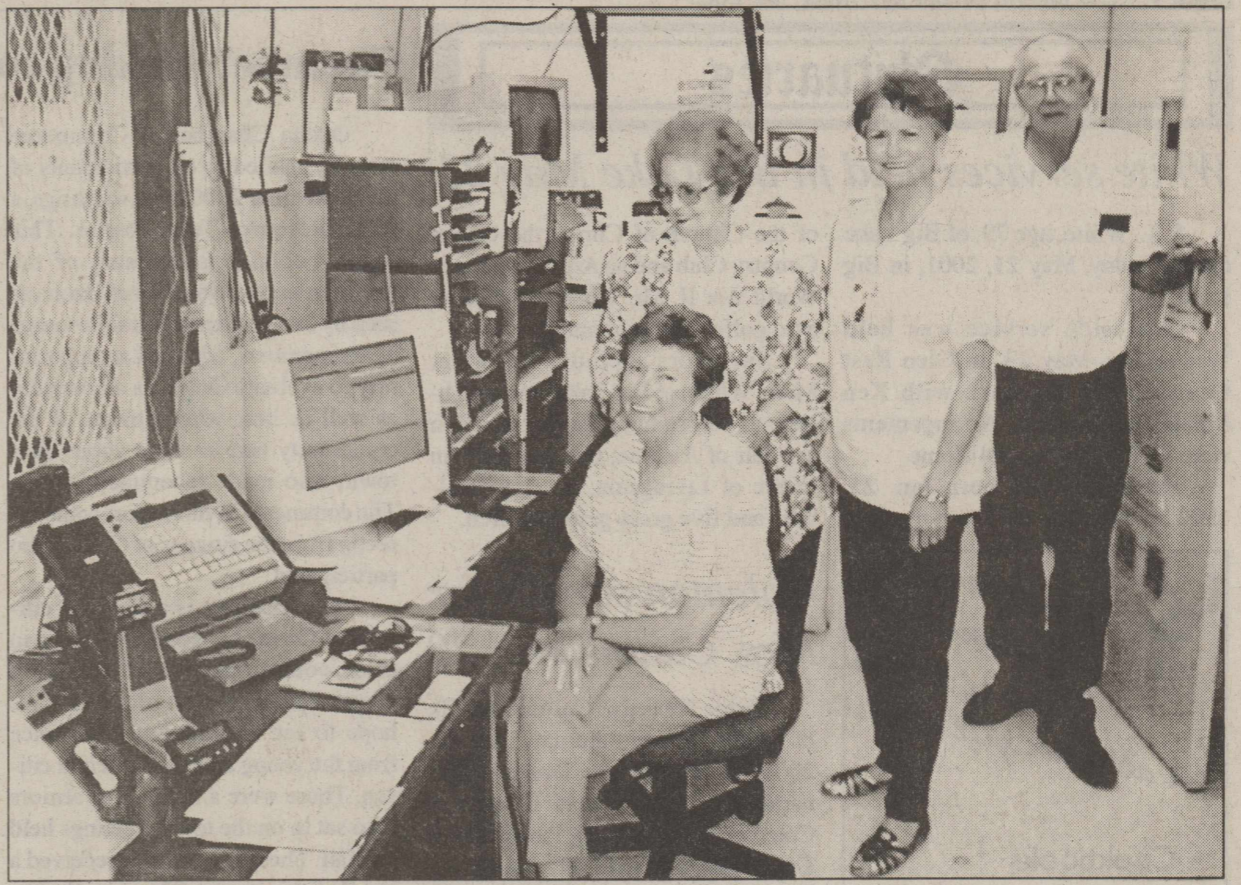

Ozona Chamber of Commerce recently mailed to all participants of the September 2000 town meetings, a Rural Resource Team Report. This report contains a summary of the strengths and weaknesses of Ozona as seen by local citizens. Rural Resource Team members, who had an opportunity to evaluate Ozona as an outsider as well as hear what citizens of the community had to share about their town, also made recommendations. The comments in this report come directly from the citizens of Ozona who participated.

"The chamber is asking the citizens of Ozona to become involved in their community," said Shannon Biggerstaff, executive director. "We hope to see a variety of attendance from the young adult to the senior citizen. There were a number of seniors who sat in on the town meetings held last fall. These seniors also received a copy of this report. They are the future of Ozona, and we want them to know their input counts. I would like to see representation from the local small business owner to the manager of a corporation.

"This meeting is about planning for our community's future. We have assessed our strengths and weaknesses. Now it's time to take that information and determine our priorities

and our goals. We need to talk about the resources available to accomplish our goals. We need to assign responsibility and outline a time frame in which to complete our goals. I believe that most people do not realize that regardless of their occupation, their many experiences throughout their lives enable them to be a wonderful resource. Everyone has something to offer. When you plan, you need a diverse group of people so that we do not leave out any segment of our community. The more input the better."

The chamber of commerce strategic planning session for Ozona has been scheduled for Tuesday, June 5, from 3:00 to 9:00 p.m. at the Crockett Room. If you cannot attend the entire meeting and have an evening conflict, attend the afternoon session or vice versa. "We will meet from 3:00-6:15 p.m.," said Biggerstaff. "There will be a break from 6:15-7:00 p.m., and we will resume our meeting until 9:00 p.m. The chamber will provide a light meal at 6:15 p.m. The meeting will be structured so that input will be valuable at any given time. Joe McFarland of the original Rural Resource Team will act as our facilitator."

Backyard cooks reminded of safety measure for older propane cylinders

An overfilling prevention device (OPD) is now required by the Railroad Commission's new LP-Gas Safety rules for propane cylinders at least 12 years old. The OPD offers protection against filling the cylinder with too much propane.

The OPD is similar to the float in a conventional toilet tank. As a cylinder is refilled and the propane liquid level rises, the floating device also rises. When the propane liquid fills approximately 80 percent of the cylinder's volume, the OPD valve mechanism shuts off the liquid flow into the cylinder. Filling to 80 percent allows room for expansion due to warmer weather.

Since Oct. 1, 1998, all newly manufactured small propane cylinders are equipped with an OPD. There are two ways consumers can tell if their propane bottle has an OPD: The tank may have a special triangular hand wheel with the letters 'OPD' on it, or the tank may have an OPD wrapper or warning label.

Commission rules require that if the cylinder is at least 12 years old, it must be periodically 'requalified' to

ensure that it is safe for continued service. At the time the cylinder is requalified, the Commission now requires the cylinder to have a new OPD valve installed.

Starting April 1, 2002, cylinders without OPDs cannot be refilled. The Railroad Commission of Texas' Alternative Fuels Research and Education Division can provide consumers with basic safety tips, as well as additional propane uses and rebates by calling toll-free, 800-642-5327 or www.rrc.state.tx.us

Created in 1991 by the Texas Legislature, the Alternative Fuels Research and Education Division of the Texas Railroad Commission is charged with researching and educating the public about propane and other environmentally beneficial fuels that can help reduce air pollution in Texas. In addition to researching propane as a clean-air fuel, the division develops marketing, technical training, advertising and information programs to increase public awareness about the fuel. Funding for the division comes from an industry fee paid on each gallon of propane sold in the state.

Chamber of Commerce update

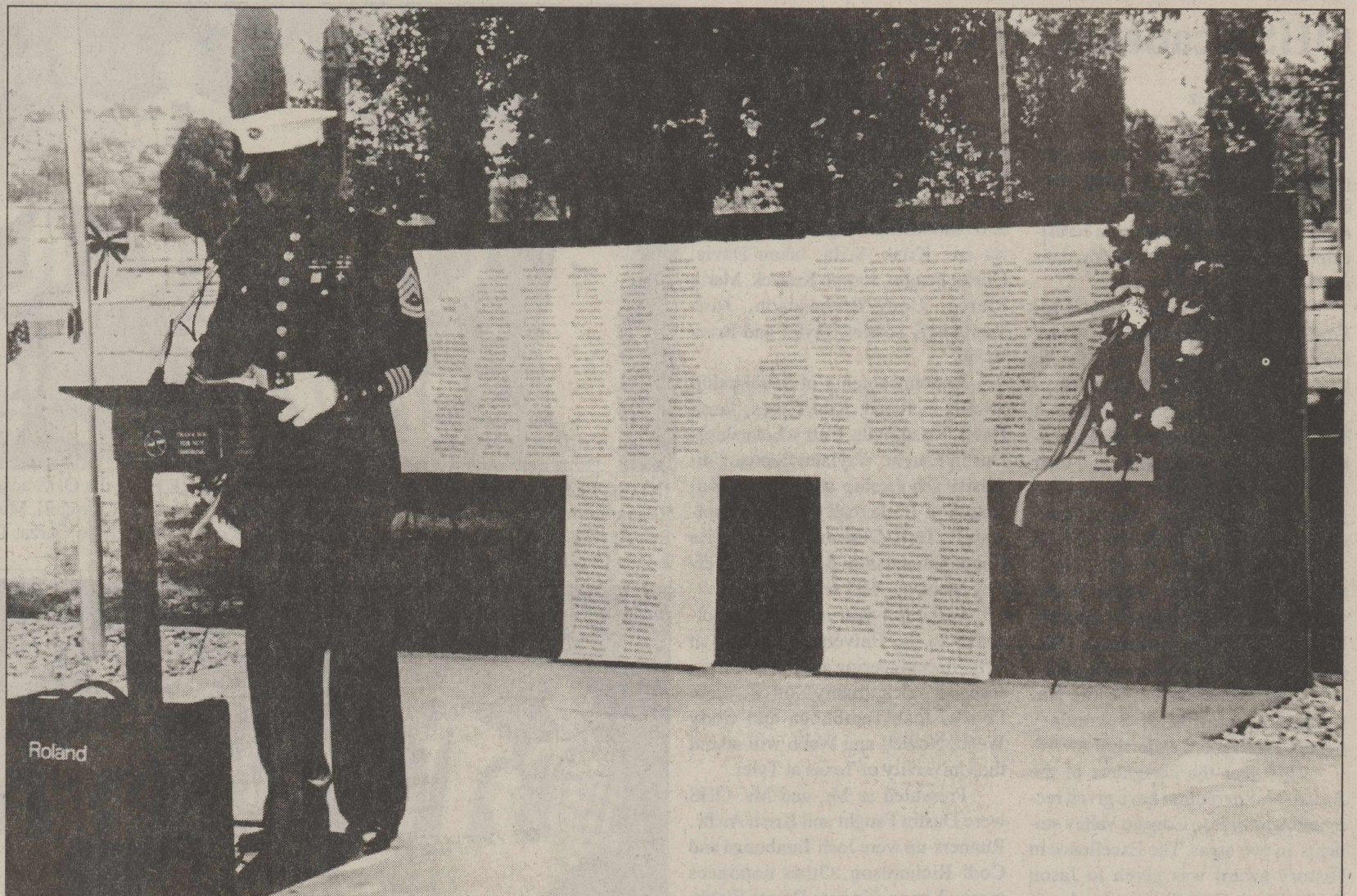
What's happening at the Ozona Chamber of Commerce? It certainly hasn't been dull for executive director Shanon Biggerstaff. "As with any chamber, you are normally working on a number of projects at the same time," she said. "Ozona is no exception. We have some pretty exciting things happening."

Visitors' Center Project: The chamber is working to finalize its nomination to TxDOT for the Statewide Transportation Enhancement Program. TxDOT must receive the nomination by Monday, June 13. The nomination outlines the request and consideration of funds to build a visitors' center. If Ozona is selected, the program will pay for 80% of the project. Property may be eligible to count toward the local 20% funding match. The county and the chamber are working together to finalize steps to secure property for the proposed site. The selection process will continue through the rest of the year. Upon selection, actual construction of the site would not begin until January 2003 with an estimated completion date of September 2004. The visitors' center would house the chamber of commerce offices. This location would be very visible to travelers off Interstate 10 and Highway 163. They would have easy access and available parking. The chamber would have the opportunity to influence travelers into town to take advantage of the many services.

Regional Festival and Event Workshop: The chamber executive recently attended the aforementioned workshop. Workshop topics included creative publicity, volunteer management, decorating your event, making your event unique, risk and crisis management, making changes and emergency planning. "This workshop was a success in that we not only had an opportunity to hear speakers address scheduled topics, we also as a group had an opportunity to select the additional topics that were specific to our individual areas. We discussed location of your event, evaluating your profit margin, be willing to make changes in order to make your event

successful and much more. Most important was the opportunity to network with like communities whose event like the David Crockett Birthday Festival is their one annual fund raising activity."

David Crockett Birthday Festival/Chamber Board Makes a Change: The chamber of commerce is accepting booth applications for the David Crockett Festival. The chamber will move its annual fund raising event to the Crockett County Fair Park. "There are a number of reasons for this change," says Shanon Biggerstaff, executive director. "The main reason for moving is this event is our annual chamber of commerce fund raiser. The change to the park allows us to gate the event and will enable us to maximize our revenue potential. There will be limited entrances and exits to the festival, allowing an organized path for our local organizations providing emergency services. It will allow for crowd control during our dance. There is a large parking lot so that people can arrive, park and walk into the event, separating the driving public from the festivities. Over the weekend Ozona will also host the Lions Club Junior Rodeo and the Jay Miller Memorial Calf Roping. Moving the location allows the general public to enjoy all activities in one venue and allows the chamber to market the weekend as a package. The park also provides beautiful trees and shade for our vendors. Chamber board members and staff met with county personnel to evaluate how our event will function in the park, and the response has been very positive. We realize that it has been a tradition to hold this event in the square. However, there are just so many positives to holding it at the park. This is a chamber of commerce fundraiser, and we have the responsibility to make the necessary adjustments that will allow us maximum success. The reward goes back to the community, and we hope the community will be open to trying something different and support our decision as well as assist us in planning a fun and safe event."

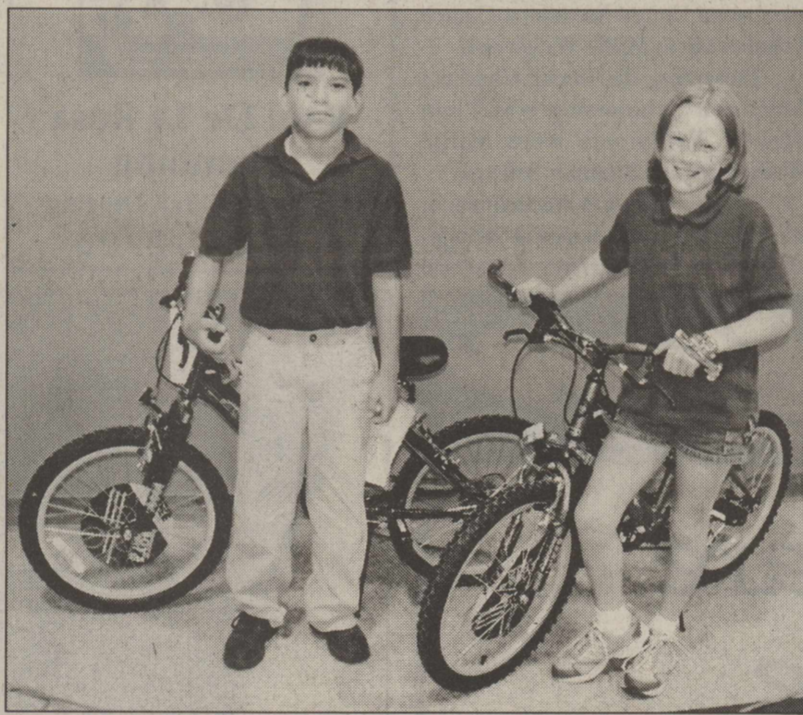

Quick tips on dealing with allergies

More than 35 million Americans suffer from allergies. We sneeze, sniffle, and swell up because of the particles in the air we breathe, and if left untreated, these symptoms can lead to other problems like asthma. Allergy symptoms make us exhausted, but because we're congested we can't sleep unless we're sitting up. In general, we just feel awful. But there are some things we can do to ease our suffering; following are some quick tips from the American Association for Respiratory Care that will help you deal with allergies.

1. During the height of pollen season, try to stay indoors with the air conditioning on as much as possible to reduce exposure to the allergens that bother you.
2. If you must go outside during adverse conditions, try to do so only in the early morning or late evening. During midday pollen and spores are at their highest, so consider wearing a paper mask—especially if you will be doing yard work.
3. Avoid common irritants like smoke, dust, smog, fumes, aerosol

sprays, cold air, and excessive humidity.

4. Keep your resistance to allergens high by eating properly and getting ample rest.
5. Help your doctor find the allergens affecting you by keeping a record of the activities and events that accompany your allergic symptoms.
6. Keep a current list of the medications and doses you are taking for your allergies.
7. Learn how each drug works and be aware of the possible side effects of each one.
8. Do not stop taking or change the dose of a drug without first contacting your doctor.
9. If you miss taking a dose of medication, take it as soon as you realize the mistake and plan to take the next dose at the recommended time interval—do not take a double dose to make up for the omitted one.
10. Check with your doctor before taking an over-the-counter remedy that might interfere with prescription drugs you are taking for your allergies.

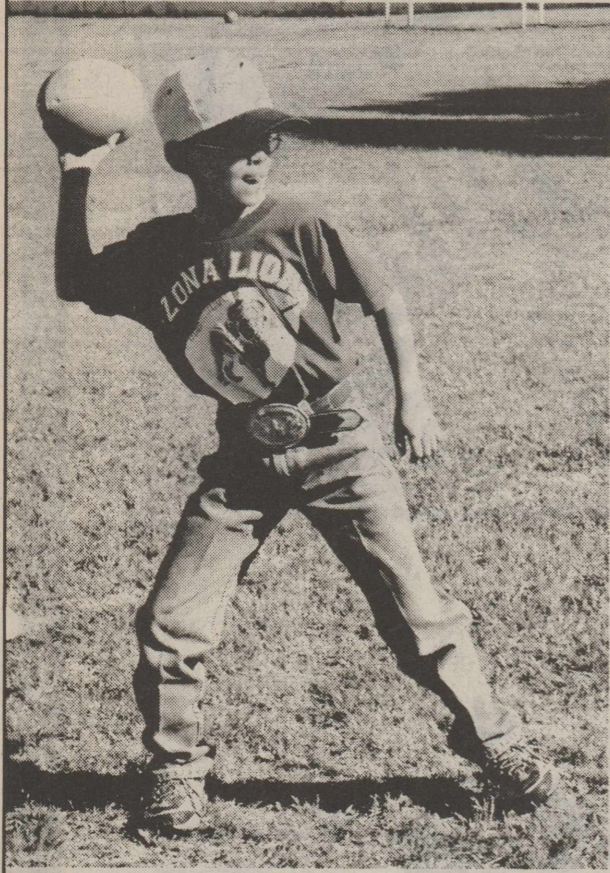

200,000 Texas children enrolled in CHIP *Graduates (continued from front page)

AUSTIN - 7-year-old Zachary Lopez and his 16-year-old sister, Talia, of Austin both suffered severe headaches last summer. For the first time in their lives, their mother, Ida Lopez, didn't hesitate to call a doctor because now that she and her husband enrolled their children in the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in Texas, she can afford the expense.

"The CHIP program has given me great peace of mind," said Ida Lopez, a receptionist at an Austin-based cable manufacturer. "Both my husband and I work, but our employers can't afford to offer health insurance to our children, but for just \$18.00 a month, CHIP covered the cost of my children's doctor's visits - even to the eye doctor. Now they have eye glasses, their headaches are gone, they can see clearly and they are studying hard in school."

Ida Lopez and her family represent one of the thousands of Texas families who have gained "peace of mind" since they enrolled in CHIP. Program officials are extremely pleased with the rate of enrollment and

report that 200,000 Texas children have enrolled since the programs began last May. These numbers mean Texas has outpaced other comparable states in the initial months.

CHIP was launched nine months ago with federal funds and money from the tobacco lawsuit settlement as part of the TexCare Partnership, Texas' umbrella children's health insurance initiative that also includes Medicaid and the Texas Healthy Kids Corporation. CHIP offers low-cost insurance to low-to-moderate income families.

Premiums are \$18.00 a month or less, depending on a family's size and income. For example, a family of four can make up to \$34,000.00 - or more (possibly up to \$38,000.00) if they have child-care or other qualified expenses - and still qualify for CHIP.

CHIP offers a full range of health insurance coverage, including regular checkups, immunizations, prescription drugs, eyeglasses, lab tests, x-rays, hospital visits, dental care and mental health care from a broad choice

of doctors.

"In less than a year, CHIP has made it possible for 200,000 children to visit the doctor when they're sick without their parents worrying about what it's going to cost," said Don Gilbert, Texas Health and Human Service Commissioner. "Still, there are thousands more families in Texas who are eligible to take advantage of this opportunity and may not know it."

Over the next three months, Tex Care Partnership is launching an intensive, statewide advertising campaign and an aggressive campaign to involve more businesses in promoting community awareness about the TexCare Partnership.

"Being over there, playing jackpot or kickball out on a playground, helped me remember a lot of things that I had forgotten about since I was there. It was pretty funny going back to a place where boys and girls didn't have any interest in each other, and I wish I could run around forever and not get tired like they do. I was the only one that ever needed a break!

Faught added, "As children, we all had dreams and goals of what we wanted to be and what we wanted to do in our lives, and tonight is another

step towards accomplishing those dreams and goals."

Jason Davis, valedictorian of the OHS Class of 2001, spoke of the many influences in his life. "I have been truly blessed with the inspiration and guidance in my life from the people in this community," Davis stated. "A person could not ask for better teachers than those in Ozona, Texas. The teachers have fulfilled our hunger for knowledge and have given us confidence and the assurance in ourselves. Their example illustrates that an individual should pursue excellence and strive to do his/her best. They have done their best to keep everyone morally intact, and they have shown compassion and understanding through our struggles, pains and failures."

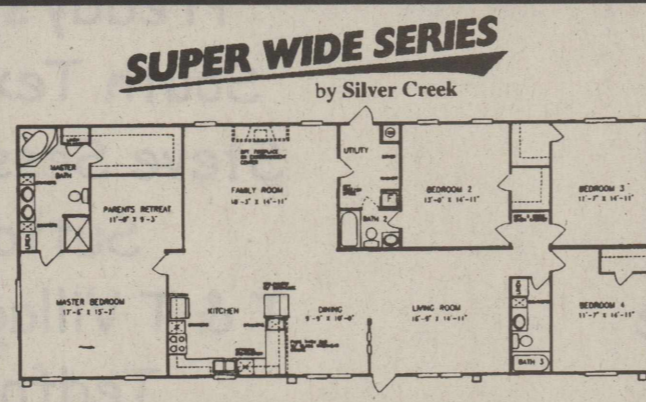

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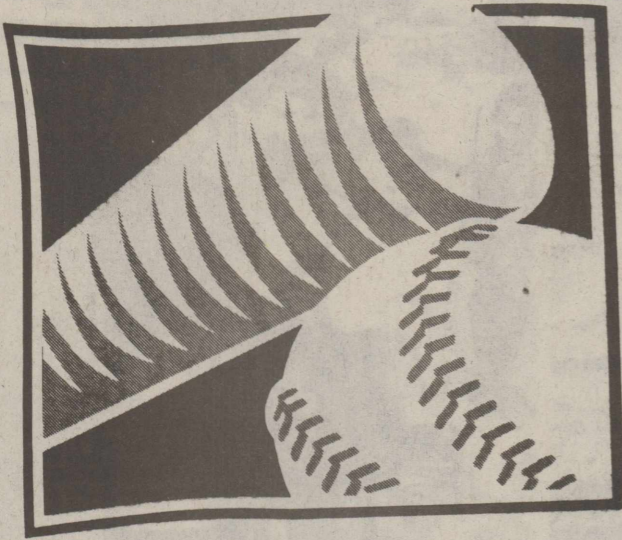


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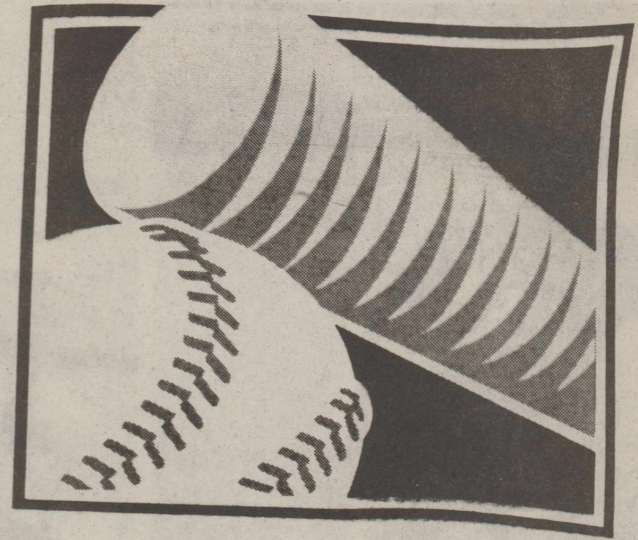

Texas Monthly Oil & Gas Statistics

The Railroad Commission of Texas issued a total of 1,080 original drilling permits in April 2001 compared to 822 in April 2000. Total drilling permits for 2001 year to date is 4,527, up from 3,555 recorded during the same period in 2000. The April total included 841 permits to drill new oil and gas wells, 37 to re-enter existing well bores, and 202 for re-completions. Permits issued in April included 283 oil, 316 gas, 442 oil and gas, 29 injection and 10 other permits.

In April 2001, operators reported 243 oil, 471 gas, 12 injection and five other completions, compared to 241 oil, 315 gas, 26 injection and four other completions during April 2000.

Total well completions for 2001 year to date are 2,886, up from 2,539 recorded during the same period in 2000. Operators reported 398 holes plugged and 115 dry holes in April 2001 compared to 652 plugged and 166 dry holes in April 2000.

Texas preliminary February crude 2001 oil production averaged 1,045,321 barrels daily, down from the 1,133,144 barrels daily average of February 2000. The preliminary Texas crude oil production figure for February 2001 is 29,268,978 barrels, a decrease from 31,419,717 barrels reported during February 2000.

Texas oil and gas wells produced 410,379,863 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas based upon preliminary production figures for February 2001, down from the February 2000 preliminary gas production total of 415,571,842 Mcf. Texas production in
