## Commissioners to auction I-10 property Friday

Commissioners will meet at noon on Friday to conduct a public auction of land to be used for a visitors' center. If the sale goes through, a deed will be executed to turn the property, which is located at the southeast corner intersection of I-10 and Hwy. 163, over to Ozona Chamber of Commerce. Under the terms of the deed, the property will revert to the county if it is not used for a visitors' center within five years.

The chamber will submit a nomination June 18 to the Texas Department of Transportation seeking funding under a statewide transportation enhancement program for the \$888,000.00 project. The land, which was appraised for the chamber at \$356,500.00, will cover the local match of funds if the chamber's proposal is accepted.

Shanon Biggerstaff, executive director of the chamber, told commissioners Monday that there are 300 other communities submitting enhancement nominations seeking a portion of the \$2-\$3 million available. Although the nominations are due June 18, "we won't know until January if we get it," Ms. Biggerstaff said. "Everybody understands that this (the land use) is going to cover the county's part," said Judge Johnny Jones. "If there's a glitch, then it's going to die on the vine."

Midland/Odessa decided to apply for visitor center funding at the last minute, and Menard is also asking for visitor center funding, Ms. Biggerstaff said. Other applications are predominately for streetscapes and historic restoration.

"In talking with TxDOT, we really have a strong project," she said. A TxDOT grant for beautification has already been awarded the community, and work on this will begin in 2002.

Commissioner Frank Tambunga was appointed by the court to hold the auction Friday as the land is in his precinct.

## Care center occupancy at 45

Administrator Benny Gibbs told commissioners that Crockett County Care Center occupancy averaged 43.3 for May but had reached 45 as of Monday. The facility is licensed for 56 beds.

The center continues to remain deficiency free, Gibbs said.

He reported that a 5-member safety committee has been implemented to try to cut workman's comp claims at the center. This group meets quarterly.

Gibbs also reported that the company doing the billing for the facility has given their 30-day notice. The contract will end July 1.

Crockett County EMS answered 29 calls in May with only two of those being non-residents of Crockett County. There were eight transfers to Shannon Medical Center and six to San Angelo Community Hospital. Two runs were cancelled and one patient refused transport.

## Commissioners hire independent auditor

The county has collected almost all currently due taxes commissioners were told Monday during a financial report by John Stokes, auditor. "The tax base is going up a lot," Stokes said. "No matter what you do, taxes are going to go down. You can go up to the eight percent (rollback rate) and still reduce taxes by 20 cents." Stokes said the tax base will be around \$1.2 billion.

Commissioners voted Monday to employ the firm of Eckert, Ingram, Tinkler, Oliphant, Featherston and Barr LLP to perform an independent audit for the county for 2000 and the previous calendar year. The last complete outside audit of county finances was 1998. These audits are usually done every year, but the audit for 1999 was not completed because all necessary data was not available.

A change in software in the treasurer's office in 1998 created accounting problems that are still being worked out. This software was used for seven months before being changed. Still more software has been ordered for the treasurer's and auditor's offices and should help, Stokes said.

"How long is this going to take?" Commissioner Frank Tambunga asked. "We've got two CPAs here and we can't get these audits up to date."

Judge Jones and Stokes are to meet with Oliphant Wednesday regarding the audit.

Burl Myers, county treasurer, answered questions about reports from his office to the Social Security Administration. County employees receiving statements from SSA this year for 1999 have discovered that they were not credited.

Myers explained that the county outgrew the paper transmittal of information to the SSA. "For whatever reason, they cannot read our disk," Myers said. If the new software that is coming doesn't work, "we will generate a paper report," Myers said. SSA has rejected two years of individual information from Crockett County. Employees can request a hard copy of their W-2 form from his office and send it in and get it updated, Myers said.

Judge Jones asked that Myers' office send a memorandum to all county employees to this effect.

Commissioners voted to approve and accept the final plat of Phase 1, Unit 2 of the Texas West Ranch sub-

division. They also voted to accept the Phase 1, Unit 3 preliminary plat from TWR. These were submitted by Renee Howes.

After reviewing a road department list of surplus items to be sold, commissioners voted to approve a sale by sealed bid at their July meeting. Other county departments may also submit lists.

Commissioners voted to waive filing fees for small claims filed regarding EMS charges, approved renewing a contract with local matching funds for the Thunderbird Rural Transportation Program, approved advertising for fuel bids and approved a resolution for depository designation and authorized Judge Jones and Stokes as signators for the Texas Community Development Program Project. They also authorized direct deposit of these funds. This is a Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District project for water and sewage improvement but funds must be administered by the county.

The court approved, on a 3-2 vote, to accept a modification of rules for use of horse stalls at the fairgrounds. The modification, drawn up by Judge Jones, eliminates the charge of a rental fee for the stalls. A charge had been set for adults keeping horses at the fairgrounds. Commissioner Tambunga and Commissioner Rudy Martinez voted against the change. Voting for were Jones, and Commissioners Freddie Nicks and Pleas Childress.

Court members discussed the possibility of adding an automated weather observing system at the airport. TxDOT funding will be available the first quarter of 2002, Judge Jones said. The county's part of the project would be \$21,250.00 with approximately \$3,000.00 a year needed for maintenance. The system would be an asset to the airport and community, said Judge Jones.

Monthly reports were presented by Richard Sanchez for the road and parks department, Benny Gibbs for the care center and health services board, Louise Ledoux for the public library and Shanon Biggerstaff for the chamber of commerce. Sheriff Shane Fenton said his report was not ready at this time. Written reports were received from Helping Hands and the fire department.

## Hearing Thursday for Merced Solis

Merced Solis, who pled guilty to intoxication manslaughter in the death of Sue Burns, will be back in court in Ozona Thursday. A hearing is scheduled on a state's motion to revoke Solis' probation.

Solis had received a sentence of 10 years in the Texas Department of Criminal Justice Institutional Division, a sentence which was suspended for a term of 10 years. In addition, under

terms of his sentence, he was to serve 180 days in the Crockett County Jail and then complete the Substance Abuse Felony Punishment Facility Program as well as other stringent requirements worked out in his plea bargain. He had begun the program at the state jail facility at Breckenridge when he was brought back to Ozona.

Sheriff Shane Fenton said that because Solis is a resident of Mexico

working in Texas with a green card, "this more or less cancels out his plea bargain". Because Solis is not a U.S. citizen, the plea bargain can not be done the way it was, Fenton said.

Solis was the driver of a pickup which struck Mrs. Burns' vehicle just north of Ozona in September of last year. He was driving on the wrong side of the road on the improved shoulder at the time.

#### WHEN WILL YOU GET YOUR REFUND?

WASHINGTON, D.C. -- U.S. Representative Henry Bonilla (R-TX) announced recently when taxpayers will receive their refunds as a result of the tax bill President George W. Bush signed into law.

"You paid too much in taxes. Thanks to President Bush, you'll get a refund. Your refund will go a long way to paying off credit cards, taking a family vacation, or buying school clothes," said Mr. Bonilla.

Rep Bonilla attended a White House ceremony recently where President Bush officially signed the tax relief bill into law. The \$1.35 trillion tax cut package is the largest tax cut Americans have seen in two decades.

"This is one of the greatest accomplishments for the Congress and White House since I began service in the House of Representatives," said Mr. Bonilla. "This is what I call progress! We're giving taxpayers across-the-board relief, eliminating the death tax, offering relief from the marriage tax and putting checks in the mail next month to every taxpaying family.

Americans will get refund checks this year, and their tax bills will continue to go down for the next 10 years. Individual taxpayers will get up to a \$300 refund check, single parents will receive up to a \$500 refund check, and married taxpayers will get up to a \$600 refund check.

### Don't let difficult people ruin your pleasant day

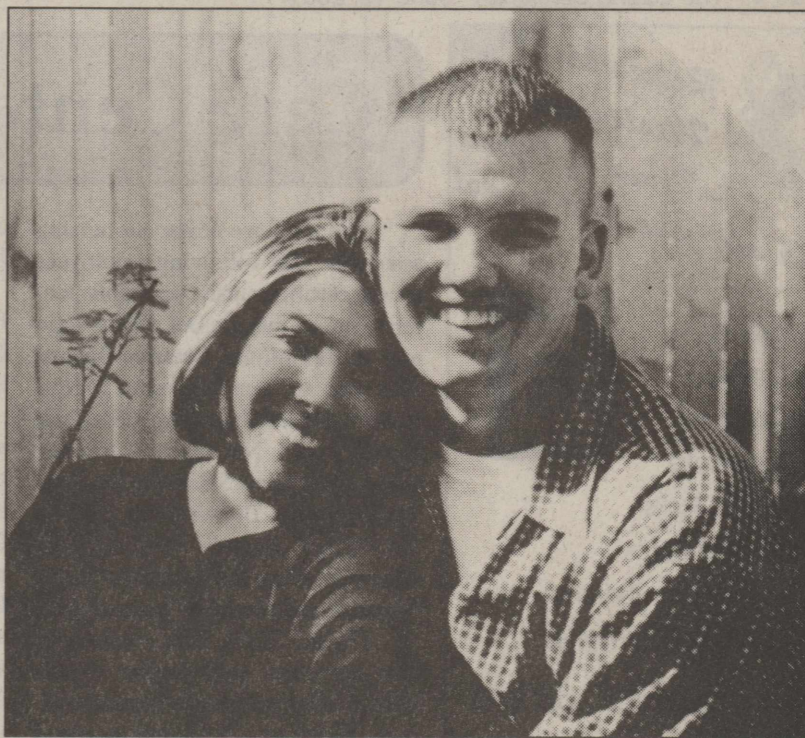
Whether at home or at work we all have to deal with difficult people sometimes, says Patrick Tiner, faculty associate in psychiatry at UT Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas.

To deal with them, it's crucial to find what they do "to push our buttons".

"Try listing the situations in which difficulties arise and analyze the difficult person's reactions," Tiner says. "Look for the reasons behind the person's actions or moods when there is conflict. Can you pick out certain behavior traits? Is it moodiness, bossiness, selfishness, refusal to listen, defensiveness or talking behind your back? Does he or she always blame someone else? Is the person a fault-finder?"

Tiner recommends trying to identify what has - and hasn't - worked to resolve conflicts in the past. Look for other circumstances and reactions you can change. Don't tune the person out or walk away. Don't become irritable or refuse to respond.

Remember: You're probably not going to be able to change the other person, but your reaction may help diffuse a difficult situation.

I sat there for awhile enjoying the moment. I thanked Him for his time and for all that He has done for me and my family, and He replied: "Anytime. I'm here 24 hours a day. All you have to do is ask for me, and I'll answer."  
People will forget what you said. People will forget what you did, but people will never forget how you made them feel.

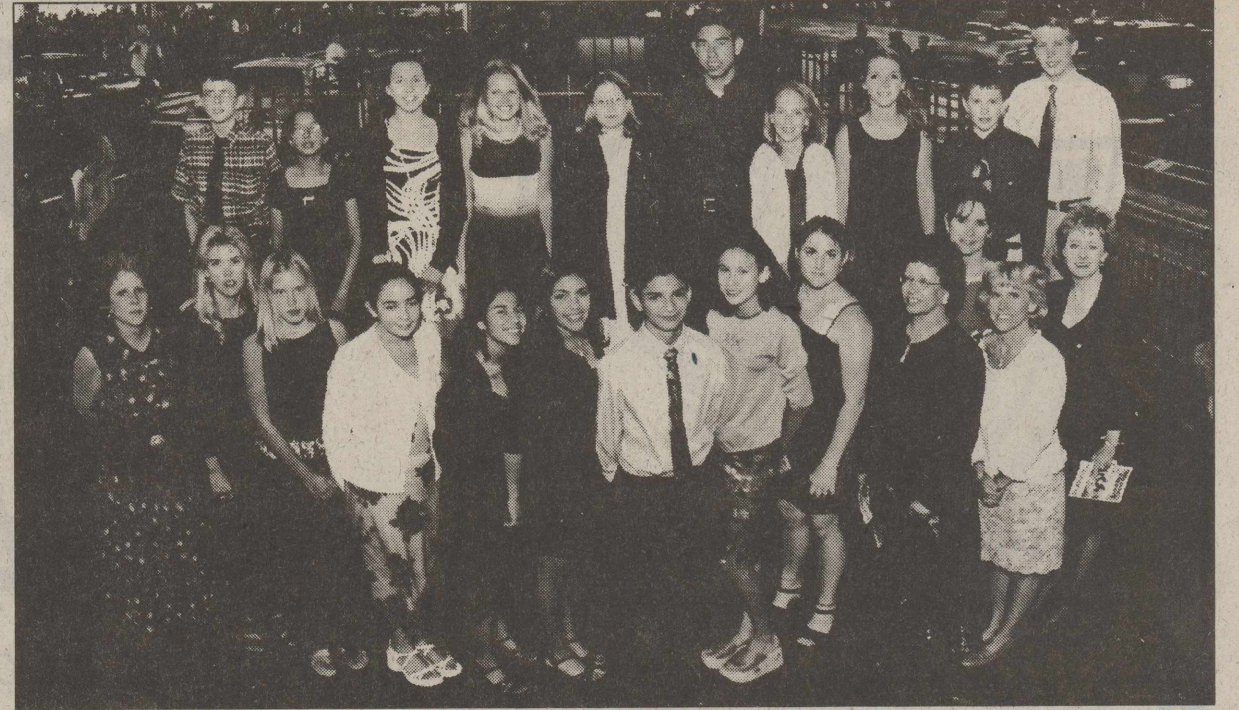

To be eligible for the Dean's List, a student must be enrolled as a full time student and have at least a 3.25 grade point average.

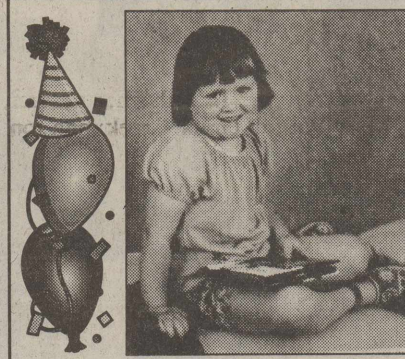

### Color not a factor for ground meat safety

COLLEGE STATION - The U. S. Department of Agriculture recently announced that color is no longer a factor when determining if ground meats have been cooked long enough to be eaten safely.

New evidence shows that harmful bacteria like E.coli can remain active in ground meat - even after it appears to be well done. At other times, meat may prematurely brown. Hamburger, and all other ground meats, must reach a temperature of 160 degrees Fahrenheit in order to be safe.

Dr. Gary Acuff, associate professor of food science at Texas A&M University, said parents should continue to teach their children not to eat ground meat that shows pink.

The USDA recommends that an "instant-read" meat thermometer be used in the thickest part of the food to ensure proper temperature.

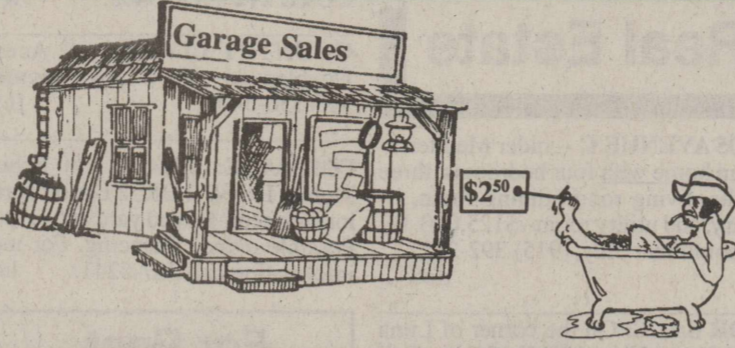


