Shannon trauma service donates new pediatric backboards

backboards to area emergency care entities. The backboards, which were purchased through a Trauma Systems Development Grant from the Texas Department of Health, offer several innovative features not previously available and are the only ones of their kind in the region.

"Shannon's Trauma Services recognized a need for these new boards to further enhance the quality of care for children in the region," said Denise Goddard, RN, trauma services coordinator. "Previously, pediatric backboards were shorter versions of the flat backboards used for adults."

One feature of the new backboard, called the Pedi-Air-Align on the board.

In an effort to enhance emergency Backboard, is its patented "Head pediatric care, Shannon Trauma Ser- Drop" system that is specially desig- given to the San Angelo Fire vices donated six new pediatric nated for the pediatric patient's large occipital region. Because a child' head is disproportionately larger than his body, conventional flat backboards do not allow for the natural alignment of the neck and spine. This can force the head forward causing an obstruction to his airway or problems with intubated patients and can even cause paralysis, said Goddard.

> The backboards also feature builtin Broslow tape for convenient reference of medication dosages. Broslaw tape is a color-coded system that determines patient dosages based on length of the body. The boards are 100 percent x-ray translucent, so the patient can be x-rayed while stabilized

Four of the backboards will be Department's first-out units, one will stay in the Shannon emergency department and one will be given to the Shannon AirMed 1 crew. Each backboard cost approximately \$333.


Shannon community health services receives federal grant

Shannon Community Health Services is one of three programs in Texas to receive an abstinence education planning grant from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, announced Tommy Thompson, HHS Secretary. Shannon is included in more than \$17.1 million in federal grants to 49 communities nationwide to develop and implement abstinenceonly education programs for young people ages 12-18, Thompson said.

Shannon's \$75,000.00 grant will be used to develop the current Right Choices for Youth program in rural counties adjacent to Tom Green County, plus Brown County said Karen Aylor Wellis, RN, BSN, director of Shannon's Community Health Services. Right Choices for Youth is a cooperative program of Shannon Health and the San Angelo Independent School District to bring education to local youth about abstinence, not only from pre-marital sex, but also from alcohol and drug use, violence and other risky lifestyle choices, Wells said. Stephanie Detamore, RN, is the program's coordinator.

"In preventing so many of today's sexual health problems, it is clear that choosing abstinence is the surest protection against disease and unintended pregnancy," Secretary Thompson said. "These grants will help create an environment that supports teenagers who choose to postpone sexual activ-

According to the Centers for Disease Control, in 1999, almost 50 percent of high school students had sexual intercourse, putting them at risk for teen pregnancy and sexually trans-

Center in Houston using their math and science skills to design a human mission to Mars this summer.


