TERRORIST ATTACKS STUN NATION

unknown number dead....

A terrorist attack on the twin towers of the World Trade Center in New York Tuesday morning stunned the nation. The north tower of the Trade Center was struck by a hijacked American Airlines plane at 8:45 a.m. Eastern time. First thought to be an accident, this crash was followed by another hijacked plane plowing into the center some 25 minutes later.

The 110-floor north tower collapsed into lower Manhattan about 45 minutes later, and the second tower fell soon after.

Thousands upon thousands of people may have been killed in the attack. Fifty thousand people worked in the World Trade Center complex.

At about 10:00 a.m. Eastern time, a third hijacked plane flew into the Pentagon Building, driving through the outer ring of the structure into the inner ring. The building caught fire

and was still burning hours later. An estimated 20,000 people worked in the Pentagon.

A fourth plane with 100 passengers aboard crashed later in central Pennsylvania. The planes which crashed into the World Trade Center were believed to be carrying 90 and 60 passengers, respectively. These were cross country flights from the east to the west coast and had full loads of fuel.

By 10:30 a.m., air travel had been shut down across the United States and Canada.

President George Bush called for calm and pledged punishment for those responsible for the attacks. "Freedom itself was attacked this morning by a faceless coward, and freedom will be defended," said Bush. "The resolve of our great nation is being tested, but make no mistake,

Health board reinstates tuition assistance for nursing degrees

Members of the care center, health and emergency services board have agreed to reestablish the tuition reimbursement program for licensed vocational nurses. Under a loan agreement presented to the board by Benny Gibbs, care center administrator, 80% of tuition and 100% of book costs will be reimbursed to approved candidates. Although the contract was worded for LVNs, it could be reworded to include registered nurses, Gibbs told his board. He will also check on a reimbursement agreement for certified nurse aides.

Care center employee Edward Chipman, who is in his last year of LVN school, was approved for financial assistance under the program at Gibbs' request. Recipients of care center education loans will be expected to work at the facility under the terms of their contract.

Students in the health science class at Ozona High School will be able to do their clinical work at the care center, Gibbs said. Instructor Linda Coates has checked with the state, and the facility is approved. Some of these students could become future candidates for employment and also for scholastic assistance.

Vonda Flanagan has been hired by the board as acting interim EMS coordinator, replacing Doug Meador. She will be responsible for hiring her assistant coordinator. Board members

have discussed the possibility of needing someone full time.

Crockett County EMS served 45 patients in August. Of these, 34 were residents, 11 non-residents.

When Linda Knightstep, regional health director for Shannon Health Systems, gave the Family Health Center of Ozona report she told the board Shannon has decided to apply for rural clinic status again. Originally a rural health clinic, the facility changed to an outpatient clinic status for financial reasons. Now that rules on reimbursement have changed, it will be better to go back to being a rural clinic, Mrs. Knightstep explained.

She reported on the search for a physician's assistant for the Ozona clinic. Possible candidates have either not had emergency room experience or are not willing to come to Ozona. Nurse practitioners with emergency room experience have applied, however. Dr. Marcus Sims told the board he has no problem working with a qualified nurse practitioner. Shannon will interview such applicants but not hire without board discussion, Mrs. Knightstep said.

Jim Skehan was recommended by the health services board as a new member to replace Tom Anderson who has resigned. Commissioners approved his appointment to the board when they met Sept. 10.

Kayla Osbourn new to extension office

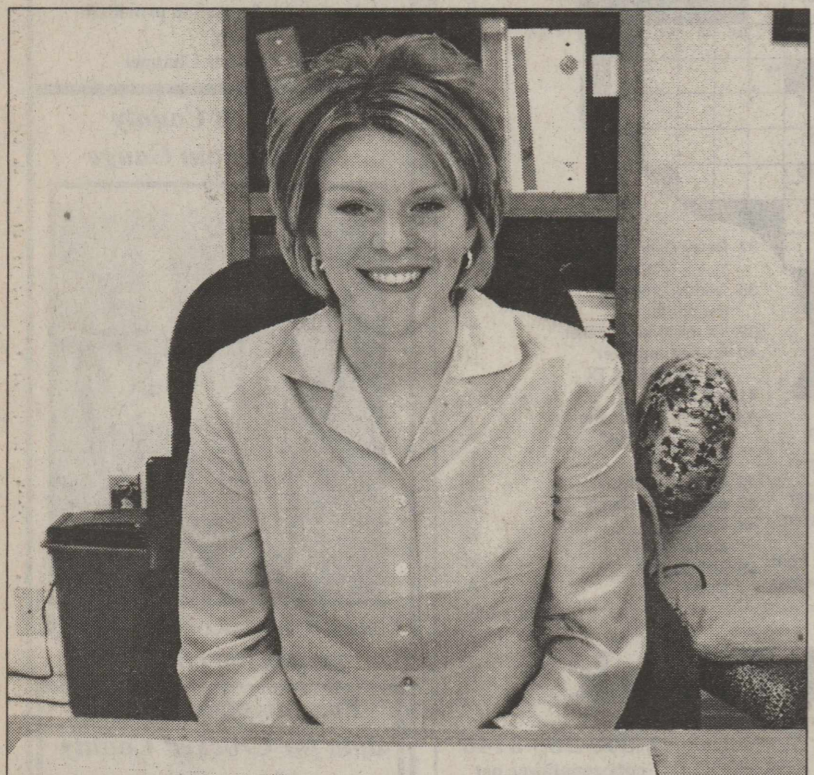
Kayla Osbourn began her duties as Family and Consumer Science Agent with the Extension Service in Ozona on Sept. 1.

we will pass the test," he said.

The President was in Florida on an education campaign when news of the attacks came. He was flown aboard Air Force 1 to Barksdale Air Force Base in Louisiana en route to an undisclosed location.

Government buildings in Washington were evacuated and the military put on its highest state of alert as emergency services mobilized. A heightened state of security across the nation included evacuation of multi-

storied buildings.

Word was received in Ozona at mid-morning Tuesday that the state's capitol had been evacuated. Locally, Federal employees at the ASCS and Farm Service Agency offices were notified to close for the remainder of the day.

Judge Johnny Jones, Sheriff Shane Fenton and DPS Sgt. Carl Mayfield consulted Tuesday morning. Fenton said that law enforcement and emergency vehicles were

being fueled and emergency generators checked.

School Superintendent Larry Taylor stated that he was working with all four principals. Parents who wished to pick up their children were being allowed to do so.

Two Ozona residents with relatives working in the areas attacked

were relieved to know their family members were all right.

Fanny Sanchez' sister who works at the Pentagon didn't go in today.

Cheryl Whitesides' sister was in her office in the World Trade Center when the plane struck. She escaped with bruises and was resting at a friend's home, Cheryl said.

Ozona Lions defeat Eagles

The Lions totally annihilated the Grape Creek Eagles to win their game 43-0 in Lion Stadium Sept. 10.

The Lions opened the game with a roar as Jared Shaffer darted up the center of the field for a 70-yard touchdown on the first offensive play of the game.

With 11:34 left in the first quarter, the Lions took an early lead over the Eagles 6-0. The Lions were all over the Eagles defensively, allowing no room for error as they held the Eagles and forced them to punt time and time again.

With 5:07 remaining in the first quarter, the Lions struck again with Josh Long moving the ball four yards for another Lion touchdown. The 2-point conversion run in by Abel Rodriguez increased the Lions lead to 14-0.

The teams exchanged possession of the ball for the rest of the first quarter with neither team able to score.

In the second quarter, the Lions scored twice more. With 2:24 left in the second quarter, the Lions roared

past the Eagles and scored a touchdown on a 3-yard run by Shaffer. Aron Garza kicked the extra point. With 35 seconds left in the quarter, the Lions struck again. Kyle Richardson connected with Martin Sanchez who was waiting in the end zone for an 8-yard touchdown pass. Again, the extra point kick by Garza was good. The Lions led the Eagles 28-0 at halftime.

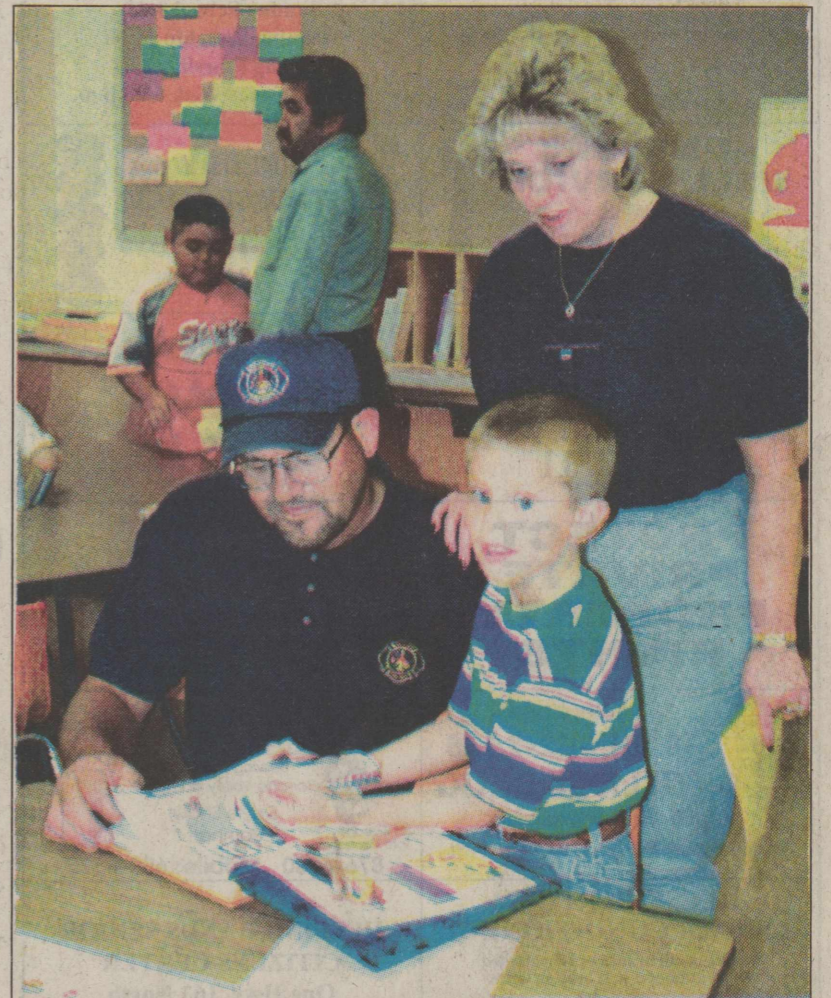
After the half, the Lions continued what they had started as they continued to upset the Eagles. Lion Martin Sanchez made an awesome play early in the third quarter as he blocked an Eagle punt, catching the ball in mid-air and running 27 yards for a touchdown. Garza's extra point kick was again good for the Lions.

Ozona scored one more time in the third quarter with just 43 seconds left. Long took the ball in on a 4-yard run, and Garza's kick was good. The quarter ended with Lions 43, Eagles 0.

Neither team scored in the final 12 minutes of the game.

The Lions moved the ball 231 yards on 40 carries. Leading in rush

Commissioners Court approves 2002 budget

Commissioners voted to adopt a 2002 budget with receipts of \$10,086,355.00 when they met Sept. 10. Tax rates adopted for 2001, which will fund the 2002 budget, include county rates of \$0.44500 for the general fund and \$0.13500 for the farm to market fund. This totals \$058000 per \$100.00 valuation for the county. School taxes are \$1.28000 for the local maintenance fund and \$0.05325 for the interest and sinking fund. The total school tax per \$100.00 valuation is \$1.33325.

Emerald Underground Water District, which assesses taxes on rural Crockett County, set its tax rate at \$0.01385. The grand total is \$ 1.92710 per \$100.00 valuation.

Court members approved an interlocal cooperation contract with the Texas Department of Transportation Monday. Through the agreement, the county approves denial of renewal of a driver's license of a person who fails to appear or pay or satisfy judgment as ordered in justice court.

They also approved an agreement for emergency transfer services provided by Shannon Airmed I and the appointment of Jim Skehan as a health services board member.

The final plat of Phase 1, Unit 5 of Texas West Ranch was accepted by the court. Plats for a new subdivision may be presented at the October court

meeting. Calkaf Inc. has bought a portion of the Marshall Montgomery Ranch for subdividing. A previously established Calkaf subdivision in western Sutton County extends into Crockett County.

Commissioners approved a contract with Tom Green County for detention of juvenile offenders.

No action was taken on agenda items pertaining to the keeping of wild animals, financial assistance for Texas Tech Health Sciences Center for services within the county and on an item requesting that the county pay for phase 3 electric utility line from Ramos Street to Buena Vista Street.

Monthly reports were received from John Stokes, auditor; Eddie Moore, roads and parks superintendent; Sheriff Shane Fenton, Louise Ledoux, librarian; Joyce Young, civic and youth center director; and Benny Gibbs, care center administrator. Written reports were received from Ozona Fire Department and Helping Hands.

Sheriff Fenton reported 449 calls for service in August and 41 persons placed in jail. There were 55 calls for 911 assistance, 30 of which were actual emergencies.

At Fenton's request, commissioners voted to approve fees charged by his department at the same rate as this year.

There were 113 head of goats auctioned at this second annual production sale. Breeders represented were Hugh and Ann Schafer, David and Barbara Slaughter, TNT Productions, W. E. and Carolyn Whitehead and Stegall-Long Boer Goats.

Approximately 250 persons attended. Buyers were here from: Mississippi, Connecticut, Minnesota,

Ohio, Michigan, Oklahoma, Louisiana, Utah, North Carolina, Florida, New Mexico, Georgia, Texas and Mexico.

American Boer Goat Association president Pete Warlick and vice-president John Edwards came for the sale, and Pip and Rinda Nieuwoudt, boer goat breeders from Clanwilliam, South Africa, were also in attendance.

Barbara Slaughter complimented the people of Ozona for being so accommodating and praised the convention center as an ideal location for the sale. The chamber of commerce, 4-H leaders Kay Stewart, Luanne Pierce and Cindy Komechak, County Agent Roy Walston and 4-H'ers also earned thanks from Mrs. Slaughter.

1,455 meals served in August.

Mrs. Young reported that the back to school dance had been successful and that future dances are being planned. An "overtime high school social" will be held after the Wall football game Sept. 28 with pizza, popcorn and sodas for the youths until midnight. A bumper pool table is being purchased for the youth center, and a ping pong table and popcorn popper are being considered.

Moore reported that the pressure washer at the road barn needs to be replaced, and commissioners voted to buy a new one. Commissioners asked Moore to install "No Parking in Alley" signs at the alley between T&C Convenience Store and Subway.

Mrs. Ledoux said that inventories of the library's fiction and children's books have been completed in preparation for computerization. Sept. 25 is the date for the fall talent show

fundraiser for the library.

Geniece Childress, Patsy White and Benny Gail Hunnicutt met with the court to ask for support in improvements to the museum. Mrs. Childress cited the need for a required fire escape on the third floor. Improvements would include replacing all the door knobs in the building in order to have one master key, removal of pipes and radiators not in use, removal of air conditioning window units and removal of the awning over the front entrance. This would be replaced with a cloth awning.

The remainder of the museum's 2001 budget will be used to purchase the materials, Mrs. Childress said. She asked that the road department do the work on the project. The money and manpower for the project will work as a match and in-kind gift toward a one to one grant the museum is seeking.

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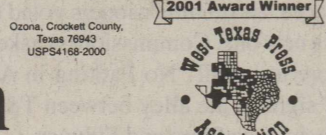

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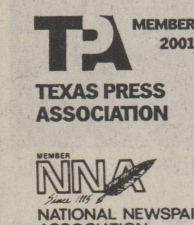

THE MEANING AND SIGNIFICANCE OF OUR CONSTITUTION

"We the People of the United States, in Order to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America."

These famous words, written more than 200 years ago, constitute the opening paragraph of one of the most profound and influential documents in history. As we celebrate the anniversary of our Constitution on September 17, we should take a few minutes this weekend to think about the meaning and significance of that incredible document.

The U.S. Constitution is the world's oldest written constitution still in effect. Ever since its completion on September 17, 1787, it has been debated, interpreted and amended. In spite of the changes our nation has gone through during the last two centuries, our Constitution has continued to provide a stable framework for America. The writers of the Constitution believed that government should come from the people, not from kings, and that a legitimate government is one that derives its powers from the people it governs. They provided for a system of checks and balances that prevent the government from becoming too powerful. They divided the federal government into three separate branches -- the executive branch, the legislative branch and the judicial branch. In addition, the Constitution provided a national structure which sought to protect the self-determination of state and local governments.

The framers of the U.S. Constitution accomplished what no other nation had achieved before that time: a national charter which defined and incorporated the principles of a government formed and run by the people. Since that time, it has been a model for other nations trying to emulate our great country.

In this day and age, it seems that some politicians in Washington are willing to jeopardize the strength of our Constitution for political gains. Our Constitution has worked well for more than 200 years; we should protect it today so we can enjoy the same level of freedom and prosperity in the United States for the next 200 years.

PINEAPPLE UPSIDE-DOWN CAKE

Melt 1/3 cup butter in heavy 10" skillet or 9" square pan. Sprinkle 1/2 cup brown sugar (packed) evenly over butter. Arrange drained pineapple rings (no. 2 can or crushed may be used if well drained) in attractive pattern on the butter-sugar coating. Decorate with pecan halves and cherries, if desired.

Make cake batter and pour over fruit. Bake until toothpick stuck into center of cake comes out clean. Immediately turn upside down on serving plate. Leave pan over cake a few minutes. Brown sugar mixture will run down over cake. Serve warm with whipped cream and Pineapple Sauce. Bake at 350 degrees 40 to 50 minutes.

CAKE BATTER

Sift together:
1 1/2 cups sifted SOFTASILK Flour or 1 1/3 cups sifted GOLD MEDAL Flour
1 cup sugar
2 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt

Add:

1/3 cup soft shortening
2/3 cup milk
1 tsp. vanilla
1/2 tsp. lemon flavoring, if desired.
Beat 2 min. Add 1 egg. Beat 2 more min.

APRICOT UPSIDE-DOWN CAKE

Follow recipe above except use drained apricot halves instead of pineapple and serve with Apricot Sauce.

PINEAPPLE OR APRICOT SAUCE

Mix in saucepan: 1/3 c. brown sugar (packed), 1tbsp. cornstarch
Stir in: 1 cup pineapple or apricot juice from drained fruit (add water if necessary to -make 1 cup). Bring to boil. Boil 1 min. over med. heat, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Add 2tbsp. butter, 1/2 tsp. lemon juice. Serve warm over each serving.

Why You Should Quit Smoking;

Quitting smoking is the most important thing that you can do for your health. Smoking causes nearly one in five deaths and is the leading preventable killer in the United States, causing over 420,000 deaths each year.

Do you know what diseases smoking causes? Most of us know about heart disease, lung disease, lung cancer, and emphysema because these diseases causes the most deaths from smoking. However, did you know that smoking also causes larynx, mouth, esophagus, pancreas, and bladder cancers? Other diseases more frequent in smokers include wrinkles, softening of the bones (osteoporosis), loss of sight (macular degeneration), bleeding stomach ulcers, stroke, inflammation of colon (Croons disease) and foot ulcers. Secondhand cigarette smoke kills an estimated 53,000 nonsmokers each year in the US. Exposure of pregnant women to secondhand smoke causes low birth weight in infants, pre-term delivery, miscarriages, and sudden infant death syndrome. Asthma, especially in children, is made worse by secondhand cigarette smoking.

Careless smoking can also causes severe burn injuries that could result in death. There are also a number of non-health reasons for quitting smoking. Ruining clothes, furniture and rugs with cigarette burns is a frequent occurrence. The smell on a smoker's breath, clothes, car, and home makes hiding a smoking habit difficult. Almost every heavy smoker knows that taxes have made smoking expensive. 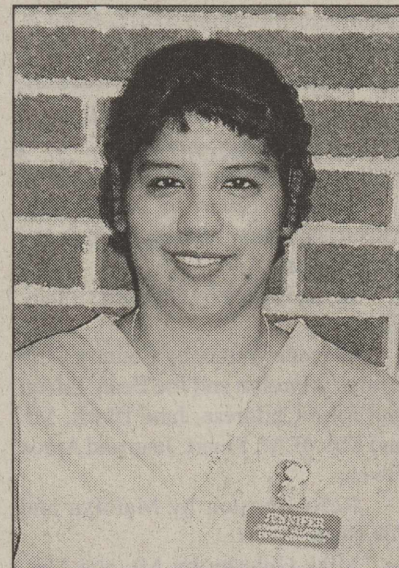

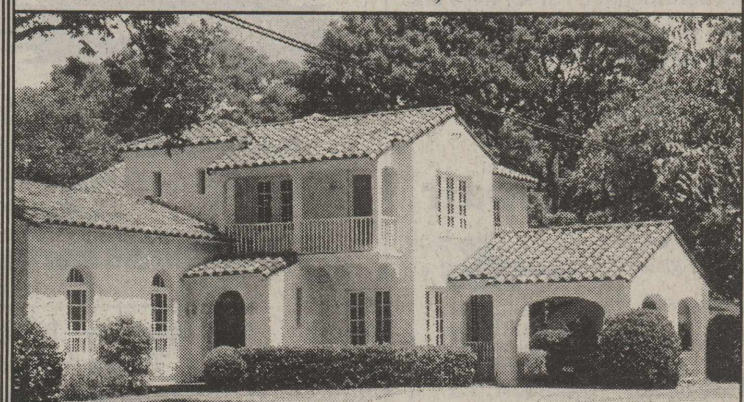

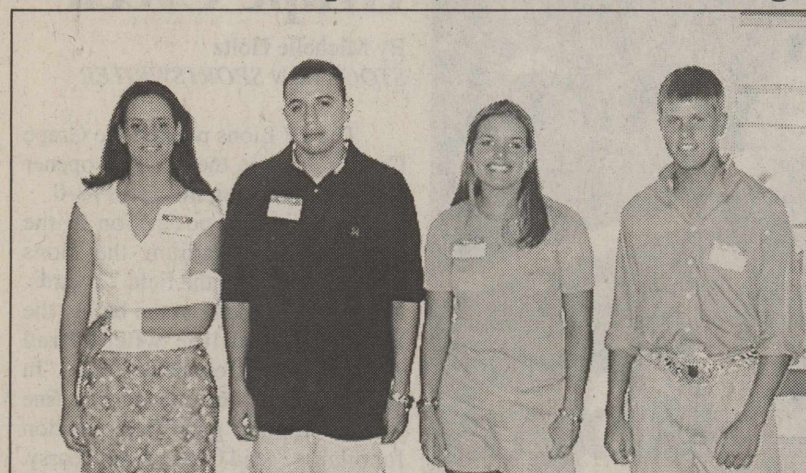

- PROPOSITION 1 (HJR 52)**
Proposition 1 would amend the constitution to relinquish the state's claim to certain disputed land in Bastrop County. The amendment would confirm legal title to that land, excluding any mineral interests, to the individuals who hold a disputed title to the land. The amendment would prevent a loss of title by people who bought and paid for property that was never transferred by the state because of faulty surveys.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the clearing of land titles by the release of a state claim of its interest to the owners of certain land in Bastrop County."
- PROPOSITION 2 (SJR 37)**
Proposition 2 would amend the constitution to establish the process for issuing up to \$175 million of state general obligation bonds and notes to provide aid to counties for access road projects to serve border colonies. Generally, a colonia is an economically distressed geographic area with inadequate public services (such as water supplies, sewer services, or paved roads) in a county without adequate resources to provide such services. These projects could include the construction of access roads, the acquisition of materials used in maintaining those roads, and projects related to the construction of those roads, such as road drainage. The Texas Transportation Commission, in consultation with the Governor, would be authorized to determine what constitutes a border colonia for purposes of selecting the counties and projects that would receive assistance.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of state general obligation bonds and notes to provide financial assistance to counties for roadway projects to serve border colonies."
- PROPOSITION 3 (SJR 47)**
Proposition 3 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to exempt green coffee and raw cocoa held in Harris County from property taxes in order to qualify Harris County as an exchange port for coffee by the New York Board of Trade. The authorization of exemption would not apply to any other county.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation raw cocoa and green coffee that is held in Harris County."
- PROPOSITION 4 (HJR 1)**
Proposition 4 would amend the constitution by setting the term of the fire fighters' pension commissioner at four years. The constitution currently provides that the duration of all offices not otherwise fixed by the constitution may not exceed two years.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for a four-year term of office for the fire fighters' pension commissioner."
- PROPOSITION 5 (SJR 32)**
Proposition 5 would amend the constitution to allow a municipality to donate outdated or surplus equipment, supplies, or other materials used in fighting fires to an underdeveloped country. Current state law does not allow anything of value belonging to the state or its political subdivisions to be donated to another nation.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing municipalities to donate outdated or surplus firefighting equipment or supplies to underdeveloped countries."
- PROPOSITION 6 (HJR 45)**
Proposition 6 would amend the constitution to require the governor to call a special session of the legislature so that the legislature can appoint presidential electors when the governor determines that it is reasonably likely that the outcome of the election for a presidential candidate's electors will not be clearly determined in time for the appropriate electors to meet before the federal deadline to cast their votes. Under current law, when the people vote for a particular candidate for president, in reality they are voting for that candidate's electors who will meet to cast their votes for president. If the electors are not determined by the certification date, no electoral votes may be cast for the state. The proposed amendment ensures that the state's electoral votes will be cast.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment requiring the governor to call a special session for the appointment of presidential electors under certain circumstances."
- PROPOSITION 7 (HJR 82)**
Proposition 7 would amend the constitution to authorize the Veterans' Land Board to issue and sell up to \$500 million of additional general obligation bonds to finance additional home mortgage loans to veterans. Additionally, the proposed amendment would authorize the Veterans' Land Board to use assets from the land and housing assistance funds to create, operate, and improve veterans' cemeteries.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to issue up to \$500 million in general obligation bonds payable from the general revenues of the state for veterans' housing assistance and to use assets in certain veterans' land and veterans' housing assistance funds to provide for veterans cemeteries."
- PROPOSITION 8 (HJR 97)**
Proposition 8 would amend the constitution to allow the legislature to authorize the Texas Public Finance Authority to issue and sell up to \$850 million of general obligation bonds. The proceeds of the sale of the bonds would pay for construction and repair projects or for the purchase of needed equipment by the General Services Commission, the Texas Youth Commission, the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, the

- constitution to improve the clarity, organization, and consistency of the constitution.
- The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to eliminate obsolete, archaic, redundant, and unnecessary provisions and to clarify, update, and harmonize certain provisions of the Texas Constitution."
- PROPOSITION 13 (SJR 2)**
Proposition 13 would amend the constitution to allow the legislature to authorize a board of trustees of an independent school district to donate real property and improvements formerly used as a school campus in order to preserve that property. The board may make the donation if the board determines that the property has historical significance, that the donation will help to preserve the property, and that the school district no longer needs the property for educational purposes.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to authorize the board of trustees of an independent school district to donate certain surplus district property of historical significance in order to preserve the property."
- PROPOSITION 14 (HJR 44)**
Proposition 14 would amend the constitution to allow the legislature to authorize a taxing unit, other than a school district, to exempt travel trailers from property taxation as long as the travel trailers are lawfully registered with the state and are not held or used for the production of income.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to authorize taxing units other than school districts to exempt from ad valorem taxation travel trailers that are not held or used for the production of income."
- PROPOSITION 15 (SJR 16)**
Proposition 15 would amend the constitution to create the Texas Mobility Fund, which would be administered by the Texas Transportation Commission. The Fund would finance the construction, acquisition, and expansion of state highways and would pay a portion of the costs of public toll roads and other public transportation projects. The legislature may reserve specific sources of state revenue for the Fund and may authorize the Commission to guarantee the payment of any obligations or credit agreements with the full faith and credit of the state. The attorney general shall determine the legality of any such obligations or credit agreements.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment creating the Texas Mobility Fund and authorizing grants and loans of money and issuance of obligations for financing the construction, reconstruction, acquisition, operation, and expansion of state highways, turnpikes, toll roads, toll bridges, and other mobility projects."
- PROPOSITION 16 (HJR 5)**
Proposition 16 would amend the constitution to reduce the waiting period required for a valid home improvement lien on a homestead from 12 days to 5 days. Currently, a lien may not attach to a homestead for a home improvement loan if the homeowner executed a contract for the improvements less than 12 days after applying for the loan. In addition, the proposed amendment would
- authorize the conversion and refinancing of a personal property lien secured by a manufactured home to a lien on a homestead.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment prescribing requirements for imposing a lien for work and material used in the construction, repair, or renovation of improvements on residential homestead property and including the conversion and refinancing of a personal property lien secured by a manufactured home to a lien on real property as a debt on homestead property protected from a forced sale."
- PROPOSITION 17 (HJR 53)**
Proposition 17 would amend the constitution to allow the state to relinquish claim to certain state land and to clear title defects for persons who claim title to those lands. The proposed amendment would apply to land whose owners have disputed title to the land, but for which no patent from the state, giving clear title to the land, was ever issued. Among other requirements, all of the taxes due on the land must have been paid. Under current law, there is no procedure allowing the state to settle title disputes without a constitutional amendment for each piece of land in dispute.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to settle land title disputes between the state and a private party."
- PROPOSITION 18 (SJR 49)**
Proposition 18 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to create a program to consolidate and standardize the collection, deposit, reporting, and payment of criminal and civil court fees. If the legislature creates such a program, any new fees imposed by the legislature may not take effect before January 1 of the following year, unless an earlier effective date is approved by a vote of two-thirds of the members of each house of the legislature.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to promote uniformity in the collection, deposit, reporting, and remitting of civil and criminal fees."
- PROPOSITION 19 (HJR 81)**
Proposition 19 would amend the constitution to allow the Texas Water Development Board to issue up to \$2 billion of additional general obligation bonds. The Board issues bonds to pay for water supply projects, water quality enhancement projects, flood control projects, state participation in water and wastewater facilities, and projects for economically distressed areas. Current law limits the amount of bonds that the Board can issue.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of additional general obligation bonds by the Texas Water Development Board in an amount not to exceed \$2 billion."

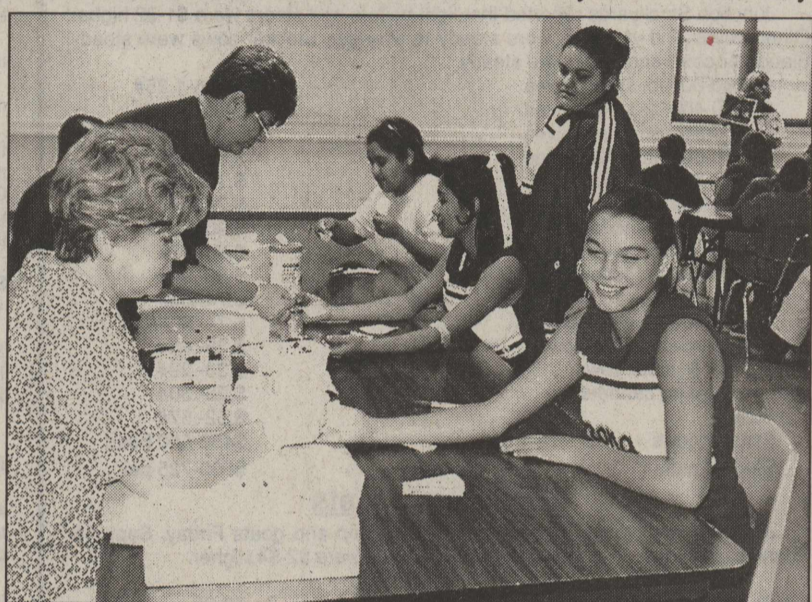
