Mighty Lions shoot down the Hawks, collect a few tail feathers

Everyone predicted that Wall would beat the Lions Sept. 28 except the Lions, their coaches and fans. The Lions proved wrong everyone doubting their ability, turning the tables on the Hawks for 21-18 win. Where the Hawks failed, the Lions made up for it with all three of their extra point kicks good by Arron Garza.

The Hawks failed on all three of their attempts for the extra point as their first attempted kick failed, then their pass failed, and lastly, their run was foiled by the awesome Lions.

In the first quarter, the Hawks struck first with 7:39 remaining in the period. Hawk #11 ran in a 1-yard touchdown. The Lions were unable to score in the first quarter, but their defense held tough as they kept the Hawks from scoring throughout the rest of the period.

In the second quarter, the Lions came on strong, scoring their first TD of the night in just a mere six seconds' run off the clock. With 11:54 remaining in the quarter, Kyle Richardson connected with Luis Cruz on a beautiful 26-yard pass. Arron Garza kicked the extra point successfully for the Lions who took a one-point lead over the Hawks 7-6.

Less than 15 seconds later, the Lions scored their second touchdown as an unidentified Lion crushed the Hawk receiver, forcing the Hawk to fumble the ball. Cruz was in the right place at the right time as he picked up the fumbled ball and took off for the end zone. He ran in the 23-yard fumble return for the Lions' second touchdown of the game. Arron Garza made good on the kick again for the Lions. Ozona now led Wall by a demanding 14-6.

The Hawks struck back with 8:28 remaining in the second quarter as #40 ran in a 3-yard touchdown, decreasing the Lions' lead to a mere two points, 14-12. And the Hawks were not done. They struck back with 3:40 left in the first half as #30 ran in a 9-yard touchdown. At the end of the first half, the scoreboard read Hawks 18, Lions 14.

The Lions were down by four going into the third quarter, but they were not finished. They came back in the third to regain their lead and keep it for the remainder of the game. With 8:59 on the clock in the third period, the Lions struck with fury as Richardson hooked up with Lalo Garza on a sweet 13-yard pass. Arron Garza's kick for the extra point was successful, bringing the score to Lions 21, Hawks 18. Neither team scored during the remainder of the game.

"It was a great win for the kids," said Coach Steve Taylor. "We beat a team we weren't supposed to, like the San Angelo paper said, our kids played with a lot of heart."

Taylor went on to say "our line-men played hard, especially our two guards, R. J. Fierro and Andrew Shaffer, who were outmatched by about 60 pounds. Our backs ran hard, and our quarterbacks made good decisions that allowed us to keep the ball

Offensively, the Lions were 42 for 175 yards rushing. Jared Shaffer led the Lions in rushing with 15 carries for 89 yards followed by Jarryd Taylor with 19 for 39 yards, Arron Garza 6 for 37, Robert Ogle 2 for 7, Kyle Richardson 2 for 4, Josh Long 5 for 3 yards and Abel Rodriguez 1 for (-4).

The Lions completed 4 passes for 14 attempts for 52 yards and had 1 interception. Kyle Richardson completed 3 passes of 4 for 46 yards and two touchdowns. Arron Garza completed 1 pass of 4 for 6 yards and had 1 interception and kicked all three extra points after the touchdowns, which was the difference in the game. Luis Cruz caught 1 reception for 26 yards for a touchdown, and Lalo Garza had 1 reception for 13 yards for a touchdown followed by Jared Shaffer 1 for 7 and Jarryd Taylor 1 for 6.

Defensively, Jarryd Taylor led the Lions in tackles with an amazing 19 tackles, 10 unassisted, with 2 quarterback sacks and 2 quarterback harassments. Also playing great defensively were Robert Ogle with 9 tackles and Gus Perez with 8.

Low volume, low prices at wool sales

Wool sales at local warehouses brought low prices last week, according to their managers.

At Ozona Wool and Mohair, short wool sold as high as 54c a pound on a few selected lots said manager Charles Seidensticker. "Everything else was what I'd consider below market value." Ozona Wool offered a total of 62,000 pounds with 45,000 of that short wool. Approximately 15,000 pounds sold.

"Due to short wool contracts last fall and this spring, certain buyers have filled their orders. They have a surplus right now. One particular buyer was only allowed to buy one truckload in Texas this year," Seidensticker commented.

At Wool Growers, the combined offering from the Ozona and Sanderson warehouses totaled 94,000

Fast For Word develops students' skills

Children in Ozona Public Schools are about to have a new tool to assist in learning. Last week teachers were introduced to Fast ForWord, a computer-based training system that helps students of all ages and learning abilities rapidly improve language, reading and learning skills. All children at Ozona Primary School will participate in the six week program. All grade levels will start the program

at some degree. The fundamental purpose of the program is to develop oral language skills. Fast ForWord works on the premise that some children can not process information. With Fast ForWord, this is taken care of at an early age. Fast ForWord trains the brain to process better and faster, based on more than 25 years of research on how the brain learns. The program begins by training basic sound processing, eventually moving students through advanced reading skills. The program creates a solid foundation that makes every other reading program work better and every other learning skill easier to acquire.

Cori Patterson, who instructed teachers about the program, said 90% of the children participating gain from one to two years' of ability in four to eight weeks. The program can be customized according to the needs of the individual student, giving the basic skills to learn language. There are multitudes of reasons for language problems. Overcoming problems through development of basic skills results in better readers and better learners in all subjects.

There is no instant replay to the computer's instructions, explained Ms. Patterson. Through the program, the child's attention span improves, directions are followed better.

Evelio Fuentes Galindo arrested Salome Lerma shot to death

A Saturday night shooting at a ranch 12 miles down Pandale Road left 53-year-old Salome Rodriguez Lerma dead. Sheriff Shane Fenton said that about 10:34 p.m. Sept. 29 his office received a call from a rancher who said there was a problem involving his ranch hands.

When officers arrived at the scene, they found that Lerma had been shot numerous times.

An investigation was conducted by the Crockett County Sheriff's Department and Texas Ranger Brooks Long, which resulted in the arrest of

60-year-old Evelio Fuentes Galindo on a charge of murder.

Both Lerma and Galindo are from Del Rio Sheriff Fenton said.

Judge James M. Hearne conducted an inquest at the scene and set Galindo's bail at \$100,000.00 at his arraignment later Saturday night.

"The investigation is continuing," said Sheriff Fenton, "and anyone that knew Mr. Lerma, that may have had contact with him on Saturday, is urged to contact the Crockett County Sheriff's Department or Texas Ranger Brooks Long at the Department of Public Safety."

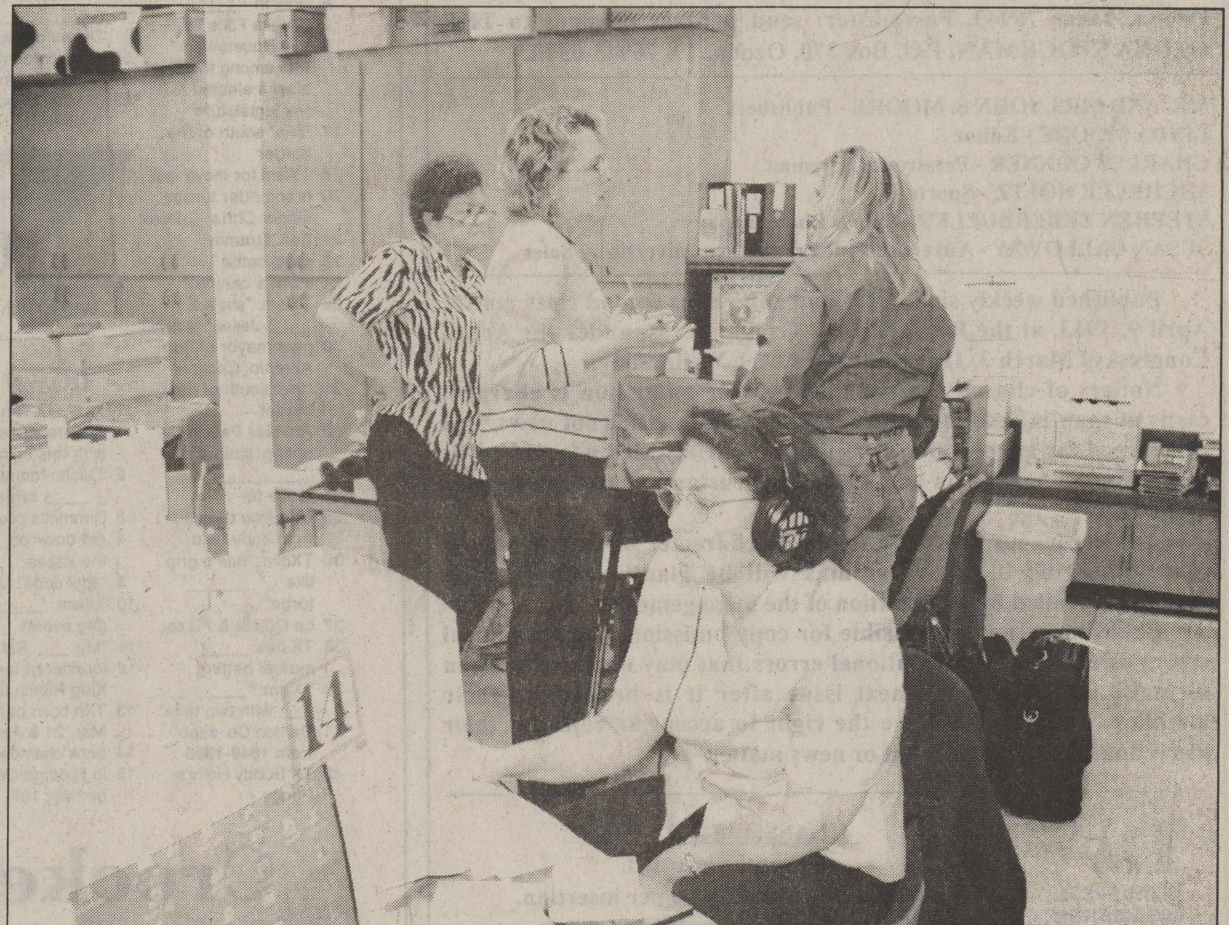

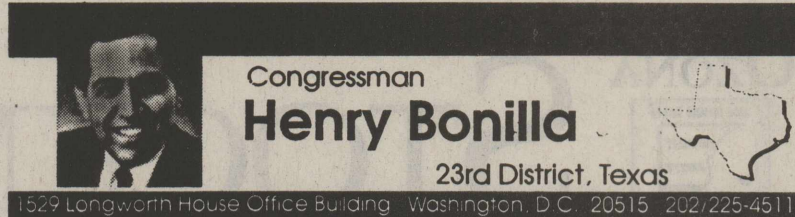

REP. BONILLA, HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES AUTHORIZE PRESIDENT TO USE MILITARY FORCE

WASHINGTON D.C.- The U.S. House of Representatives recently passed legislation authorizing President George W. Bush to use whatever military force he deems necessary.

"The forces of evil signed a death warrant on Tuesday. They have unleashed the wrath of the American people," said Mr. Bonilla. "The struggle ahead may be a long one. Ultimately, we will triumph. We will preserve freedom for future generations. We will guarantee hope remains for all mankind."

Joint Resolution 62 authorizes the use of United States Armed Forces against "those responsible for the recent attacks launched against the United States. The joint resolution authorizes President George W. Bush to use all necessary and appropriate force against those nations, organizations or persons he determines planned, authorized, committed or aided in the terrorist attacks that occurred on September 11, 2001." The resolution goes on to authorize force against those who "harbored such organizations or persons, in order to prevent any future acts of international terrorism against the United States."

The U.S. House of Representatives Congressional Record reported the following statement from Rep. Bonilla. "We have witnessed evil this week. The twin tragedies in New York and Washington, the massacre of innocents, must never happen again. Today, with this legislation, we are sending the world a message. We are stating that America does not recoil in the face of evil, on the contrary, America rises up," said Mr. Bonilla.

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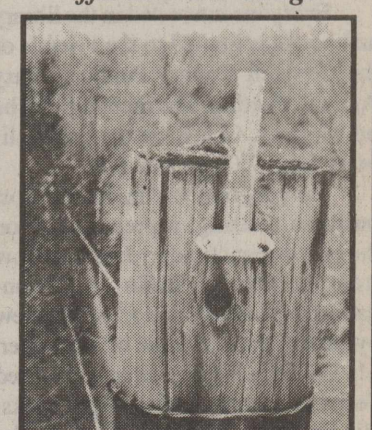

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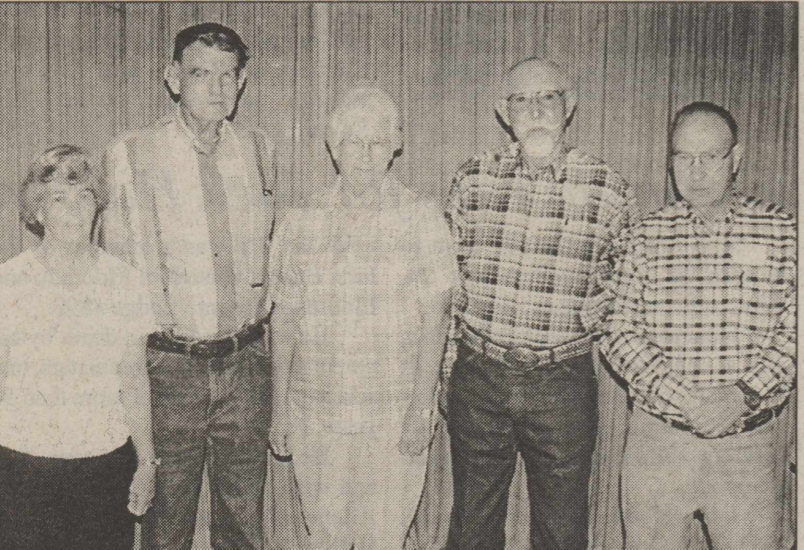
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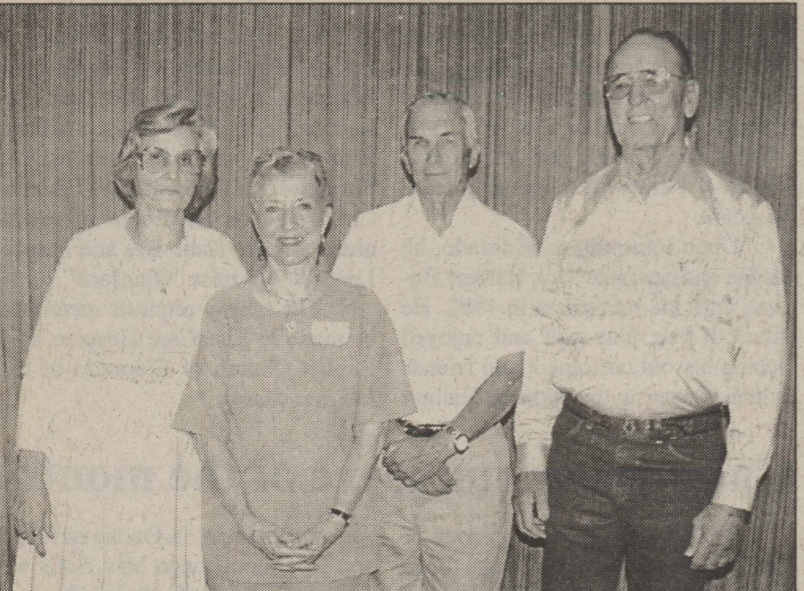

1/2 c. chopped pecans
2 cans peach pie filling
1/4 c. sugar
1 tsp. cinnamon
1 tsp. almond extract

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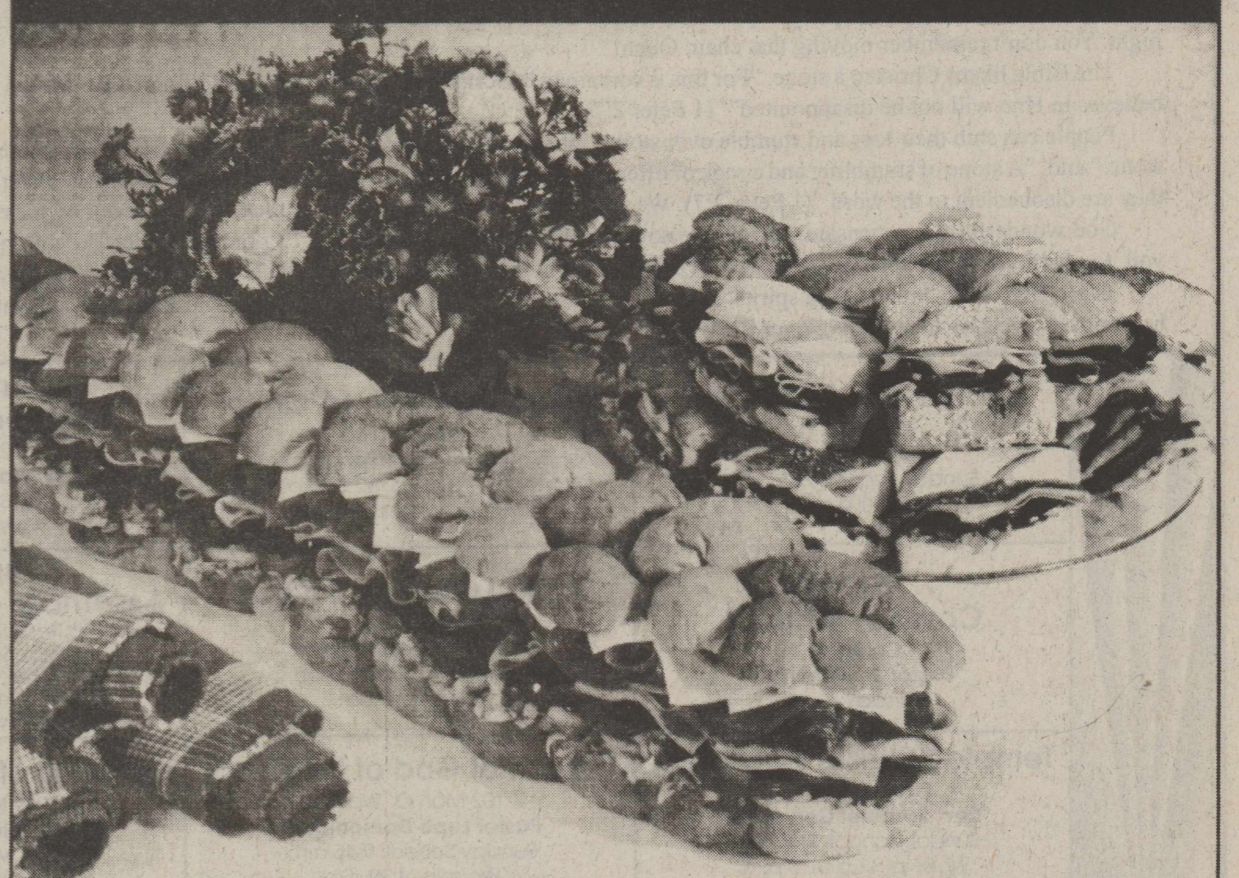

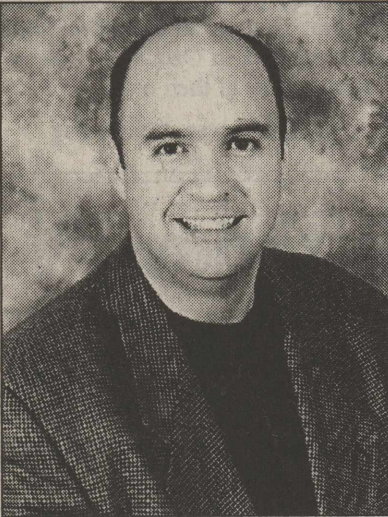

When you stub your toes, you jump and howl. You do it at the most inopportune times too, like heading to the bathroom in the middle of the night. You don't remember moving that chair. Ouch!

The Bible likens Christ to a stone. "For this is contained in Scripture: 'Behold, I lay in Zion a choice stone, a precious corner stone and he who believes in Him will not be disappointed'" (1 Peter 2:7).

People can stub their toes and stumble over stones intended for building. "The stone which the builders rejected, this became the very corner stone," and, "A stone of stumbling and a rock of offense" (1 Peter 2:7). How do people stumble over Christ? Peter explains. "They stumble because they are disobedient to the word" (1 Peter 2:7). We stumble over Christ and stub our toes on Him, to our own eternal hurt, when we disobey Him.

God wonderfully compensates for our weakness and stumbling. Psalm 91:11-12 promises, "For He will give His angels charge concerning you, to guard you in all your ways. They will bear you up in their hands, that you do not strike your foot against a stone."

These angels are "ministering spirits, sent out to render service for the sake of those who will inherit salvation" (Hebrews 1:14). They keep heirs of salvation from stumbling over Christ.

How we try to help people make good choices

While statistics indicate that most people (about 75 percent) have a good understanding of the Social Security system, I'd guess that most people don't know a lot about the finer details. Social Security employees are trained in these details.

For example, we assume most people don't know whether it is advantageous or disadvantageous to elect reduced Social Security retirement benefits. We show them how much their benefits would be reduced (as much as 20 percent for people retiring at age 62) and remind them that the reduction is permanent. We tell them that they will be receiving benefits over a longer period of time. Also, if they decide to delay retirement past their full retirement age, their benefit would be increased for each month they delay retirement.

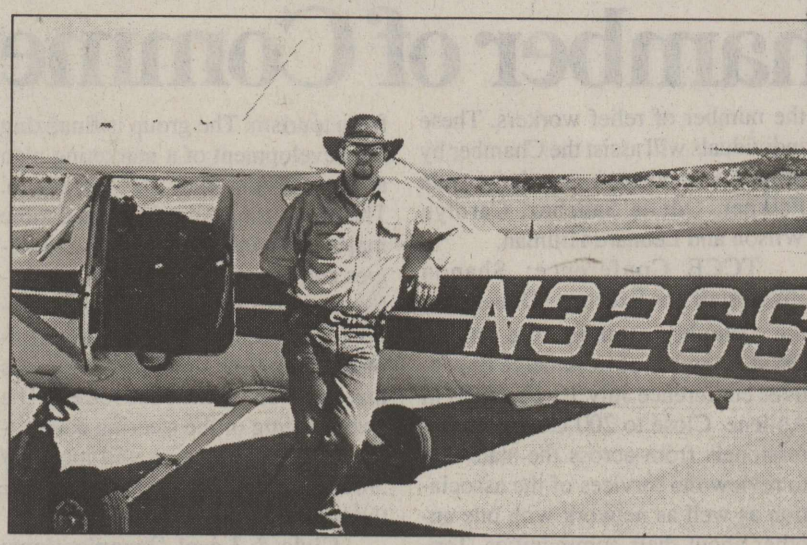
A person whose health is not good may decide on the early benefits as best for him/her. A person who has the option of continuing to work may decide to wait. At age 65, benefits are not reduced because of earnings.

Another good example is the choices made by beneficiaries with disabilities who want to work. Many fear to even discuss this matter because they are afraid it will trigger a process that will result in a loss of benefits, particularly their Medicare/Medicaid coverage. But we understand the desire to return to the workplace. The program includes a number of special rules that permit benefits and Medicare or Medicaid to continue while they test their ability to work. Once people find out about these rules, called "work incentives", they generally give serious thought to making a work attempt. But the choice is their own.

Social Security representatives want to be sure that claimants and beneficiaries have all facts necessary to make an informed choice. Then the claimant must choose. It's an individual decision, depending on each person's circumstances.

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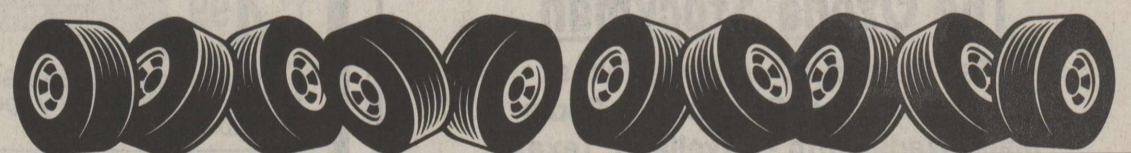
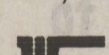

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Ozona Chamber of Commerce quarterly activity update

JULY:
Ozona Night At The Park: The town of Ozona was promoted Monday, July 9, 2001, during the San Angelo Colts baseball game. This was a promotion to bring the activity of professional baseball to the forefront of rural communities. In turn, Ozona had the opportunity to promote local attractions and events and perhaps entice visitors to town. Tickets were sold at discounted prices in Ozona, there was a random drawing of all ticket purchasers for a team autographed baseball, local minor and major league baseball teams were introduced before the game while taking the field and locals were invited to throw the first pitch of the night and sing the National Anthem.

Billboards: You will notice the Chamber has refurbished its billboard located on the Big Lake highway which acts as directional signage to Ozona.

Visitor Center Project: The Chamber of Commerce submitted its nomination packet to Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) on 6/18/01. A final decision from the review committee will not be made until January, 2002. The Chamber has mailed a copy of the nomination project to all state and U.S. representatives. In talking with TxDOT, they are expecting 350-400 project nominations to be submitted. There is approximately \$130,000,000.00 dollars available for the Statewide Enhancement Program. TxDOT representatives reviewed the Ozona nomination and the project meets all the program criteria. Crockett County has deeded 2.78 acres of land to the Chamber of Commerce for the purpose of building a Visitor Center. The Chamber of Commerce will have 5 years to complete this project. Otherwise, the land will revert back to the county. "We have a very strong nomination and we can only wait and hope the Ozona project is selected for funding. There are so many communities seeking assistance for a variety of projects, so we will keep our fingers crossed. The Chamber is already looking into other grant possibilities in case Ozona is not selected. The Chamber is dedicated to pursuing this project and we strongly feel this is a positive step in the right direction for our community and its economic future", said Sharon Biggerstaff.

Relief Workers: You may have seen an ad in the Ozona Stockman for part time help. The Chamber has not hired a permanent part time person. Instead, the Chamber has increased

the number of relief workers. These individuals will assist the Chamber by project or as otherwise needed; Lynda Falkner, Odelia Sanchez, Carolyn Wilson and Leonard Hillman.

TCCE Conference: Sharon Biggerstaff, the Executive Director for the Chamber attended the annual Texas Chamber of Commerce Executives conference July 16-17, 2001, in Abilene. Close to 200 Chamber professionals from across the state met to review the services of the association as well as network with one another about their communities. Topics such as "Change is Inevitable-Growth is Optional, Chamber Marketing Opportunities, Accounting For Non-Profit Corporations, That's Off the Record, Okay (dealing with the press/media), Guerrilla Negotiating and The Future of Chambers of Commerce were just a few presentations provided. "When you attend these conferences you hope to come away with two things. By networking with your peers that are facing the same challenges in their communities, you leave with a sense that your priorities back at home are on track. Secondly, this forum always provides an opportunity to share and take home new ideas. The role of the Chamber of Commerce within the community is changing fast. One of the primary messages always relayed during these conferences is you must stay focused. Focus on projects that benefit the community as a whole and not just one sector" said Biggerstaff.

AUGUST

David Crockett Birthday Festival: The 9th annual David Crockett Birthday festival held Aug. 4, was a success! The festival raised right at \$3,000.00 for the Chamber. Attendance through the gate was 713, and 491 people attended the evening dance. These numbers did not include vendors, volunteers or band members. The Chamber raised monies through booth sales, admission to the festival, dance tickets, food, beverage and novelty items. The dollars raised will be used to promote Ozona, it's activities, attractions and services.

Southwest Tourism Partnership: Formerly the Tri County Association, the group was organized to foster the growth of tourism as an economics development strategy in the Crockett, Schleicher and Sutton counties and surrounding areas. Participation in the partnership is open to any business, organization, rancher or other individual who shares in the goal of increasing the benefits that come

from tourism. The group is finalizing the development of a marketing plan and is working with ASU on a logo. The organization has identified three major domains of objectives, strategies and action steps to grow and enhance tourism. Organization, education, awareness and marketing information were the three major focuses that came out of the June retreat. The next meeting of the steering committee of the organization will meet 10/3/01 in Sonora where funding will be the topic of focus.

Civic & Local Organizations: All local organizations received a letter of request for updated information as well as calendar activities open to the general public for the last quarter of this year. The Chamber produces a quarterly community calendar that is placed on the web site, given to our local paper, as well as forwarded to surrounding communities and state-wide publications.

SEPTEMBER:

ASU SMALL BUSINESS SEMINARS: Each year the Chamber coordinates with ASU out of San Angelo to provide to its members business seminars at no charge. The membership was surveyed to determine their interests and the seminars will begin on Tuesday, October ~ through February 5, 2002. Advertising and Marketing, Hire-Don't Fire,

The Basics of Bookkeeping, Introduction to Quickbooks and Understanding Financial Statements will be the seminar topics offered. This is an added benefit offered only to Chamber members.

TxDOT STREETSCAPE PLAN UPDATE: Through the TxDOT Construction Landscape Program, Ozona has been approved for \$110,000 to streetscape the 1-10 access roads and intersections of Hwy. 163. Improvements to this area will include planters, trees, sidewalks, grass, curbs/gutters and a decorative native stonewall. This project will immensely improve the appearance of the gateways into our community as well as provide a more appealing visual for our visitors. TxDOT has just recently hired a new surveyor who is scheduled to complete the survey for this project by the end of October. Design plans for the project will begin in January and the project should begin in the Spring of 2002.

RC&D STRATEGIC PLANNING SESSION: As a result of the recent community strategic planning session, the Chamber will focus on the following goals in the order as listed:

- 1) Tourism and Travel, 2) Business and Industry, 3) Human Capacity, 4) Quality of Life and 5) Telecommunications. Tourism and Travel offer the greatest potential for Ozona, being located off I-10. Hunting, wild-

life, soliciting for meetings and events, nature tourism, festivals and events, and promoting our heritage and history are a priority. Promoting Ozona to attract business, developing our workforce, and working to possibly bring a vocational or trade school to the community was addressed. Grooming new leadership within our community was of importance. Getting volunteers involved in the community and helping them to find their niche so there is project follow-through was addressed. There was dis-

ussion on developing our downtown and main street appearance as well as working on landscaping and streetscaping to improve our overall appeal. The community is interested in expanding our arts and culture and providing activities and events to the general public. There was discussion on increasing housing availability. Finally, bringing Ozona up to Internet speed through telecommunications and community networking was also considered a priority.

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
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Cub Scouts have first fall pack meeting

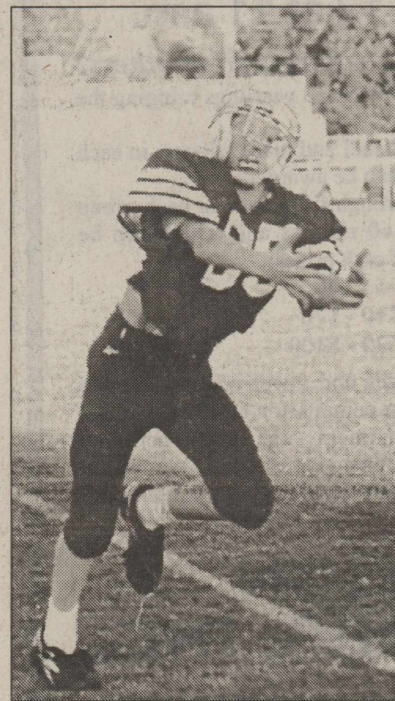

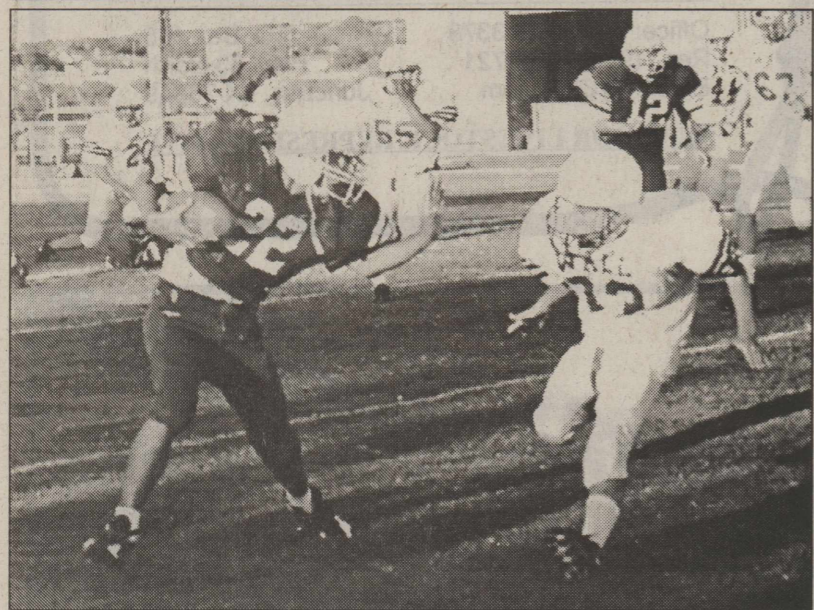
the end of the first half, the Lions led the Hawks 6-0.

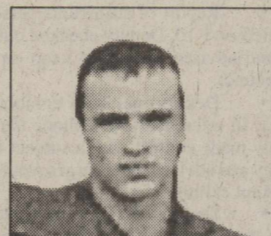

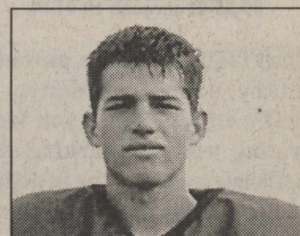
