



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REP. BONILLA, HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES AUTHORIZE PRESIDENT TO USE MILITARY FORCE

WASHINGTON D.C.- The U.S. House of Representatives recently passed egislation authorizing President George W. Bush to use whatever military force he deems necessary.

"The forces of evil signed a death warrant on Tuesday. They have uneashed the wrath of the American people," said Mr. Bonilla. "The struggle ahead may be a long one. Ultimately, we will triumph. We will preserve reedom for future generations. We will guarantee hope remains for all mankind.

Joint Resolution 62 authorizes the use of United States Armed Forces gainst "those responsible for the recent attacks launched against the United States. The joint resolution authorizes President George W. Bush to use all necessary and appropriate force against those nations, organizations or persons he determines planned, authorized, committed or aided in the terrorist attacks that occurred on September 11, 2001." The resolution goes on to authorize force against those who "harbored such organizations or persons, in order to prevent any future acts of international terrorism against the United States."

The U.S. House of Representatives Congressional Record reported the ollowing statement from Rep. Bonilla. "We have witnessed evil this week. The twin tragedies in New York and Washington, the massacre of innocents, nust never happen again. Today, with this legislation, we are sending the world a message. We are stating that America does not recoil in the face of vil, on the contrary, America rises up," said Mr. Bonilla.

God's Angels, Our Stumbling

When you stub your toes, you jump and howl. You do it at the most inopportune times too, like heading to the bathroom in the middle of the night. You don't remember moving that chair. Ouch!

The Bible likens Christ to a stone. "For this is contained in Scripture: 'Behold, I lay in Zion a choice stone, a precious corner stone and he who believes in Him will not be disappointed" (1 Peter 2:7).

People can stub their toes and stumble over stones intended for building. "The stone which the builders rejected, this became the very corner stone," and, "A stone of stumbling and a rock of offense" (1 Peter 2:7). How do people stumble over Christ? Peter explains. "They stumble because they are disobedient to the word" (1 Peter 2:7). We stumble over Christ and stub our toes on Him, to our own eternal hurt, when we disobey Him.

God wonderfully compensates for our weakness and bumbling. Psalm 91:11-12 promises, "For He will give His angels charge concerning you, to guard you in all your ways. They will bear you up in their hands, that you do not strike your foot against a stone."

These angels are "ministering spirits, sent out to render service for the sake of those who will inherit salvation" (Hebrews 1:14). They keep heirs of salvation from stumbling over Christ.

How we try to help people make good choices

By Fredi Franki Social Security Manager,

While statistics indicate that most people (about 75 percent) have a good understanding of the Social Security system, I'd guess that most people don't know a lot about the finer details. Social Security employees are trained in these details.

For example, we assume most people don't know whether it is advantageous or disadvantageous to elect reduced Social Security retirement benefits. We show them how much their benefits would be reduced (as much as 20 percent for people retiring at age 62) and remind them that the reduction is permanent. We tell them that they will be receiving benefits over a longer period of time. Also, if they decide to delay retirement past their full retirement age, their benefit would be increased for each month they delay retirement.

A person whose health is not good may decide on the early benefits as best for him/her. A person who has the option of continuing to work may decide to wait. At age 65, benefits are not reduced because of earnings.

Another good example is the choices made by beneficiaries with disabilities who want to work. Many fear to even discuss this matter because they are afraid it will trigger a process that will result in a loss of benefits, particularly their Medicare/ Medicaid coverage. But we understand the desire to return to the workplace. The program includes a number of special rules that permit benefits and Medicare or Medicaid to continue while they test their ability to Extension programs serve people work. 

Airshow 2001 Oct. 6-7 in Permian Basin


The Confederate Air Force will land. celebrate the beginning of the millennium by hosting the world's largest gathering of World War II aircraft at the Fina-CAF Airsho 2001 slated to take place Oct. 6-7 at Midland International Airport. More than 100 warbirds, ranging from bombers and fighters to trainers and foreign aircraft, will travel from across the country to the international headquarters of the CAF to attend what traditionally has been known as the organization's homecoming event.

Highlighting the Fina-CAF Airsho 2001 will be appearances by many of the CAF airplanes. In the spotlight will be the CAF's nationally renowned Tora, Tora, Tora group. Five of the replica Japanese aircraft that fly regularly with the Tora group as well as five Tora pilots, took part in the filming of Touchstone Picture's newly released movie "Pearl Harbor" Airsho 2001 will also commemorate the 60th anniversary of the attack of Pearl Harbor with a special tribute to Pearl Harbor survivors.


Eagerly anticipated will also be the Airsho debut of the CAF's rare P-51C Mustang. Restored by the CAF's So. Minnesota Wing over a 10 year period, the airplane will be flown in the colors of the 332nd Fighter Group, 15th Air Force - the Tuskegee Airmen. The restoration project known as "The Red Tail Project" has received endorsements by The Tuskegee Airmen, Inc. and Lena Horne, who has been designated as the project's honorary chairperson. Currently only two P-51C Mustangs fly.

Other rare CAF airplanes in attendance at Airsho 2001 include the world's only flying B-29 Superfortress and SB2C Helldiver. Also on display and flying will be the CAF's B-24/LB-30 Liberator, two B-17 Flying Fortresses, five B-25 Mitchells, SBD Dauntless, P-39 Airacobra, German Heinkel He 111, Ju 52 Junkers and many more.

Both day's events will include the CAF's airpower demonstration, recreations of some of history's most famous air battles, including the surprise attack on Pearl Harbor, battles of the Pacific and European theaters and the fateful attack on the Japanese main-


