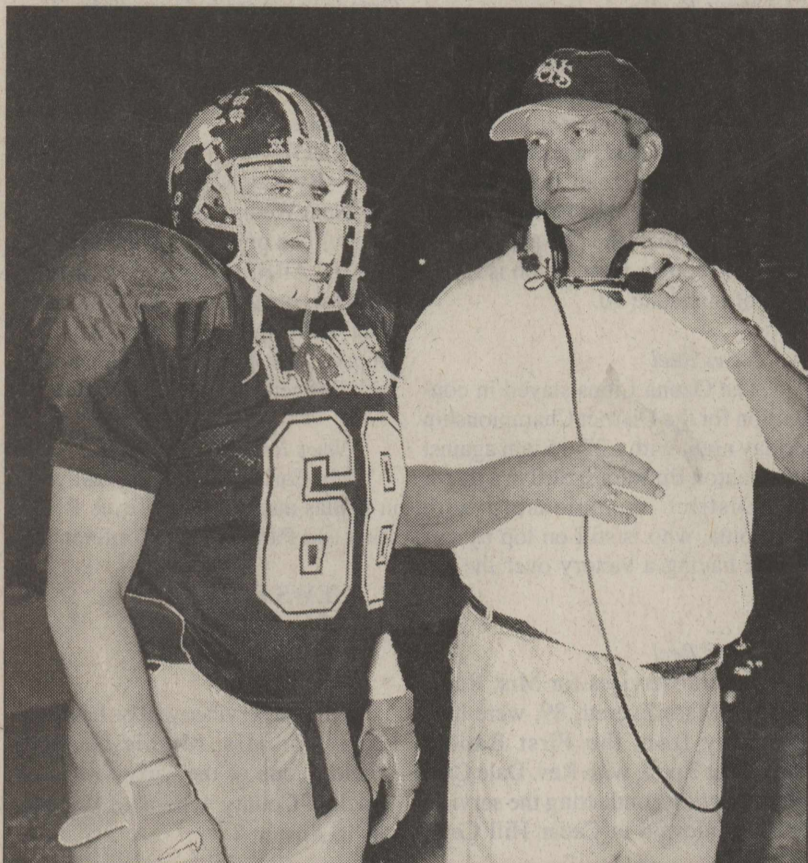

## Lions send Coyotes packin'

The Ozona Lions soundly defeated the Tornillo Coyotes Nov. 2 in Lion Stadium.

"This was another great win for our kids, where everybody got a lot of playing time and did well with the opportunity," said Coach Steve Taylor.

The Lions sent the Coyotes packin' as they thoroughly whipped the Coyotes and won the game by a whopping 63 points, 69-6. The Coyotes tried to tame the Lions, but soon came to realize that the Mighty Lions were too much for them to handle.

In the opening quarter, the Lions were first to get on the scoreboard. With 5:07 remaining, Arron Garza connected a sweet 21-yard pass to Quay Oglesby for a touchdown. The 2-point conversion was made by

Garza.

This was the only score in the first quarter, but in the second, the Lions began to unload on the Coyotes, scoring an awesome five touchdowns and shutting out the Coyotes completely.

The Lions wasted very little time in the second quarter before they launched their all out attack on the Coyotes. The Lions scored their first of five touchdowns with 8:57 remaining in the quarter as Jared Shaffer weaved through the Coyote defensive line for an incredible 41-yard touchdown run. The kick for the extra point for the Lions was made good by Arron Garza to increase the Lions' lead to 15-0.

Three minutes and 26 seconds later the Lions made good on another touchdown as Arron Garza scored on a 3-yard run. The 2-point conversion attempt failed for the Lions. Two minutes and 28 seconds later the Lions

struck again. This time Arron Garza hooked up with Bryan Skehan on a 33-yard pass for a touchdown. The kick for the extra point failed for the Lions.

The Lions scored their fifth touchdown of the second quarter with a mere 12 seconds remaining as Garza threw a sweet 11-yard pass to Oglesby, who was waiting in the end zone for a touchdown. Garza's kick was good for the extra point. At the end of the first half the Lions led the Coyotes 41 to zip.

In the third quarter the Lions continued their attack on the Coyotes. The Lions shut out the Coyotes throughout the third quarter as they scored two more touchdowns. The Lions scored on a 29-yard touchdown run by Jarryd Taylor. Garza's kick for the extra point was good. Then with 4:01 remaining in the third quarter, Josh Long scored on a 1-yard touchdown run. Skehan's kick for the extra point was successful. The Lions held a sizeable lead over the Coyotes at the end of the third quarter 55 to 0.

The fourth quarter the Lions continued to show no mercy, scoring two more touchdowns in the game. The Coyotes managed to make a touchdown and get on the scoreboard, but it was too little too late for the Coyotes as the Lions won the game by a just incredible 63 points.

With a mere 54 seconds on the clock in the fourth, Gus Perez intercepted a Coyote pass and ran in a 40-yard touchdown. Skehan's kick for the extra point was good. Later in the quarter the Coyotes scored their one and only touchdown. With 4:43 remaining in the game, Aldo Montes ran in a 2-yard touchdown.

Twenty-two seconds later the Lions scored their final touchdown. With 4:21 remaining, G. L. Bunger ran in a 3-yard touchdown. Skehan's kick for the extra point was good, bringing the final score to Lions 69, Coyotes 6.

Offensively, the Lions rushed a whopping 403 yards on 41 carries. Please see page 6 . . .

## Mail advisory gives safety tips

Crockett County customers of the U. S. Postal Service received cards with a cautionary message from the Postmaster General last week. These cards are being sent across the nation. The advisory results from anthrax contamination of mail on the east coast and outlines conditions which should lead a recipient to be suspicious of a piece of mail. What to do about a suspicious piece of mail is also included.

"Our processing is going on as normal," Ozona Postmaster Melvin Wende said Monday. The volume of mail at the Ozona office continues to be high since the anthrax scare. "I can't tell that there's that much difference. It's a Monday and we're snowed under," Wende said his staff had about 7,000 letters alone to put up Monday. This doesn't include mail requiring special processing such as priority, certified, etc. or packages.

When asked if there is a delivery backlog on mail arriving here, Wende said "I don't see that".

Counter sales of envelopes have been pulled by the Postal Service. It is unknown for how long. Customers can still order personalized envelopes through the post office, however.

Since the anthrax scare there has been a renewed emphasis on following procedures, Wende said. Postal Service personnel look closely to make sure mail is properly addressed and has a return address and is properly packaged.

"Nothing's changed on what's mailable and what's not," Wende said. "It's still the responsibility of the customer to know what they can mail and what they can not."

Last week Postmaster General John F. Potter said "We are taking concrete steps immediately to protect employees and the public through education, investigation, intervention and prevention." This comes after two postal workers died of anthrax, others became ill and anthrax was found on mail sent to the television media and government buildings.

President Bush has released \$175 million to help the mail system, and the postal governing board added \$200 million for emergency spending to help pay for equipment and other measure. High-tech sanitizing equipment similar to that used to sanitize food and medical equipment will use an electron beam to kill bacteria and spores.

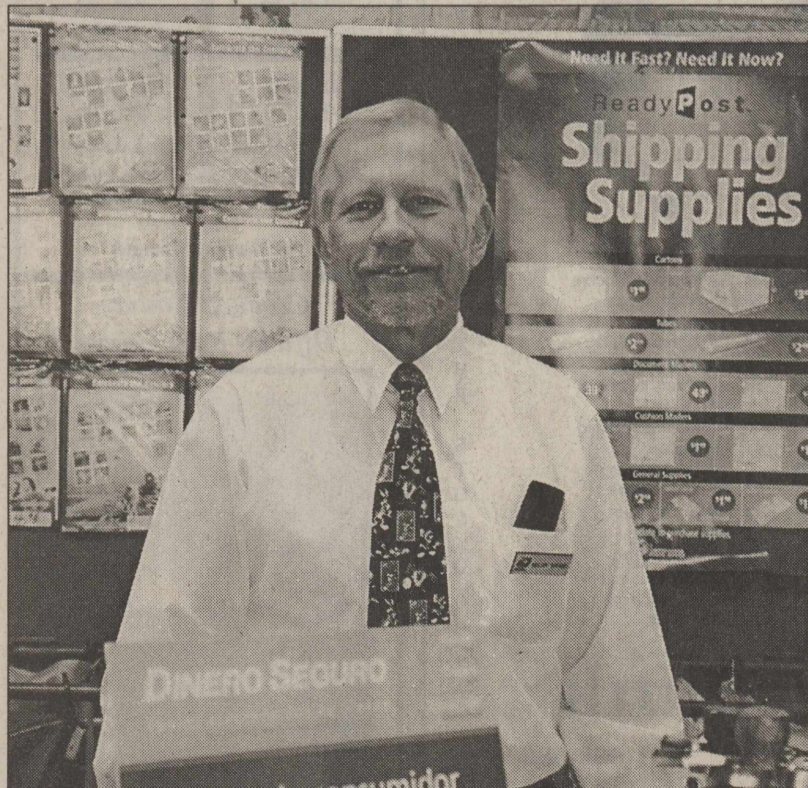

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# A Father's Concern.....

 On Veterans Day we do well to reflect on the war that has been set before us and on those who serve.  
 What follows is a story from a dear friend. His son is a soldier, who has been deployed in the war on terrorism. The words are especially poignant, because they speak for thousands of mothers and fathers and husbands and wives who are today anxiously waiting for word from their loved ones:  
 "It both ends and begins with a phone call.  
 "Hey, Dad...Just got the word that we're moving out, pronto. Like we talked before, it'll be a while before I can call again. I love you. Don't worry about me. Put Mom on for a sec, will you?  
 "It's the end of the waiting for military orders. The end of hope that they don't come. The end of uncertainty about deployment. He's going.  
 "The end is bad, but the begin-

ning is worse. It's the beginning of long months of silence. Long nights of worry. Watch the news. Search the Internet. Wait for the phone to ring...but it doesn't.  
 "He might be in Turkmenistan, or Uzbekistan, or a dozen other countries I didn't know existed before September 11. I knew it might happen. After all, this is what he was trained for. He's a soldier. I know he's proud to do his duty. And I'm proud of him.  
 "I hug my wife and tell her he's going to be okay, but we need something more to cling to. 'Lord give him strength. Lord protect him.' Still, I have to focus. I have to keep on living, despite the hollow numbness in the pit of my stomach.  
 "My boy's gone to war.  
 "I've been there - but I've never been here. I've been the one to go to war, but not the one left behind...to wait...to worry...to wonder. I didn't want this for him.  
 "Only yesterday he was a little kid pleading for me to go outside and play ball. Today he's a man doing his duty, defending his nation.  
 "He's special to me, but really no different from thousands of others. Your sons and daughters, grandsons and granddaughters, friends and neighbors. They're all doing their duty, leaving their homes, leaving their families to fight an enemy who wears no uniform, swears allegiance to no country, and recognizes no rules of war.  
 "America's troops may be gone for weeks, even months or years. Some may never come home, yet all will be with their 'family'.  
 "Not blood relatives - not mom and dad - but with other young men and women with whom they serve in the military uniform of our county. Come what may, none will fail those with whom they serve.  
 "They are today's 'Private Ryans' and 'Band of Brothers'. Their platoons and air wings and ship's companies are their families, their brothers and sisters.  
 "Each has pledged his life and entrusted his safety to the other. All have forged a sacred bond that will last a lifetime, a bond none can understand: except those who share it.  
 "We are praying as a family, because, in a very real sense, every Soldier, Sailor, Marine, Airman and Coast Guardsman is a part of our family. The American Legion family, and we love them all and we're proud of them.  
 "No words are sufficient to describe our national sense of resolve or our collective feelings of concern for those young ones who have gone into Harm's Way on our behalf. Instead let us pray to the God of us all that we gain victory and rejoice in the safe return of our family.  
 "Nonetheless, let us also pray that His will be done, and that He gives us the strength to bear it - be it sorrow or rejoicing.  
 "God has blessed America with much bounty and many free men and women through the years who have risked their lives - and given them - to preserve our liberty and our way of life.  
 "So today let this be our prayer, as in ages past, 'God Bless America'."

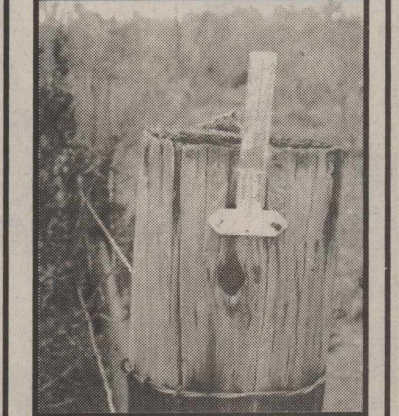

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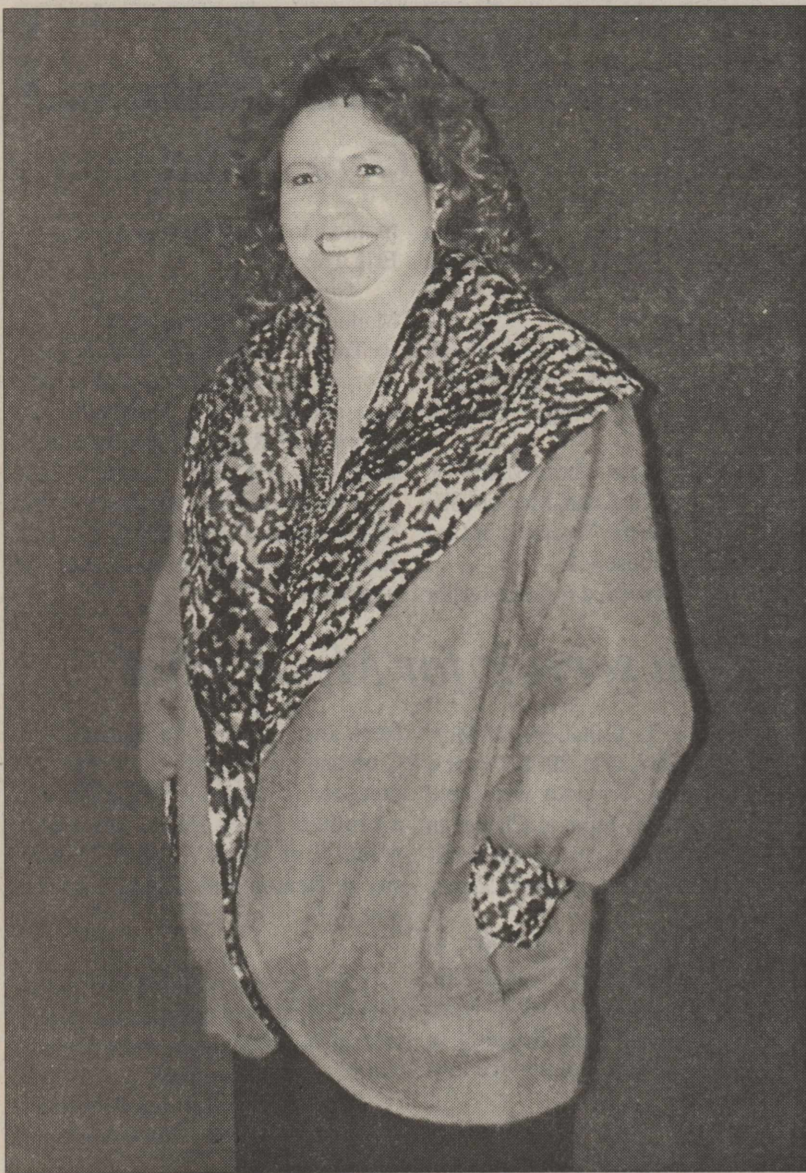

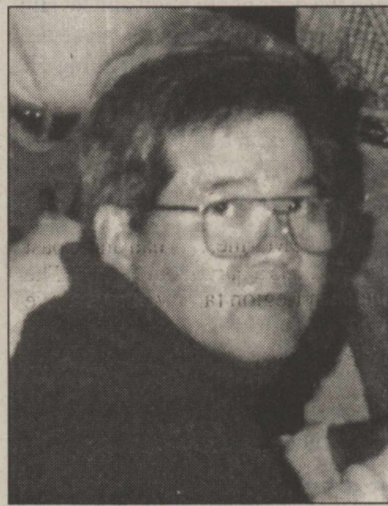
## Friends of the Library to present open house featuring artist Lap Ngo

Everyone is cordially invited to attend an open house at the Crockett County Public Library from 4:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. on Friday, Nov. 9, to meet artist Lap Ngo and to view some of his paintings. The exhibit will be at the library for viewing until the end of December.

Born in Northern Vietnam in 1945, Lap Ngo's love for art began at the early age of six where he spent his childhood roaming freely in the famous islands of his native coastal town of Halong Bay. But, as war and poverty ravaged his country, he and his family were forced to flee first to Southern Vietnam, then to the neighboring countries of Laos and Thailand where he spent his early adult life practicing the basics of drawing and painting.

At the height of the Vietnam War, Mr. Ngo saved enough money from several art exhibits to purchase a one-way ticket to France. He departed from Vientiane, Laos, in 1968, leaving behind his family and the Southeast Asia he loved. In Paris in 1968, he was admitted to the *Ecole Nationale Supérieure des Beaux Arts* and began his studies in painting and engraving.

In 1972, he obtained a Masters Degree in Fine Arts and, for the next three years, continued his studies in print making technique. During his time in Paris, Mr. Ngo participated in and won several prizes in yearly exhibitions at the *Salon des Artistes Français* and the *Salon d'Automne*. It was during his travels to many of Europe's national museums that he first became mesmerized by the translucent serenity of the 14th century Flemish paintings of Jan Van Eyck as well as the detailed work of the Italian Renaissance painters such as Botticelli and Raphael.

Shortly after completing his university studies, Lap Ngo moved to the United States and began teaching art classes for the Northern Virginia Community College from 1975 to 1978.

In 1978, Lap Ngo moved to the western African nation of Niger and began giving private art classes to the international community there. He became the first teacher to introduce wood cutting and etching techniques in his seminars and workshops for Nigerian artists. His success as a

teacher led to a one-man art exhibit for visiting former Vice President of the United States Walter Mondale, his wife, and the accompanying White House staff.

Lap Ngo spent the next 22 years living and traveling throughout North and West Africa in countries such as Cameroon, Guinea, Ivory Coast, Morocco, and Tunisia. He continued to give private art classes to the international communities of each country and held yearly art exhibits sponsored by various institutions including the U.S. Information Agency (USIA), the European Economic Community (EEC), Ernst & Young, and the respective Ministries of Culture and Fine Arts. As a result, he developed an extensive repertoire of art clients in Western Europe, Africa, Southeast Asia, and the United States.

Lap Ngo's paintings have often been described as "versatile yet peaceful and luminescent." His love for details and serene atmosphere in his work can be attributed to his Southeast Asian roots. Working mostly with oils, watercolors, the old European technique of egg tempera on wooden panels and, recently, frescos, his paintings include portraits of nomads and luminous landscapes he encountered in his African travels to very surrealistic compositions inspired by the European masters which he studied during his years in Paris.

Roy and Charlotte Harrell first met Lap Ngo in Niamey, Niger, where both families were serving with the International Agency for Development, an arm of the Department of State. Many years later, they discovered that they had all moved to Texas and renewed their friendship of long standing. Also an avid hunter, Lap Ngo was invited to the Harrell Ranch for hunting, hiking, and visiting. Coming to West Texas for the first time, Lap Ngo became interested in the people and landscapes of our area. Mr. Ngo's recent paintings of West Texas will be the ones primarily featured in his exhibit at the Crockett County Public Library.

Mr. Ngo has recently begun using the new *glicke* method of reproducing his original oil paintings. This method permits him to make a limited number of reproductions which are difficult to discern from the originals but can be sold much more reasonably. Information regarding the sale of his paintings will be available at the library, should anyone be interested in purchasing his work. The Friends of the Library will be given 15 percent of the proceeds of any paintings sold at the library.

Mr. Ngo currently resides in Allen, Texas, with his wife, Peggy, where he continues to work and paint.

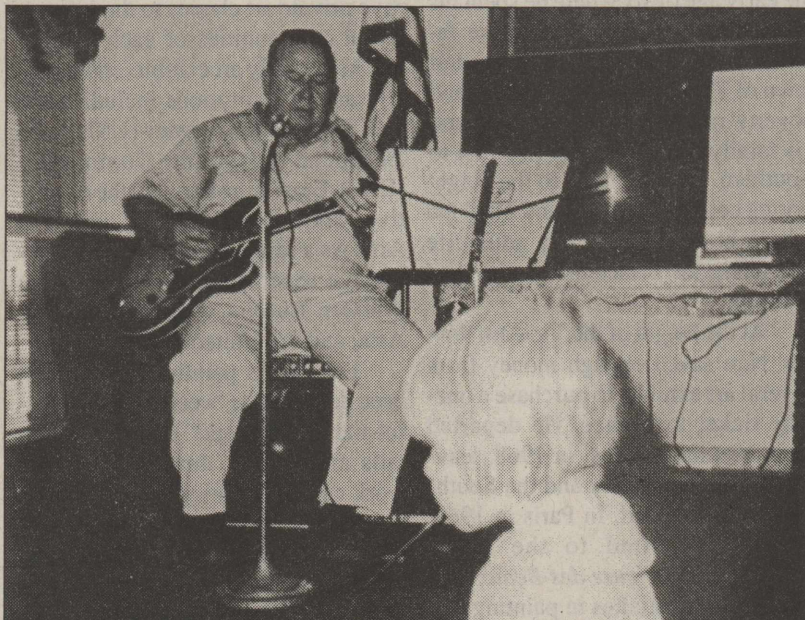
