Mail advisory gives safety tips

"Our processing is going on as certified, etc. or packages. normal," Ozona Postmaster Melvin

Wende said Monday. The volume of mail at the Ozona office continues to be high since the anthrax scare. "I can't tell that there's that much difference. It's a Monday and we're snowed

When asked if there is a delivery backlog on mail arriving here, Wende said "I don't see that".

Counter sales of envelopes have been pulled by the Postal Service. It is unknown for how long. Customers can still order personalized envelopes through the post office, however.

Since the anthrax scare there has been a renewed emphasis on following procedures, Wende said. Postal Service personnel look closely to make sure mail is properly addressed and has a return address and is properly packaged.

'Nothing's changed on what's mailable and what's not," Wende said. "It's still the responsibility of the customer to know what they can mail and what they can not."

Last week Postmaster General John F. Potter said "We are taking concrete steps immediately to protect employees and the public through education, investigation, intervention and prevention." This comes after two postal workers died of anthrax, others became ill and anthrax was found on mail sent to the television media and government buildings.

President Bush has released \$175 million to help the mail system, and the postal governing board added \$200 million for emergency spending to help pay for equipment and other measures. High-tech sanitizing equipment similar to that used to sanitize food and medical equipment will use an electron beam to kill bacteria and spores.

Work continues on water delivery improvement project

Control, the people who are responsible for putting them there. These identifying marks are a preliminary step in replacing, removing or adding fire hydrants.

Approximately 54 fire hydrants, all of the World War II style, will be replaced when this phase of the district's \$3 million improvement project is completed. The old military surplus hydrants are not reparable. Some five hydrants will be removed and not replaced, and seven will be put in new locations to cover areas that have not been well covered. New hydrants cost \$3,000.00 each.

Currently, 14 hydrants cover the downtown intersection. Five hydrants will be removed in this area, and there will still be more than double coverage according to Dee Keilers, district manager.

When the fire hydrant phase of the improvement project is completed, the district will have 75 hydrants, more or less, serving Ozona, Crockett Heights and the businesses past the Heights and at Circle Bar. Crockett Heights has five or six hydrants now that are acceptable, Keilers said. Two new ones will be placed at Circle Bar and two new hydrants will also be installed to serve the businesses west of Circle Bar.

From time to time, as work is being done, water will have to be shut off in various parts of town, Keilers said. First the paving will be cut with a saw and dirt dug out in preparation for changing out hydrants, removing or installing them.

Other phases of the improvement project are moving along. Pipeline from the east hill of town to Circle Bar is in the ground, covered, full of water and ready to be tested. The contractor is working on the pump station on the west hill, and foundations for placement of storage tanks are in place and cured on the west hill and at the entrance of Crockett Heights.

By Dr. David F. Russell


On Veterans Day we do well to reflect on the war that has been set before us and on those who serve.

What follows is a story from a dear friend. His son is a soldier, who has been deployed in the war on terrorism. The words are especially poignant, because they speak for thousands of mothers and fathers and husbands and wives who are today anxiously waiting for word from their

"It both ends and begins with a phone call.

"Hey, Dad...Just got the word that we're moving out, pronto. Like we talked before, it'll be a while before I can call again. I love you. Don't worry about me. Put Mom on for a

"It's the end of the waiting for military orders. The end of hope that they don't come. The end of uncertainty about deployment. He's going. 'The end is bad, but the begin-



ning is worse. It's the beginning of long months of silence. Long nights of worry. Watch the news. Search the Internet. Wait for the phone to ring..but it doesn't.

'He might be in Turkmenistan, or Uzbekistan, or a dozen other countries I didn't know existed before September 11. I knew it might happen. After all, this is what he was trained for. He's a soldier. I know he's proud to do his duty. And I'm proud of him.

'I hug my wife and tell her he's going to be okay, but we need something more to cling to. 'Lord give him strength. Lord protect him.' Still, I have to focus. I have to keep on living, despite the hollow numbress in the pit of my stomach.

'My boy's gone to war. 'I've been there - but I've never

been here. I've been the one to go to war, but not the one left behind ... to wait...to worry...to wonder. I didn't want this for him.

'Only yesterday he was a little kid pleading for me to go outside and play ball. Today he's a man doing his duty, defending his nation.
