To be eligible for this award, a district or campuses within a district has to have a spring, 2001 Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) passing rate of at least 80% of its students passing each TAAS subject area (all students and each student subgroup) and a student dropout rate of less than 3.0%.

Districtwide, 93.2% of the students in grades 3-8 and 10 passed TAAS Reading. Among the analysis subgroups in reading, 90.7% of the district's Hispanic students passed, 97.3% of the district's white students passed, and 89.1% of the district's economically disadvantaged students passed the reading portion of the test. 96.4% of the district's students passed TAAS Mathematics. 

During the meeting the trustees reviewed and discussed the bidding process for the addition and renovation work to the boys fieldhouse at Lions Stadium. Superintendent Larry Taylor told the members that district architect Larry Harvey and Higgins and May, the plumbing, heating, and air-conditioning engineers, were not able to complete the plans to meet the bidding legal requirements, so this item will be done at the board's January, 2002 regular meeting. Taylor also told the board that the addition and renovation work to be done on the boys fieldhouse at Lions Stadium to meet the requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and p.m. the Texas Barriers Division had caused the delay. Projected completion date of the project is June 3, 2002. The members approved a \$21,500.00 bid from Dobbins Roofing and Construction Company in San Angelo for the removal of the old roofs and the installing of new roofs on the main part of the Ozona Primary School, the Ozona High School Homemaking Building, and the classroom part of the Ozona High School Auto Mechanics Building. They also approved the Crockett County CCSD Blood Borne Pathogen Plan as presented by district nurse Karen Huffman and a \$6,500.00 budget amendment for district employee immunizations. Also during the meeting, the board members approved a shared services arrangement agreement with the Menard Special Education Cooperative and a resolution to preserve and protect the rights of students of faith to exercise their constitutional right of voluntary, non-coercive prayer and their constitutionally protected right to express their feelings of faith and patriotism. Also approved was the local school district's administrative plan for the implementation of House Bill 1130. House Bill 1130 was passed by the Texas Legislature and signed by Governor Rick Perry in May of this year. The intent of House Bill 1130 was to ensure that reasonable efforts are made to inform and support educational aides who want to become

House Bill 1130 also broadened eligibility for exemption of tuition and fees for teacher certificate courses. Any school employee who has worked as an educational aide for at least one year out of the past five and meets the financial criteria may apply for tuition exemption. The tuition exemption program is administered by the Division of Student Services at the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board and has been in effect since 1997. The local plan includes making information available to instructional aides and explains what the district is able to do to support employees who want to pursue teacher certification.

During the meeting the board approved the resignation, effective May 31, 2002 and for the purpose of retirement, of Superintendent of Schools ing his eighth year as superintendent of the school district. In January the trustee will be interviewing superintendent search firms for the purpose of selecting a firm to coordinate the new superintendent search process.
