

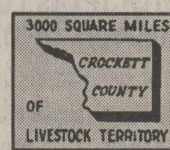

Martinez wins primary election

Rudy Martinez Jr., candidate for Precinct 4 commissioner, won his race in the Democratic Primary, defeating challenger Sandra Perez 145 to 134.

A total of 202 voters turned

out in Precinct 4 with 74 voting early.

The Pct. 4 commissioner post was the only contested race in the county. Other candidates for county offices on the Democratic ballot were: County Judge John R. Jones, District and County Clerk Debbi Puckett-Moore, County Treasurer Burl J. Myers, County Commissioner Pct. 2 Pleas Childress III, Justice of the Peace Pct. 1 James M. Hearne, and County Chairman A. O. Fields.

There were eight voters in the Republican Primary. On the ballot for party chairman was Len Hillman.

Ozona youths take top honors in Houston

Two Crockett County 4-H members took champion and reserve champion fine wool in the junior market lamb show on Feb. 28 at the 2002 Houston Livestock

Show. The champion, shown by Clay Hale, 16, weighed 122 pounds. Clay has shown at Houston for several years, but his high-

est award until this year was a second place in class.

His lamb sold for \$45,000.00 and he received \$10,000.00.

Laurie Hale, Clay's mother, said he has worked hard since last year to prepare for the show.

"We're so proud of him," she said. "I'm still shaking." Clay is the son of Laurie and Ed Hale.

Reserve champion went to 114-pound Big Fred, shown by Murphey Black, 8, also of Ozona.

"I've won with goats and sheep at the Crockett County show, but this is my first time to win at Houston," Murphey said.

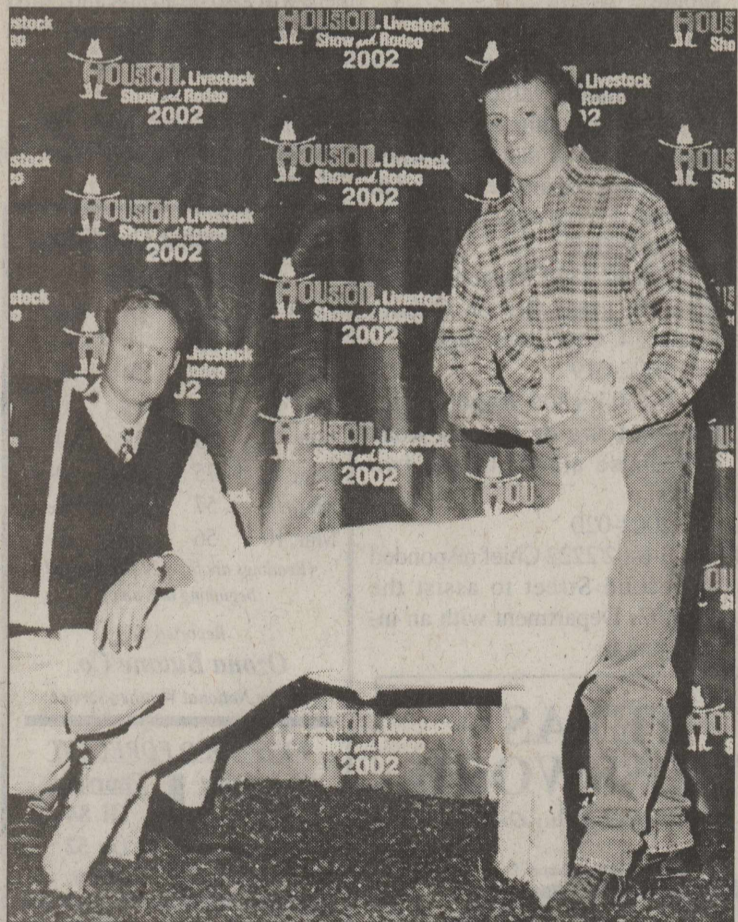
The large crowd that applauded Murphey's win included his proud parents, Vickie and Will M. Black, who had helped him prepare for his first Houston show.

Hale's champion fine wool was bred by former Crockett County Agent Billy Reagor. Fred Chandler was breeder of Black's fine wool lamb.

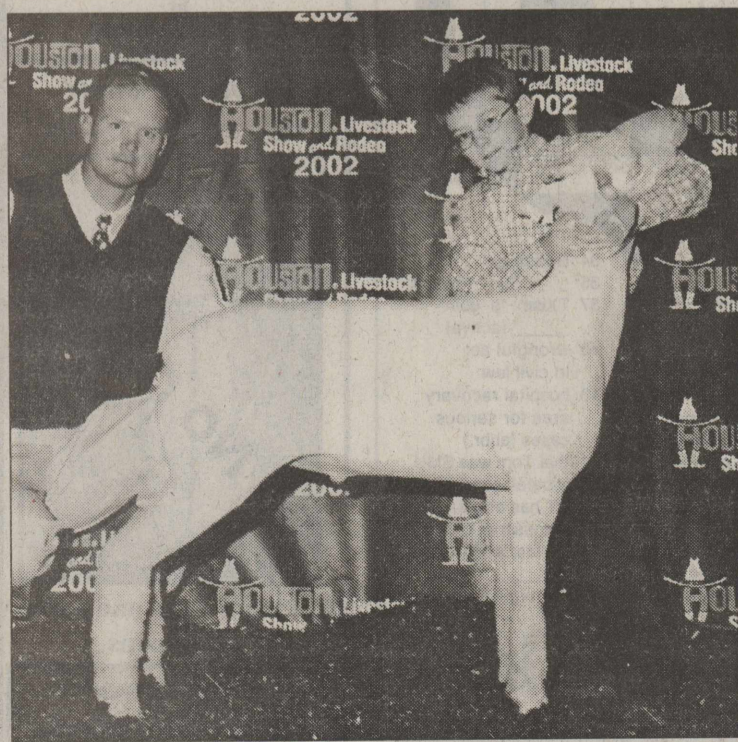
Judge Clint Cummings of Paso Robles, CA, said he looks for animals that "put the most good things together in one package."

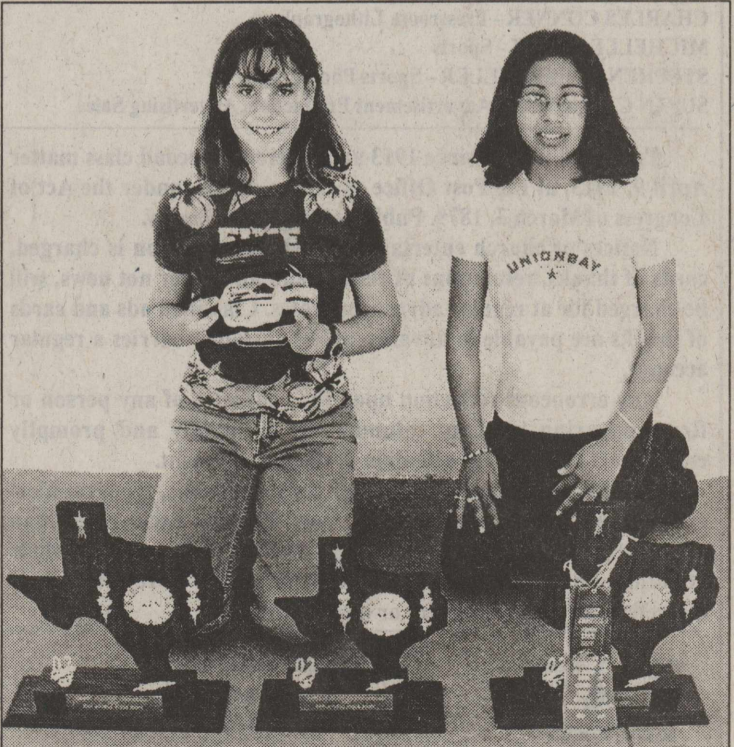

county departments will be advised of a possible May sale. Charles McCleary exercised his option to renew his lease of the airport, and court members voted to renew. The one-year contract can be terminated by either party with a 30-day notice prior to the renewal date.

A discussion on a policy for use of county property for any event resulted in a vote to table action. A draft could be prepared by the next meeting.

The court voted to distribute \$1,500.00 of the \$2,000.00 in the county budget for youth baseball to the younger league. \$500.00 will go to the senior league.

During a report by County Auditor John Stokes, the court discussed the benefits of having an automatic weather system at the airport. Application for grant funds would be made through TxDOT.

Stokes said that the EMS is in the black \$3,000.00 and the care center in the black \$7,500.00 for the January-February accounting period.

Eddie Moore, who is a member of the health services board, told the court that it is difficult to get EMS personnel for daytime calls. All the EMS members work.

Moore said that Dr. Marcus Sims had to make a house call last week for lack of EMS responders. "This is getting serious," Moore commented. Dr. Sims is the medical director and the EMS operates under his license. "It's his neck out there on the line."

During the month of March, the Friends of the Library is happy to present the art of three prominent local artists from the Ozona community. Please stop at the library to see art works by Mary Jo Mason, Dorothy Montgomery and Celia West any time during regular library hours Monday through Friday. To introduce you to our three present exhibitors, some biographical material follows.

Mary Jo Mason has been painting in oils and watercolor since 1957 when she took an art course at North Texas University where she received a B.A. degree in 1964. She seriously began studying art when her son started first grade in 1971. Ms. Mason studied with Wanda Johnson and Bud Biggs in Richardson. Over the years, she has studied in workshops with Ed Whitney, Maurice Shubin, Frank Webb, Mario Cooper and Leo Smith. Most recently, she has studied with Janet Walsh, Joseph Fettingis, Warren Taylor, Stephen Quiller and Mary Barton in workshops. She is currently studying with Cathy McNally Lubke in San Angelo.

Mary Jo paints mostly in watercolor and feels that it is always best to paint what you know and what has meaning to you as an individual. She believes in capturing the essence, the heart and soul of the subject matter she chooses to paint. Impressionism has been

a strong influence in her work and best expresses the style of her painting. She says that she is an impatient painter, thus watercolor suits her perfectly. The excitement of paint mixing on paper and the incredible results never fail to inspire and delight.

Having grown up on a ranch in Crockett County, Mary Jo enjoys painting the surroundings of West Texas. She is a Master Flower Show Judge and also enjoys painting floral subjects. Mary Jo has exhibited her work in Richardson at the Glass Door Gallery, and presently her paintings are being shown at the SonoraArt.com gallery in Sonora. Her work hangs in homes and offices throughout Texas. She has had several individual shows locally and has been in shows in San Angelo with other artists.

Dorothy Montgomery began private art studies at the age of seven with Laura Faulkner in her home town of Fort Worth. She continued to study art, learning the wonderful public school art methods and art appreciation. In her high school art labs, Dorothy explored all types of creativity. She studied life drawing and painting from Sally Gillespie. At Texas Christian University, she studied under Samuel P. Biegler, Professor of Art, while getting her B.S. degree in education.

After college Dorothy married Beecher Montgomery and moved to Ozona where they raised

their family. In Ozona she taught dancing for five years and public school classes for 17 years. She continues to paint and says that art has given her many advantages and much pleasure throughout her life.

Celia West is a native of Spain where she studied at the Escuela de Artes y Oficios Artisticos de la Corona for six years. She specialized in artistic drawing under a famous Spanish artist, Camila Diaz Vd. De Blance, and graduated Sobresaliente (better than A+) before coming to the United States.

Over the years, Ms. West has used various media, including charcoal, oils, pastels and acrylics. Her paintings currently on exhibit at the library are examples of her oils and acrylics. After marrying Wayne West, Celia moved to Ozona and began to paint subjects familiar to West Texas. Locally, she has studied with Susie Schneider of Sonora.

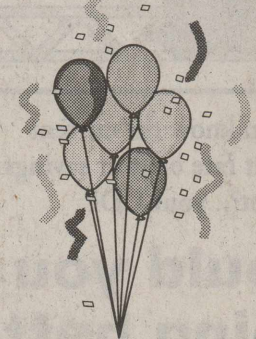

Did you know those soldiers epitomize people like you and me? Our sins put Christ on the cross. In a real sense, we are the ones who pierced Jesus. We are like those soldiers. We too look upon the One whom we have pierced.

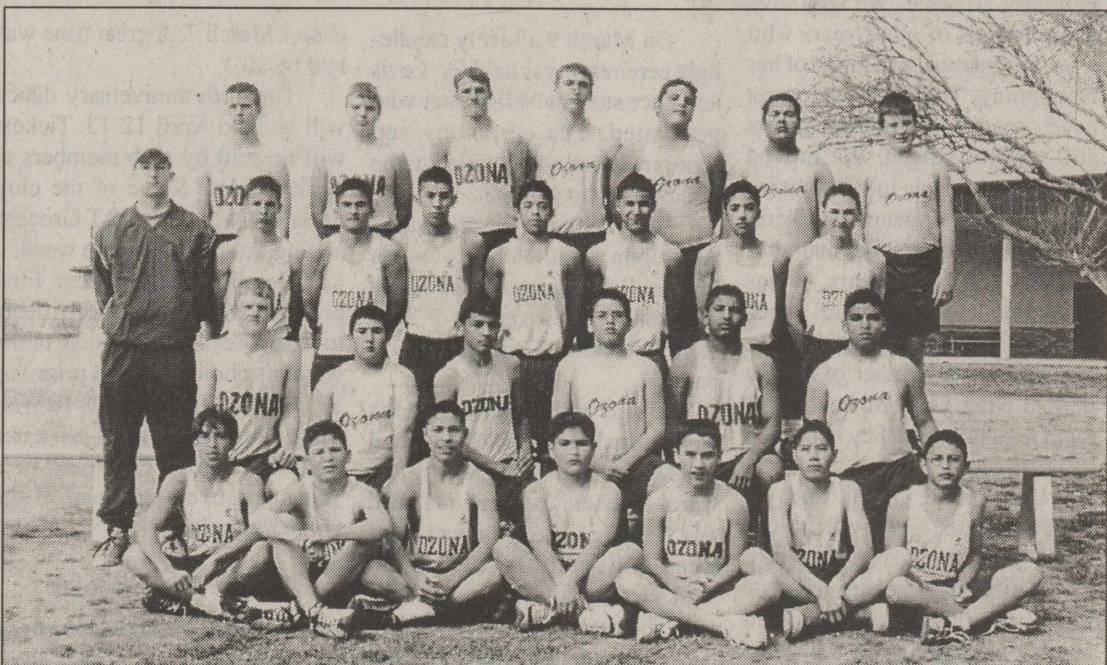
