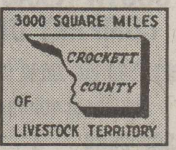

Library updates and changes

The look of the Crockett County Public Library is changing and updating for 2002. After receiving a substantial donation at Christmas, CCPL now has new shelving to complete the expansion and remodeling of the library building, and is completing an automation project begun in 2001.

The Reference Book Collection has been moved into the new expansion adjacent to the public computers. This allows greater access to all the reference materials, from print to electronic, all in one area. After repair and painting by county maintenance crews, rooms in the old section of the li-

brary on the first and second floors now have new shelving and are ready to house additional reference materials and perhaps a new archive of local history materials in the planning stage. New shelving was also added to the Children's Room to allow expansion space for our collection of Accelerated Reader books to supplement the school reading program.

New display panels have been added to the ends of existing shelving units to provide space to display new books and program announcements in the library. New signs and notice boards will

guide patrons to needed books and materials. The look is new, but the aim is greater access and service for our patrons in search of information, art and entertainment at the public library.

Automation is progressing and patrons will soon be able to access the library's card catalog and circulation system through the computer, with the ultimate goal being an online site for access through the Internet. A complete inventory of all library holdings is almost complete, and the new equipment and automation software have arrived and will soon be installed. Patrons will be able to find books and materials quickly and easily, generate reading lists of favorite authors or subjects, locate needed information locally and through the Internet, and much, much more through the automated system. Every patron is urged to fill out a new library card application. New patron library cards will be issued to each person using the library and the new automated system. Children will need parent authorization for checking out books and Internet use. CCPL is participating in the Tex Share Card Program to provide access for all Texas residents to public libraries across the state.

"Come fill out a new library card application and see the great art exhibit on display," invites Louise Ledoux, librarian. "Check out new books and audio cassettes. Join the Friends of the Library and participate in library programs such as the exciting 'Ghost Stories' presented by Docia S. Williams, or the upcoming book sale and second time around sale. Come check out all the updates and changes at your public library."

"This is the way it was"

This interesting story about an airplane is from The Ozona Stockman of May 2, 1929.

Crockett County rancher S. E. Couch, 72-years-old, buys an airplane and employs E. H. (Embery) Hunt to work for him and fly the plane.

Lee Wilson bought a plane in early 1928 and brought Mr. Hunt from Fort Worth to fly his plane. He later learned to fly, and Mr. Hunt went to San Angelo to manage a new municipal airport. He did this until Mr. Couch hired him.

Mr. Couch ordered a \$12,500.00 Ryan closed model monoplane. This is the same plane Lindberg flew across the Atlantic. The story said Mr. Wilson was in

Ozona making arrangements for the construction of a hanger. When it was completed, the plane would be brought here from San Angelo.

I might add that the May 2, 1929, Stockman reported that the Lions Club has ordered the sign, "The Biggest Little Town In The World". The slogan, after two contests, was offered by Lee Wilson, local Buick dealer.

On another note, the Baptists are dedicating the new church Sunday, May 5. Rev. A. J. Carson, brother of Ira Carson and former preacher in Ozona, will preach. They will have a barbecue dinner. The church cost \$40,000.00.

Gutierrez to national conference

Felice (Ms. Fela) Gutierrez was in Washington, DC, March 5-9 as Region 9 representative of the Child Welfare League of America. She is chairperson of the Crockett County Welfare Board.

The conference sessions included such topics as crisis management, use of restraints and seclusion to manage behavior, welfare reform legislation, violence prevention, building positive parenting skills, Indian families and children, the effects of alcohol and other drugs on families served by the child welfare system and child welfare data and research. Other sessions addressed such issues as children with parents in prison and the crisis in the child welfare workforce.

During a day spent on Capitol Hill, conference representatives met with Sen. Kay Bailey

Hutchison and staff representatives of Sen. Phil Gramm "where we introduced some child welfare issues," Mrs. Gutierrez said.

The Child Welfare League of America, the nation's oldest and largest voluntary child welfare organization, is headquartered in Washington, DC, with offices in Baltimore, Boston, Chicago, Denver, Los Angeles and Northern Virginia. CWLA strives to advance national standards of excellence and sound public policies on behalf of the more than two million abused, neglected and otherwise vulnerable children served by its more than 1,200 public and private member agencies.

CWLA conducts research; develops standards of best practice, hosts regional and national conferences; and offers comprehensive, field-based consultation

and professional development activities. CWLA is also the largest publisher of child welfare materials in North America.

"We felt very safe," said Mrs. Gutierrez of the group's stay in Washington. "We were told that Washington is the safest place to be right now because of all the security following September 11."

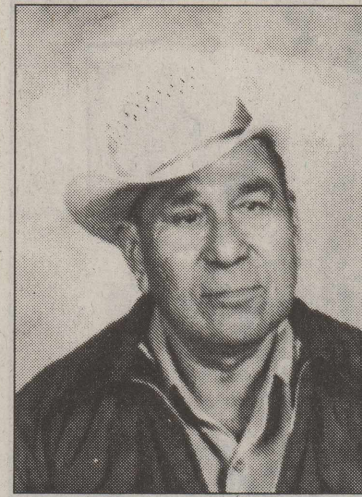

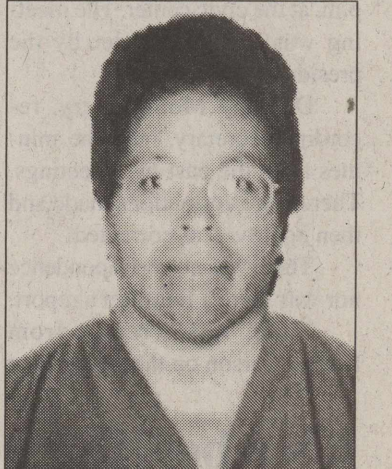

This Easter season let us take time and think about how much God loves us and make sure we don't miss out on it.

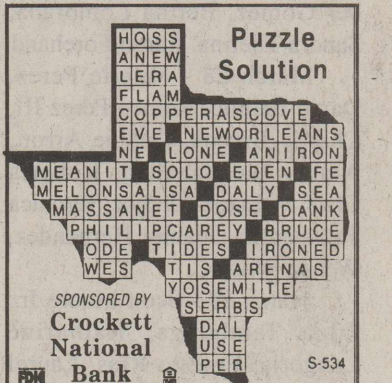

high school fieldhouse renovation project that is taking place at Lions Stadium. District architect Larry Harvey said, "As we have all learned from previous construction projects, when dealing with old structures, be prepared for surprises. With the high school fieldhouse project, we are not only dealing with an old structure, but we are also dealing with moisture and the accelerated decay caused by moisture. During the demolition phase of the project, Master Builders Construction has uncovered a list of items that need corrective work. We have also been able to change the design a little that will save some money for the district."

The majority of the \$20,276.00 change order involves three items: (1) the changing from fiberglass showers to ceramic tile showers matching the original showers and adding floor drains in the showers' drying areas (\$6,974.00); (2) deletion of overhead primary electrical service and providing a much safer underground primary electrical service (\$4,614.00); and (3) demolishing and rebuilding the gang shower plaster ceiling (\$4,378.00).

The trustees also approved the accounting firm of Eckert, Ingram, Tinkler, Oliphant, Featherston and Barr to do the district's 2001-02 school year audit, and they also approved the district's textbook committee report for new textbooks next year.

Prior to adjournment, two board meeting dates were approved. April 16, 2002, at 7:00 p.m. was approved as the date and time for the board's April regular meeting, and March 28, 2002, at 7:00 a.m. was approved as the date and time for a special meeting of the board for the purpose of meeting with the district's superintendent search consultants. If the March 28 date and time is not convenient for the consultants, then the special meeting will be held on April 2 at 7:00 p.m.
