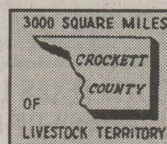

Congress votes to end Federal Death Tax

How often do you hear about someone making history? Well, last week, your Congress did just that. On June 6, 2002, the House of Representatives voted to end one of the most hated and unfair taxes on the books: the death tax. The specific date may fade from our memories, but the changes we made will forever be remembered.

The death tax was a form of double taxation. The government taxes hard-working Americans throughout their lifetimes, and then at the time of death, they are assessed another tax on the value of their property. The last thing a family wants to see after a loved one passes-on is a bill from the Internal Revenue Service.

Bob McCan, a cattle rancher, said it best when speaking about how the death tax would affect him and his family: "Our ranch in Victoria, Texas, has been in my family for five generations, but it would have to be sold if I were to die today just to pay the estate taxes."

And the death tax not only hurts ranchers and farmers, but urban and suburban small businesses. The death tax is wrong in principle. The government makes the death of a loved one a taxable event. Grieving family members are burdened with paying taxes as well as tending to funeral arrangements.

Currently, the death tax affects one-third of all small business owners. Their families are forced to pay rates as high as 55 to 60 percent on the value of their store, farm or ranch. This is immoral.

The death tax really takes a toll on the savings accumulated over a lifetime by farmers, ranchers and small businesses through their hard work. More than 70 percent of all small businesses do not survive into the second generation and even more don't even make it to the third generation.

Those opposed to the repeal of this unfair tax argue it is a tax break targeted to benefit a few wealthy individuals. But working Texans know better. Repeal of the death tax is about a father or grandfather having the ability to pass on to his children or grandchildren the family farm, family ranch, or family store.

I was proud to be a part of this historic vote. An end to the death tax will bring new life to the American Dream. It will mean that hard work and success are no longer penalized, but are rewarded. It is the right thing for America and Americans.

New trees for Civic Center

Commissioners agreed Monday to remove damaged trees at Crockett County Civic Center and replant. New soil will be placed in the yard at the center. No decision was made as to type of tree. A sprinkler system is to be put in place before new trees are placed.

A list of surplus items to be put in the Lions Club auction was approved by vote to the court. The

auction is scheduled for June 29 at the 4-H Barn.

Eddie Moore, roads and parks superintendent, reported that the county is replacing lights bought by the Crockett County Fair Association for the rodeo arena. A change in the type of light is allowing a reduction from 48 to 20 lights, Moore said.

Court members voted to ad-

vertise for fuel bids, approve a contract with the Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services, and approve a resolution for final acceptance of the 2001 TCDP sewer line improvements. They also voted to appoint Johnnie Perkins to the health services board to replace Eddie Moore.

Janet Hill-McDaniel spoke with commissioners about her pending retirement. She hopes to retire as supervisor of Helping Hands at Ozona Senior Center in July if a replacement is found. Commissioners agreed to leave

the salary at its present rate of \$16,200.00 plus benefits.

Mrs. McDaniel said she puts in approximately 200 hours per month including a lot of night work. The job requires 30 hours of continuing education per two years and annual attendance at a 4-day state joint conference.

In her report, Mrs. McDaniel said Helping Hands served 1,502 meals in May.

Commissioners were given for review an emergency management plan drawn up by coordina-

hours of training. Among the 33 subjects studied were the Texas Penal Code, strategies of defense,

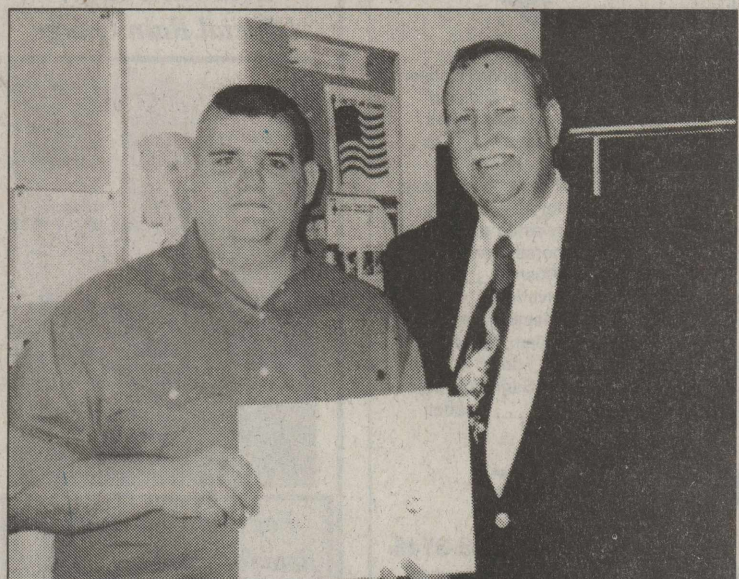
drugs and criminal investigations.

Ozona jury gives Big Lake child molester life in prison

On Thursday, June 6, an Ozona jury of eight men and four women sentenced a Big Lake man to life in prison. The jury found Jimmy Lee Pinson guilty of aggravated sexual assault of a child. The jury heard evidence that Pinson molested a 7-year-old Big Lake boy in 1999.

The case was tried in Ozona on a change of venue from Big Lake and lasted two weeks. Pinson was represented by Abner Burnett of Odessa.

The jury took almost four hours to find Pinson guilty and three hours to sentence him to the

maximum prison sentence for this crime. Aggravated sexual assault of a child is a first degree felony. The punishment range for a first degree felony is five to 99 years or life in prison. A maximum fine of \$10,000.00 can also be assessed. During the guilt-innocence phase of the trial, the prosecution presented testimony of the child victim, his mother and law enforcement officers from several local and state agencies.

The Reagan County Sheriff's Department conducted the invest-

Crockett County History

"This is the way it was"

Hope you like the story this week. It's a little different.

In 1933, rancher Pon Seahorn was taken to a San Angelo hospital where it was discovered that he had a ruptured appendix. They operated and he was very ill. Then he developed goat fever. This was all too much. He was buried in Ozona at a tremendous funeral.

Mr. Seahorn was born in Hot Springs, Arkansas, Dec. 14, 1876. The family moved to the Indian Territory, now Oklahoma, when he was a small boy. His parents operated a stock farm on Cowskin Prairie near Vinita, OK.

He worked on a ranch in Oklahoma when a young man, Will Rogers, the famous humorist, worked on a neighboring ranch at the time. The two men visited at that time.

Pon Seahorn came to Crockett County in November of 1900 at the age of 24 to visit J. O. Secrest, his former employer in Oklahoma. He got a job on the J. S. Todd Ranch and homesteaded three sections of land on the ranch. July 12, 1907, he married Miss Maggie Friend, daughter of the late J. W. Friend. He sold the three

sections, and they moved to the J. W. Friend Ranch. In 1917, Joe and Batts Friend, young nephews of Mrs. Seahorn, came to live with them. That same year, a son, Bill, was born to the Seahorns, and later a daughter, Maggie Burns Seahorn.

The four children were raised as one family with the same loving care.

Mr. Seahorn was active in civic affairs.

SPC professor has study guide/manual published

Dr. Laura Graves, former Ozona resident and associate professor of history and government at South Plains College in Levelland, has completed a student study guide and instructors' manual for a new American history textbook. The works have been published by Prentice Hall, the nation's leading publisher of academic and reference textbooks and technology.

She wrote the companion materials for one of the first American history textbooks to be published in a number of years, "Making a Nation: The United States and Its People." The book will be available to students this fall. She outlined the chapters,

provided study questions, lecture ideas and tips on how to use the material.

Dr. Graves also completed a guide on correlating three textbooks for teaching about Texas in American history. She provided topical outlines, websites for research areas and instructors' resources for each subject area, so teachers can weave in examples of Texas history into an American history lesson. As a result of her work on the study guides, she has been asked to submit a proposal for an American Indian history textbook. She would serve as senior author on the project.

Dr. Graves is the daughter of the late Jocelyn and Lee Graves.

Colorado City hosts fly in

The annual July 4th Fly In will be held in Colorado City at the municipal airport. Started in 1962, this will be the 40th anniversary. For several years, the City National Bank has been cooking and serving a breakfast of bacon, eggs, Texas toast, coffee, juice and cantaloupe. The breakfast is \$3.00 and is free to Fly Ins. Breakfast starts at 7:00 a.m. and is generally over by 9:30.

The popular aviation writer and author, Nancy Robinson Masters, will be the mistress of ceremonies and will present awards in five categories at 9:00 a.m. The youngest pilot award is never younger than 15, and the oldest pilot has been 88. The oldest aircraft was a 1937 Grumman Goose, and the most unusual aircraft has been various warbirds and homebuilts. The longest distance recorded is Fairbanks, AK.

The greatest number of aircraft flying in is 105. Usually about 95 show up, consisting of mostly general aviation types with a few warbirds, several homebuilts, and occasionally a sailplane, amphibian or helicopter.

The Air Force C130 has attended five times over the years, and last year featured two army helicopters including the twin-rotor Chinook.

After a lapse of a couple of years, skydiving exhibitions have resumed with the Stanton Skydivers. They made two jumps last year and will make at least two this year.

There is no admission charge.

Dietary produced \$6,186.00 in meal sales for May. Meal revenue and low operating cost resulted in \$7,532.00 operating income for dietary. The financial report reflects a total facility net operating income of \$16,832.00 for May and \$100,614.00 year to date.

The new front office lacks approximately one week to be complete.

A report from EMS showed 19 runs for May. There were 18 patients with 10 transfers.

Fathers and Families?

What is Father's Day? It is a day in which you can honor your dad or the dad in your household in special ways. Most dads receive a tie or another gift as a way of saying, "Thanks for just being you."

But why should Father's day be only one day a year? Shouldn't families always be about the business of honoring the moms and dads in their midst? At least God would have it so. He gives familiar instruction in the Bible in the form of what we traditionally call the Fifth Commandment. "Honor your father and your mother, that your days may be prolonged in the land which the Lord your God gives you" (Exodus 20:12). The New Testament of the Bible picks up this same theme. "Honor your father and mother (which is the first commandment with a promise)" (Ephesians 6:2).

And what is the promise? The old Westminster Shorter Catechism says this "is a promise of long life and prosperity (as far as it shall serve for God's glory and their own good) to all such as keep this commandment." On the negative side, the breakdown of families and large teenage suicide rates argue in favor of keeping the Fifth Commandment. On the positive side, Father's Day is an annual reminder of the Fifth Commandment and the promise attached to it. If you find you can't cope, the power is at hand. It is not in your hand. It is in the hands of Christ. Turn to Him.

Crockett County unemployment drops from 3.7% to 3.6%

Unemployment in Crockett County dropped from February's 3.7% to 3.6% in March according to a report released by the Texas Workforce Commission (TWC). The report showed a labor force of 1,785 with 1,721 employed and 64 unemployed here in March.

Across the state, the seasonally adjusted unemployment rate remained unchanged in March from a revised February rate of 5.8%.

"Texas' seasonally adjusted unemployment rate appears to be leveling off after significant gains over the past year," said TWC Chair Diane Rath. "This, combined with continued job growth, is an encouraging sign for the Texas labor market."

March saw a slight gain of 1,900 nonfarm jobs in Texas, though the state sustained a loss of 3,300 jobs in the manufacturing industry.

"I'm certainly pleased with the growth in retail trade and government," said Commissioner Representing Employers Ron Lehman. "However, the loss of 1,000 jobs in mining and 900 jobs in services is an indication that some sluggishness remains in the current Texas economy."

An expected tax abatement agreement with Cielo Wind Power was not completed by the firm in time for review Monday.

The court discussed the need for extreme caution in the use of fireworks and in outdoor burning this summer.

In his monthly report, Sheriff Shane Fenton said there were 65 calls to 911 in May with 62 of these being actual emergencies. 911 calls in April numbered 24 with 21 actual emergencies.

There were 357 calls for service in April and 408 in May. Each month saw 35 persons placed in jail.

Constable Raymond Borrego assisted the sheriff's office with 20 calls in April and 18 in May.

The constable made 22 traffic stops for speeding in April. Four were issued written warnings and 18 were issued citations. In May, 17 persons were stopped for speeding. Three were issued written warnings and 14 were issued citations.

He served three citations for the sheriff's office and posted two citations for the county/district clerk's office in April and served four citations in May for the sheriff's office.

Joyce Young reported that 2095 people used the civic center in May. There were 38 functions there during the month.

entered the Novitiate of the Missionary Oblates of Mary in Korbeck-Loo, Belgium on Sept. 8, 1946. After one year at the Novitiate, Father Henry went to Gijzegem, a town in Belgium, where he studied two years of philosophy and two years of theology. In August of 1951, he left by boat from Le Havre, France, crossed the Atlantic Ocean and arrived in New Orleans, LA, where an Oblate Priest met him. After a few days in New Orleans, Father Henry went by train to San Antonio where he finished his last two years of theology.

He was ordained a priest on June 8, 1952, in San Antonio by Bishop Mongeau. Father Henry was a Missionary Oblate of Mary Immaculate. In 1953, he spent one year in San Antonio taking care of a mission called San Juan de los Lagos, which is now a big parish. From 1954 to 1956, Father Henry was in Roma where he took care of the many little missions in Starr County. In 1960, he became pastor of Menard and three affiliated churches: Eden, Junction and Fort McKavett. He stayed there until Jan. 5, 1967.

Father Henry was then sent to Holy Family parish in La Grulla in Starr County, where he stayed 18 months. On Sept. 6, 1968, he became pastor of Our Lady of Refuge in Eagle Pass where he stayed for 11 years. On June 10, 1979, he became pastor of San Juan de Los Lagos parish in San Antonio and remained there four years. Then on January 3, 1983, Father Henry was sent to San Benito where he pastored for three years at Saint Theresa parish and then seven years at St. Benedict parish.

From June 1992 until January 1994, Father Henry took a Sabbatical leave, recuperated from a knee operation and took care of Sacred Heart Church in Del Rio while the pastor was on vacation and also spent some time in Austin with young people preparing to enter the seminary.

In January of 1994, he became pastor of Immaculate Heart of Mary Church in Sweetwater and its mission, St. Albert Church in Roscoe. Finally, on Aug. 1, 1997, Father Henry became pastor of OLPH in Ozona and its mission, Good Shepherd Church in Sheffield where he is still the pastor.

tigation, which began in October 1999. Others assisting in the investigation included Texas Ranger Brooks Long, Richard Dickson of the Texas Department of Public Safety and D. A. investigator James Quintana. Friends for Hope, the Big Lake victim's advocacy organization, provided support and other services for the victims and their families throughout the case and during the trial.

"This verdict shows that the people of Ozona and West Texas will not tolerate child molesters," said Shannon Flanigan, lead prosecutor. "Our office will aggressively prosecute these offenders, like we did in this case, because we know our juries will give the maximum allowable punishment."

"We truly appreciate the hard work and cooperation between the law enforcement agencies and officers, Friends for Hope, the victim and his family, and the punishment witnesses and their families," stated Laurie English, who assisted Flanigan with the prosecution.

Ori White, District Attorney, said, "Sex crimes against children are the most egregious crimes we prosecute. The Pinson verdict represents justice for our children. I would like to thank everyone involved and commend them for a job well done. We could not have effectively prosecuted this case without all these organizations and individuals assisting our office in the investigation, victim support and prosecution."

"By adding one can of soda daily to your otherwise healthy regimen, you could theoretically gain 15 pounds in a year's time," says Carson.

The average 12-ounce can of soda contains 150 calories. Americans are consuming twice as much soda as they did 25 years ago, and as the serving sizes of soda containers continue to increase, so will the number of calories.

Caffeine-free diet sodas, vegetable juices and sugarless iced teas are healthy alternatives to calorie-laden sodas."

"Water with a bit of lemon is also a great choice," Carson says.

Facts about smoking: Myths and realities

Research studies have indicated that cigarette smoking is a primary "risk factor" for several major chronic diseases including lung cancer; coronary heart disease, emphysema and bronchitis. Ninety percent of all cases of lung cancer occur in people who smoke cigarettes. There is no cure for lung cancer, and 90 to 95% of lung cancer victims die within five years.

Heart disease is the biggest killer in the United States. Research studies have indicated that every cigarette a person smokes takes about six minutes off his/her life. Cigarettes are dangerous because they contain or produce poisonous substances like tar, nicotine and carbon monoxide.

Tar is the common name for a mixture of substances that is produced as the tobacco burns and has been found to cause or promote lung cancer. Nicotine is an oily compound which can kill instantly in pure form. An injection of one drop 70mg. will kill an average size man within a few minutes. Most cigarettes, however, contain somewhere between .2mg. and 2.2mg.

Carbon monoxide is another deadly poison found in cigarette smoke, which decreases the ability of the blood to furnish the body with the necessary amount of oxy-

gen. According to national survey data, half of the current cigarette smokers have tried unsuccessfully to quit smoking. People who are heavy smokers (30 cigarettes or more per day) generally find it difficult to quit smoking, because they have become both psychologically dependent and physically addicted to cigarettes.

Sixty-eight percent of American adolescents perceive great risk associated with smoking cigarettes. Only 5% of daily smokers think that they will be smoking five years from now. However, according to research, nearly 75% of these daily smokers find that they are unable to break the habit. Of the current 1/2-a-pack smokers in high school: 95% have used an illicit drug, 81% have used an illicit drug other than marijuana. Seventy-two percent of the students report that their close friends would disapprove if they smoked a pack of cigarettes each day.

Of those who report daily smoking by senior year, 40% began smoking by eighth grade. Of those seniors with a "A" average, only 7% are current daily smokers, while 47% of those with a "D" average are current daily smokers. For cigarette use, 70% of high school seniors, 74% of tenth graders and 78% of eighth graders reported that they disapproved of smoking one or more packs of cigarettes per day. Sixty-eight percent of twelfth graders, 59% of tenth graders and 51% of eighth graders perceive regular smoking to be a significant health risk.

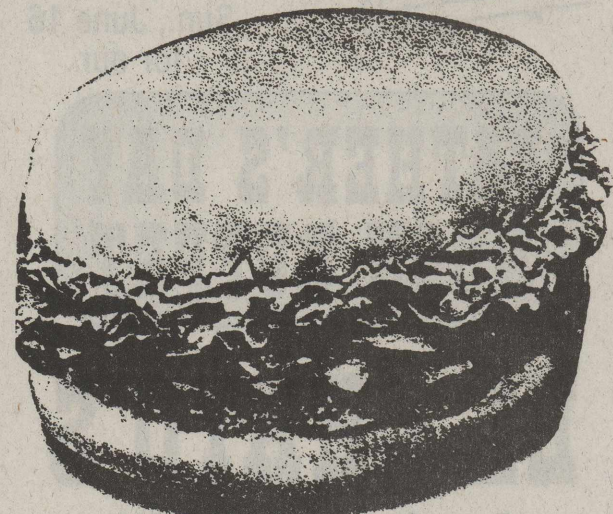

Texas monthly oil and gas statistics

The Texas Railroad Commission issued a total of 819 original drilling permits in April 2002 compared to 1,080 in April 2001. The April total included 634 permits to drill new oil and gas wells, 26 to re-enter existing well bores, and 159 for re-completions. Permits issued in April 2002 included 177 oil, 299 gas, 316 oil and gas, 15 injection, one service and 11 other permits.

Texas preliminary March 2002 crude oil production averaged 970,738 barrels daily, down from the 1,033,587 barrels daily average of March 2001.

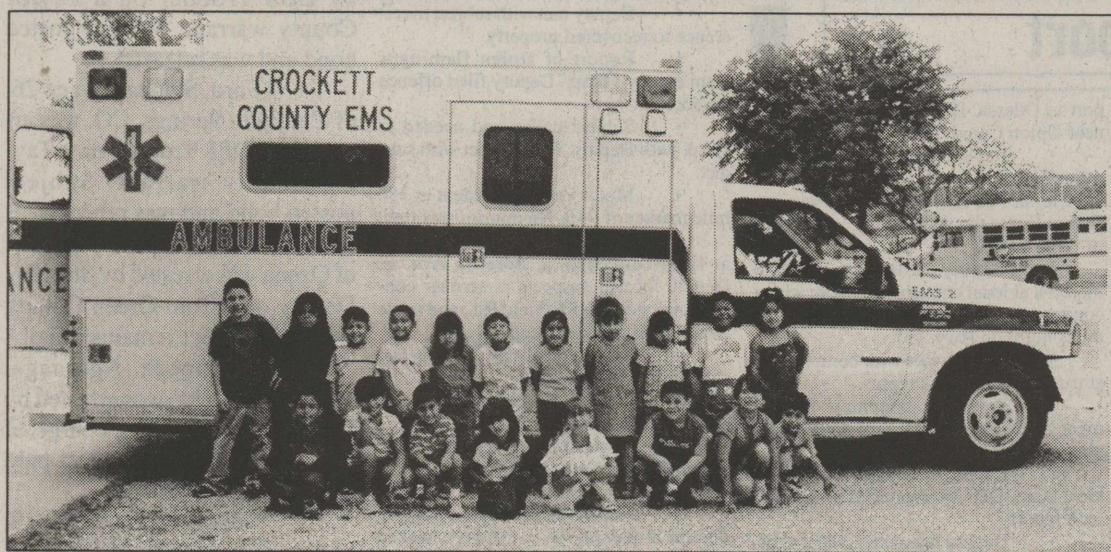
The preliminary Texas crude oil production figure for March 2002 is 30,092,883 barrels, a decrease from 32,041,192 barrels reported during March 2001.

In April 2002, operators reported 336 oil, 506 gas, 47 injection, and two other completions, compared to 243 oil, 471 gas, 12 injection and five other completions during April 2001.

Total well completions for 2002 year to date are 3,459 up from 2,886 recorded during the same period in 2001.

Texas oil and gas wells produced 440,349,144 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas based upon preliminary production figures for March 2002, down from the March 2001 preliminary gas production total of 450,226,708 Mcf. Texas production in February 2002 came from 144,270 oil and 57,400 gas wells.

Crockett County preliminary production in March was 9,851,676 Mcf, placing the county ninth in the state.
