Senate kills Death Tax Repeal bill

The Gramm-Ky1 amendment for permanent estate-tax repeal did not receive the 60 votes necessary for final passage in the Sen-

While the vote is disappointing, it was important to educate and keep this issue in front of members of Congress so that they know that family-business owners believe permanent repeal is critically important for estate tax planning purposes. It is also important to remember that substantial progress has been made over the

Forty-one Democratic Senators voted against the bill. Among them were Tom Daschle (S.D.), Hillary Clinton (N.Y.), John Rockefeller (W.Va.), and Edward Kennedy (Mass.).

Two Republican Senators, Lincoln Chafee (R.I.) and John McCain (Ariz.) voted against the bill. Mike Crapo (Idaho) and Jesse Helms (N.C.) did not vote.

Democrats voting for the bill were Evan Bayh (Ind.), Ben Nelson (Neb.), Bill Nelson (Fla.), Max Baucus (Mont.), Max Cleland (Ga.), Blanche Lincoln (Ark.), Zell Miller (Ga.), Ron Wyden (Ore.), and Mary Landrieu (La.).

Quail is mother to three baby chicks on Jake Young Ranch

A quail who is mothering three baby chicks was the unusual discovery made recently by Jake Young on his ranch east of town. The strange combination was sighted in a pasture near the ranch house, Mr. Young said.







Maria de Jesus died at Agreda on May 24, 1665. Her story was published in Spain several years after her death. Sister Maria said her last projection to the New World was in 1631 but she was long remembered in Texas. A missionary working with the Tejas Indians said he heard the legend as late as 1690. In the 1840s a mysterious woman in blue was reported to have traveled the Sabine River valley giving aid to malaria victims, and her apparitions have been reported as recently as World War II.



Representative Henry Bonilla votes against tax increases WASHINGTON, D.C. - A long-time advocate of lower taxes, Representative Henry Bonilla voted

Bonilla's vote supported amending the U.S. Constitution's tax language. The resolution would have required that any bill calling for a tax increase must receive approval by two-thirds of the Congress. This mean that more than 290 out of 435 members of Congress must vote for any bill calling for a tax increase. Unfortunately, the legislation failed by a vote of 227 to 178.

"Today's vote was about making it as hard as possible to raise taxes. I'm disappointed it didn't pass. But those of us who voted for the bill made a statement. We will not stand by and let the DC bureaucrats raise taxes on the people in the heart-land," said Bonilla.

The tax-increase resolution did allow for important exceptions. For example, Congress could waive the super-majority requirement in a time of war. This exception protects against any serious threat to

Today's resolution was based on a change that was adopted in 1995, in conjunction with the Contract with America. The change required that an increase in the income tax rate be approved by a three-fifths vote in the House of Representatives. The new proposal would have increased the vote from three-fifths approval to two-thirds approval.

"The tax burden on working Americans is already too steep. Requiring two-thirds of representatives 14-19 Division - 1 Katheryn and senators to vote on tax law changes makes Congress more fiscally responsible. That's good news for every hard-working, tax-paying American," said Bonilla. Bonilla played an active role in passing President George W. Bush's 2001 tax-cut package, "The

people of America worked hard to earn their money. I'm determined to make sure they get to keep more of what they deserve," said Bonilla.

Bonilla has represented the 23rd Congressional district since his first election in 1992. He is chairman of the powerful Agriculture Appropriations Subcommittee and a member of the Foreign Operations and Defense Appropriations Subcommittees.
