



And I will put my spirit within you" (Ezekiel 36:26 & 27). Here is the answer to human sin: new hearts given by God which desire to follow him; and the gift of God's Holy Spirit giving the power to follow God! How about you? Do you need a change of heart? Do you need new power to follow God? Then you need to talk to God about it!
