By Dr. Dennis J. Prutow You've heard this saying, "There is nothing as certain as death and taxes." We make this comparison to show that just as it is impossible to escape death so we will always have to pay taxes of some sort.

But there is something else just as inevitable as death and taxes. The Bible puts it this way. "It is appointed for man to die once and after this comes judgment" Hebrews 9:27.

Yes, physical death comes just once to every person. The Bible knows nothing of reincarnation. There will be no second or third or fourth life in this world. Why? Because death is followed by judgment. "For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ that each one may be recompensed for his deeds in the body according to what he has done whether good or bad" 2 Corinthians 5:10.

You see, you will be judged according to what you have done in and with your life. The standard of judgment will be the righteousness and holiness of God. If your life has not measured up to the high standard of God's holiness, strict judgment will be pronounced against you and the fact is no human being has ever met God's standard for holiness. 

"This experience has given me a greater respect for the pros because they have to play on grass, and it is a pain," said Albers.



They took time out to see the tourist sights of London including Big Ben, Parliament, the changing of the Guard at Buckingham Palace and the Tower of London. Other sightseeing on the tour included the viewing the Scottish Crown Jewels and visiting Statford Upon Avon, England, the birthplace of Shakespeare.

The team traveled to Edinburgh, Scotland, to compete in the Scottish Junior International Open, which is the biggest junior tournament held in Scotland. In singles, Albers made it to the second round and

The surfaces in the different tournaments varied. "I got to play on artificial grass, grass, asphalt, artificial grass topped with sand and clay courts. Sometimes we had to switch between surfaces in the same tournament," said Albers.

The world's political environment did not seem affect how the American touring team players were treated. "They were pretty laid back in Scotland, even though their accents were hard to understand," said Albers. "In England they were pretty rude when you asked them to repeat themselves," said Albers. "I also noticed that the people were thinner there, probably because everyone walks everywhere. Asking a taxi driver to take you a half mile draws a blank stare or a rude comment about wasting their time when it's right up there."
