To attain Academically Exemplary, Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) results in each district or campus have to show at least 90% of the district or campus students and student analysis subgroups (African American, Hispanic, White, and Economically Disadvantaged) passed each subject area (reading, writing, and mathematics) on the 2002 TAAS. Texas Education Agency data also has to show a 2000-01 school year student dropout rate of 100 or less.

In Ozona High School, 95% of the students who took TAAS Reading passed (90.3% Hispanic, and 100% White), 93.3% of the students who took TAAS Mathematics passed (90.3% Hispanic and 96.6% White), and 91.5% of the students who took TAAS Writing passed (90.0% Hispanic and 93.1% White) the state exam. Economically disadvantaged students were not analyzed by T.E.A. due to the fact that there were less than 30 students in this group.

In Ozona Intermediate School, 95.3% of the students who took TAAS Reading passed (92.9% Hispanic, 100% White, and 93.1% Economically Disadvantaged), 99.3% of the students who took TAAS Mathematics
