

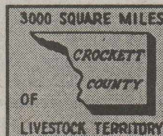

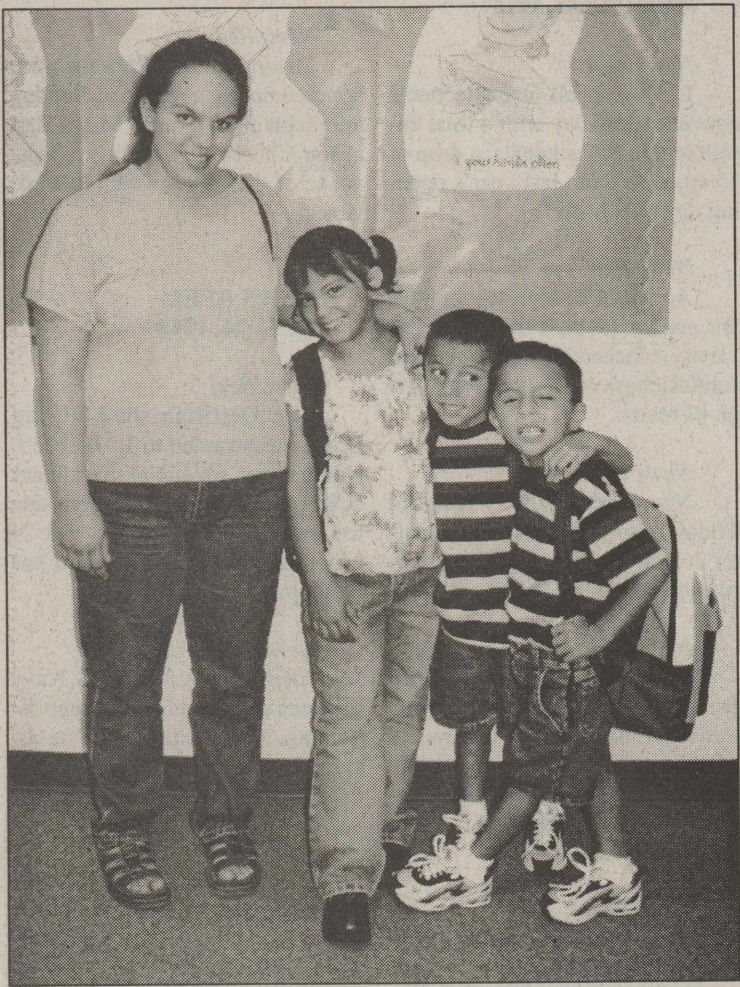

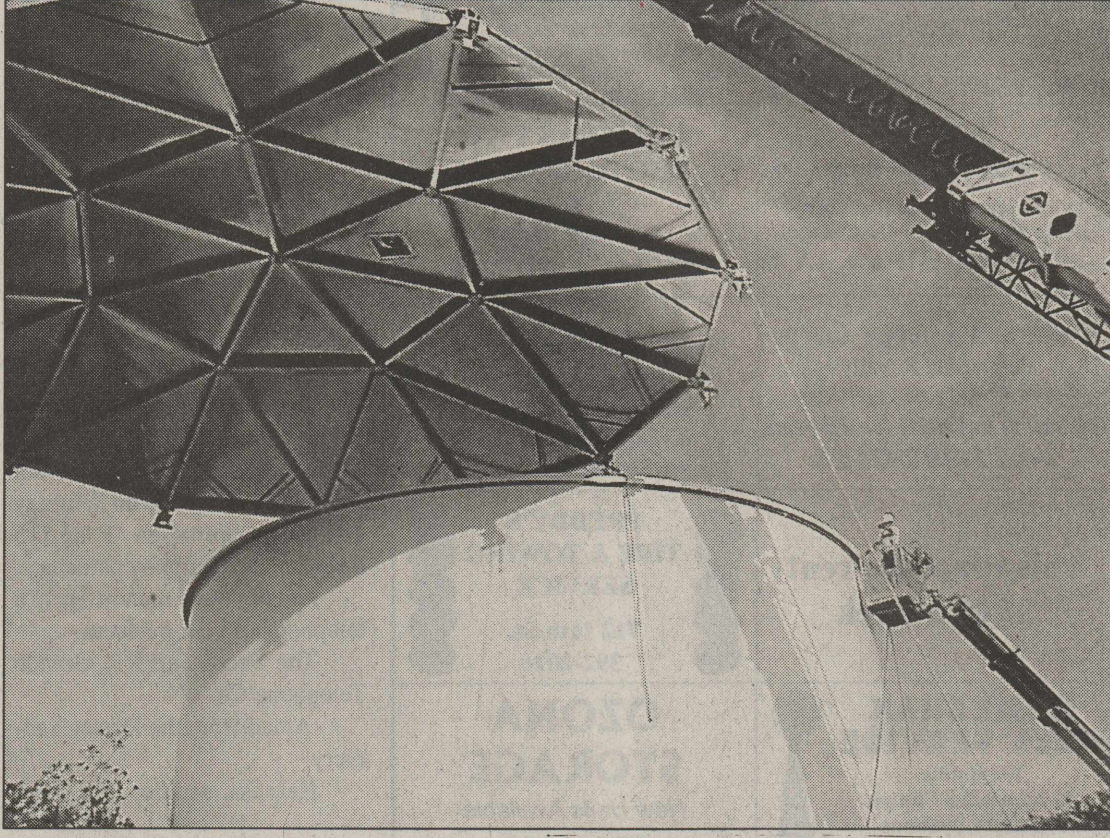
4-H record books place at state

Crockett County 4-H'ers placed five record books at the state judging Aug. 5-6 at the Texas 4-H Center in Brownwood.

Results, including placing and category entered, are: Kathryn Walston, fourth place, horse; Katie Parker, ninth place, leadership; Katie Churchill, second place, personal development/leadership open; Jake Stewart, eleventh place, shooting sports; and Andrew Birkenfeld, fifth place, veterinary science.

Wendy Scott, County Extension Agent - Family and Consumer Sciences, said, "Record books are a result of many hours of hard work. The work is not only spent on the records that have been put together, but also on the projects and activities members are involved in through their entire 4-H careers."

Record books are completed once a year and are a culmination of one's 4-H activities. They include a 4-H story and photo portfolio and report forms listing various projects. Seniors must also complete a resume.

Three Ozona schools T.E.A. rated Academically Exemplary

During their regular monthly meeting that was held on Wednesday, August 14, members of the Ozona School Board were presented with a report prepared by the Texas Education Agency on the local school district and campus accountability accreditation ratings. The report notified the school district that three of its four campuses had achieved T.E.A.'s highest rating, "Academically Exemplary", based on student results from this past school year. The campuses are: Ozona High School; Ozona Intermediate School; and, Ozona Primary School, which is paired with Ozona Intermediate School for the purpose of accountability. Ozona Middle School narrowly missed capturing the Academically Exemplary rating and was awarded, for the fifth year in a row, T.E.A.'s second highest honor, "Academically Recognized".

To attain Academically Exemplary, Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) results in each district or campus have to show at least 90% of the district or campus students and student analysis subgroups (African American, Hispanic, White, and Economically Disadvantaged) passed each subject area (reading, writing, and mathematics) on the 2002 TAAS. Texas Education Agency data also has to show a 2000-01 school year student drop-out rate of 100 or less.

In Ozona High School, 95% of the students who took TAAS Reading passed (90.3% Hispanic, and 100% White), 93.3% of the students who took TAAS Mathematics passed (90.3% Hispanic and 96.6% White), and 91.5% of the students who took TAAS Writing passed (90.0% Hispanic and 93.1% White) the state exam. Economically disadvantaged students were not analyzed by T.E.A. due to the fact that there were less than 30 students in this group.

In Ozona Intermediate School, 95.3% of the students who took TAAS Reading passed (92.9% Hispanic, 100% White, and 93.1% Economically Disadvantaged), 99.3% of the students who took TAAS Mathematics

passed (99% Hispanic, 100% White, and 98.9% Economically Disadvantaged), and 93.1% of the students who took TAAS Writing (90% Hispanic, 100% White, and 91.9% Economically Disadvantaged) passed the grades 3-5 TAAS. Ozona Primary School, paired with Ozona Intermediate School for the purpose of accountability, also was recognized with the above honor.

Ozona Middle School missed Academically Exemplary by only one student subgroup (Hispanic results in TAAS Writing-87.9%) falling below the 90% criteria. At Ozona Middle School, 96.7% of the students who took TAAS Reading passed (96.3% Hispanic, 97.2% White, and 95% Economically Disadvantaged), 97.2% of the students who took TAAS

Mathematics passed (95.3% Hispanic, 100% White, and 93.8% Economically Disadvantaged), and 93.3% passed TAAS Writing (87.9% Hispanic and 100% White). Economically Disadvantaged students in writing were not analyzed due to less than 30 students in this group tested at grade 8.

The school district itself received the "Academically Recognized" rating from T.E.A. for the sixth year in a row. To attain Academically Recognized status, TAAS results in grades 3-8 and 10 in the 2001-02 school year have to show that at least 80% of the district's students and student subgroups (African American, Hispanic, White, and Economically

School begins with new superintendent

Crockett County school children began their first day of classes Aug. 19 with a new superintendent in charge.

Jim Rumage says he is happy to be in Ozona. "Mr. Taylor left the school in real good shape. It is a great situation for me to step into," he said and commended "all the people in the school."

Supt. Rumage doesn't plan any changes for the school system this year. "I may put some of my things in next year."

After a "great week of in-service", teachers were fired up and ready for their students according to the superintendent.

"I told them during in-service if you come to school every day with a smile on your face and a song in your heart, you will make kids more susceptible to learning. You've got to believe in that child for that child to learn."

Mr. Rumage is enthused about his staff, calling them "super" at all levels. "We're all going to work for the same thing, what's best for kids. If I make some mis-

takes, it will be because I was doing what I thought was best for the kids."

Jim Rumage comes to Ozona from Ira where he was superintendent. He also led the Rochester ISD as superintendent during the 1999-2000 school year.

His teaching career began in 1991 in Jacksboro where he taught social studies. During the five years he was in the Jacksboro school system, he earned his master of education degree with superintendent certification from TWU. His bachelor of science degree was earned at McMurry University.

During the 1996-97 school year he was prekindergarten

through twelfth grade principal in Bryson ISD. He then moved to Haskell ISD to serve two years as principal for grades seven through twelve.

He was a member of the school board in Clyde for nine years, including terms as president and vice-president of the board. Prior to becoming an educator, he was in farming and ranching and private business.

Debbie and Jim Rumage are the parents of three children, Scott, Jason and LeAnn.

His interests include hunting, fishing and cooking.

"I am not originally from Ozona, but I got here as quick as I could," he quipped.

First day enrollment remains steady

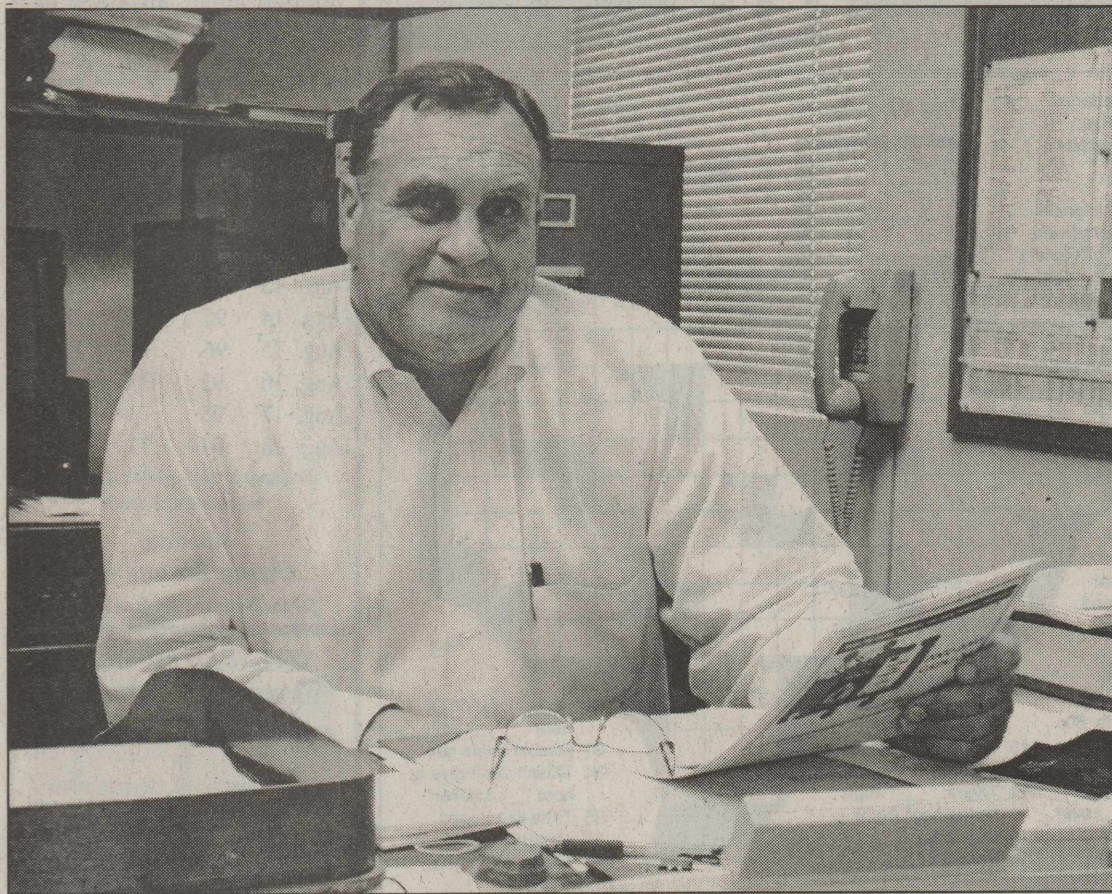
First day enrollment for the 2002-03 school year totaled 840, down one student from the previous year.

The most significant changes were in Ozona middle school,

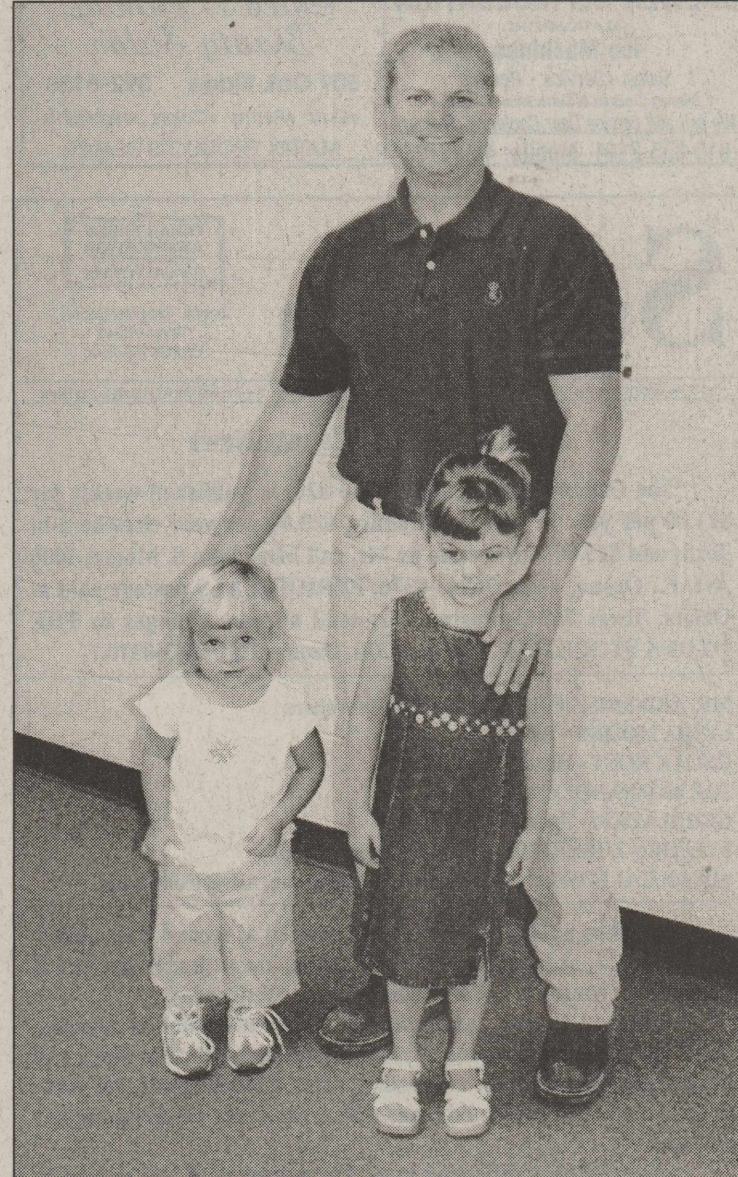
which lost 26 students, and the high school, which gained 22.

The primary school enrollment totaled 182, down from 185,



Library receives grant

Thanks to a partnership between the Tocker Foundation and the University of Texas Press, \$25,000.00 worth of books will be made available to Texas libraries. The Austin-based Tocker Foundation, whose mission is to provide assistance to small rural libraries, has awarded a grant through their Collection Enhancement Program that will enable UT Press to provide \$250.00 worth of books to 100 eligible Texas libraries.

With Darryl Tocker as executive director, the Foundation's focus is on improving public library services to areas without adequate service or with no service at all. These communities typically have populations of fewer than 12,000 inhabitants.

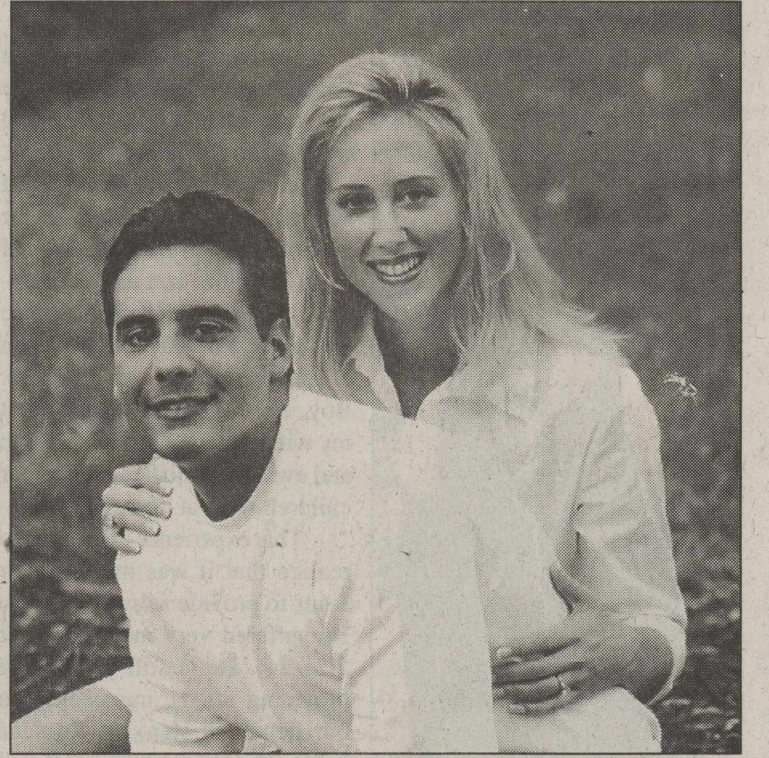
Crockett County Public Library was selected as one of the lucky rural libraries to receive this wonderful grant of books from the UT Press. The Press publishes

nearly 100 titles a year in many subject areas, and each participating library will make its own selection from books about Texas and the Southwest, natural history and ornithology, Latino and bilingual studies and books of general interest.

"I have been wishing for the funds to purchase books I found in the UT Press catalog just recently, and now we can have those books for our collection," stated Librarian Louise Ledoux. "I can't thank the Tocker Foundation enough for their generous support of libraries through their grant programs. CCPL has received two other grants from the Tocker Foundation - one for computers, and another for conversion of our records for automation. Assistant Librarian Sylvia DeHoyos also received a travel stipend through the Tocker Foundation that allowed her to attend her first Texas Library Association Annual Conference in 2001. Our small library has been so enriched by the Tocker Foundation," said Ledoux.

But these same people seldom read their Bibles. And the reason is that they don't appreciate the Bible. For them the Bible seems foolish and irrelevant.

Perhaps this is the case with you. When you read the Bible, there is no real joy or excitement. You probably have a form of religion but you have denied its power. The power of true religion is the power to change the human heart. And it is only when your heart and mind have been enlightened by the Holy Spirit that you are really able to see the beauty of the Bible. And so if you own a Bible and do not read it and appreciate it, as you should, you need to experience the power of the Holy Spirit in your life. You need to turn to God and ask Him to forgive you of your sins on the basis of Christ's sacrifice on the cross. And you need to ask God to give you the gift of His Holy Spirit. Jesus asked, "How much more shall your heavenly father give the Holy Spirit to those who ask Him?" (Luke 11:13). Then when you read the Bible, you will see that it is literally God's word to you!

When 70 Texas 4-H'ers received a helping hand with their dreams of higher education through Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo scholarships, Lana Stewart of Ozona was among the outstanding recipients.

Lana plans to study microbiology at Texas Tech University. Her parents are Kay and Eddie Stewart.

The four-year, \$10,000.00 scholarships were presented during the 2002 Texas 4-H Roundup June 11 in College Station.

The scholarships presented to Texas 4-H'ers are only one part of the show's current annual commitment of more than \$8.5 million. The show also awards direct scholarships through the Texas FFA and the Texas Family, Career and Community Leaders of America, plus through the show's Metropolitan, Opportunity and School Art programs. In addition, the show funds research at 10 Texas universities, enhances educational opportunities through grants and supports the Rodeo Institute for Teacher Excellence.

The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo is a 501(c)(3) educational charity and has committed more than \$85 million to scholarships and educational programs since 1957.

Disadvantaged) passed each subject area. T.E.A. data also has to show that the district had a 2000-01 student dropout rate of 2.5% or less.

Districtwide, 95.9% of the district's students in grades 3-8 and 10 passed TAAS Reading. Among the student analysis subgroups in reading, 94.1% of the district's Hispanic students passed, 98.7% of the district's white students passed, and 93.2% of the district's economically disadvantaged students passed the reading portion of the state test.

97.4% of the district's students passed TAAS Mathematics. Among the student analysis subgroups in math, 96.2% of the district's Hispanic students passed, 99.3% of the district's white students passed, and 95.4% of the district's economically disadvantaged students passed the state math exam.

92.7% of the district's students passed TAAS Writing. Among the student analysis subgroups in writing, 89.3% of the district's Hispanic students passed, 97.3% of the district's white students passed, and 87.8% of the district's economically disadvantaged students passed the state writing exam.

During the meeting the trustees accepted a proposal, pending contract review by the district's attorney, for a ten-year exclusive beverage vending agreement between the district and Ab-Tex (Pepsi-Dr. Pepper Company) for soft-drink products. Under the "Special Programs" section of the agreement, Ab-Tex will donate annually \$1,000.00 of its product for non-revenue functions of the school district; provide an annual scholarship fund of \$2,000.00 in the name of Dr. Pepper/Peppi Cola for ten years; and, Ab-Tex will

make a support payment of \$8,000.00 in 2002, a support payment of \$8,000.00 in 2003, and a support payment of \$9,000.00 in 2004 for a double-sided marquee sign that will be used to display upcoming school district and campus events.

Through special pricing on vending and concession products as well as the special provisions outlined above, the proposal is expected to earn \$188,235.51 for student cocurricular and extracurricular activities during the ten years of the contract.

The trustees accepted a \$1,000,000.00 abatement agreement contract contribution offer from Cielo Windpower Company that can't be recaptured by the state under the Robin Hood system of state funding. The abatement agreement will be \$125,000.00 per year for eight years.

Also during the meeting the school board approved a bid from the Texas Association of School Boards for school property, liability, vehicle, and workers' compensation insurance for the 2002-03 school year, and it approved the employment of two additional teacher aides, one for Ozona Primary School and one for Ozona Intermediate School, for this school year. The members also approved a \$300.00 stipend for the 2002-03 school year for English-as-a-Second Language (ESL) certified teachers.

The meeting was adjourned following an affirmative vote to approve the calling of a special meeting of the board on September 4 at 6:00 p.m. for the purpose of setting the 2002-03 School Year Budget and Tax Rate and to approve September 17 at 6:30 p.m. as the date and time for the board's September regular meeting.

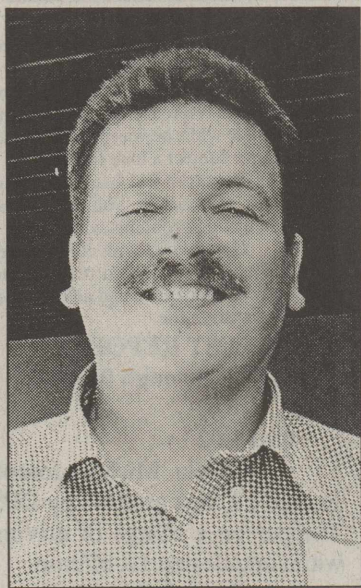

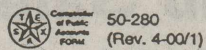

Texas monthly oil and gas statistics

The Texas Railroad Commission issued a total of 851 original drilling permits in June 2002 compared to 1,186 in June 2001. The June total included 681 permits to drill new oil and gas wells, 25 to re-enter existing well bores, and 145 for recompletions. Permits issued in June 2002 included 208 oil, 285 gas, 327 oil and gas, 17 injection and 14 other permits.

In June 2002, operators reported 223 oil, 379 gas, 22 injection and three others compared to 269 oil, 431 gas, 9 injection and one other completion during June 2001.

Total well completions for 2002 year to date are 4,961 up from 4,370 recorded during the same period in 2001.

Operators reported 885 holes plugged and 65 dry holes in June 2002 compared to 474 plugged and 84 dry holes in June 2001.

Texas preliminary May 2002 crude oil production averaged 9679,324 barrels daily, down from the 1,015,448 barrels daily average of May 2001.

The preliminary Texas crude oil production figure for May 2002 is 30,049,037 barrels, a decrease from 31,478,895 barrels reported during May 2001.

Texas oil and gas wells produced 436,432,724,724 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas based upon preliminary production figures for May 2002, down from the May 2001 preliminary gas production total of 450,778,000 Mcf. Texas production in May 2002 came from 142,839 oil and 58,344 gas wells.

Crockett County was ranked ninth in the state in gas production for May with 8,976,329 Mcf.

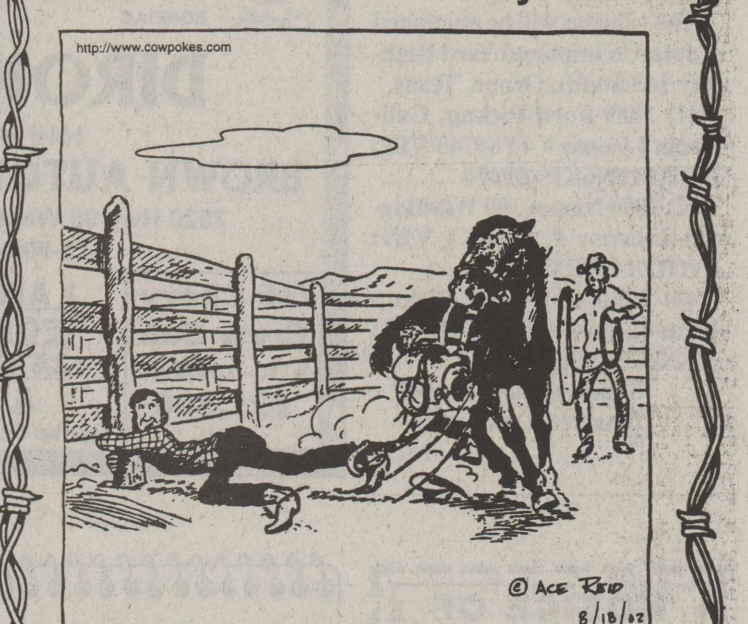
