I'm overcome by the power of the flooding of the Colorado River and lakes in Texas. Farmland was ravaged, homes swept away, cities shut down, and businesses mired. At the same time, there were devastating wildfires in Colorado and Arizona. When one area suffers from too much rain, another area lacks. This makes sense. There is only so much water. And when it is not evenly distributed, problems are bound to occur. But who is in charge of this distribution? Are we left to blind fate or impersonal chance? Listen to how the Bible answers these questions. "God thunders with His voice wondrously, doing great things which we cannot comprehend. For to the snow He says, 'Fall on the earth,' and to the downpour and the rain, 'Be strong' (Job 37:5-6). The Biblical perspective is plain. God "sends rain" (Matthew 7:45). And the messages are simple. God says, "If I shut up the heavens so that there is no rain...and My people who are called by My name humble themselves and pray, and seek My face and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven, will forgive their sin, and will heal their land. 




spectively. In the junior varsity girls' division, Jessica Moore placed seventh and Mandy Fierro placed



Explanatory Brief for HJR 2

HJR 2 would amend the constitution to allow the commissioners court of a county to declare the office of constable dormant if that office has been vacant for at least seven consecutive years. The records of a constable office that is declared dormant will be transferred to the county clerk. If the office is declared dormant, the previous officeholder does not continue to hold the office. The office may not be filled by election or appointment unless the commissioners court votes to reinstate the office or a majority of votes cast in an election held on the issue favor reinstatement. The reinstatement election may be held if the commissioners court on its own motion orders such an election, or the reinstatement election must be held if the commissioners court receives a petition signed by 10% of the registered voters of the constable precinct. The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows:
