Rabid fox bites woman north of town

Jody Darr was bitten Saturday by a fox that tested positive for rabies. The attack occurred when Mrs. Darr was unloading a horse from a trailer on the Tebbetts place just north of Ozona.

Her daughter, Shelbie, saw the fox under the horse trailer before it struck according to Mrs. Darr's mother, Peggy Osborne.

Mrs. Darr and Shelbie had gone to the ranch to ride and were with her husband David's parents, Jesse and Joyce Darr of Denver City, and the Tebbetts' daughter, Brandyn. The fox made no move to injure the others, Mrs. Osborne

Mrs. Darr began a series of shots Monday and will continue treatment until early November. She was able to return to work at school on Tuesday.

This is the second person to be bitten by a rabid fox here in a matter of weeks. Jerald Savala was attacked at the gun range at the edge of Ozona and underwent a series of shots.

Since July, Ozona Veterinary Clinic has sent off five foxes that tested positive for rabies. Three of these were killed in town, one at the cemetery, and the one that attacked Mrs. Darr just north of town according to Nancy Vannoy. Sunday morning, a townsperson brought to the clinic two kittens that had been bitten by a fox, she

Several ranchers have told Dr. Gary Vannoy they have killed foxes they know were rabid, "and I know there are quite a few around here," Mrs. Vannoy said.



The On Feb. 13, 1901, the plans and hospital opened in September of specifications of Oscar Ruffini were adopted, and on Aug. 12, 1901, the contract for the building was let to Charles Schumm for \$26,800.00. The building was completed in 1902, and the bonds were paid off in April, 1942.

In 1934, Judge Davidson declared to Sam Ashburn with the Standard Times that "the courthouse is the only one that the county will ever need." However, growth and progress of the county eventually made the building inadequate to house all of the county officials.

To digress, in order to bring the courthouse question up to date,

The county, needing more room, furnished the building (hospital) and made offices. It relieved the situation for a number of years until the 1990's and the county needed more room.

In 1995, a bond election was held for \$901,000.00 and carried. The present annex, which is a wonderful building, was furnished and occupied in April of 1998. I believe the bonds were paid off the year it was occupied.





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From Faith to Faith

Not too long ago a fellow who wanted some help in talking to an atheist friend approached me. "It's funny," he said, "this fellow is an atheist but all he wants to talk about is God." One of the fascinating wonders of our world is the fact of religion. People simply cannot avoid it. We are innately religious. Even those who reject God continue to talk about Him. And there is good reason. It's the way God created us. The Bible says, "He has also put eternity in their heart" (Ecclesiastes 3:11). There is a sense of deity within us. There is a God consciousness present in us from birth. This being the case, men and women must act on this sense of the reality of God. On one side, they will suppress and reject the notion of God. But even in their rejection, they cannot escape Him. The rejection of God is really an affirmation He exists. On the other hand, men and women begin to seek God. This can be the beginning of a real relationship with Him. "He who comes to God must believe that He is, and that He is a rewarder of those who seek Him" (Hebrews 11:6). That's simple. To come to God, you must first believe He exists. That is, you accept the fact of His existence. You no longer suppress or reject the truth swelling up within you. And so you look for more. You seek a relationship with God. This means there are different levels of faith. Simple belief in the existence of God is one thing. Trust in Christ as the Savior of your soul is quite another. When you believe in the existence of God you have an intellectual faith. But when you come to God through faith in the sacrifice of Christ, you have saving faith. You become an adopted member of God's family.
