The missing man, a 34-yearold attorney working in Hong Kong for the London firm Clifford Chance, was taking part in a ruby competition with the Hong Kong Football Club.

He was in the process of moving back to the Kansas City area where he planned to work for a bank holding company. His wife, Laura, and their 2-year-old son, Wilson Samuel Young, had already returned to the United States.

Bali's Defense Minister Matori Abdul Djalil said Monday that Osama bin Laden's al Qaeda network played a part in the bombing, working through a local group.

Indications are that the assailants were targeting Westerners. A majority of those killed and injured were from Australia, New Zealand, Britain, France, Germany and Belgium.

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

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



Questionable Politics


