New lights for softball field

Commissioners on Monday voted to purchase of new light fixtures for the south softball park. New lights will bring the number of fixtures down from 80 to 34 according to Eddie Moore, road and parks superintendent.

Cost for the clamp on fixtures will be \$22,462.67. Bulbs designed to last for 20,000 hours and use two-thirds less electricity cost \$3,744.00. These fixtures will be the same as those installed at the rodeo arena this summer.

Court members voted to advertise for bids for a chip spreader for the road department with acceptance of the machine to be after the first of the year.

In his report, Moore told the court that the Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission will not allow the county to install a septic system at the clay bird shooting range. Because it is rated a commercial facility, the work will have to be done by a professional installer.

Restrooms are being built by the county at the clay bird range.

Tom Anderson of the Ozona Trap and Skeet Club met with commissioners regarding a proposed agreement between the club, county and 4-H Club. It was agreed that the formal agreement proposed by OTSC was not needed. Details and basic rules for use will be worked out and on the next court agenda.

Shooting will be allowed only under supervision and during designated times. The range will be closed during funerals. A seven-member board appointed by the court will govern the facility.

Judge Johnny Jones and County Attorney Bill Mason stated their opposition to allowing alcohol on the premises at any time.

"I have a real problem with it

(alcohol at the range)," said Jones. "I want to see that your board unanimously approves before I would even consider it."

Renee Howes of the Rimrock Ranch project presented the preliminary plan for Phase III of the subdivision.

Steve Wagner presented the final plan for Phase II and preliminary plan for Phase III of the Star View Ranch subdivision.

Acceptance of all these plans was approved by a vote of the court.

Commissioners voted to adopt a resolution supporting the weather modification program sponsored by the Emerald Underground Water Conservation District.

A vote was also taken to adopt a resolution supporting MHMR's request for funding from the state legislature.

A seasonal pole attachment license with West Texas Utilities and an unmetered service agreement with WTU were approved by the court.

The resignation of Felice Gutierrez from the local and regional child welfare boards was accepted. They accepted a recommendation to appoint as board members Karen Huffman, Napoleon Vieta, Sam Longoria and Art Roane.

Membership in the County Information Resources Agency was also approved by the court. This free service will make possible free e-mail, domain name registration and-hosting and free standard county web sites and web site hosting.

A resolution was approved for county membership in the Concho Valley Housing Finance Corporation. This involves a state-guaranteed loan program for qualifying first time home buyers.

The Lions came into Friday's game well rested and ready for district play. Wall, their first district opponent, arrived at Lion Stadium for the game on Oct. 11. The Hawks began the night by winning the coin toss; however, that was the only advantage they would get in the first half. For this half was owned by the Lions.

On their first possession, the Lions plodded down the field with several good carries by Jarryd Taylor, G. L. Bunger and Koby Fenton, a great pass from Clay Hale to Kris Gray and four first downs. They met strong resistance from the Hawks near the goal line and opted to set up for a field goal kick. That attempt was blocked by Wall, and the Hawks gained possession. A sealed wall of Lion defenders met Wall's offense, and the Hawks were forced to punt. The Wall punter's knee touched down in the end zone for a safety, and the Lions took the lead 2-0.

The Hawks kicked off to the Lions, and Ozona was once again headed toward the end zone. Good carries by Fenton, Bunger and Taylor moved the ball down the field. The drive was completed with a touchdown run by G. L. Bunger. The Lions faked an extra point attempt, trying to pass the ball for the 2-point conversion. The fake was unsuccessful, and the Lions led 8-0.

On the kickoff to Wall, the Hawks fumbled, and Ozona's Tyson Vordick came up with the ball. This possession was not as lucrative for the Lions as they found themselves punting after three plays.

The Hawks were again swallowed by the Lion defense with great tackles by Ramon Trujillo,

Jarryd Taylor and Quay Oglesby. Even the Hawks' punt fake was no match for the Lion defense, and soon the Lions took possession of the ball again. Bunger, Fenton and Hale each picked up yardage that added up to a first down. Then Hale connected with Lalo Garza, who had a great run after the catch to nab another first down. The Hawks made a defensive stand at the 6-yard line, but on the next play Jarryd Taylor busted through for the touchdown. The extra point attempt was no good, and the scoreboard read 14-0 for the Lions.

On their next possession, Wall's offense tried to rally. They were able to gain enough ground for two first downs before the Lions shut them down again and

Leobardo Mata was stabbed twice, one in the abdomen and once in the chest after he and his brother Eleverio were confronted at the Mata home.

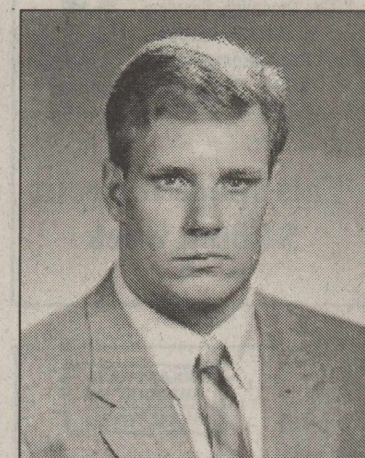

Son of former Ozonan.... Young missing in Bali

Terrorism became more real to many Ozonans Monday with the news that Jake Young is missing following a bomb blast in Bali.

Young, the son of Ozona native Jake Young Jr., was in Bali to play a final tournament with his rugby team from Hong Kong

when a bombing devastated two nightclubs and surrounding buildings Saturday. More than 180 people were killed in the bombing and many injured.

The former All-American center at the University of Nebraska in 1988 and 1989 is described also as a former standout offensive lineman at Midland Lee High School. His former coach at Nebraska, Rep. Tom Osborne, R-Neb., said State Department officials had recovered Young's passport.

"We don't know anything," said Young's father from his home in Midland on Tuesday. "Everybody is working trying to help us. The State Department and the people he worked for in Hong Kong are updating us several times a day.

"We never thought we'd go through something like this," Young said.

The missing man, a 34-year-old attorney working in Hong Kong for the London firm Clifford Chance, was taking part in a ruby competition with the Hong Kong Football Club.

He was in the process of moving back to the Kansas City area where he planned to work for a bank holding company. His wife, Laura, and their 2-year-old son, Wilson Samuel Young, had already returned to the United States.

Bali's Defense Minister Matori Abdul Djilil said Monday that Osama bin Laden's al Qaeda network played a part in the bombing, working through a local group.

Indications are that the assailants were targeting Westerners. A majority of those killed and injured were from Australia, New Zealand, Britain, France, Germany and Belgium.

Young is the grandson of the late Hester (Bunger) and Jacob C. Young and great-grandson of the late G. L. and Elgia (Williams) Bunger.

Commissioners receive audit reports

Audit reports from 1998, 1999 and 2000 were given to commissioners Oct. 14 by Michael Oliphant. Commissioners had hired the firm of Eckert, Ingram, Tinkler, Oliphant, Featherston and Barr LLP in June of 2001 to perform an independent audit for 2000 and 1999.

County Auditor John Stokes and Treasurer Burl Myers previously said a change in computer software at the county treasurer's office in 1998 led to accounting

classifications reflected in the accompanying financial statements.

"It's not to say we didn't have difficulties in the 2000 audit, but there was something there we could work with.

"We audited everything we could audit, but there were not enough records to be able to say this is right," Oliphant continued.

Stokes commented that the problems are well documented and hopefully cured in the past two years.

"This is the way it was"

The Kirkpatrick hotel was about 30 years old when it burned on Sunday afternoon, Dec. 21, 1919. The newspaper account says it was 30 years old, so it must have been built around 1892 or 93. The hotel was built by J. H. Carmichael of the firm of Carmichael and Perner. It was sold to Mrs. M. E. Smith and was exchanged by her for a residence.

Uncle John Kirkpatrick, owner (no date), operated the hotel until his death. Mrs. Kirkpatrick then operated the hotel and sold it to Mr. and Mrs. Andy Nelson and Joe Oberkamp. Later, Mr. Nelson bought Mr. Oberkamp out. He was sole owner when it burned.

Travelers from all over the country would stay at the Kirkpatrick hotel.

When I lodged there in 1933, it was a rooming house that charged \$8.00 a week for room and board. This was a pretty good lick to the pocketbook when you only made \$10.00 a week.

Located at 502 9th Street across from the Baptist parsonage, the building now houses Preddy Funeral Home.

Another hotel, the Hotel Ozona, built in 1926, was touted as the finest hotel between San Antonio and El Paso. The ranchers and citizens of Ozona formed a corporation to build the hotel. They sold \$70,000.00 in stock. Before it was finished, they called on the stockholders to buy the same amount of stock. The hotel cost \$140,000.00. The building still stands today.

When the hotel business got bad, they sold first to Bill Taylor, then another partner. After it closed, Buster Miller purchased the property, which is located on Ave. E.

Finding out about hotels is a hard task. In old times, early 1900s, there was another small hotel or two.

October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month

Local breast cancer survivors hung a wreath on the door of the Crockett County Courthouse designating October as Breast Cancer Awareness Month. Similar ceremonies were conducted in communities throughout Texas. The ceremonies demonstrated a commitment to fight the disease that has claimed the lives of so many women. This year an estimated 2,600 Texas women will die from breast cancer, and 13,100 will be diagnosed with the disease.

The ceremony included: Mary Harris, Joyce Young, Elizabeth Upham, Sally Roane, Elizabeth Chadwell, Blanca Castro, Janie Chandler, Veva Vargas, and Judge Johnny Jones who read a proclamation declaring October Breast Cancer Awareness in Crockett County.

Early detection could reduce deaths due to breast cancer by as much as 30 percent. By celebrating Breast Cancer Awareness Month, the Texas Department of Health, the American Cancer Society, Susan G. Komen Foundation, Texas Cancer Council and the Governor's Commission for Women hope to increase awareness of how early detection can save lives.

2002 marks the 16th National Breast Cancer Awareness Month. The goal of Breast Cancer Awareness Month is to increase awareness of the importance of early detection of breast cancer through public and professional education outreach efforts. To find breast cancer early, women should do breast self-examinations every month, have a health professional check their breasts every year and

have regular mammograms. All women are at risk for developing breast cancer. Women 50 or older are the most likely to develop breast cancer. The American Cancer Society recommends that women 40 or older get a yearly mammogram and breast exam. Getting a mammogram and breast exam only once is not enough.

Many mammography facilities offer reduced rates on mammograms during October.

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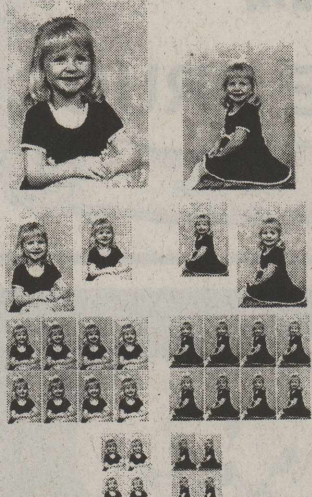

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Editorial

Questionable Politics

As a former Democratic Member of Congress and current Zavala County rancher it has been a number of years since I wrote an article for publication in a paper. However, a series of claims made by a candidate in our congressional district were so outrageous that I felt compelled to set the record straight.

Our Congressman, Henry Bonilla, has worked in an effective bipartisan manner to advocate the needs of south and west Texas. A recent survey ranked him as one of the "top ten most powerful" lawmakers in Congress. Henry has a history of honest, straightforward leadership. Unfortunately his opponent is not upholding the same standards.

Henry's opponent is distributing a pamphlet packed with claims about Henry Bonilla, which are at best misleading and often downright false. If you saw this pamphlet and threw it out or read no further, you did the right thing. If you were concerned over what you read, let me give you just a few examples of the distortions included on his list.

Bonilla's opponent claims he voted against a crime bill. He's wrong. It was not a crime bill, but was a bill to restrict gun ownership. I am proud to report I voted with Congressman Bonilla against this abuse of the U. S. Constitution. I know Texans want their congressman to defend the second amendment and that's exactly what Henry voted to do.

The pamphlet also attacks Bonilla's resolute decision to vote against the huge Clinton-Gingrich budget. Henry was one of the few members of congress who took a stand and voted against the budget because of its multi-billion dollar tax increase and massive \$115 billion cut in Medicare. The fact that CHIP was included amongst the hundreds of programs in the bill does not hide the fact that this bill was all about tax increases and less Medicare coverage for seniors. Bonilla's support of CHIP is well documented by his leadership in securing funding for this program every year since its establishment. The bot-

tom line is your congressman understands that you have to consider the real impact of legislation on Texans - rather than how good it sounds in press releases - when deciding how to vote.

In another case, Henry's opponent claims our congressman voted against hiring teachers. This couldn't be further from the truth. We all know Henry is a longtime advocate of education. Henry's vote did not cut teachers - in fact, he voted to hire additional teachers. Henry voted against legislation that would have sent money to the Federal government - and instead voted for legislation that sent the same money to state governments. Henry's vote put the hiring decisions at the discretion of individual school districts. In other words: Schools will make the decisions, not bureaucrats.

I could go on covering each of his claims, but I think we all get the point. Henry's opponent either has a gross misunderstanding

of the legislative process, or a bad habit of stretching the truth.

If you have a question on Congressman Bonilla's position, give his office a call. You can be sure you will get a straight answer even if you disagree. Let's insist that all our candidates demonstrate the same level of honesty that Congressman Bonilla has lived by since his first election to congress. The voters of the 23rd congressional district should insist on nothing less than an honest, straight forward representative.

Former U. S. Representative Bill Brewster (D) represented Oklahoma's third congressional district from 1990 to 1996. While in Congress, Brewster served on the powerful Ways and Means Committee and was a longtime advocate of the oil and gas industry. Since his retirement from Congress, Brewster heads his own lobbying firm in Washington, D.C. and spends time at his ranch in Zavala County.





Crockett County Sheriff's Department received a call to 1622 Laredo Street just before midnight Oct. 12. According to a report by Sgt. Jose Gutierrez, he was told that brothers Marcos and Samuel Quiroz had been visiting outside with the Matas when Marcos became abusive and the two were asked to leave but refused.

Approximately 30 minutes after the deputy responded and asked the men to leave, the Quiroz brothers returned and confronted the Matas the report says.

After Mata was stabbed, the Quiroz men fled on foot into the draw where officers found them hiding in the brush. After several commands to get down on the ground, Marcos Quiroz lunged at Sgt. Gutierrez and was restrained

and arrested.

Marcos Quiroz was charged with aggravated assault with a deadly weapon, taunting a peace officer and resisting arrest. Samuel Quiroz was charged with aggravated assault with a deadly weapon.

Deputy Nick Richter said a wooden handled ice pick recovered at the scene is the suspected weapon. It has been sent for DNA testing, and the Sheriff's Department is also waiting for hospital confirmation as to a possible weapon.

More charges may be coming as the investigation progresses, Richter said.

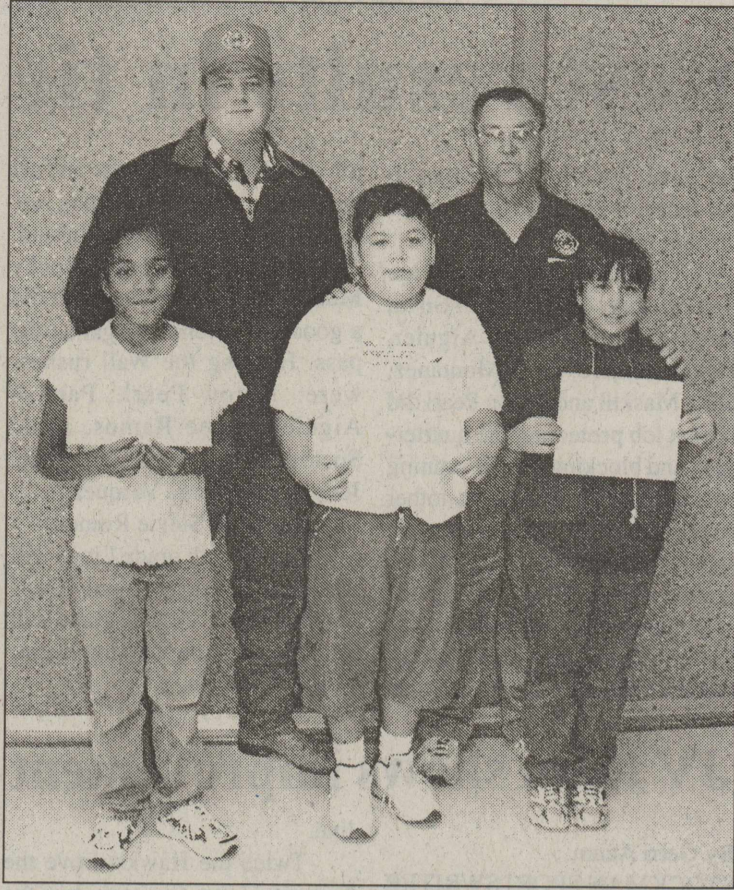

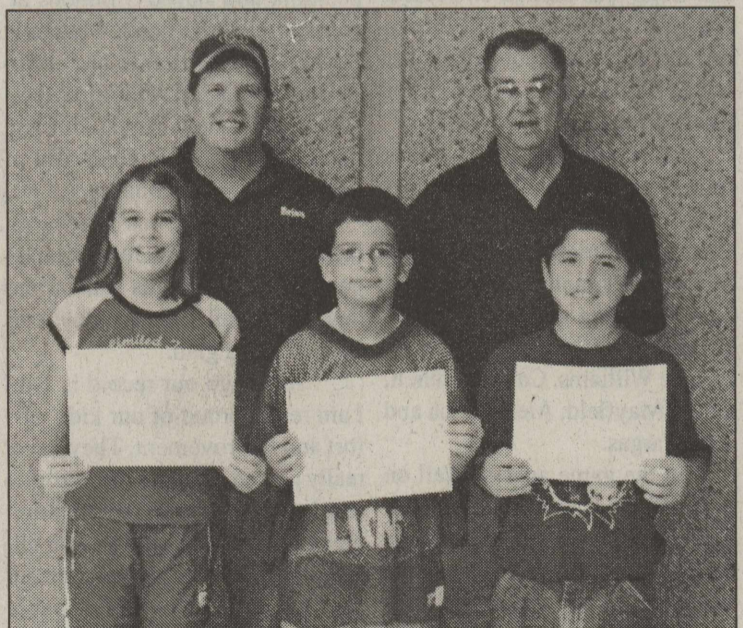

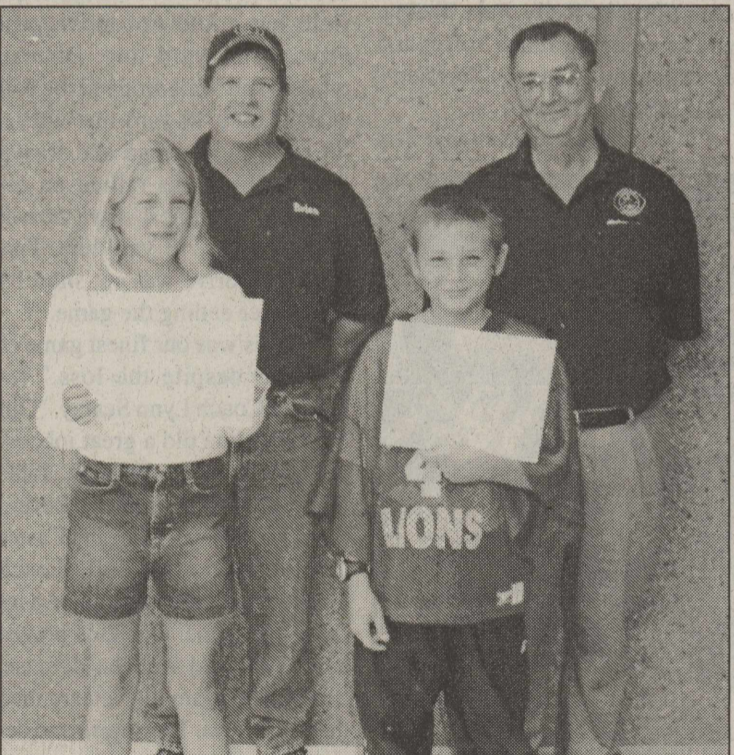

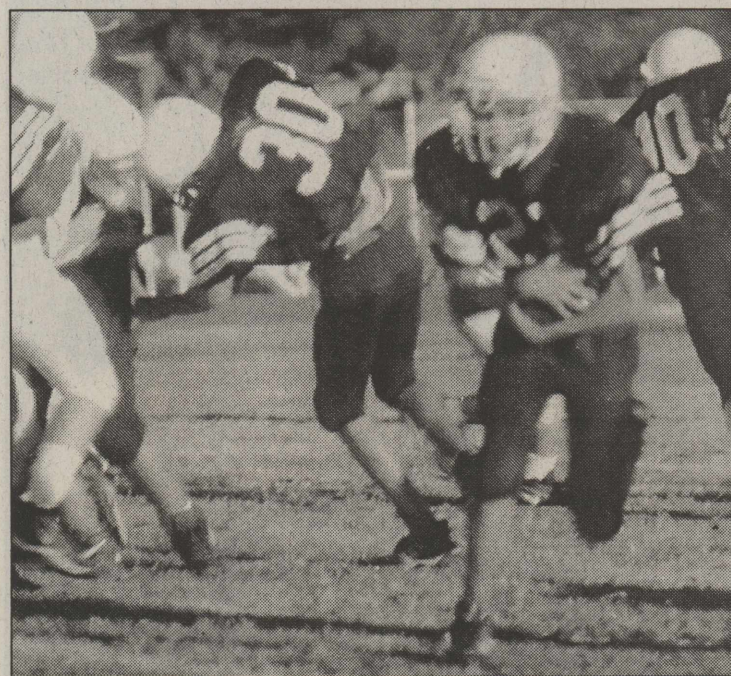

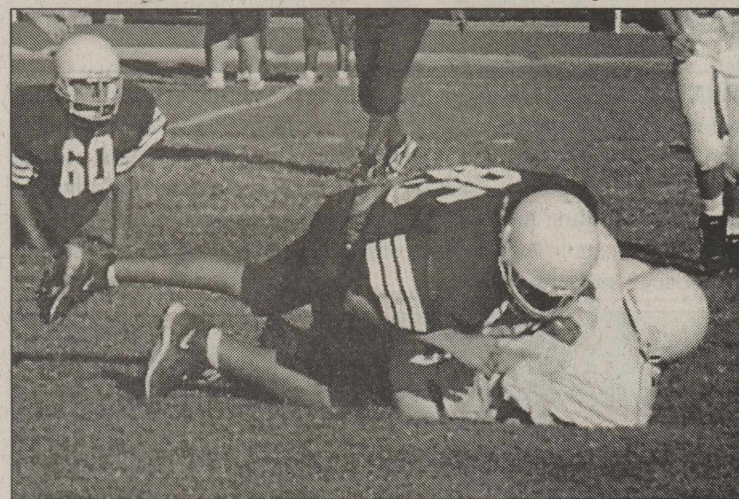
