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

SITOR CENTER PROJECT SEES PROGRESS

After submitting a nomination and being notified that Ozona had been selected for funding to build a Visitor Center through the TxDOT (Texas Department of Transportation) Statewide Transportation Enhancement Program, the Chamber of Commerce has been working to push the project forward.

Having raised the architect fee for the project, the Chamber is now working through the preliminary phases of the project with TxDOT. Preliminary phases consist of finalizing site plans, survey and soil investigations, landscaping consulting, environmental documentation, archeological and historical studies, FEMA flood plain coordination, appraisal of and final transfer of the property.

Crockett County has signed the TxDOT contract that has been sent to Austin. The Chamber has signed a contract with architect Henry Schmidt out of San An elo. Upon execution of the TxDOT contract, the Chamber will have the property, on which the center is to be built, appraised. The amount of the appraisal of the property must equal or exceed the 20% local match required of the county. "Having the local match is the key to the whole project. If the appraisal of the property meets our 20% local match, then we have a green light to move forward. Although the Chamber had the property appraised prior to submitting our nomination, it is a requirement of the state to go through this process a second time. The property will have been appraised by two different individuals," said Shanon Biggerstaff, Chamber Executive Director. TxDOT will reimburse the county for 80% of the allowable costs for the remainder the project. The TxDOT Right of Way Department has reviewed and approved all deeds and documentation on the property. The Environmental Department recently visited Ozona and the site to complete their report. "We have been informed that TxDOT will have to conduct an archeological study of the property because the property is undeveloped and has undergone no previous construction," said Biggerstaff.

Ozona has also been approved to receive \$154,000 to beautiful the I-IH and SH 163 intersections with a streetscape theme. "In an effort to contribute to the quality, both projects will be developed in concert and with the idea of "linkage" between the two," said Biggerstaff. It will take several months to actually complete the preliminary phases. TxDOT will be accepting bids for both the Visitor Center and the Landscape/Streetscape project in July of 2003.
