

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



By Tom Morrow © 2002 War is not the answer, to which I would adhere, neither is a life of horror, death and fear; War should be the last resort, when all reasoning has failed, when you hear the boot steps pounding, or see the sword of evil flail; War is not the answer, I can attest to that, sometimes war is the only way, when evil's at your back. The results of war are cruel, the rewards far but few,


