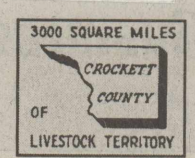

Moderate turnout in General Election

A moderate number of Crockett County voters showed up for the Nov. 5 General Election. Of the 2,660 registered voters, 37 percent, a total of 981, went to the polls.

Pct. 1 registered 595 for this election with 214 voting, Pct. 2 was 715 with 306 voters, Pct. 3 had 659 registered and a turnout of 296, there were 673 registered in Pct. 4 with 161 voting and Box 36 had 18 registered to vote with four casting ballots.

Lions hard break the Broncos 18-0

Friday night's match up on the gridiron was a big game for two rivals. Actually, any time Ozona and Sonora square off on the field, it is a big game. It is of little consequence which team has the better record. It does not matter much who beat whom in the last game off. In fact, it could be a play-off game or a district ballgame, anytime these two neighboring towns meet, it is a big game.

Friday's game was no exception. The Sonora Broncos came to Lion Stadium fired up and ready for a fight. The Lions came out pumped and did not disappoint their opponents. The two teams battled in the drizzle and cold in front of stands filled with fans. It was a good game. It was a big game. And it was the Lions' game.

The night started with the customary coin toss. The Lions

won the toss and chose to have the wind to their backs and to kick off to the Broncos. The Lion defense roared onto the field and pushed the Broncos back and held them for three plays. On fourth and eleven, Sonora punted the ball.

Ozونا started their first drive of the game in good field position from the 35. Jarryd Taylor carried the ball on the first two plays, bringing the Lions to third and one until a holding call on Ozونا pushed them back 10 yards, making it third and eleven. Clay Hale looked to pass but had to scramble to pick up three yards. Fourth and eight and the Lions went for a screen pass with Hale finding Robert Ogle and securing the first down.

The Lions continued pressing toward the goal line, finally pushing through on a run by Taylor for the touchdown. The extra point kick was not good, and the Lions found themselves up 6-0.

The Broncos tried to rally for an answer on their next drive. They got two first downs and were threatening when G. L. Bunger came up with the ball on a pass interception.

Ozونا wasted no time in moving down the field. Bunger, Taylor and Koby Fenton put together the yardage to give the Lions four first downs by the end of the first quarter. The second quarter began with good runs by Taylor and Bunger for yet another first down for the Lions. Ozona's drive was stopped close to the end zone

when Sonora recovered a fumble. The Broncos tried to keep momentum on their drive. They came up with one first down before the Lion defense stopped them. On the fourth and eight, the Broncos faked the punt. After the snap, the punter ran with the ball, trying to find an open receiver before stopping to kick the ball. The Lion defenders, trying to stop the pass but instead finding themselves defending a punter again, got too close and got a penalty. The Broncos decided to go for it on the next play, a fourth and three situation. Ozona stopped them cold and took over on downs.

The Lions went three and out, then Sonora went three and out as well. Ozona's offense pulled together to finally get moving on their next possession. After one first down, the Lions lost the ball to Sonora on another fumble.

Sonora struggled to move the ball at all before the buzzer sounded and ended the first half. The teams went in with the Lions leading 6-0.

Ozونا controlled the ball most of the third quarter. Great runs by G. L. Bunger and Jarryd Taylor provided the yards for four first downs and ate up more than six minutes on the clock. The Lions came within four yards of scoring on this drive before the Broncos put a stop to their progress.

Treto heads for state

Eliseo Treto captured a place at the state meet when he ran in the cross country regional meet Nov. 2. The Ozona High School sophomore placed ninth out of a field of 150 runners in Lubbock.

The state meet is Saturday, Nov. 9, in Round Rock. Treto will run at noon.

Other Ozona runners placing in the top 100 at the regional meet were Rigo Treto who finished 63rd and Simon Garza who was

close behind at 66th. The girls' division boasted 157 runners. Placing in the top

100 from OHS were Laken Villarreal at 26th and Jasmine Tambunga who was 58th.

October rainfall nears record

October rainfall recorded in Ozona by Crockett County Water Control this year neared the 1986 record of 7.73. Water district figures showed 7.03 inches for October 2002. Their measuring equipment is located on the east hill.

The National Weather Service gauge maintained at Ozona Butane south of town recorded 8.22 for October 2002, surpassing the 1986 water district measurement of 7.73 and this year's 7.03 inches.

Official rainfall records for the town of Ozona have been kept at the water district office since 1931. The larger amounts of October rain occurred in 1941 with 7.65, 1976 with 5.93, 1981 with 5.88, 1983 with 6.81 and the 7.73 in 1986.

Octobers with no rain recorded were 1934, 1950, 1952, 1955 and 1988.

Good rains across the county had many areas receiving more rain this October than for the entire 2001 year.

Jake young's body found

Jake Young's death in a terrorist attack in Bali was confirmed and his family informed Oct. 25. Barbara and Jake Young of Midland were notified by the State Department around midnight on the 25th that their son's remains had been identified.

Young was one of two Texans killed in a bomb attack outside two popular nightclubs Oct. 12 in Bali. More than 190 died in the attack.

Young, a descendant of Crockett County pioneers, was in Bali for the final game of a rugby tournament before returning to the

United States where he was to take a job as an attorney at a bank holding company.

He had practiced international law for the Clifford Chance law firm in Hong Kong where he was a member of the Hong Kong Football Club.

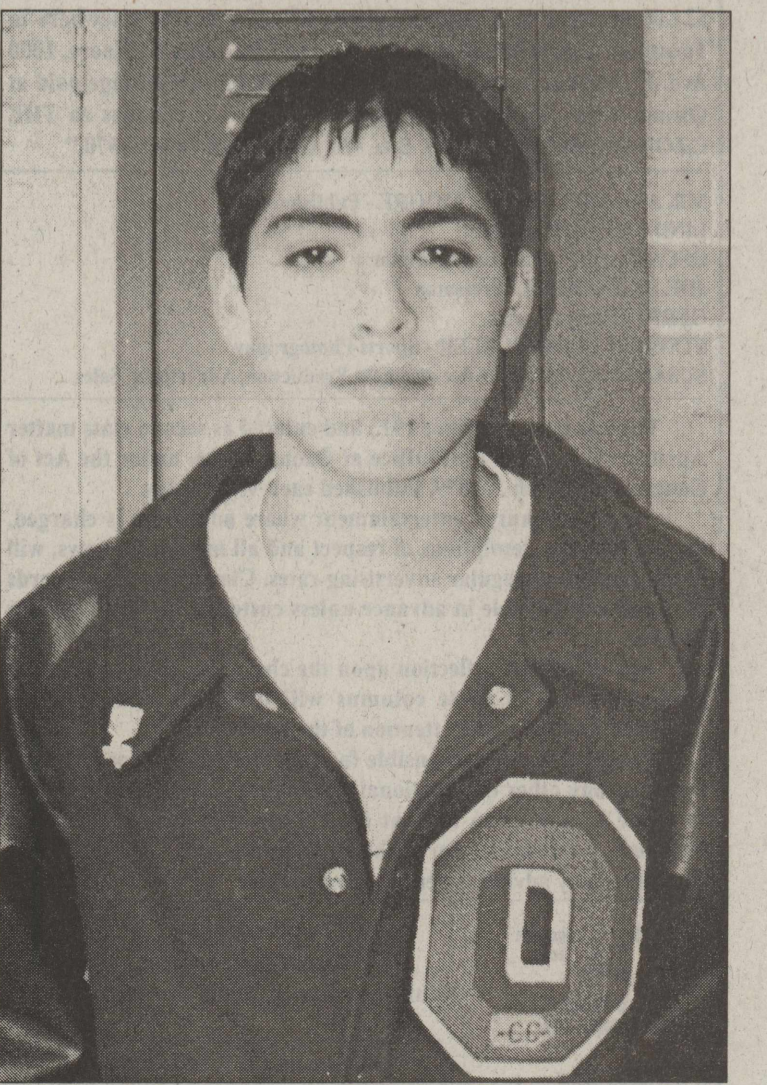
Young's wife, Laura, and 2-year-old son, Wilson Samuel, had already returned to the United States.

A memorial service was held in Overland Park, KS, on Oct. 26 and in Midland Oct. 30. Young is remembered by many as a two-time All American center for the University of Nebraska.

Ozona Chamber reminds community of open invitation

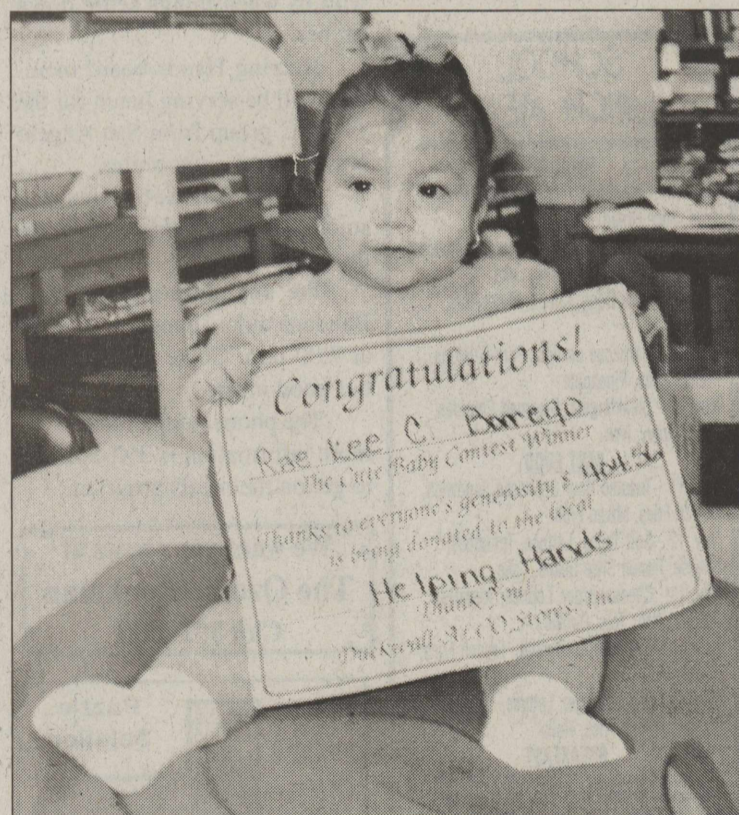

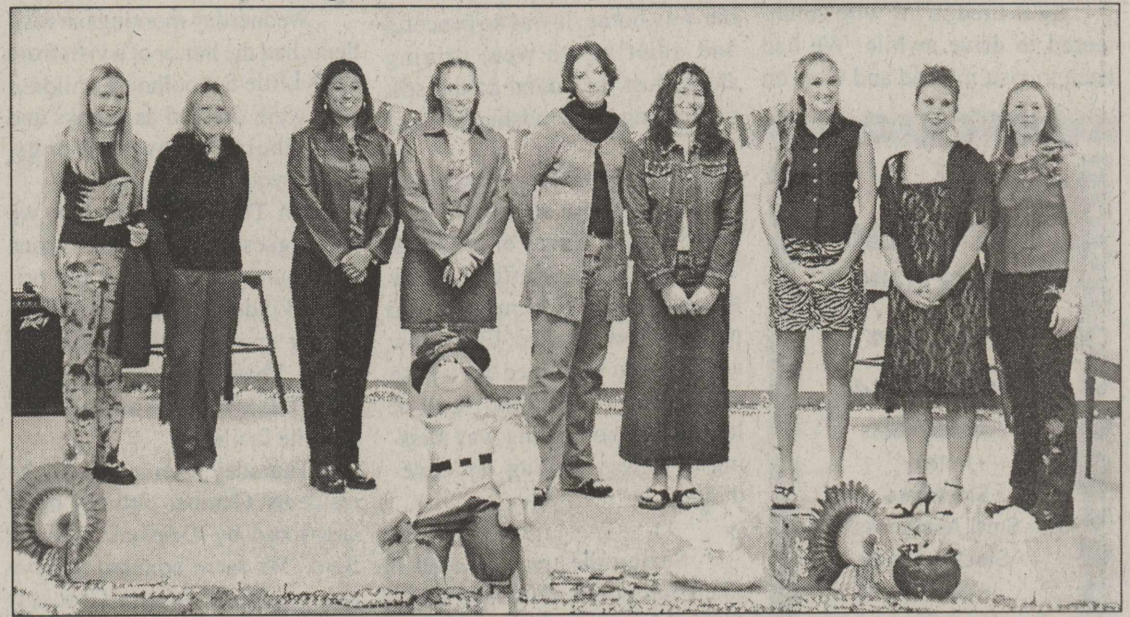

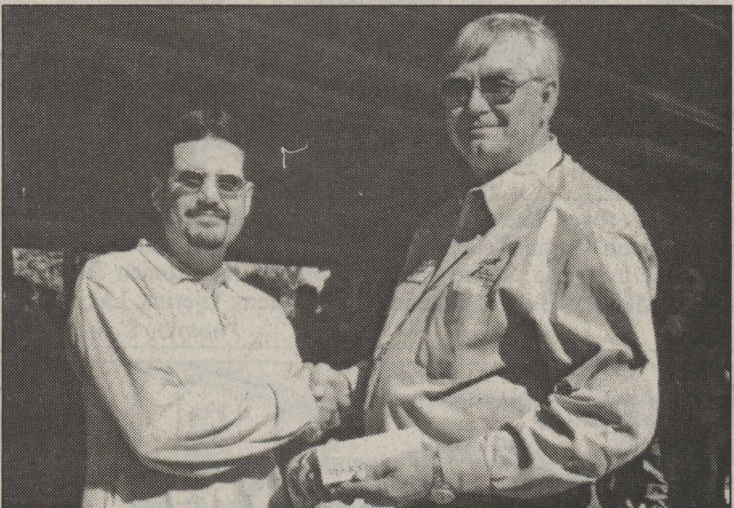

Two Texas Department of Transportation employees from the Ozona Maintenance Section received awards at the annual San Angelo District Truck Rodeo on Oct. 16.

Joe Lara and Ricardo Dominguez were recognized as winners from their local competition. Lara won the Ozona Maintenance Section competition in September with a score of 330 points. Dominguez placed second, scoring 295 out of a possible 350 points. Their scores advanced them to the annual district competition that included 28 finalists from across San Angelo District.

Waylan Ensor from the District Maintenance Office won the district competition. Second place winner Gary Maricle from Sterling City maintenance will also advance to the state event.

The annual program promotes safe vehicle operation. Additionally, the competition also challenges and recognizes the skills of all the TxDOT commercial drivers license operators. The drivers are judged while driving through an obstacle course.

The annual event requires the rodeo participant to weave the dump truck through a course that simulates equipment maneuvers on a daily basis. Backing the truck into a confined loading dock area

and driving forward and backward in a figure-eight pattern are a few of the skills that are scored.

NOTICE OF RECEIPT OF APPLICATION AND INTENT TO OBTAIN AIR PERMIT RENEWAL

AIR QUALITY PERMIT NO. 9824A

APPLICATION AND PRELIMINARY DECISION Belvan Corp. 211 North Colorado Street, Midland, Texas, 79701-4607, has applied to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) for renewal of Air Quality Permit No. 9824A which would authorize continued operation of their Midway Lane Gas Processing Plant. The applicant has provided the following directions to the site: from the intersection of Highway 163 North and US 190, turn left on US 190 and go about 8-9 miles to facility, Ozona, Crockett County, Texas. The following air contaminants will be evaluated for authorization: nitrogen oxides, carbon monoxide, organic compounds, sulfur dioxide, hydrogen sulfide and particulate matter.

This application was submitted to the TCEQ on June 17, 2002. The application is available for viewing and copying at the TCEQ central office, the TCEQ San Angelo regional office, and the Crockett County Courthouse, 908 Avenue D, Ozona, Crockett County, Texas. The facility's compliance file, if any exists, is available for public review in the San Angelo regional office of the TCEQ.

The TCEQ executive director has determined the application is administratively complete and will conduct a technical review of the application.

PUBLIC COMMENT/PUBLIC MEETING You may submit public comments, a request for a public meeting, or request a contested case hearing to the Office of the Chief Clerk at the address below. The TCEQ will consider all public comments in developing a final decision on the application. **The deadline to submit public comments is 15 days after newspaper notice is published.** After the deadline for public comments, the executive director will prepare a response to all relevant and material or significant public comments.

The purpose of a public meeting is to provide the opportunity to submit comments or ask questions about the application. A public meeting about the application may be held if the executive director determines that there is a significant degree of public interest in the application or if requested by a local legislator. A public meeting is not a contested case hearing.

If only comments are received on the application, the response to comments, along with notice of the executive director's action on the application, will be mailed to everyone who submitted comments or is on the mailing list for this application.

If a hearing request is timely filed, the executive director will complete the technical review, may issue a preliminary decision on the application, and a Notice of Application and Preliminary Decision may be published and mailed to those who are on the mailing list for this application. That notice will contain the final deadline for submitting public comments.

After the final deadline for public comments following any required Notice of Application and Preliminary Decision, the executive director will consider the comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. If comments are received, the response to comments, along with the executive director's decision on the application, will then be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments or is on a mailing list for this application.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING You may request a contested case hearing. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in state district court. Unless a written request for a contested case hearing is filed within 15 days from this notice, the executive director may approve the application. **If no hearing request is received within this 15-day period, no further opportunity for hearing will be provided.** A contested case hearing will only be granted based on disputed issues of fact that are relevant and material to the Commission's decision on the application. Further, the Commission will only grant a hearing on those issues raised during the public comment period and not withdrawn.

A person who may be affected by emissions of air contaminants from the facility is entitled to request a hearing. **If requesting a contested case hearing, you must submit the following:** (1) your name (or for a group or association, an official representative), mailing address, daytime phone number, and fax number, if any; (2) applicant's name and permit number; (3) the statement "[I/we] request a contested case hearing;" (4) a specific description of how you would be adversely affected by the application and air emissions from the facility in a way not common to the general public; (5) the location and distance of your property relative to the facility; and (6) a description of how you use the property which may be impacted by the facility. **If the request is made by a group or an association, the one or more members who have standing to request a hearing, and the interests which the group or association seeks to protect, must also be identified.** You may also submit your proposed adjustments to the application/permit which would satisfy your concerns. Requests for a contested case hearing must be submitted in writing within 15 days following this notice to the Office of the Chief Clerk, at the address below.

If a hearing request is timely filed, additional notice may be provided. Following the close of all applicable comment and request periods, the executive director will forward the application and any requests for contested case hearing to the TCEQ Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting. If a hearing is granted, the subject of a hearing will be limited to disputed issues of fact relating to relevant and material air quality concerns raised during the comment period. Issues such as property values, noise, traffic safety, and zoning are outside of the Commission's jurisdiction to address in this proceeding.

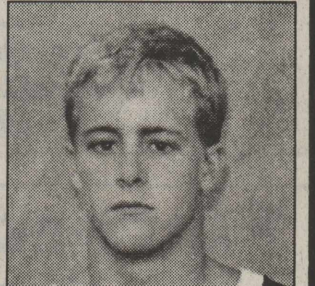

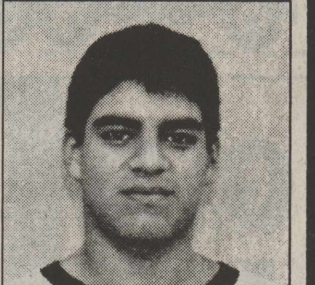

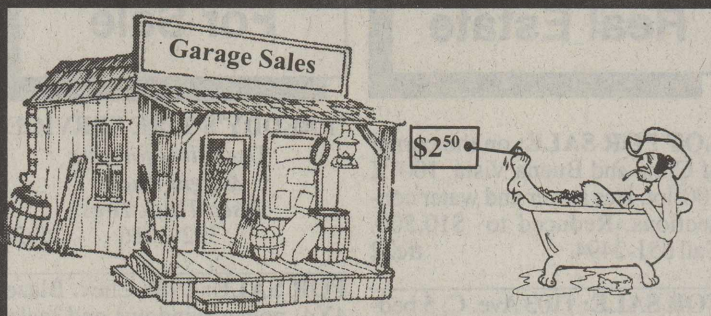
