

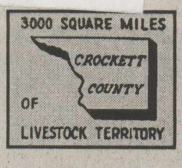

## Veterans honored for service

Crockett County's veterans were honored guests at a banquet Nov. 10 where they were recognized for their service to their country. Master of Ceremonies for the evening, Frank Tambunga, Marine Gunnery Sergeant, Retired, welcomed the honorees and other guests. Citing the need to educate young people of today, he explained that Veteran's Day is a day set aside to appreciate the veterans who are still here with us. Memorial Day is a day to remember those veterans who have passed on, Tambunga said.

## Masked robber shoots clerk, takes money

A masked gunman robbed the Town and Country Village Market Sunday night, shooting a clerk before fleeing with a bank money bag.

Kenny Tobar, 18, was counting the daily receipts when the robber, who had entered the store after its 8:30 p.m. closing time, ordered Tobar to give him the bank bag.

Chief Deputy Alton Davis said Tobar handed over the bag and was then shot twice in the leg. The weapon was believed to be a .22 rifle with a scope according to the Department of Public Safety.

Tobar was flown by AirMed to San Angelo for treatment of his wounds.

Crockett County Sheriff's Office received the 911 call on the robbery about 8:40 p.m. The assailant was described as a male about 5'11" tall and weighing 200 pounds. He was reported as wearing a camouflage shirt and blue sneakers with no description given of the type pants. His face was covered with a ski-type mask.

Initial reports were that two vehicles left the store's parking lot about the time of the robbery, one, a maroon blazer heading north on Hwy. 163, and the second, a mid-sized red car traveling south on Hwy. 163.

Surrounding counties were notified of the robbery, and roadblocks were set up in some areas.

Reports of a possible attempted robbery at the KFC in Fort Stockton around 10:40 p.m. and an armed robbery at 12:44 a.m. Monday at Allsup's in Pecos were in the right time frame to be connected. However, descriptions of the men, their clothing and the weapon used in Pecos are all different according to a DPS spokesperson.

The Ozona robbery is under investigation by the Crockett County Sheriff's Department and Texas Ranger Sgt. Brooks Long. Sheriff Shane Fenton asks that anyone contact his office who saw the cars leave the store parking lot or a man fitting the description of the robber.

## Eagles easy prey for the Mighty Lions

The final game of the regular season for the Ozona Lions was against the Eldorado Eagles in Eagle Stadium Nov. 8. The Lions handily defeated the Eagles 47-0, bringing their record to a remarkable 10-0.

The game kicked off with the Lions receiving the ball and beginning their first drive from the 15 yard line. G. L. Bunger and Jarryd Taylor worked together to stack up the yardage for two first downs, putting the Lions on the 25. Jarryd then took the ball and zipped down the field for a long 62 yard touchdown run. Bryan Skehan made good on the extra point kick, and the Lions jumped ahead 7-0.

With 9:02 left in the first quarter, the Lions kicked off to Eldorado. Ozona's defense refused to give an inch to the Eagles. Then on third and ten, Ryan Pearl stepped in for the interception, giving the ball back to Ozona.

Koby Fenton, Taylor and Bunger worked together to move

the Lions downfield, making the first down. The Lions then tried a pass play, only to have the Eagles intercept and stop their drive.

The Lion defense walled the Eagles in again, not allowing for much forward progress. Then Robert Ogle and Ramon Trujillo buried the quarterback with a sack pushing the Eagles back. Fourth and nineteen and the Eagles attempt to punt but instead were tackled for a loss, giving the Lions the ball on the 19-yard line.

The Lions were stalled in their next drive, and the Eagles took over on downs. Eldorado finally gained a first down before they threw a pass that was intercepted by Lalo Garza.

For the rest of the first quarter and into the second, the Lion offense hustled the ball toward the goal line. They scored again on a short but tough run by Jarryd Taylor. Skehan scored the extra point, and the scoreboard favored the Lions 14-0.

The Lions kicked off to Eldorado again. The Eagles succeeded in securing another first down in their drive. However, the

following play resulted in a fumble recovered by the Lions.

Ozona wasted no time in advancing toward the end zone once again. Taylor, Fenton and Josh Long carried the Lions to the goal line. Long capped the drive with the touchdown run. The Lions faked the extra point kick, but were unable to convert on the play. The Lions then led 20-0.

After the kickoff, the Lion defense held tight once again. The Eagles, with nowhere to go, had to punt.

The Lions began another drive with a good run by Taylor that was called back and penalized for holding. First and twenty and then Taylor got the ball again. Bunger's block created the hole Taylor needed, and he headed into the end zone for the touchdown. Skehan scored the extra point, and Ozona was ahead 27-0.

The Eagles found themselves up against the same stubborn defense as before and were not able to move the ball. They punted, and the Lions found themselves with the ball with about a minute left

in the half.

After a short gain by Bunger, the Lions looked to pass. Clay Hale connected with Brad Mayfield, Lalo Garza, then Wilson Stokes to secure the first down. After a few missed passes and a penalty for interference against the Eagles, Jarryd Taylor rumbled into the end zone for the score. Skehan's extra point kick brought the score to 34-0.

After the half, the Lions came out to kick off to the Eagles. Eldorado's drive was ended with a fumble recovered by Ozona's Tyson Vordick. The next play showed Quay Oglesby passing to Ryan Wiley for a run up the sideline and a touchdown. They added the point from the extra point kick to bring the score to 41-0.

The Eagles fought against their defenders, but soon punted the ball. The Lions struggled in their next possession with a fumble and recovery, and a tackle for a loss. On the fourth and fifteen, the Lions faked the punt, and Hale threw the ball to Brad Mayfield who carried it in for the

touchdown. The extra point was blocked, and 47-0 was the score.

The remainder of the third quarter had the teams trading possession, and the fourth quarter opened with Ozona punting to the Eagles. After allowing the first down, the Lion defense shut the Eagles down completely, forcing the punt. The next play, the Eagles recovered the ball on a fumble and put together a decent drive. However, this drive also ended in a fumble recovered by the Lions.

The game wound down with the teams once again trading possessions. The buzzer sounded, ending the game and giving the victory to the Lions. The final score of the game, 47-0 Ozona.

Offensively, the Lions had a great game, gaining 366 yards in total offense and scoring 47 points. The line played a good game, adjusting to Eldorado's defenses and stunts and preventing any quarterback sacks.

Coach Steve Taylor commended the offense, giving special kudos to some players. He *Please see page 6.*

Adult tickets are \$5.00 and student tickets are \$3.00. Local school and senior citizen passes will not be honored.

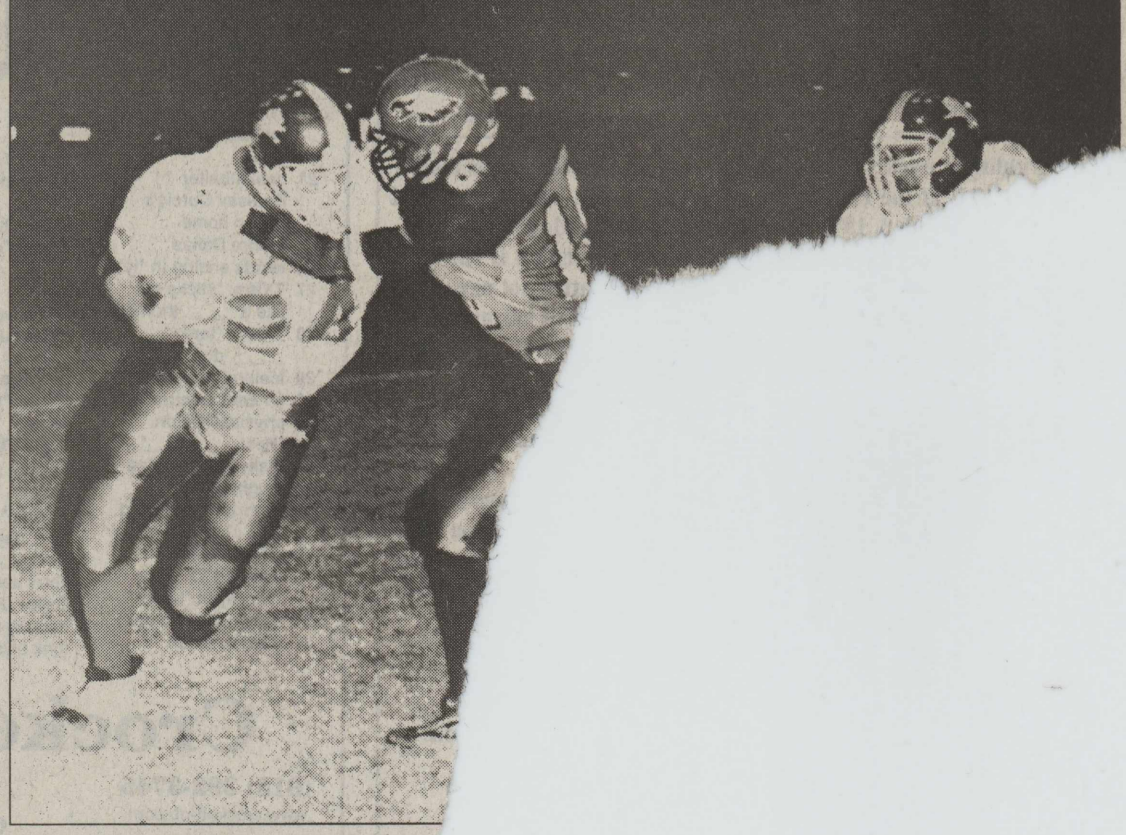
The only passes honored are those for District 2-AA and THSCA.

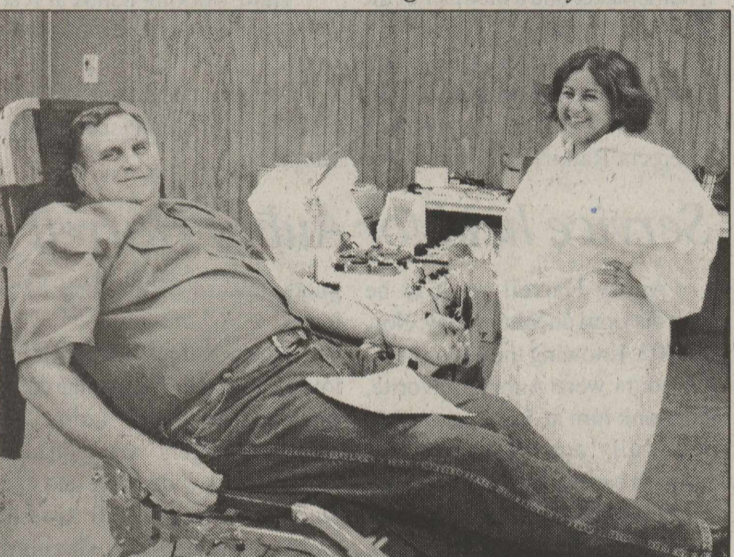

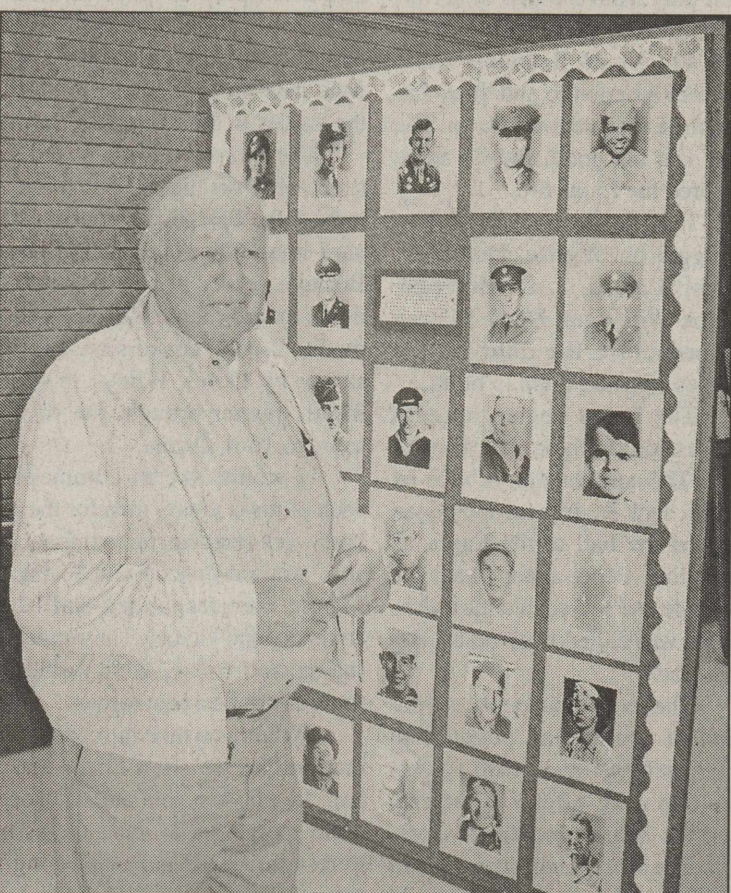

remarked, "The whole team has done great, but I have to especially brag on one group and one individual. The group is the offensive line. They have been out manned every game, but have battled and fought and clawed their way through each game and got the job done."

"Since Arron Garza got hurt, people have loaded up to stop our running game, but thanks to a bunch of unbelievably small (the line averages 185 pounds) guys up front we've got a back who's rushed for 1,200 yards and an offense averaging well over 300 yards a game and an undefeated season."

Coach Taylor continued, "The individual I want to brag on is Clay Hale. He went from thinking he wasn't going to play any to playing every down at quarterback and has led the offense and the team to an undefeated season. I can't say enough about the job Clay has done. Really, the whole team is special."

Defensively, the Lions played great, holding the Eagles to 60 total yards of offense and coming up with six turnovers. They totally shut out their opponent this game and have allowed only 48 points to be scored in the last 10 games, making them a top defense. Leading tacklers in this game were: Victor Hernandez with nine, Chase Clark and Jarryd Taylor with eight each and Robert Ogle, Ramon Trujillo, Bryan Skehan, John Ray Luna and Brad Mayfield with seven tackles each.

Most Valuable Players for the game were: The Offensive Line: center Johnny Tambunga, guards Andrew Shaffer and Chase Clark and tackles Jacob Tambunga and Roy Estrada for Offensive MVPs. They helped the offense gain 366 yards in total offense. #57 John Ray Luna for defensive MVP. He made seven tackles with two unassisted, three behind the line of scrimmage and one quarterback harassment. #8 Brad Mayfield for special teams MVP. He made three tackles on the kickoff team with two unassisted tackles and scored a touchdown on a fake punt.

The Lions finished their regular season undefeated with a 10-0 record. It has been 26 years since

Ozona has seen an undefeated regular season for the Lions. 1976 was the last time a Lion team has completed their regular schedule with no losses. That tells you that this is an accomplishment for any team. It definitely does not happen every year.

They will play in Fort Stockton on Friday, Nov. 15, at 7:30 p.m. Their opponent will be the 5-5 Van Horn Eagles who took third place in their district. However, the resilient Eagles quickly came soaring back as they narrowed the lead down to 20 to 14 at the end of the third quarter with a touchdown run of their own.

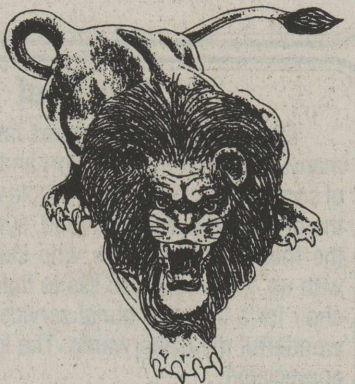
The fourth quarter was all Lions. The final showing of the David and Dean combo proved to be the most important as wadsworth took the pass from Esparza and ran it from 40

"Our job as a freshman team is to steadily get better and prepare ourselves for the next three years," said Coach Lenny Morrow. The Lions ran the time off the clock and took the victory with a final score of 20-6.

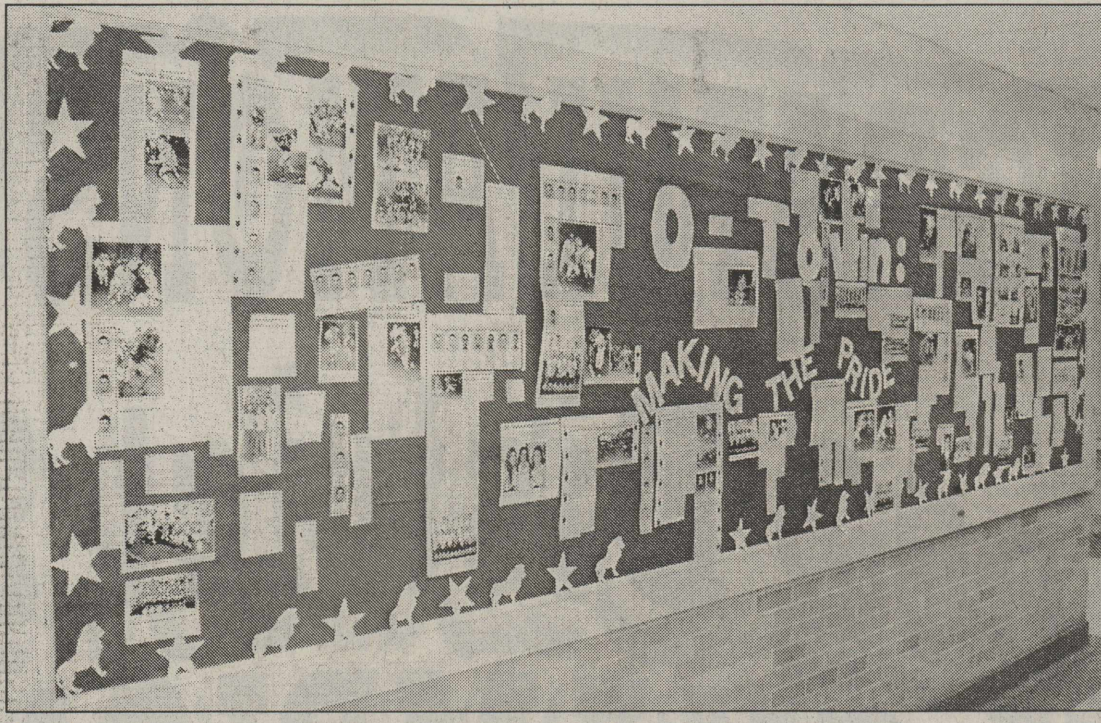

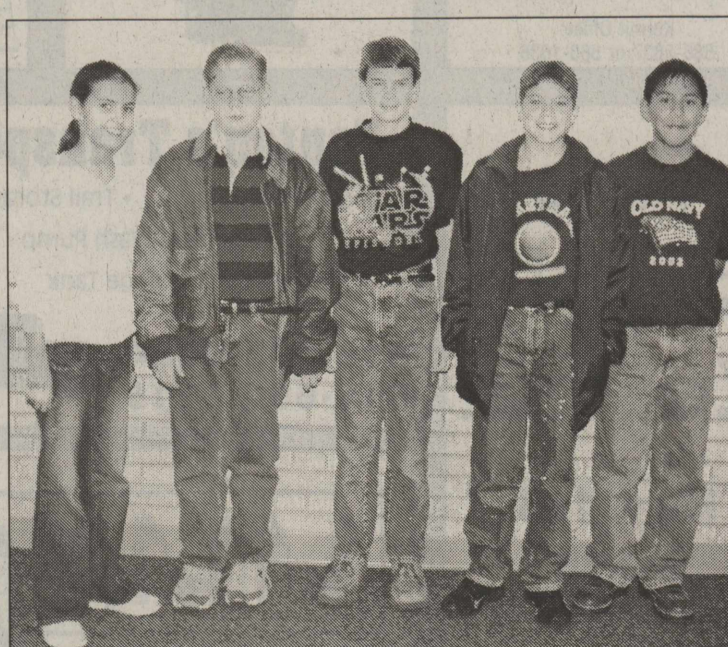
