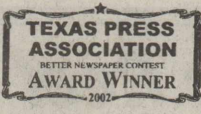
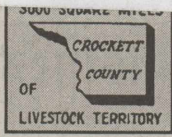


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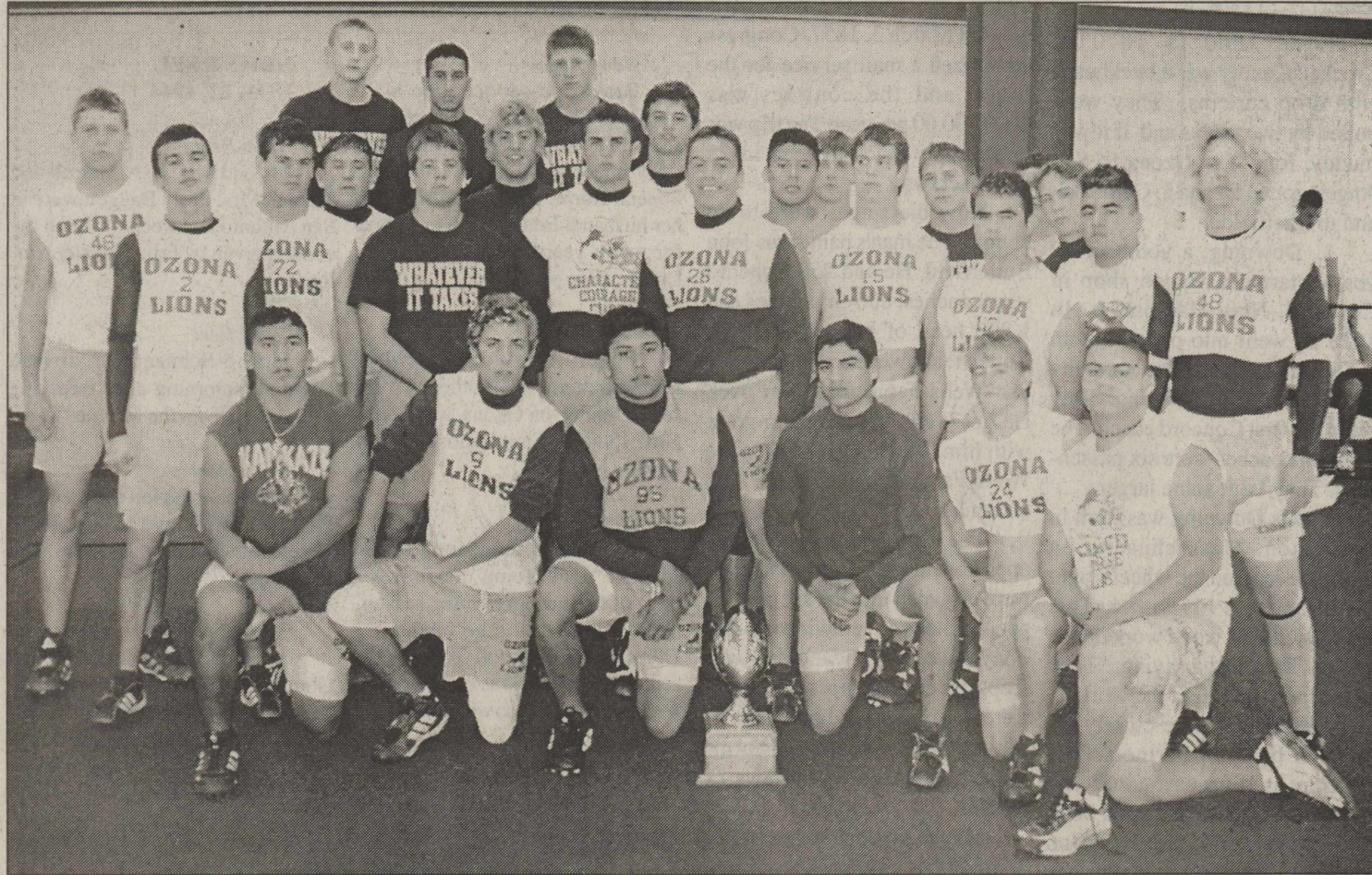

Lions seize bi-district championship

The Ozona Lions made quick work of the Van Horn Eagles Nov. 15, storming the field and dominating the game. The final score of the Fort Stockton contest was 66-0 with the Lions taking the bi-district trophy.

The night began with the Lions kicking off to Van Horn. The Lion defense held the Eagles, and on fourth and eight they punted. Ozona wasted no time in moving the ball. Jarryd Taylor carried for two consecutive first downs with G. L. Bunger adding the third. Jarryd and G. L. continued the progress toward the goal line. Bunger finished the drive with a 2-yard dash into the end zone for the touchdown. Bryan Skehan made the extra point kick, and the scoreboard read 7-0 for Ozona.

The Eagles received the kickoff and tried to answer the Lions. They were successful in attaining a first down only to be shut down again by the Lion defenders. The Eagles' punt was blocked on the 26-yard line, and the Lions gained possession.

Clay Hale connected with Lalo Garza on a pass to pick up nine yards. Jarryd then ran for the first down. After an offside penalty against Van Horn and a short gain by Hale on the carry, Taylor rumbled into the end zone for the touchdown. Skehan's kick was good again, and the score became 14-0.

The Eagles butted heads with the Lion defenders once again and found themselves unable to move the ball. After four plays, they punted. It was now Ozona's ball, and with a pass from Hale to Robert Ogle, the Lions made it to the end zone again. The Lions then faked the extra point, allowing Ryan Wiley to pitch the ball to Brad Mayfield who made good on the 2-point conversion. The score, 22-0.

The first quarter ended with the Eagles going four and out and the Lions receiving the punt. Taylor picked up nine yards on the next play with a tough run. Lalo then caught a Hale pass, gaining the first down and moving the Lions to the 17-yard line. The Eagles were penalized for offside on the next down, giving the Lions five yards. Play was at first and five with a reverse to Kris Gray for the touchdown. Skehan was straight on with the kick again, and the Lions led 28-0.

The Eagles struggled to pick up five yards on the next drive, then were completely paralyzed by the defense once again. They punted on the fourth and five play, giving the ball back to the Lions.

Lalo Garza secured the ball on the punt and zipped down the field to add another six points to the score. Skehan's kick was good again, and the score was 35-0.

Van Horn again was unable to secure a first down, and after

Mighty Lions ready for Idalou in area contest

Ozona's Lions are 11-0 after a runaway win over Van Horn Nov. 15, capturing the bi-district championship. The Lions will meet the 10-1 Idalou Wildcats Nov. 22 in an area contest at the Grande Communications Stadium in Midland.

Leading their respective teams into the fray are the Taylor brothers, Ozona Head Coach Steve Taylor and Idalou Head Coach Johnny Taylor. Steve Taylor became the Lions' head coach

with the 1999 season. Johnny Taylor is in his 12th year as Idalou's head coach.

Game time Friday will be 7:30 p.m. with Ozona in the home stands on the west side of the stadium, which is located on North Loop 250 at Hwy. 191.

Ticket prices are \$5.00 for adults and \$3.00 for students at the gate. There will be no advance ticket sales. District passes and coaches' cards will be honored.

Court buys Baggett stockpile

County commissioners voted to enter a contract with Penn Baggett to purchase his stockpile of flexible road base material when they met Tuesday, Nov. 12. This crushed limestone material was offered by Baggett in a proposal first made in August. Under the agreement, the county will have the right to renew annually until the stockpile is exhausted. A minimum annual purchase is required.

The court voted to adopt a resolution supporting a "united voice for Texas counties on technology issues". This action is part of a statewide effort to obtain Legislative recognition and resources to address challenges of technology through membership in the County Information Resources Agency.

CIRA was created from recommendations of the Texas Association of Counties e-County Task Force to act as a coordinator with state and federal agencies in the planning and deployment of new programs involving the use of technology.

The interlocal agreement approved by the court with CIRA also includes such benefits as free secure e-mails to county officials, registration and hosting of county domain names, free standard county web sites and web site hosting. Members can also join the e-County listserv and the Geographic Information Systems

listserv which will pass along news items and allow all of the members to share ideas and information.

A contract with Midland County for detention of juvenile offenders was approved by the court. Crockett County Jail is not approved for housing of juvenile offenders.

The court members also voted to execute a resolution for the indigent defense discretionary grant program. The grant program assists in providing improvement in indigent defense services.

Other action taken by the court includes: approval of payroll deduction for deferred compensation offered by AIG Financial Services, approval of the Rimrock Ranch Phase III final plat, appointment of Dr. Marcus Sims as county health officer, certification of the returns of the 2002 general election, authorization of re-advertisement of bids for a chip spreader, and setting of Dec. 19 as the date for the employee appreciation luncheon.

Commissioners appointed the following persons to the shooting sports complex board: Frank White, Eddie Moore, Eddie Stewart, Cindy Dusek, Hugh Childress, Roy Walston and Tom Anderson with Jake Stewart as a junior officer.

Stolen car leads to capture of wanted men

A hit on a license plate run in Sutton County put officers on alert and led to the arrest of two men wanted in Alabama.

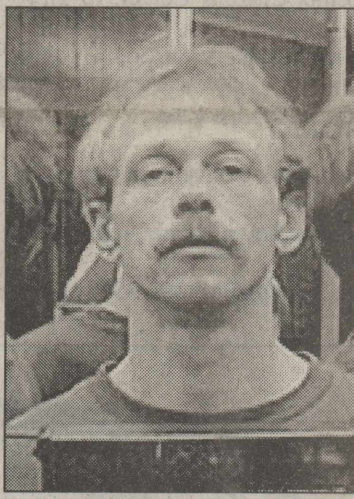
Sutton County Deputy Bob Hartman was going through the westbound roadside park west of Sonora when he saw the 1984 Ford F-150 pickup and called in the plates. The computer was running slow, and when a reply was returned in about five minutes, it came back as a stolen vehicle with a caution that the occupants were wanted for questioning for murder.

The maroon pickup was reported stolen out of Covington County, AL, Nov. 6, the same night that a resident of the community of Gantt was fatally shot.

Trooper Don Van Zandt of Sonora sighted the pickup about eight miles east of Ozona and made the stop without incident as Troopers and other officers from Crockett and Sutton Counties converged on the scene.

DPS communications officer Glenda Capps said the two men in the pickup got out with their arms up and lay down in the ditch. Arrested were Bobby O'Lee Phillips, 39, of Opp, AL, and Oscar Roy Doster, 27, of Andalusia, AL. Phillips and Doster escaped from the Covington County Jail earlier this month along with two other prisoners.

Investigation of a burglary at a mobile home in Gantt on Nov. 6 led to the discovery of a gunshot



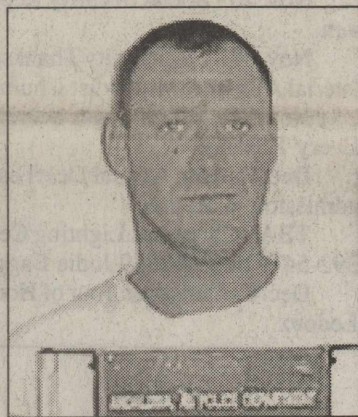

victim in an adjacent travel trailer. A 1984 Ford F-150 maroon truck with a maroon camper shell was taken from the residence.

Also reported missing was camouflage clothing, a 16-gauge shotgun, a 12-gauge shotgun and a 30.06 bolt action rifle.

The pickup was sealed with crime scene tape and brought to Crockett County Jail to be held for Covington County officials. Two investigators were expected to arrive in Ozona from Alabama sometime Tuesday.

Covington County Investigator Elliot King said three people have been arrested for aiding the escapees, who left the jail through

a ventilation system.

Doster was reported to be in jail for a probation violation and was originally convicted for sexual abuse in the first degree for improper touching of a child.

Phillips was on probation for escape in the third degree, a probation violated when he originally pled guilty to several burglary charges according to information in *The Star News*, a newspaper in Andalusia.

The office of Alabama Governor Don Siegelman had announced a \$10,000.00 reward for information leading to the arrest of Phillips and Doster, and a separate reward of \$1,000.00 had been put up by the Covington County Sheriff's Posse.

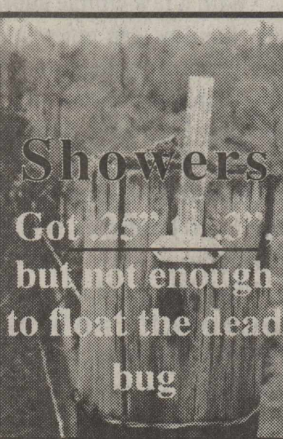

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Crockett County History
"This is the way it was"

In 1850 the first mail crossed Crockett County in a Concord coach pulled by six mules in command of Big Foot Wallace. The trek took 30 days between San Antonio and El Paso.
From 1860 to 1870 in Crockett County was a buckboard with drop curtains. They were pulled by two mules and if it was muddy, four. The Ozona to San Angelo route, Ozona to Comstock and to Sheffield.
L. Downing, a youth of 19 years, started a wagon shop in Concord, New Hampshire. In 1828 he went into partners with J. Stephens Abbott. The company was Abbott and Downing. They built the first Concord coach. The original coaches were six passengers. They built some larger.
Lewis Downing was born in Lexington, Massachusetts, in 1792. He learned the wheelwright business from his father. This helped with his wood work on the stages. They had a saying, "They blazed a trail around the world."
The stages were closely inspected by both partners. The coaches used up east could seat nine passengers. The coach body was mounted on leather straps (no springs). The first coaches were built to transport passengers from the railroad to Scarborough.
Now for some real use of the coaches.

Crockett County History (continued)
The Butterfield Mail and Passenger Service ran from Saint Louis to San Francisco from Sept. 15, 1858, to March 1, 1861, the longest route in history. 2,795 miles.
On March 3, 1857, Congress authorized a mail service for the route, and the contract was \$600,000.00 per year. The trip was to be made twice a week in 25 days each way.
Now the stages were to be bought. The man's name was John Butterfield. He had 250 Concord stagecoaches, 800 employees and 1,800 head of horses. In 1860, Butterfield owed so much money that Wells-Fargo took him over. He got Wells and Fargo to go in with him. They later founded the Wells-Fargo you see on the sign on banks.
The Concord stagecoach - one more thing. The passengers were crowded into the six passenger coaches with entwined knees. They traveled night and day with stops to change horses. Meals were not furnished. Each passenger was asked to bring firearms in case of attack by outlaws or Indians.
Maybe you can make something of this column about stage coaches.

Cut calories this holiday season with substitutions

Preparing a healthy holiday meal needn't be a hassle, says Leigh Ann Kowalsky, a registered dietitian and a clinical instructor of clinical nutrition at UT Southwestern Allied Health Science School.
"With a few simple substitutions, families can enjoy a delicious yet healthy meal this holiday season," says Kowalsky, who offers the following calorie-saving tips:
*Use broth to sauté instead of butter - 104 calories saved per tablespoon
*Substitute 1/3 cup of mayonnaise and 1/3 cup of non-fat yogurt for 2/3 cup of mayonnaise - 480 calories saved.
*Use nonfat milk instead of whole milk - 60 calories saved per cup.
*Use plain nonfat yogurt instead of cream - 720 calories saved per cup.
*Eat skinless chicken - 360 calories saved per whole bird.

Health services news

Benny Gibbs, administrator of Crockett County Care Center, talked with commissioners at their Nov. 12 meeting about the request by the care center and health and emergency service's board for assistance with Dr. Marcus Sims'

liability insurance as medical director. His liability insurance has increased from last year's \$10,000.00 to \$38,000.00 with a large part of the reason being the services he provides not only for the clinic but for being medical director for the EMS and Crockett County Care Center. At a meeting of the health services board on Oct. 10, members agreed to request that the county assist with half the amount.

Commissioners voted to appoint Dr. Sims as county health officer.

Gibbs reported to his board and to commissioners that the office of the director of nurses and assistant director of nurses and that of medical records have been repainted and that the dietary manager's office is being enlarged. Eleven bedside tables and seven 4-drawer dressers have been ordered for residents' rooms.

The facility remains deficiency free and has 79% occupancy.

Linda Knightstep, regional health director with Shannon Health Systems, updated the board on the Family Health Clinic's new billing system. Due to difficulties with the system, the clinic will not get paid \$36,000.00 from Medicaid or Medicare charges incurred but not billed prior to 95 days.

Mrs. Knightstep also reported to the board that P. A. Jim Drees is no longer with the clinic. Two parttime physician's assistants are being brought in to relieve Dr. Sims.

Crockett County EMS reported 45 runs during October with 26 local. Thirty-eight patients were attended with 31 of these being local residents.

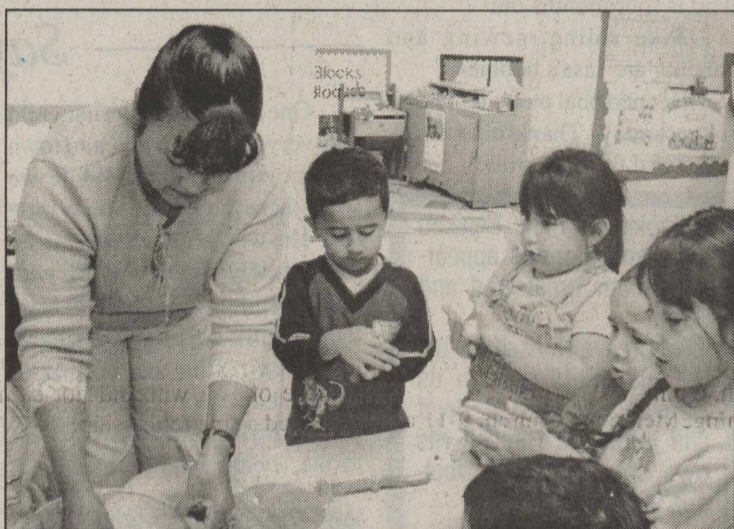

God's Gracious Gift

A man drives through the window of a restaurant and then begins killing the people in that restaurant. Another man kills his fellow employees in a post office. The discussion around coffee involves gun control. Take the guns out of the hands of these people and you will solve the problem. It is true that taking the guns out of the hands of such people will reduce mass slaughter. But it will not solve the problem. The root problem is really the hearts of men and women. Why do people kill and murder and destroy? They have a real heart problem. Listen to what Jesus says, "From within, out of the heart of men, proceed the evil thoughts, fornications, thefts, murders, adulteries, deeds of coveting and wickedness, as well as deceit, sensuality, envy, slander, pride and foolishness. All these evil things proceed from within and defile the man" (Mark 7:21-23). Note that Jesus says murder comes out of the heart! This is born out by the fact that 75 to 80 percent of those who go to prison return to their old ways. Once they have murdered, they will likely murder again. And there is only one real solution. There must be a radical change of heart. And this means a new heart. But there is only one source for such a new heart. A new heart is God's gracious gift. Listen, "Moreover, I will give you a new heart and put a new spirit within you; and I will remove the heart of stone from your flesh and give you a heart of flesh. And I will put My Spirit within you and cause you to walk in My statutes, and you will be careful to observe My ordinances" (Ezekiel 36:26-27). You see, the reason a new heart is the solution to the problem of murder is that a new heart leads people to follow God's command "You shall not commit murder" (Exodus 20:13).

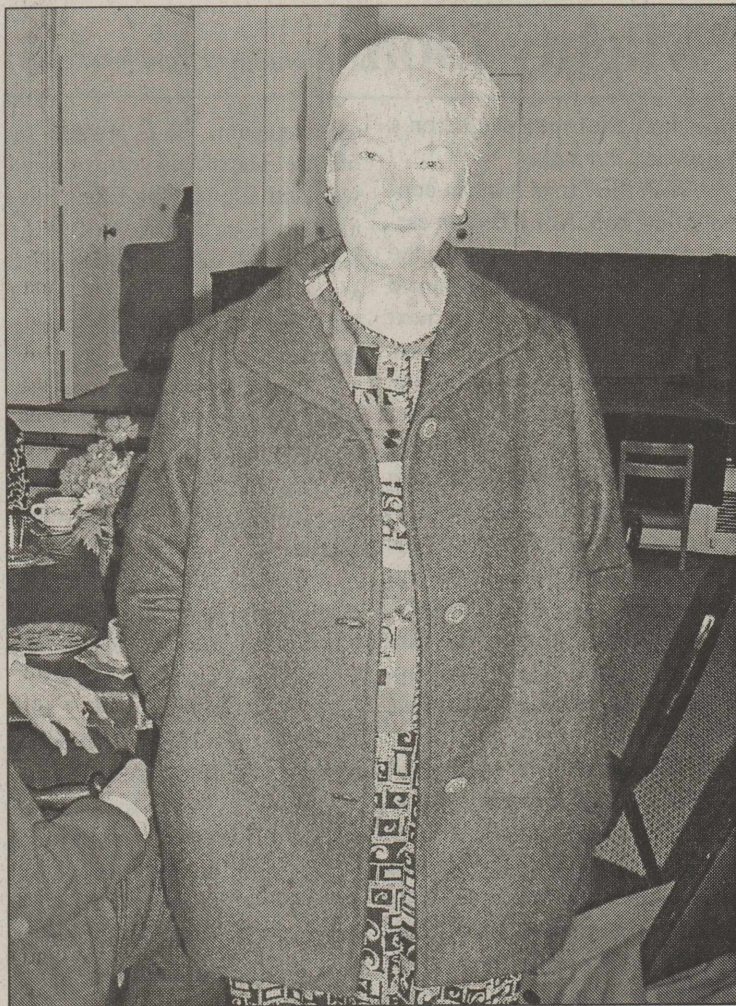

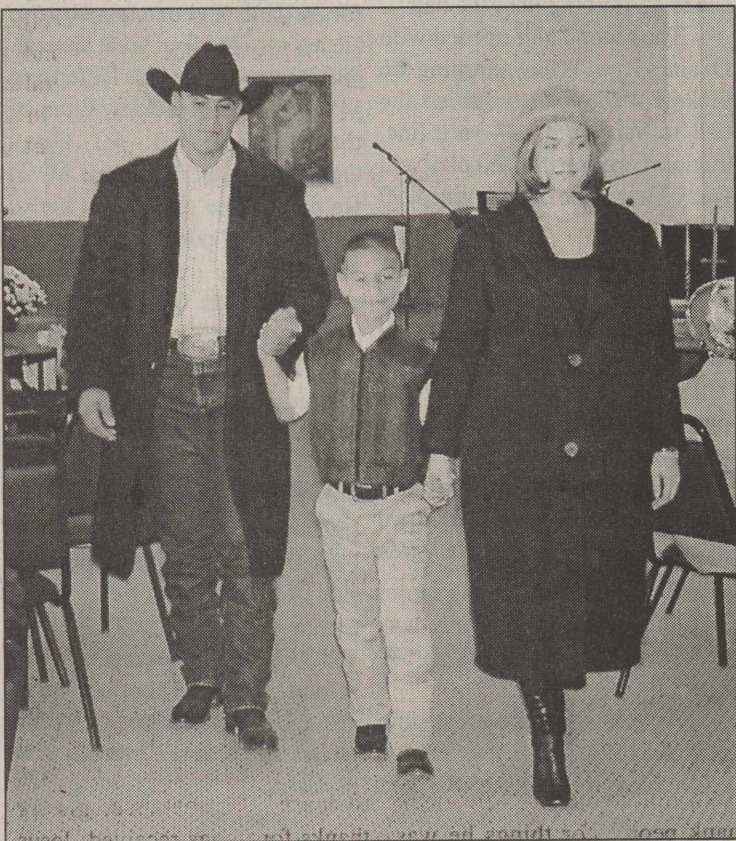

Mammography Clinic Dec. 5

Breast cancer takes years to develop. Early in the disease, most cancers of the breast cause no symptoms. When breast cancer is detected in the localized stage without spread to lymph nodes, the five year survival rate is 97%. If the cancer has spread regionally to axillary (underarm) lymph nodes the rate drops to 76%. If distant metastasis (spread) to other organs such as the lungs, bone marrow, liver, or brain is present, the five year survival rate is 20%.

Screening mammography is an x-ray examination of the breast in a woman who is asymptomatic (has no breast complaints). The goal of screening mammography is to detect cancer when it is still too small to be felt by her or her physician. Early detection of small breast cancers by screening mammography greatly improves a woman's chances for successful treatment.

Screening mammography usually involves two views (x-ray pictures) of each breast. For some patients, additional pictures may be needed at screening to include as much breast tissue as possible.

The American Cancer Society Board of Directors voted on March 23, 1997 to change the Society's breast detection guidelines to include yearly screening mammography for all women 40 years of age and older. The Society's decision was based on the following evidence

* 1 in 66 women in their forties will develop breast cancer. About 18% of all breast cancers occur in women in their forties.

• Results from the most recent meta-analysis (a compilation of many studies) of all 8 randomized clinical trials found 17% fewer deaths from breast among women in their forties who had mammography.

• Breast cancers found by mammographic screening of women in their forties were smaller and at an earlier stage (with less spread to lymph nodes or other organs) than cancers found in women not having mammography.

• The American Cancer Society believes that the benefits of

yearly mammography for women in their forties and older outweigh the impact of occasional false positive results leading to biopsy of noncancerous abnormalities, and the economic cost of these examinations. The exposure of radiation has been previously suggested as a disadvantage, but the low dose of radiation from modern mammography is not felt to pose a significant risk.

Because mammography can not find 100% of breast cancers, The American Cancer Society recommends use of three tests for breast cancer detection in asymptomatic women-mammography, clinical breast exams by a physician or other health care professional, and breast self examination (BSE).

The American Cancer Society Guidelines for the detection of breast cancer in asymptomatic women are:

• Women 20 years of age and older should perform breast self-examination every month.

• Women 20-39 should have a physical examination of the breast every three years, performed by health care professional such as a physician, physician assistant, nurse or nurse practitioner.

• Women 40 years of age and older should have a mammogram every year.

These guidelines apply only to women at usual risk for breast cancer, who have no symptoms of breast cancer. Women with certain risk factors, such as a family history of breast cancer should discuss their risk factors with their doctor. In some cases, mammography may be started before age 40 and a more vigilant schedule of early detection tests may be appropriate.

Texas Tech Mobile Mammography Clinic will be at the Ozona United Methodist Church on December 5. Medicare pays for one mammography per year. The cost of a screening mammogram is \$75.00. Call 1-800-222-8388 to schedule your mammogram.

Don't think Social Security can do it all

Social Security never was meant to be your only source of retirement income. It always was meant to be part of a "three-legged financial stool," along with private pensions and savings or investments.

Most financial planners tell people to figure out how much money they'll need in retirement, usually 70 to 80 percent of their pre-retirement incomes, and then start socking away 10 percent of their incomes to meet this goal. If you can't do that much, at least set aside one dollar for retirement savings for every dollar of Social Security taxes you pay.

Remember, for the average wage earner, Social Security will replace only about 40 percent of what you make before you retire.

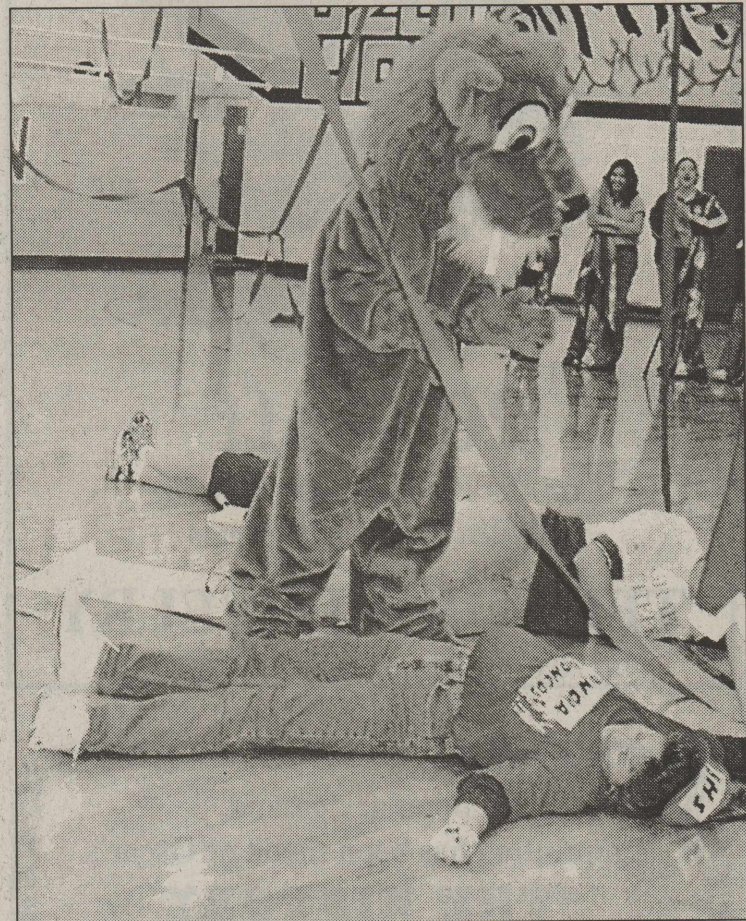

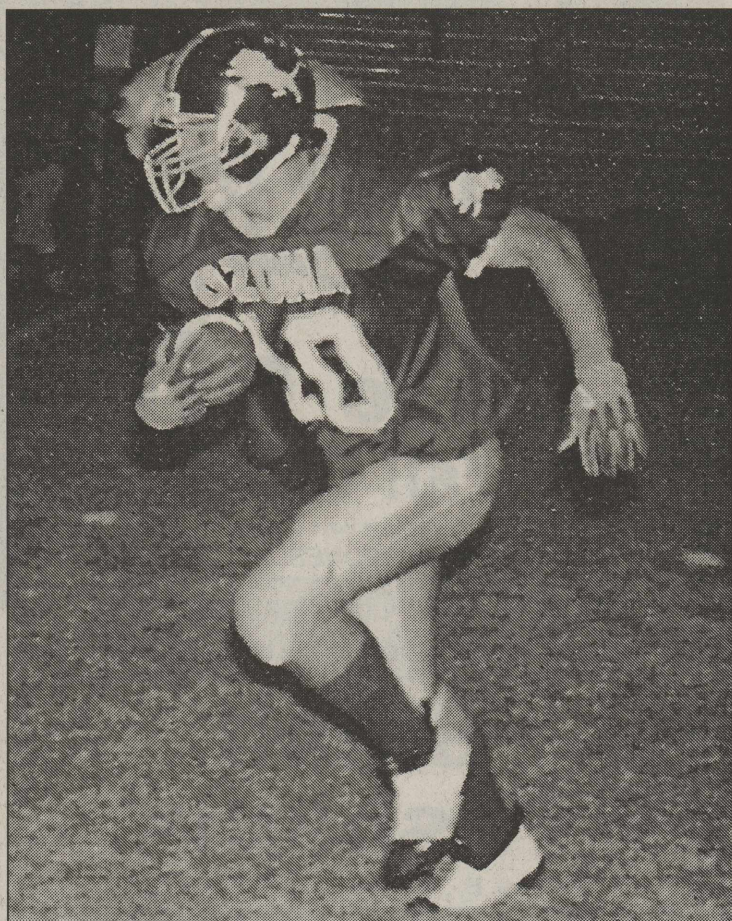
