Four Lions named to All State football team





administrative guidelines for use of the Ozona High School vocational agriculture department pickup. The guidelines are: (1) The primary use of the Ozona High School Vocational Agriculture Department pickup shall be for vocational agriculture department school-related activities; however, in the event that it is needed for other school-related activities, it shall be shared equally as needed;


(2) In the event of a conflict between the use of the vocational agriculture department pickup and the need to use the vehicle for other school-related activities, the superintendent of schools or designee shall have the final authority to resolve the conflict;


(3) The vocational agriculture department pickup shall be driven by the vocational agriculture department teacher, and no students shall be allowed to drive the vehicle;

(4) For the purpose of vehicle safety, the vocational agriculture department pickup shall be garaged at the home of the vocational agriculture teacher during his/her contracted months of employment: therefore, transportation of the vehicle to the individual's residence and back to school each day shall be allowed; and, (6) The superintendent of schools or designee shall have the final authority to resolve concerns regarding use of the vocational agriculture department pickup.

The administrative guidelines were requested by the board so that employees would have a clearer idea of the use of the vehicle when a new vocational agriculture department pickup is delivered to the district in late December or January.

The members went into executive session at 8:45 p.m. for the purpose of conducting the annual evaluation of the school district superintendent. Emerging out of executive session at 9:35 p.m., they voted to set the date and time of the regular January 2003 meeting on Jan. 16 at 6:30 p.m.


