praisal roll in Crockett County for 2002 was \$1,184,295,810 with minerals making up \$877,705,570 or 74.11% of that amount. The values of the tax appraisal roll for 2001 totaled \$1,265,553,830 with a 76.6% (\$969,609,900) mineral value.

Taxes are rendered by Duke Energy in two categories. Together they rank fourth on the county's mineral roll. Separately they are seventh and 13th in the top 15 for 2002.

But to staff from the Texas Department of Health's (TDH) zoonosis control program, feeding coyotes and gray foxes specially prepared food packets is not particularly an act of kindness. Rather, it is part of a vitally seriby helping control the spread of rabies.

For the ninth year, TDH will airdrop bait food filled with oral rabies vaccination program (ORVP) will drop about 2.5 million baits from airplanes flying across 50 counties beginning in early January. The first flight takes off Jan. 7, weather permitting, from the Zapata County Airport in South Texas. The second portion of the drop will begin about Jan. 15 from the Kimble County Airport in Junction, and the final phase will fly from the Pecos County Airport in Fort Stockton beginning about Jan. 23.

TDH initiated the program in 1995 in South Texas where canine These hungry animals may rabies in coyotes and domestic dogs had reached epidemic proportions and threatened to invade San Antonio and other major population areas. The next year, an airdrop began in West Central Texas where an epidemic of gray fox rabies had been occurring since 1988.

"The baits are harmless," Sidwa said. "The vaccine inside the bait cannot cause rabies in people or animals."

People should not handle these baits, however; wildlife is less likely to eat them if people have touched them. Anyone who comes in contact with the baits may call TDH toll free at 1-877-722-6725 for information. Each bait, which measures 1 1/4 by 1 1/4 by 3/4 inches, is marked with a label that includes the telephone number.







Nutritionist touts "No Diet"

Looking to lose weight as a New Year's resolution? A little behavior modification may be the key

"Most diet plans and weight loss programs are like a prison sentence, with one difference: You get better food at a penitentiary," said Molly Gee, a nutritionist in the Department of Medicine at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Gee said by modifying eating habits and lifestyle slightly, many people can say "goodbye" to diets forever, and enjoy the good food, within reason, during the holiday season and into the new year.

"First, you need to set reasonable, realistic and measurable goals based on behavior, not only pounds lost," she said. "Then, find an exercise routing you will enjoy and follow on a consistent Wiley basis."

When eating, Gee recommends the following:

•Slow down by laying down the fork between bites and drinking the beverage first to help fill the stomach.

•Choose one specific place at home or at work to eat. Eat only while seated.

•Get all high-risk foods out of the house.

•Modify recipes by cutting down fat by one-fourth. •Serve plates from the kitchen rather than placing bowls of food on the table.

"It is very important that you reward your achievements every step of the way when applying these strategies," Gee said. "You must be your own best support person."

Most of our members are too young to remember when "lamp" meant "coal oil lamp." Heck, so are we. 1937 is the year most cooperatives started spreading the light. Before then, farms and ranches depended on wood stoves and coal oil and ice blocks for light and cooking and refrigeration. At the time, private power providers didn't see any profit in putting electricity in "the sticks."

So rural families got together and formed electric cooperatives, and with the help of government loans, did it themselves. Just ordinary people, many of them our grandparents and great-grandparents, but they spread the light in the dark land between the cities. All because they believed in the power of people working together: cooperation.

Electric deregulation is based on the belief that competition is better than cooperation. Put electricity on the market and it'll be cheaper. Maybe, maybe not. For now, Southwest Texas Electric Co-op has decided not to opt in to deregulation, at least till we're sure it's right for our members. We think the smart choice is to "wait and see." After sixty years, we've learned a little patience and that what's good for city folk doesn't necessarily apply out here. 



Your Spiritual Disposition

By Dr. Dennis J. Prutow When I get up in the morning, I'd just as soon be left alone. I have my little morning routine and I like it just fine. And if you upset that routine, I'm liable to get upset. I guess I just can't stand too much change. This is true with many of us. Change threatens us. And we react! And the same thing is true when we start talking about God. You see, the God of the Bible demands change! We are told that God loves us just the way we are. But I take exception to that line of thinking. God may love sinners. And Christ may have died for sinners. But the Bible tells us that Christ came into the world to "save His people from their sins" (Matthew 1:21). And this means that Christians are called to leave old sinful lifestyles and form new habits which are pleasing to God. And this is a real challenge. But it is part of what it means to be a Christian. "Well," you say, "If being a Christian means giving up my drinking and the little affair I've been having with my neighbor's wife, I'm not interested." That's right, you are not interested. But listen. You cannot continue in your sin and expect to experience the love of God. When I get up in the morning, I sometimes have an ugly disposition. But that is nothing compared to a disposition which is opposed to God. And that needs to be changed. Why? "The mind set on the flesh is death, but the mind set on the spirit is life and peace" (Romans 8:6). Let me reword this verse so it makes more sense, "The disposition of the flesh is death, but the disposition of the spirit is life and peace." The disposition of the flesh is opposed to God. But the disposition of the spirit loves God.
