

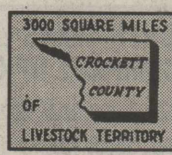

Taylor named to All West Texas Super Team

Five Lions named to All West Texas Team

The Lions continue raking in the honors this year with five of our Lions named to The All West Texas Team. Ozona even had a player on the All West Texas Super Team, which consists of all the players in West Texas from class 5A on down.

Jarryd Taylor, son of Steve and Renee Taylor, is a 5'10", 184 lb. junior. He made the All West Texas team as a running back. This season, he rushed for 1410 yards and made 17 touchdowns.

Jarryd's impressive season was aided by "an undersized offensive line that played over their heads and with a lot of heart," stated Coach Taylor. "The guys that led the war for Taylor were Chase Clark, Jacob Tambunga, Johnny Tambunga, Andrew Shaffer, Roy Estrada, Victor Hernandez, Dominique Perez, Wilson Stokes and Robert Ogle. Three of these guys were All West Texas as well."

Chase Clark, son of Dennis and Elizabeth Clark, is a 5'11", 175 lb. senior. He made the All West Texas team as a defensive lineman. Chase was voted the Defensive Most Valuable Player for District 2-AA this year. He had 87 tackles and 10 quarterback sacks.

"Chase was moved from running back to lineman his junior year and responded great," said Coach Taylor. "He had two great years for Ozona on the defensive line. Nobody we played could block him this year. He spent a lot of time in the opponents backfield."

Jacob Tambunga, son of Melissa Tambunga, is a 6'0", 195 lb. senior. He was named to the All West Texas team as an offensive

lineman. He was named All District for three years and this year it was by unanimous vote.

Coach Taylor commented. "Jacob's been a great blocker for us for three years. When we had to have it, we knew we could run behind Jacob and get what we needed. Three years ago, he went from the freshman team to starting on the varsity and never looked back. We'll miss him a great deal."

Robert Ogle, son of Gloria Williams and Bobby Ogle, is a 6'2", 195 lb. senior. He made the All West Texas Team as a defensive end. This season he had 104 tackles and seven quarterback sacks. Robert has been named All District three years being the unanimous choice the last two years. Over his three-year career he had 26 quarterback sacks.

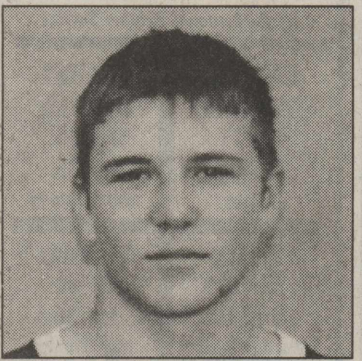
"Robert demanded a lot of respect from all our opponents. He could close a lot of ground on a quarterback in a hurry if he didn't sack them he was usually in their face," remarked Coach Taylor.

Lalo Garza, son of Lalo and Belia Garza, is a 5'11", 130 lb. senior. He was named to the All West Texas team as a utility player, for doing a good job of everything. Lalo had 46 tackles, four interceptions, 18 receptions for 305 yards and four touchdowns, and three punt returns for touchdowns this season. He made the All District team three years and got the unanimous vote the last two years.

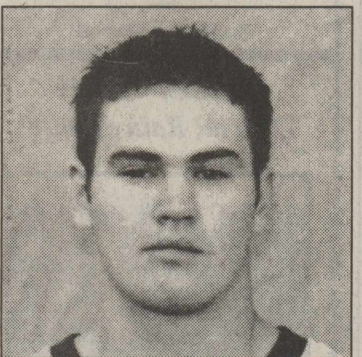
"Lalo was another guy all the opposing coaches talked about," Coach Taylor noted. "By the end of the year nobody would punt to him and if they did, he made them pay."

The Lion named to the All West Texas Super Team was Jarryd Taylor. He was named to the team as a utility player, running back and linebacker. The All West Texas Super team is quite an honor since players from every classification compete for the spots on the team. There are not many 2A players on the team. Jarryd's 1410 yards rushing, 141 tackles and eight quarterback sacks earned him a spot on the Super Team.

"This is a big honor for Jarryd," stated Coach Taylor. "Again, this is truly a team honor."

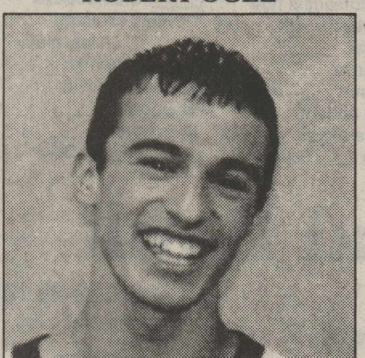

Lions take 2nd tournament championship

The Ozona Lions competed in the Sterling City Tournament on Dec. 27-30, ultimately winning the tournament, giving the Lions their second tourney championship trophy this season. "This was a very good tournament for us. Our guard play has been very good and very consistent all year. Our post players brought their game up a notch in this tournament" Coach Osborn said.

The first round of play pitted the Lions against the Forsan Buffaloes. The Buffaloes played the Lions close for three quarters before the Lions dominated the final quarter, winning the game 80-67.

Scoring against Forsan were Derek Faught with 21 points, Bryan Skehan with 17 points, Brad Mayfield with 15 points, Lalo Garza with 11 points, and

Dennis Taylor with seven points, Robert Ogle with four points, Jarryd Taylor with three points, and Arron Garza with two points.

Leading rebounders in this game were Derek Faught with 12, and Bryan Skehan with eight rebounds. Ryan Wiley also played for the Lions.

The semifinal game for the Lions was against Robert Lee. This was another close game in the first three quarters with Ozona and Robert Lee taking turns at the lead. Again, the Lions dominated the fourth quarter and finished with the victory and final score of 62-54.

The Lions' 62 points were contributed by Derek Faught with 19 points, Bryan Skehan with 16, Robert Ogle with eight, Lalo Garza with seven, Brad Mayfield with six, and Arron Garza, Ryan Wiley, and Jarryd Taylor making two points each.

Top rebounders were Robert

Ogle with nine, and Derek Faught and Bryan Skehan with eight rebounds apiece. Dennis Taylor also played in this game for the Lions.

This victory put the Lions in the championship game with Sterling City. The Lions did not wait as long to take control of this game. After a close first quarter, the Lions gained a good lead and finished the game with a final of 75-46, giving the Lions their second tournament championship this year.

Bryan Skehan made 19 points. Robert Ogle and Derek Faught each scored 12. Ryan Wiley and Jarryd Taylor made eight points apiece, Lalo Garza put in seven, Arron Garza added six points, and Brad Mayfield scored three points.

Robert Ogle grabbed 13 rebounds, Bryan Skehan had 10, and

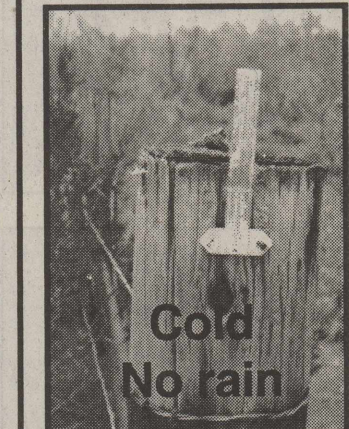


Crockett County Official Rain Gauge

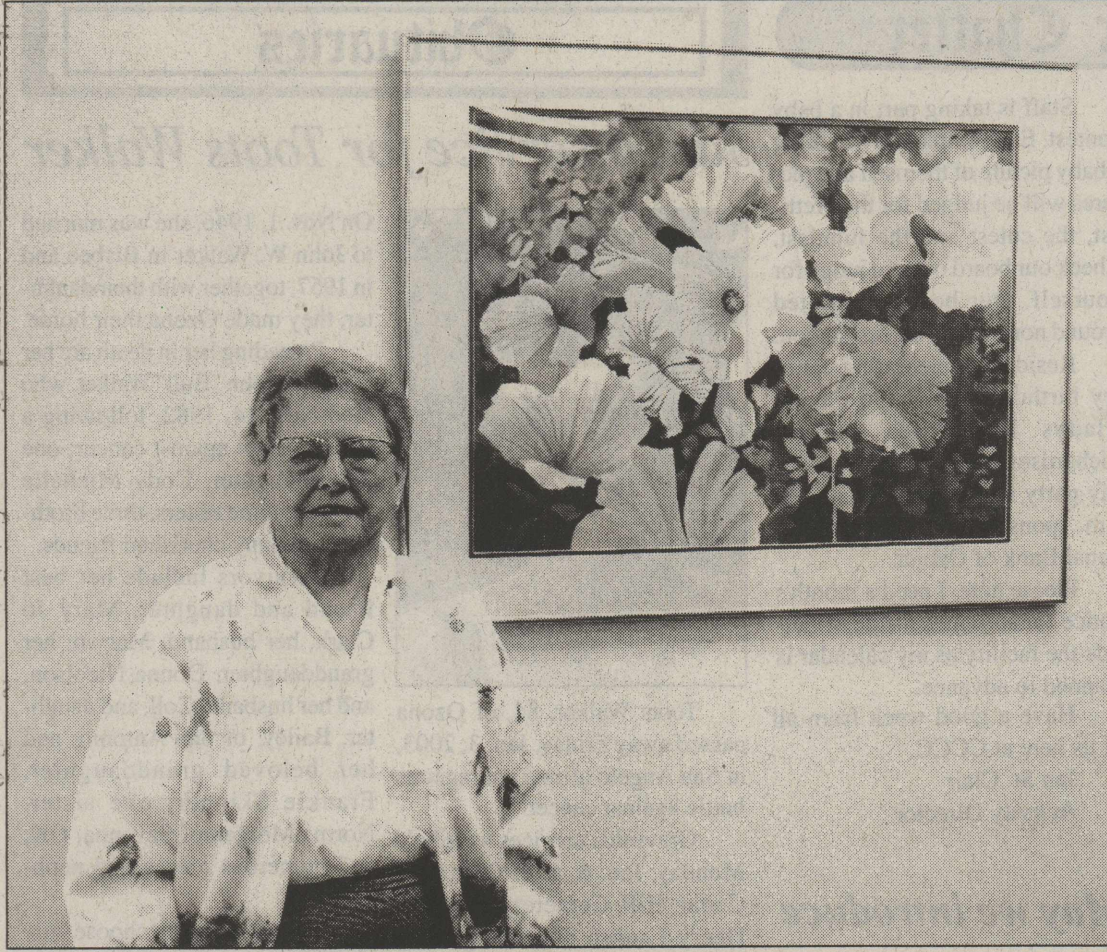

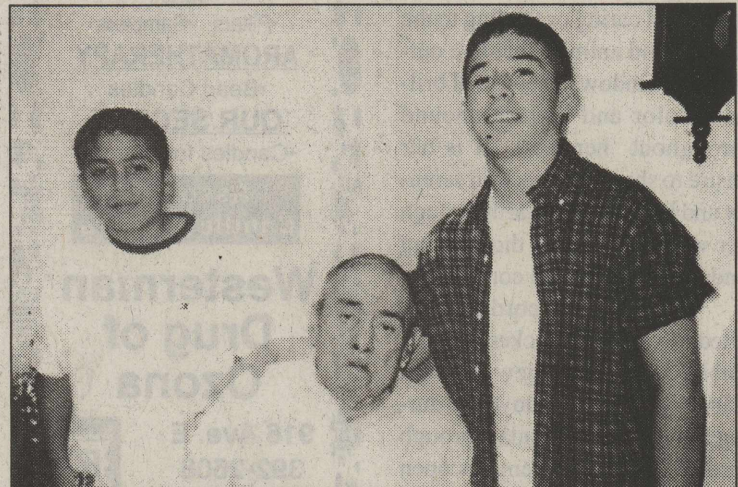

"Keep those prayers coming," requests Lupe.

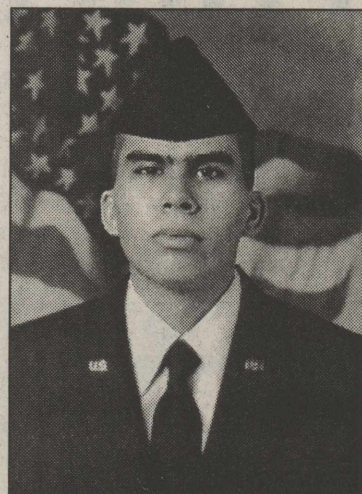
Former Ozonan graduates from basic training

Texas Cooperative Extension to offer foodservice manager certification course

Statistics indicate that foodborne illness continues to be a health issue in the United States. Each year, 1 in 4 Americans will become sick, 1 in 1,000 will become hospitalized, and 5,000 will die due to a foodborne illness.

During the past legislative session, a statute was amended that allowed the Texas Department of Health (TDH) to require each food establishment to have one certified food manager.

Recently, the Texas Board of Health adopted rules to implement this statute. Many of you have already received a letter from the Texas Department of Health regarding this. Under these new rules, each food establishment permitted by the Texas Department of Health must have one certified food manager. New food manager certificates will be valid for 5 years.

maintaining clean utensils, equipment and surroundings
controlling pests



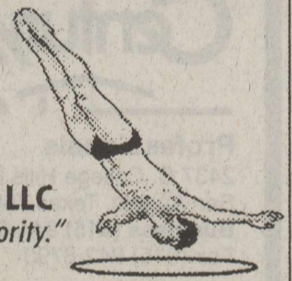
